REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Superintending School Committee respectfully presents the following report:

The schools of the town—fifteen Summer, and the same number of Winter—have been under the care and instruction of twenty-five different teachers, four of them males, and twenty-one females.

The amount of money raised by town tax for the support of schools is \$1,076.30; amount received from Literary Fund, \$73.80.

The average length of the schools is 8 3-5 weeks. The more important statistics of the schools are given in the following table.

Those schools that commenced after the first of November are called Winter schools.

efforts to have the different schools in town take a higher and more advanced standing. I have tried to impress upon the mind of the scholars the great importance of a good and thorough education. I think that our schools have been as successful, and have made as good progress as during any preceding year; and in some respects considerable improvement has manifestly been made. No school in town can be said to have been an entire failure. In some of the schools the teachers lacked that energy and tact so desirable in teachers; and in others the scholars failed to give as close attention and application to their studies as they should, yet on the whole I think that both teachers and scholars have done very creditably.

When we consider that at the common school the foundation of the education of the young is laid, upon which the whole superstructure is to be built, too much care can not be had that the teachers should be well and thoroughly fitted to perform the duties devolving upon them.

The school houses in town, with a few exceptions, are in good condition, and show that the inhabitants of our town have a commendable pride in providing for their children the conveniences and comforts that many of them, in their school days, sadly needed.

I found on my first visit to the different schools that the practice of penmanship was very much neglected, and in many of the schools, entirely abandoned. I have urged upon all the scholars the importance of acquiring a fair and legible hand-writing, and I am pleased to be able to state that our schools now, generally, pay considerable attention to this branch of common school education. I have changed the reading books in all the schools, and have put in Hillard's, instead of the Progressive. This has been done without much trouble, and with very little expense, and I am confident that our schools, with this series of books, will make much more improvement in this very important, but oftentimes badly neglected branch of popular education.

In conclusion, I would return my sincere thanks for the kind manner in which I have everywhere been received by teachers, scholars, and friends of education generally. It is my earnest wish that the common schools of this town may continue to improve until they shall all become the distinguished ornaments of the town, and may send forth men and women in the future, as in the past, who shall be fitted to engage successfully in the arduous and responsible duties of life.

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Superintending School Committee respectfully presents the following report:

The schools of the town, eighteen Summer and eleven Winter, have been under the instruction and charge of twenty-seven different teachers, four males and twenty-three females.

The amount of money raised by the town for school purposes is \$1000.00. Amount received from Literary Fund \$73.86.

Whole number of scholars attending school during the year is 632. Average attendance in school, 526.

The whole length of Summer schools 156 weeks. The whole length of Winter schools 89 1-2 weeks. Average length Summer schools 8 2-3. Average length Winter schools 8.

The schools that commence after November 1st are called Winter schools.

Inasmuch as our schools and churches give tone to the morals of society, so they increase the security of property. An intelligent people can master a debt easier than an unintelligent people, for "mind governs matter." But looking at the question in a money point of view is altogether too low. What, set mind against matter? "Pamper the body at the soul's expense!" Matter is material, consequently gross. Much is immaterial, consequently refined. The pleasures of the body, like the body, are gross. The pleasures of the mind, like the mind are refined. Edward Everett, speaks of education as "furnishing us with a refined pleasure."

Parents of Gilmanton, that a war of the magnitude of the recent civil war of this country, should have convulsed society, and disturbed some of interests, is not strange. For four years its shadow has hovered over our schools. It is long enough: Let not our public debt longer be an excuse for withholding money from our schools. But while we ask for more money, parents, say as you may, and as employers, you have a right too, what the standard of excellence in the employed and their schools shall be; and when you have done that, and doubled your interest in, and attention to the schools, you have doubled the utility of the money expended for them. And when your influence has been potent in doing away with the present rusty school machinery, and in procuring professional teachers who make teaching a study, a business, and a means of gaining a livelihood, instead of a pastime, then you may hope to have increased the utility of the money expended many fold.
