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#### CHAPTER I.

#### INTRODUCTION.

The history of the Hodges family is a pleasant one. New England has produced more brilliant and more noted families; but it may well be doubted whether it has produced a single one which, taken from beginning to end, has had fewer weak spots or has been more genuinely useful to the community. In sturdy independence, fair-mindedness and loyalty, the tribe has probably been unsurpassed. Indeed, its very preëminence in these qualities, which are so valuable for the public good, has interfered with the prominence of individual members, and with their obtaining a reputation and position justly deserved; for they have refused to take anything not earned, have refrained from pushing themselves forward at the expense of their neighbors, and have made constant sacrifices for the sake of their Evidences of these facts abound in the following pages. country. One example may be cited here. Had that officer [No. 462] who, during the Civil War, performed "one of the most brilliant feats of logistics ever recorded" and "without a parallel on record," been less modest, less independent, less observant of the rights of his fellow officers, or willing to seek advancement by political methods, he would be Brigadier General now without doubt; whereas, in fact, he retires from active service with the rank of Colonel, on account of the irregular advancement of an inferior officer through political in-

In attestation of the loyalty of the family, the chapter on their military service is given. It may be pointed out that not a few examples are given where, at the call of duty, members of the family have waived the higher rank then held by them, and gone out as privates. In one case, it will be found, a Colonel seized a musket and marched in the ranks as a private soldier.

Rufus Hodges, of Cincinnati, published in 1837 a small duodecimo of 22 finely printed pages, entitled Record of the Families in New England of the Name of Hodges, with the hope, expressed in the preface, that some one, more favorably situated than he, would pursue the undertaking until it was rendered complete. The size of the book, which is printed in very small type, gives no adequate idea of the amount and value of the contents. The facts were compiled with great judgment and the errors are surprisingly few.

In 1853, Almon D. Hodges published an octavo of 71 pages, entitled *Genealogical Record of the Hodges Family in New England*, in which he continued the work begun by Rufus Hodges. At the date of this publication, interest in genealogy was confined to a compara-

tively few persons in this country, and great difficulty was experienced in obtaining replies to genealogical queries. The compiler succeeded, however, in collecting the names of more than 1,500 persons.

In 1891, a member of the family, while tracing back his ancestry, had occasion to write a letter of enquiry to that very able lawyer and enthusiastic genealogist, Hon. Josiah Hayden Drummond of Portland, Me. Mr. Drummond, mistaking the import of the questions, answered far more than was asked, and began to accumulate and rapidly send facts about the early members of the Taunton branch. His correspondent could not do otherwise than co-operate, and in a short time the principal data of the first four generations of this branch were collected, the greater part being obtained by Mr. Drummond. Many persons now became interested in the work, which was pushed until this book, containing 15,000 names, was completed. Mrs. Harriet (Hodges) Stone, of Newton, Mass., was an early contributor, and to her belongs the credit of compiling the account of the Salem branch, as well as of giving many other valuable facts and suggestions. Mrs. Stone has made a study of the early immigrants of the name and of English families, and has found so many clews to the possible English ancestry of the New England families, that a solution of this as yet unsolved problem seems probable. Mr. Isaac W. Wilcox of Taunton, whose knowledge of Bristol County genealogy is remarkably accurate and extensive, has been a most valuable and able assistant, without whom the work could not have been done so speedily and so well.

The list of members of the family, 800 in number, who have coperated with the compilers, is so large, that to give the individual names would require more space than the necessary limits of this work allow. Persons in all parts of the United States have contributed to these pages. The evidence of the strong and widespread affection of the Hodges family for their kin, has been most gratifying. One name, however, may be mentioned, as the bearer has passed away while the work was in progress—that of Deacon Edgar Hodges Reed of Taunton, who had devoted years to historical studies of Bristol County families, was always most courteous and generous in imparting the results of his researches, and was a most important co-worker in the compilation of the edition published 42 years ago, as

well as of the present edition.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The different generations are denoted by the exponents placed after the Christian names. Thus: William¹ Hodges is William Hodges of the first generation; George² Hodges is George Hodges of the second generation; Henry Clay¹ Hodges is Henry Clay Hodges of the seventh generation.

The names are arranged and numbered according to generations,

and in each generation according to priority of birth.

Only those children of any one generation are numbered who are carried forward, with their numbers, to the next generation as heads of families.

After the name of each head of family, there follow [in brackets] a number (which is the number of the father of said head of family), and then, in italics, the names of the ancestors in genealogical order. Some of these names are abbreviated. When the names of father and son are identical, the name is given only once, but with the exponents of both generations.

Two examples (from the Taunton branch) will explain the method of indicating the line of ancestry:—

Joseph 7. 6. 5. 4. 3 Henry 2 Wm1] That is: No. 769 is Gilbert Hodges of the 8th generation, son of Joseph Hodges (whose number is 575) of the 7th generation, who was son of Joseph Hodges of the 6th generation, who was son of Joseph Hodges of the 5th generation, who was son of Joseph Hodges of the 4th generation, who was son of Joseph Hodges of the 3rd generation, who was son of Henry Hodges of the 2nd generation, who was son of William Hodges of the 1st generation.

#### DOUBLE DATES.

In England and her colonies the legal year began on March 25, from the 14th century until 1752, when a change was made to January 1, as at present. Other nations had made this change before 1752, and even in English documents the beginning of the year was often reckoned from January 1 long before this reckoning was made legal. Hence, to avoid ambiguity, arose the custom (which is followed in this book) of "double-dating" the year for all days from January 1 to March 25. Thus January 1649/50 (or 1649-50 or 1648) means January 1649, as it would have been written legally at that time, and January 1650, as we should write it now.

### CHAPTER II.

#### SEVENTEENTH-CENTURY IMMIGRANTS.

In the 17th century occurred the great Puritan Exodus, the like of which has never been recorded before or since. From devotion to an idea, within 20 years more than 20,000 picked men and women—the families of the sturdy, thrifty, self-respecting country squires and yeomen of England—left their comfortable homes, and went to the savage land of America. "God sifted a whole nation," said William Stoughton, "that he might send choice grain into the wilderness."

Among these chosen colonists were numerous representatives of the Hodges family. Just how many of this family crossed the ocean, and how they were related to one another, has not yet been determined. The name occurs in many counties of England, held by respectable and sometimes eminent persons, and it is hoped that the studies of one of the principal contributors to this present book will result in a subsequent publication determining the English ancestry of some at least of the immigrants. But the careless manner in which names in our early New England documents have been spelled, copied and translated into print, has caused unsurmounted difficulties, and made it impossible, in certain cases, to tell from individual entries whether the person mentioned was or was not named Hodges. The same name has been given to different families, and the same person has been given different names. Hedge, Hedges, Hodge, Hodges, Hogge, Hogg and other possible synonymes are apt to be confused in the records and the copies, so that a person searching for any one of these names, must take note of all of them. Even Hodgkins may not be neglected; for Savage in his Genealogical Dictionary says that it was Hannah Hodges, who, on Jan'y 17, 1671, married John Berry of Ipswich, while the Salem records state that it was Hannah Hodgkins. Furthermore, in later years, persons named Hogg have changed their name to Hodge in a number of instances; persons named Hodge have added a final s in some cases; and in one or two families, it is said, Hedges has become Hodges.

For the purpose of determining, so far as possible, their true names and families, there has been prepared the following list of persons migrating to or living in New England in the 17th century. This list includes the names mentioned above except Hodgkins which, it may be noted, is modified in the records into Hodgskins, Hodgskine, Hodgekine, Hodgekins, Hodgkinson, Hoskine, Hoskins, Haskins and Hotchkiss. That this name could be confused with Hodges, did not occur to the compilers of this genealogy until late in

their searches.

An incomplete list of persons known to have settled in the Southern states, the Barbadoes and the West Indies, is also given, as it is probable that some of these were near relatives of some of the

New Englanders.

The names are arranged chronologically according to the earliest date of appearance in the records, except where a possible or probable relationship between certain persons has made it convenient to bring their names together. It is quite possible that the same person appears more than once in the lists, as is occasionally noted.

An index of Christian names is appended to the New England list.

For in 1663 charges were brought against him of "unjustly detaining several sums of money due to his Majesty: he was by the late pretended authorities and the then Council of State appointed Treasurer and Paymaster of the forces in Jamaica." Of course an officer of Oliver Cromwell would be attacked by the government of Charles II. Francis Hodges

acquired estates in Jamaica, and from him the Hodgeses of Jamaica are supposed to be descended. He is thought to have been a descendant of Sir Nathaniel Hodges of Middlesex, England, and related to Rev. Dr. Hodges, Chaplain of the House of Lords at the Restoration, and also to Dr. Nathaniel Hodges who distinguished himself in his presional capacity during the Great Plague of London in 1665. ## B. NEW ENGLAND.

1. John Hodges of Charlestown, Mass., mariner, the first of the name in New England, so far as known, appears in the year 1632. In tracing his career, great difficulty has arisen from the statements of Wyman (in Charlestown Genealogies and Estates) that he married Mary Miller and that the Mary Hodges who married John Anderson on January 3, 1654/5, was his widow. No authority for Wyman's statements has been found by the compilers of this genealogy, some of whom consider the statements erroneous, while others accept them as probably correct. Owing to this diversity of opinion, the two following accounts (1a and 1b) of the probable career of John Hodges are offered. Until new documents are discovered, the matter cannot be decisively settled.

1a. The first account, denying the marriage of John Hodges, assumes that the name of John Hodges which occurs frequently in the records during a long series of years, is the name of one and the same person. Some of the reasons for supposing that Wyman's statements are erroneous are, that there is no record of the existence of any Mary Miller, or of any marriage of John Hodges, or of his death, and that Savage (in his Genealogical Dictionary) states that Mary's maiden name was Hodges and not Miller, for the correctness of which statement evidence is given below under the names of Mary Hodges and Joanna Hodges. Another reason for supposing that Mary was not John's wife or widow is the fact that, so far as known, she never became owner of any of John's real estate, which she would have inherited if she had married him. More detailed consideration of these reasons is given under 2a and 3a following.

John Hodges of Charlestown, mariner, mate of the ship Lion and captain of the Rebecca, appears in the year 1632, takes a prominent position and is frequently named in documents for over twenty years, and then disappears without leaving any record of his birth, parentage or family. Gov. John Winthrop of Massachusetts writes of him often and in terms implying friendship, if not relationship. Hotten's Lists of Emigrants to America, and the Middlesex County (Mass.) Deeds and Court Records contain his name. But all his recorded doings are professional and business transactions, and of genealogical matter there is not a trace. The same seems to be true of a man with whom John Hodges was intimately associated, Capt. William Peirce, perhaps the most noted shipmaster sailing into New England harbors in the days of the founding of Massachusetts. Capt.

William Peirce is said to have left a brother, Capt. Michael of Scituate, Mass., but otherwise his family seems to be entirely unknown,

and is not mentioned in any of the Peirce genealogies.

From 1622 to 1632, Capt. William Peirce was making repeated voyages between England and Massachusetts, the last two years in the Lion. Whether John Hodges was with him in these years is not recorded; but on Sept. 27, 1632, the Lion, with William Peirce as master and John Hodges as one of the mates, sailed out of Boston harbor with skins and fish, bound to England by way of Virginia where, probably, the fish were to be exchanged for tobacco. Five days later the ship was wrecked off the coast of Virginia, and on April 10, 1633, John Hodges arrived at Boston with news of the disaster. It was a heavy blow to the adventurers. The ship was owned chiefly by the Massachusetts Company. Gov. Winthrop lost "near £100," and Capt. Peirce wrote, "my whole estate (for ye most parte) is taken away." After this wreck and while waiting for a position on another vessel, it is highly probable that John Hodges resided in Charlestown. At least, the name of John Hodges is inscribed as an inhabitant of this town in 1633.

In November, 1633, the Rebecca, of about 60 tons, was built at Medford, Mass., for Gov. Matthew Cradock and his partners, and William Peirce was given command. Perhaps John Hodges was mate. We know that on Dec. 18, 1634, the Rebecca, Capt. William Peirce, sailed from Massachusetts for England; and on April 6 and 9, 1635, the Rebecca, Capt. John Hodges, was at London taking passengers and freight for New England. In 1635 and 1636 John Hodges was making constant trips in the Rebecca, plying between Boston and Connecticut, with letters and commissions of Gov. John Winthrop, senior, of Massachusetts and Gov. John Winthrop, junior, of Connecticut, going north to the Isle of Sable for sea-horse and cows, and south to Bermuda, whence he returned with "30,000 weight of potatoes and store of oranges and limes." Early in 1637 Matthew Cradock in London wrote to Gov. Winthrop in Boston, directing that John Hodges should resume command of the Rebecca and take this ship with her "ordynance," and victualled for three months, to Virginia. Why "resume" is not stated, nor whether John Hodges and the Rebecca made this voyage.

At this date both John Hodges, in his capacity of Captain, and the Rebecca disappear finally from all known records with three possible exceptions. Two of these exceptions, in Dec. 1649 and Oct. 1664, will be mentioned later in due chromological order; the third is simply the fact that a vessel described as "the pinke Rebecca, Thomas Williams, commander," in July 1679, was taking emigrants from the Barbadoes to Virginia. But it seems almost beyond doubt that Captain John Hodges was the "John Hodges, mariner," of Charlestown, where he first appears in 1633, as above stated, where he owned land as early as 1636 (at least), and where he can be traced for many years. In March, 1637, he was allotted land in Charlestown on the Mystic side (now Malden), and in 1638 he owned eleven lots in the town. Some of these lots he sold or exchanged; what became of the

rest has not been discovered. Nothing further of him has been found until 1647, when he exchanged one of his Charlestown lots. In Oct. 1649, Richard Poole of Wapping, near London, mariner, made him his sole agent and attorney in New England. In Feb. 1649/50 "John Hodges" was master of a galliote bound from Boston to Virginia. In Oct. 1650, "Mr. Hodges" testified at Middlesex County Court in the suit of the President of Harvard College vs William Pierce and Richard Webb, administrators of the estate of William Pierce deceased. In Oct. 1654, Mr. John Hodges, mariner, and widow Alice Rand, both of Charlestown, made an agreement to exchange land, and acknowledged the agreement in May, 1655.

Not long after the last date, John Hodges seems to have gone to London and settled there. For in March, 1655, Samuel Ward of Hull, Mass., executed an acknowledgment of debt and bond, in which he agreed to give John Hodges, "before his going from New England," bills of exchange on London; and in August of the same year, Thomas Broughton of Boston drew bills of exchange for one hundred pounds sterling, payable to John Hodges in London in John Hodges, on April 16, 1658, at Deptford, London, acknowledged payment of the money owed him, as above, by Samuel Ward. Finally in a letter dated "Whithart Court, London," Oct. 21, 1664, Priscilla Reade wrote a letter to Gov. John Winthrop of Connecticut, in which Capt John Hodges may be referred to :- "Pr'ses [presumably Priscilla's, referring to the writer's daughter] humbel sarves to yourself, wt her ants & dear respects to har cosans all. All frinds els desir ye like. Mr. Hoges & his wif. Capt. Mico has been a widower this twelmonth," etc.

1b. The second account assumes that the records refer to more than one person of the name of John Hodges, based on the opinion that Wyman and Frothingham are right in saying that John Hodges,

mariner, of Charlestown, married Mary Miller.

The only obstacle to this belief is, that a John Hodges was alive and actively transacting business after Jan. 3, 1654/5, when Mary (Miller) Hodges married John Anderson. But why is this necessarily the same John Hodges? Why not his son? What proof is there that John Hodges of ships Lion and Rebecca did not die between 1650, when he testifies in the suit of Harvard College vs Wm. Pierce and others, and 1655, when his widow married John Anderson?

About this time a John Hodges, probably their eldest son, determines to live in England, his home perhaps being broken up by the second marriage of his mother. He it is who exchanges land with Alice Rand, sells four "cowes" to Samuel Ward, for which the bond mentioned in the previous account was given, and records the power of attorney given by Richard Poole in 1649.

If this opinion be correct, it accounts for Nicholas Hodges [No. 19], of Plymouth, Mass., (so known and called from 1643 to 1665) having in his will of the latter date styled himself "Nicholas Miller, alias Hodges." The word "alias" was often used in this way to give the mother's name and without implying illegitimacy [See Notes and

Queries, 7th Series, xii, 401, 450.] It was also often used to establish some honorable descent. For instance, some of the Hodges family in Somersetshire, England, were descended from Richard Brooke, Chief Baron of the Exchequer in the reign of King Henry VIII, so that Richard Hodges of that county was married in 1596 thus:-"Richard Brooke alias Hodges, to Johanna Courte;" and his wife was buried under the same title, Jan. 4, 1611/12, "Joan, wife of Richard Brooke alias Hodges."

In 1643 Nicholas Hodges was "able to bear arms," and therefore at least 16 years of age. This would oblige us to assume that John Hodges and Mary Miller were married before his first recorded ap-

pearance in Boston in 1632; but that is quite probable.

That John Hodges had a residence in Charlestown and was a large land owner there, is certain. That he had such a home without wife or child, is improbable. It seems likely then that he and Mary Miller were the parents, not only of John and Nicholas, but of Thomas Hodges [No. 31] who, in 1663, married Elizabeth (Blackleach) Rasor, and of Humphrey Hodges [No. 33] who married Mary ----, and had sons Humphrey, Faircliffe and Thomas. Besides these four sons, John, Nicholas, Thomas and Humphrey, John Hodges had probably two daughters, at least: Mary Hodges, [No. 21] who married, in 1646, Robert Taylor of Newport; and Sarah Hodges [No. 28,] who married, in 1653, Thomas Moore of Cambridge. Mary (Hodges) Taylor named her second son John, her first son having been named Robert for his father. Sarah (Hodges) Moore had but one son, called Thomas for his father. Besides these children, it is not impossible that George Hodges [No. 30], who appears in Salem in 1662, was son of John, as well as Robert Hodges [No. 34], also of Salem, later of Boston.

It certainly seems reasonable to suppose that so many persons of the name of Hodges, occurring in the second generation in Charlestown, were the children of John and Mary (Miller) Hodges, and there

are some facts corroborating such a belief, viz:-

In 1649 a John Hodges is master of a "galliote bound to Guiney." That is hardly a command worthy of John Hodges, formerly master of the ship Rebecca, but quite credible if the John Hodges is his son, and accounts for the latter being afterward also called "mariner."

Nicholas establishes his claim to be a son by giving the name of

Miller at his death.

Humphrey's name is his claim. In somewhat extended researches among the English Hodgeses, the name of Humphrey has not been found. But there was a Humphrey Miller living in Charlestown at the time.

The chief reason for thinking that George Hodges of Salem may have gone there from Charlestown, is that his first wife, Mary Hudson, was probably the daughter of Francis Hudson, the well-known Charlestown ferryman. The only child of that marriage, Katharine, married, in Boston, Benjamin Deland, and persons of that name, possibly her descendants, early appeared in Malden, first known as "Mystic Side," where much of the land of John Hodges, of Charlestown, lay. There are also reasons for thinking that George Hodges of Salem may have been connected with Nicholas Hodges alias Miller of Plymouth. The first mention of George Hodges is in the will of Robert Gray; and Edward Gray was a debtor to the estate of Nicholas Hodges. Intimate connection between the Millers, Grays and Hodgeses in England can be shown, and it should be borne in mind that marriages in the early days of America often took place between persons already allied in England either by blood or by friendship. William Crowe was also a debtor to Nicholas Hodges's estate, and Mehitable Miller, daughter of James Miller of Charlestown, had married John Crowe of Yarmouth.

[Note about the Grays. John Miller of Came, Dorset, England, married Anne, daughter of Giles Winterhay. They had several sons one of whom, Jasper Miller, married Mary, daughter of —— Yarde, relict of Christopher Gray; and another son, Lawrence, married (1st) a daughter of — Adyn, and (2nd) a daughter of Angell Smith, reliet of George Gray. The oldest son of John and Anne (Winterhay) Miller, Sir Robert Miller, married (1st) Dorothy Basley, daughter of Henry Basley of the Isle of Wight, and (2nd) Margaret, daughter of Robert Freak of Wren (or Iwerne), Courtney, Dorset. Margaret Freak's oldest sister, Alice Freak (or Mary, according to another account) married William Hodges of Ilchester, Somerset. The brother of these two sisters, Sir Thomas Freke, (b. 1553, d. 1623) married Elizabeth, only daughter of John Taylor, Esq. Remember that Mary Hodges, of Charlestown, married Robert Taylor of Newport. Remember also Nicholas Hodges's legacies to the Hoskins family, evidently descendants of James Hodges of Somerset. One could go on ad infinitum with these connections of the Grays, Hodgeses and Millers. For instance: Nathaniel Hodges married Susanne Gray, Oct. 9, 1618. Elizabeth Throgmorton married (1st) John Gifford, (2nd) William Hodges, (3rd) George Petta. Among her Gifford children were: i. Grisogond, who married Edward Gray; ii. Cicely, who married Humphrey Freere, a nephew of Joyce Freere who married Christopher Hodges; iii. Joan, who married Amias Chichester, and whose son, Philip Chichester, married Katharine, daughter of William Proute and widow of William Hodges. And John Benbowe, Clerk of the Crown in 1623, married (1st) Dorothy, daughter of William Proute; (2nd) Katharine, daughter of Robert Sparke; (3rd) on Feb. 29, 1619, Elizabeth, daughter of William Hodges of Ilchester.]

2. Mary Hodges, Charlestown, Mass., m. 1654/5 Jan'y 3, Charlestown, John Anderson, as his 2nd wife. He d. 1677 Sept. 28, Boston. She d., prob. at Boston, early in 1693, her will being proved March

11, 1692/3.

2 children born in Boston:-

i. Joanna Anderson, b. 1655 Dec. 25; d. prob. before Nov. 6, 1689 (not named in her mother's will); m. between about Aug. 1675 and Sept. 25, 1677, —— Newman (acc. to wills of her brother and her father.)

Anna Anderson, b. 1657 May 5; d. 1659/60 March 12, Boston.
 John Anderson was a shipwright of Boston, whose first wife, Jane,

died May 4, 1654. He seems to have been a man of position, as in the record of his marriage he is given the title of respect, "Mr. John Anderson." His wife, at the same time, is entitled "Mrs.," which term in those days usually was employed to denote good social position, but possibly may have indicated previous matrimony. Anderson had by his first wife at least 7 children, who married into highly respectable families. A granddaughter was wife of the famous Cotton Mather. A son Henry resided in Bantam on the island of Java, where he died, leaving considerable property. An abstract of his will, dated Aug. 18, 1675, proved in England Feb. 12, 1675/6, in which he mentions (among others) his sister Joanna Anderson, is given in the Gen. Reg. xlvi, 334. John Anderson's will, in which he names his daughter Joanna Newman, dated Sept. 25, 1677, was proved at Boston Oct. 1, 1677, and may be found in the Suffolk County Probate Records, vi, 205. It was proved also in England, and an abstract is given in the Gen. Reg. xlvi, 335.

Mary Hodges, as stated before, is said by Wyman to have been the widow of John Hodges of Charlestown, [No. 1] her maiden name being Miller. Concerning the correctness of Wyman's statement,

there are two opinions.

2a. First Opinion. Mary's maiden name was probably Hodges, not Miller, and probably she was not the wife of John Hodges. Wyman seems to have made an over-hasty conclusion from two indecisive records—the only ones capable of being construed in favor of his statement, which have been found after a long and careful search. These two records are:—(1) the marriage record of "Mrs. Hodges and Mr. John Anderson;" (2) the phrase in Mary's will, "My brother George Miller of Swanzey, England."

With regard to the first point, if any inference at all is to be drawn, it is that, according to the customs of the time, Mary was of so high social standing that designating her as "Mistress Hodges" was considered sufficient identification by the recorder. Had she been a widow, she probably would have been called "Widow Mary Hodges"

or "Widow Hodges."

With regard to the second point, it is to be noted that Mary, in her will, applied the terms "my son," "my daughter," "my grandchild," and "my grandson" to persons who were the children, children-in-law and grandchildren of John Anderson by his first wife, and therefore not relatives of Mary. Thus, "my son John Phillips" was the husband of Katharine, daughter of John and Jane Anderson. This fact shows the possibility that, by the term "my brother" George Miller, my brother-in-law, or even my husband's brother-in-law, may be meant. At least, without corroborative evidence, it is unsafe to conclude that George Miller was her own brother. And no such evidence has as yet been produced.

In her will Mary mentions "my sister Joanna." There is corroborative evidence in this case that Joanna was own sister to Mary, as Wyman seems to have regarded her. There is also evidence that Joanna's maiden name was Hodges, although this is not proven. This

will be explained more fully under Joanna's name [No. 3a].

There being, so far as known, no record of previous marriage of Mary, or of the marriage or death of John Hodges, or of the existence of any Mary Miller who could be identified with this Mary Hodges, or of Mary's ever having owned any of the real estate of John Hodges; while on the other hand, there is evidence (such as it is) that Mary was sister of the Joanna whose name follows on this list, and also that this Joanna's maiden name was Hodges, and since, moreover, Mary certainly owned none of John Hodges's property when she made her will, and makes no reference in this will to any of the Hodges family; — in view of the above facts, it is thought probable that Mary's maiden name was Mary Hodges, and that Wyman's surmise may be rejected. Moreover, it is a noteworthy fact that Nicholas Davison in his will calls Mary "my sister-in-law Mary

Hodges [now] wife of my brother-in-law John Anderson."

2b. Second Opinion. That Mary Hodges, who married John Anderson, had been previously the wife of John Hodges, and that her maiden name was Miller, as Wyman states, is probable from the will of Nicholas Miller alias Hodges, and from the name of Humphrey occurring for the first time in the Hodges family, as has been already stated in the second opinion of John Hodges. It is also probable from the evidence in Mary's will. She there calls George Miller, of Swanzea in Wales, her brother, and although she assumes as children and grandchildren all the descendants of John Anderson by his first wife, even going so far as to call her step-son's, David Anderson's, widow her "daughter Katharine," wife to Capt. Richard Sprague, it is not fair to assume that she would call a man in Swanzea, Wales, her brother, if he were not really a relative, especially as no connection has been shown between him and the Andersons.

It is true that her will ignores any Hodges relations or descendants. But on the death of John Hodges, if he was her first husband, his property was probably divided among his children, the widow also taking her share, but having at the time of her death, nearly forty years later, little to leave that she had not received from Mr. Anderson. Besides, of her Hodges children, assuming that John, Nicholas, Thomas, Humphrey, George, Robert, Mary and Sarah were hers, we know that Nicholas was dead; Humphrey does not appear after 1677, fifteen years earlier; Thomas does not appear after 1671; John we assume to have gone to England; Robert had died in 1685; the husbands of both daughters were certainly dead and probably these daughters were also deceased; leaving George the only one living, and that he was her son is by no means established. Under these circumstances, it is not at all strange that, having been identified for nearly 40 years with John Anderson's family, her bequests should have been mostly to them.

3. Joanna Hodges (or perhaps Miller), of Charlestown, Mass., 1647 or earlier, d. 1699 Oct. 30, Newbury, Mass. She m. (1) Nicholas¹ Davison, b. 1610 or 1611; d. 1664. She m. (2), 1674/5 Jan'y 6, Newbury, Mass., Richard Kent Jr. of Newbury, who d. without

issue, 1689 Nov. 25, Newbury.

2 children born in Charlestown:-

i. Sarah <sup>2</sup> Davison, b. 1647 Dec. 31; d. 1678 Dec. 13; m. 1665 March 29, Charlestown, Joseph Lynde of Charlestown, son of

Dea. Thomas Lynde of Charlestown.

ii. Major Daniel <sup>2</sup> Davison, b. 1650/1 Jan'y 9; went to Newbury, Mass., where he became prominent; m. 1673 Dec. 16, Dover, N. H., Abigail Coffin, dau. of Peter & Abigail (Starbuck) Coffin of Dover.

Nicholas Davison was one of the chief men of Charlestown, and an agent of Gov. Matthew Cradock. On March 26, 1655, he made his will, doubtless in view of the voyage which he made this year to the Barbadoes and thence to England. He came back in the Speedwell in 1656, his age then being 45 years. He died, leaving a good estate, in 1664, his will being proved July 11, 1664. In his will he mentioned:—wife Joan, who received one-third of the estate; children, Daniel and Sarah, who received two-thirds; brother John, whereabouts unknown; sister-in-law Mary Hodges, wife of brother-in-law John Anderson; nephews, Em. Rash and Jean Rash, abroad; children of brother Jeremy Davison deceased, who lived at Lynn, England, as late as 1652.

Joanna's maiden name is given as *Hodges* by Savage, and *Miller* by Wyman. On this point two opinions are offered, as in the cases of

John Hodges and Mary Hodges.

3a. First Opinion. Joanna's maiden name was probably Hodges. No reason has been found for the supposition that it was Miller except that, if Joanna and Mary Hodges (last mentioned) were sisters, and if Mary's maiden name was Miller, then Joanna's must have been Miller also. Wyman evidently considered Mary and Joanna to be sisters, and this is the opinion of the present writer. Mary in her will called Joanna "my sister," and Joanna's husband in his will called Mary "my sister-in-law." But under Mary's name the theory has been advanced that Mary's maiden name was not Miller but Hodges; and evidence is now offered that Joanna's maiden name was Hodges.

This evidence is the Davison pedigree printed in Vol. 8 of *Munsell's American Ancestry*, derived from a family record owned by Mr. S. M. Davison of Fishkill-on-Hudson, N. Y., and written by Mr. Davison's grandfather from unstated authorities. This record, in part, is as

follows:-

"Joan Hodges married in 1630 Nicholas¹ Davidson of Charlestown, Mass. He was the son of Nicholas Davidson of Dingwall Castle, Scotland, and Lynn, England, and grandson of Malcolm Davidson of Scotland, and was born in 1611 in Lynn, England. They had son, Daniel² Davidson, born April 8, 1639, in Charlestown, Mass., who married Margaret Lowe. He in turn had six sons, but only one of these lived to represent the family, viz:—Peter³ Davidson, born 1670 at Charlestown, married March 6, 1695, Ann Preston."

Premising that Joan is the same name as Joanna, and that Nicholas Davison's name was often spelled Davidson, the following partial record of Joanna's family is given here for the purpose of com-

parison:—

Joanna married Nicholas¹ Davison of Charlestown, Mass. He was born in 1610 or 1611 in England, and had a brother who lived in Lynn, England. They had a son Daniel² Davison, born Jan'y 9, 1650/1 in Charlestown, Mass., who married Abigail Coffin, daughter of Peter. Daniel² in turn had 7 children, of whom the youngest was Peter³, born Oct. 20, 1692, and the oldest son was Nicholas³, born in 1680. Nicholas³ married Ann——, and had Daniel⁴ Davison who married Margaret Ogelby. The authorities for this record of Joanna are:—Charlestown town records; Newbury town records; Savage's Genealogical Dictionary; The Coffin Family, Boston, 1870; and Coffin's History of Newbury.

While there are important differences in the dates and marriages of these two records, there is certainly a striking similarity, so that one can hardly doubt that the same family is referred to in both.

3b. Second Opinion. Since all the evidence on which to found any opinion as to the maiden name of Joanna Davison rests on the facts that Mary Anderson calls her "sister" in her will, and Nicholas Davison, in his will, calls Mary Anderson his "sister-in-law," it follows that, having expressed the belief that Mary Anderson's maiden name was Miller, Joanna's must necessarily be the same, in this opinion. Savage and Wyman do not agree, it is true, but both apparently make their statements on the basis of this relationship. The Davidson pedigree in Munsell's American Ancestry has some marked discrepancies with authoritative records. It is said to be based on a manuscript record, and it is at least possible that the original compiler gave Joan Davidson the maiden name of Hodges, taking Savage as authority without question.

4. John Hedge, age about 24, was at Lynn, Mass., in 1634. [Savage] 5. William<sup>1</sup> Hedge (printed also Hedges and Edge) of Lynn, Mass.; freeman, May 14, 1634; removed to Sandwich and then to Yarmouth, Mass.; died 1670; married twice; first wife's name unknown; second wife was Blanche, widow of Tristram Hull. He

was founder of the Hedge family of Plymouth, Mass.

- 9 children at least, order of birth unknown:—
  i. Elizabeth<sup>2</sup> Hedge, b. 1646 May 21; m. 1665/6 Jan'y 4, Jonathan Barnes.
- ii. Mary<sup>2</sup> Hedge, b. 1648; m. a son of Edward Sturgis.

iv. Sarah<sup>2</sup> Hedge, m. — Matthews.

vi. William<sup>2</sup> Hedge. Probably the William Hedge who m. Elizabeth, and had, at Bristol, R. I.:—Elizabeth<sup>3</sup> Hedge, b. and d. 1682/3 Feb. 15; John<sup>3</sup> Hedge, b. 1685 April 4, d. 1687 July 17, Bristol;

and Elizabeth<sup>3</sup> Hedge, again, b. 1687 May 5.

vii. John<sup>2</sup> Hedge, d. 1679. His brothers Elisha and Lemuel appointed to administer his estate, April 11, 1679.

viii. Lemuel<sup>2</sup> Hedge.

ix. Mercy<sup>2</sup> Hedge.

- 6. ELISHA HEDGE, Plymouth, Mass., June 1662, July 5, 1670, and 1671; was evidently a relative, and probably the son, of William<sup>1</sup> Hedge [No. 5] whose will he proved.
  - 7. Peter Hogg was in Saco, Me., in 1635 and 1636.
- 8. RICHARD HODGES, HOGGE, HOGG, and possibly Hodge and Hoag, appears in only one entry (witness to a deed, July 7, 1645) under the guise of Hodges. In all the others so far found, his name is written Hogge or Hogg, and there is a possibility of its having been pronounced either Hodge or Hoag and spelled in one of these ways by the next generation. He was a tailor and lived in Boston from 1637 to about 1652. His residence before and after this period is unknown. Perhaps the family moved to Connecticut, becoming Hodge, or possibly to Newbury, Mass., assuming the name of Hoag; or perhaps Richard was a member of the First Church in Boston, where four of his children were baptized, in each case being called the child of "our brother Richard Hogge." His wife's name was Joan. On Jan'y 7, 1639/40, he was granted a great lot for 5 heads at the Mount, i.e. Mount Wollaston, now Braintree. He was made freeman May 13, 1640. He lived on the east side of Washington street, on the 3rd lot south of Milk street, where he had a house and garden which he sold in 1645 to John Lake. In the Book of Possessions, compiled about 1652, Richard Hogg is the only person mentioned as owning land in Boston, whose name can be twisted into any resemblance of Hodges.

Children born in Boston:-

i. Joseph Hogge, b. 1637 Dec.—; bapt. 1639 Aug. 25. [There was a Joseph Hodg, adult inhabitant of West Springfield, Mass., April 7, 1707.]

ii. Mary Hogge, b. 1641 July 16; bapt. 1641 July 22; d. soon.

iii. John Hogge, b. 1643/4 March 4; bapt. 1643/4 March 10. It seems possible that he was the John Hoag [No. 17] of Newbury, Mass, who d. 1728, aged 85. Or perhaps he was the John Hodge [No. 32] of Killingworth, Conn., who married Susannah Denslow, Aug. 1, 1666.

iv. Mary Hogge, b. 1646/7 Feb. 3; bapt. 1646/7 Feb. 7.

9. John Hogges and Hogg. Relationship with this gentleman probably will not be claimed eagerly by any New England family; for although given the title of "Mr.," which denoted high social standing, his existence is known only through the records of the Court in Boston where, from Sept. 1637 to Jan'y 1641, he was repeatedly fined for drunkenness. Early in 1641 he departed to England.

10. John Hogg, "perhaps only a transient," was in Massachusetts in 1639, says Savage, referring to Felt as his authority. A search through the publications of Joseph B. Felt failed to discover the name. Perhaps he was the preceding gentleman, or one or more of the next

following Johns.

11. John Hogg. In *Thomas Lechford's Note Book* [Cambridge, Mass., 1885] occurs this entry:—"In the Cort at Boston (10) 1. 1640 [March 10, 1640/1]. The peticion of John Hogg, brother of

Roger Hogg (1-6)." This is the whole entry. An entry 12 days later refers to "one Roger Hogge" who apparently was living in London.

12. John Hodges, Salisbury, Mass., about 1640. An original settler. He went back to London, and in April 1647, describing himself as "citizen and cooper of London," gave his friends, John Checkley of London and John Harrison of Boston, power of attorney to collect rents on, and to lease or sell, his house and the lands assigned to him in Salisbury.

13. John Hedges, fined at Salem Court, Dec. 29, 1643. This name, written Hedges in the records, has been copied and printed, incorrectly,

Hodges.

- 14. WILLIAM HEDGES was on the jury at the court held at Salem, March 27, 1637/8. The name has frequently been copied incorrectly Hodges. This person has not been identified, but it seems probable that he was either William Hodges [No 18], founder of the Taunton branch (whose name was written always Hedges in the Plymouth Colony records), or else William<sup>1</sup> Hedges of Southampton, Long Island (a place colonized in great measure from Massachusetts), whose life before enrollment in 1644 as inhabitant of Southampton is unknown. This WILLIAM HEDGES died in 1674, leaving a wife Rose, 4 daughters (his will does not give their names), and these two
- i. Stephen<sup>2</sup> Hedges, b. 1634/5 Jan'y; d. 1734 July 7, aged 100 years. He married and had:--
  - (1) John<sup>3</sup> Hedges, of East Hampton, L. I., b. 1670; m. Ruth Stratton.
  - (2) Daniel<sup>3</sup> Hedges, of Sagg, L. I., b. 1677; m. 1703, Abigail Baker.
  - (3) William<sup>3</sup> Hedges, of East Hampton, b. 1679; m. 1705, Abiah Mulford (wife Zerviah is named in his will). One of his children, Ezekiel\* Hedges, bapt. 1719, was noted for his piety, moved before the Revolution to Patchogue, L. I., and left children. The name of his son, Ezekiel<sup>5</sup>, has been printed Hodges, and some of his descendants, there is reason to think, now bear this name.

ii. Isaac<sup>2</sup> Hedges, b. about 1636, d. 1677; m. Joanna Barnes. had several children, but the only one whose name has been

(1) Isaac<sup>3</sup> Hedges. Married and had at least 11 children, of whom 4 were born in the 17th century: - Samuel4 Hedges, b. 1684 or 1685; *Abraham*\* *Hedges*, b. 1692; *Isaac*\* *Hedges*, b. about 1695; and *Jacob*\* *Hedges*, b. 1698.

15. Andrew Hodges, Ipswich, 1639; died at Ipswich, Dec. — 1665, evidently leaving no children. He m. (1) Ann, who died at Ipswich, Nov. 15, 1658. He m. (2) Nov. 27, 1659, Lydia Browne, widow of Abraham Browne of Watertown, Mass. His name appears first at Ipswich on Aug. 26, 1639, when he bought 7 acres of land lying near the highway to Jeffries Neck. He subsequently acquired other real estate, and was prominent in town affairs. He made quite a long will, dated Oct. 11, 1665, proved March 27, 1666, which is on file in Vol. XI, folio 96, Office of Clerk of Courts, Salem. In this will no children are mentioned; a nephew, Giles Birdley, was the principal legatee. Andrew bequeathed five shillings a year forever to the poor of Ipswich, and five pounds to Harvard College for the benefit of poor scholars. He left property also to the following persons:—

i. Wife Lydia. She returned to Watertown, where her children by

her first husband lived, and there died Sept. 27, 1686.

ii. Theophilus Wilson, one of the overseers of his will, 20 shil-

lings.

iii. Mary Quilter, 40 shillings. She had been a maidservant of Rev. Nathaniel Rogers, a former pastor of Ipswich church, and perhaps had been in the service of Andrew Hodges.

iv. Mr. Cobbit, 40 shillings. Probably Rev. Thomas Cobbit, minister

at Ipswich at this date.

v. Goodman Walden, 40 shillings. The writing is defaced and possibly this is goodwife; but it looks more like goodman, and the copy of the will reads Edward Walden. There was an Edward Walden or Walderne living then in Ipswich, whether related to Andrew or not, is unknown. Walden and Alderne are supposed to be the same name, and Thomas Alderne of London, England, in his will dated 1656, mentioned "Aunt Hodges."

vi. Henry Bennet, 5 pounds. Henry Bennet, born about 1625, was in Salem as early as 1638, went to Ipswich about 1639, and lived about eight years with Andrew Hodges, as he himself testified

Oct. 29, 1695.

vii. Giles Birdley, nephew of Andrew Hodges, inherited the rest of the estate. Giles Birdley or Burley was of Ipswich, where he died in 1668. His wife, Rebecca, was born in 1626, and married (2nd), at Ipswich, Jan'y 7, 1668/9, Abraham Fitt of Ipswich. Giles¹ Birdley had (at least) 4 children:—i. 16. Thomas Hedger, of Warwick, R. I., May 1, 1639. He resided at Warwick many years, but no trace of his family is seen on the

records [Savage.]

17. John Hoag, Hoeg, Hoegs and Hoge, Newbury, Mass., "born 1643, died 1728, aged 85," was possibly the John Hodge [No. 8, iii], son of "our brother Richard Hogge," who was born at Boston, 1643/4 March 4. He m. 1669 April 21, Newbury, Ebenezer Emery, (daughter of John Emery) whose birth is thus recorded: "Ebenezer, a daughter, 16 Sept. 1648, being Monday [Sept. 16 was really Saturday] morning, two hours before day."

The births of these children are from the Newbury records which do not state the names of the third and the fifth children. It may be suspected that one of these so-called "daughters" was the Benjamin Hoag of Newbury who m. 1702 June 23, Sarah Norris of Exeter.

18. WILLIAM Hodges, of Taunton, appears first with certainty on the list, dated August 1643, of those able to bear arms, between the ages of 16 and 60. He was the founder of the Taunton branch, and an account of him is given in the chapter devoted to this branch. His name occurs always as Hodges in documents originating at Taunton, and always as Hedges in the Plymouth Colony records. Possibly he was the William Hedges [No. 14] who was on the jury

at Salem Court, March 27, 1637/8.

19. NICHOLAS HODGES alias MILLER, of Plymouth, first appears in the military list of August 1643. On August 15, 1645, he went out in the First Company of Plymouth "sent forth in the late Expedition against the Narrohiggansetts [Narragansett Indians] & their Confederats," and served 17 days. On Oct. 24, 1665, "being very sick & weake, but in perfect memory, waiting upon god, hopeing for mercy through the blood of Christ," he made his will. He probably died the January following, as letters of administration were granted to William Haskins, Feb. 6, 1665/6. His bequests were to:—
i. Four children of William Hoskins, small legacies.

ii. David Ramsden.

iii. Hannah Reife, his butter pot.

iv. Peter Reife, his house, land, etc.

Edward Gray, William Crowe and Samuel Sturtivant were debtors to the estate.

William Hoskins and Peter Reife were witnesses.

A search for the names mentioned in the will has failed to reveal the family connections of Nicholas Hodges. The chief legatee was Peter Reife, who might be supposed to be a relative, but nothing is known of Peter or his family. On March 5, 1683/4, William Hoskins was appointed administrator of the estate of Peter Riffe, deceased; and Richard Riff was in the list of freemen of Salem in 1678. These are the only instances in which the name of Reiffe or Riffe has been found.

William Hoskins was of Plymouth and then of Taunton. He married (1st), at Plymouth, Nov. 22, 1636, Sarah Cushman, and (2nd), at Plymouth, Dec. 31, 1638, Ann Hynes or Hinde, who was born in England. He lost all his property in King Philip's war and was pensioned. His name is spelled variously as Haskins, Hoskins, Hodgskine, Hodgekins, Hodgkinson and Hoskine. We do not know whether William Hoskins was related to Nicholas Hodges; but English researches show that James Hodges of Somerton, Somersetshire, in his will proved in 1601, named his daughter Anne and her husband Peter Hoskins or Hoskyns, who was living in Devonshire in 1623.

Nicholas Hodges has the alias of Miller in his will. The reason is not yet definitely known. William Crowe, who was one of the debtors of the estate, and the Rev. John Miller of Yarmouth married sisters. Perhaps Nicholas, who begins his will with a pious expression of hope and trust, had been in the family of Rev. John Miller. The name of Miller occurs in connection with that of Mary Hodges [No. 2] who married John Anderson, and in the 2nd opinion [2b] concerning Mary, the theory is advanced that she may have been the mother of Nicholas.

20. RICHARD HEDGES was fined at Salem Court, Dec. 29, 1643,

as was also John Hedges [No. 13].

21. MARY HODGES m. 1646 NOV. —, ROBERT TAYLOR, of Scituate, Mass., and later of Newport, R. I. He died 1687/8, Jan'y 13. Their children were: —i. Mary; ii. Ann; iii. Margaret; iv. Robert; v.

22. Thomas Hogg was in New Haven, Conn., in 1646 or earlier [Savage]. The inventory of the estate of Thomas Hogge of New Haven was taken June 1, 1685 [N. H. Prob. Rec. Vol. 1, part i. p. 206]. Daniel Hogge, 1672, was one of the first planters at Wallingford, Conn., apparently coming from New Haven [Hist. of Wallingford, p. 77].

These were landed at Boston, Nov. 11, 1651, having been brought on the ship John & Sara, prisoners taken at the fight at Worcester, England, in 1651, and sent to New England to be sold as slaves. Probably they were Scotch or Scotch-Irish, and progenitors of families in Maine, New Hampshire and Connecticut.\*

29. TRISTRAM HEDGES, of Boston, m. 1657 Dec. 20, Boston, ANN NICKERSON, dau. of William & Ann (Busby) Nickerson of Boston,

\*During the establishment of the Commonwealth in England, many Irishmen and Scotchmen, who had been taken prisoners in battle, were sent to New England and there sold, by those at whose expenses they had been brought over, to any of the inhabitants who were in want of servants or slaves. The above persons named Hogg were brought in this manner to New England. Savage, unduly frightened by the name of "slave," concluded that all of them died of cruel treatment or broken hearts, a conclusion unsupported by evidence. On the contrary, many of the so-called "slaves" seem to have achieved their freedom, married into the families of their masters, and left numerous descendants.

and had a daughter, *Grace Hedges*, b. 1659 Aug. 20, Boston; d. 1659/60 Jan'y 4, Boston. Tristram and his father-in-law went to Mannamoiett (now Chatham, Mass.) about 1663.

30. George Hodges, of Salem, first appears in 1662. He was the first known member of the Salem branch [but see No. 2b] and his

record is given in the chapter devoted to that line.

- 32. John Hodge, of Killingworth, Conn., 1664, later of Windsor and Suffield, Conn., died at Lyme, Conn., 1692 or 1693. Possibly he was the John Hogge [No. 8, iii.], son of "our brother Richard Hogge," who was born in Boston 1643/4 March 4. He m. 1666 Aug. 1, Susannah Denslow, dau. of Henry & Susannah Denslow, b. 1646 Sept. 3.

Humphrey Hodges was born in 1620 or 1621, as appears from his deposition, June 17, 1673, at Cambridge, Mass., in which he gives his age as 52 years. He resided in Charlestown, and then moved to Boston, where he lived, apparently, next to Cotton Mather. At least,

George Heathcote, in a letter dated Barbadoes, July 18, 1669, requests his loving friend, Gov. John Winthrop, Jr., to send him medicine "to be left at Humphra Hodges in Boston near Parson Mathers." His name appears in the tax list of 1674 in Boston, and is the only name of Hodges, or anything like Hodges, in the Boston tax lists of this period. At a court held in Boston, May 3, 1665, he and other creditors of the estate of Samuel Maverick, Jr., petition for the appointment of commissioners to care that this estate be not concealed or conveyed away; and such commissioners were accordingly appointed. On April 5, 1672, he bought land in Charlestown of John Checkley. In March, 1674/5, he served on a jury in Boston. Before this, on Nov. 28, 1672, he was tried at Boston and "convict of villifying and reproaching the court and their proceedings," which means that he was a Quaker and was proceeded against as such. He appealed, but the case apparently went against him. He seems to have persisted in his ways, for in 1677 he was whipped for being a Quaker. Nothing later has been found of him or his family.

Robert's name is spelled generally Hodge, but sometimes, and more especially in the Essex County records, Hodges. His wife, Mary, was baptized at the First Church, Salem, on June 5, 1680, and the 7 children on June 12, 1680, all under the name of Hodges. Nathaniel Pickman's will, 1684, mentions his daughter Mary Hodges. The record of marriage (as printed in the Essex Inst. Hist. Coll.) has the name Hodge. All the daughters were married (if the above marriages are correct), according to the records, under the name of Hodge, except Elizabeth, whose name was spelled Hodgs.

Robert was a mariner. It is apparently he who was referred to, under date of Aug. 31, 1673, in the "Relation of Robert Hodge that came from Southold on Long Island, August 6. Taken at Boston August 11," which gave an account of the capture of New York city by the Dutch. When Robert died his estate seems to have

been divided among his creditors.

35. Stephen Hedge, Fairfield, Conn., 1670. [Savage.]

36. Hannah Hodges or Hodgens m. 1670/1 Jan'y 17, John Berry of Ipswich, and d. 1676. Savage gives the name as Hodges, while it is written Hodgens in the Salem records.

37. John Hodg, 1674/5 March 1, witnessed a deed of land in Kittery, Me., from William Palmer of Kittery to Christopher Adams.

38. NICHOLAS<sup>1</sup> HODGE, Little Harbor (now Rye), N. H., was there in 1684 according to Savage, but the family account states that he came thither about 1658 from England. He has numerous descendants. He married Seaborn (Reynolds?) daughter of Richard Tucker of Falmouth (now Portland), Maine, and died, it is said, at the age of 112 years. He left two sons:—

Hodge, of Cleveland, Ohio, has determined it to be Hodge, and furnishes the following as the *probable* record of his family:—

Her name is inferred from John Swett's will, dated March 22, 1687/8, in which he names his "daughter-in-law" [probably step-daughter] JANE HODGES, and from the fact that John Swett (who had married (1st) Mercy Rous, who d. 1685/6 Feb. 13) married (2nd) Jane. The "daughter-in-law" was probably the following:-

46. Andrew Hodge, of Plymouth, drowned April 1, 1702 in Plymouth Harbor. The coroner's jury "do find on ye first day of April in ye night. In the harbor of Plimouth near the wharff; by the overturne of a canoe & thereby said Andrew Hodge by faling into the water was thereby drowned."

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## CHAPTER III.

THE SALEM BRANCH.

## -----1 HODGES.

According to a family tradition extant in both the Salem and the Taunton branches, the founder of the Salem branch was either John or Richard Hodges, these both being supposed to be brothers of William Hodges, founder of the Taunton branch. Long-continued and diligent search of the records has failed to produce any documentary evidence in favor of the tradition.

The statement has been made in a manuscript-genealogy of the Mannings, a family for several generations closely allied with the Hodges family of Salem, that George Hodges of Salem was the son of Andrew of Ipswich. No authority for this statement has been found, and as Andrewin his will made no mention of any children and left his property, with the exception of a few small bequests, to a nephew, the statement is improbable.

George Hodges of Salem, the earliest known member of this branch at present, does not appear in the records until the comparatively late date of 1662. In view of this fact, and in consideration of various possibilities, it has seemed best to assume that he had an American ancestor, and to mark him as of the second generation-George<sup>2</sup> Hodges.

George<sup>2</sup> Hodges first appears in the records in 1662, when Robert Gray of Salem in his will left him "a quadrant, a fore-staffe, a gunter's scale and a pair of compasses." This Robert Gray, whose widow married Nicholas Manning, was connected with the family of Thomas & Alice (Place or Plasse) Weeks or Wicks. Thomas Wicks in his will mentioned his "cousin Robert Gray" and, six years later, Robert Gray's will mentioned "his servant Elizabeth Wicks." In Somersetshire, England, the families of Wicks and Hodges were allied. Richard Wicks in his will, dated 1609, named his grand-nephews, John, Robert and Henry Hodges, the sons of Isott (Bickham) Hodges, who was daughter of Richard Wick's sister Ann.

In 1667, two years after George Hodges lost his first wife, his little child Katharine was adopted by Katharine Rootes, wife of Thomas This couple appear to have had no children, and with them George Hodges was intimate for many years. They owned land to-gether in Beverly and on Jeffrey's Neck (afterward Manchester), were neighbors in Salem, sold property to each other, and in 1680, on the 3rd of December, made an agreement whereby George Hodges was bound "to keep and maintain them, the said Thomas Rootes and his wife, the whole terme of their naturall lives, with victuals, cloathes, firing, phissick and tendance; in consideration of which, ye sd. George Hodges is to have the use and improvement of ye whole estate of ye sd. Thomas Rootes, duering the whole time of ye naturall lives of ye sd. Thomas Rootes and his wife; - excepting thirty pole of land" reserved for a house lot for Katharine Hodges. sd. Thomas Rootes reserves unto his owne proper use and for the use of his wife, theire best lower roome, together with theire beding, chests and cloathing and household stuff which is therein at the sealing of this agreement, to be at their owne dispose duering the time of theire naturall lives and, at theire decease, then what shall be left of theire movables shall fall to Katharine Hodges, as a particular portion for her; and also, at ye decease of ye sd. Thomas Rootes and his wife, yn theire whole estate which George Hodges is now possest of, together with theire best lower roome, shall then fall to George Hodges to be his owne proper right." Before a year had passed Katharine Rootes died, and, probably on this account, the agreement was made void. Later Thomas Rootes married again and moved to Jeffrey's Neck where he died at the end of 1683. But on Nov. 14. 1681, the day on which the agreement was annulled, Thomas Rootes bought George Hodges' dwelling house and land, 1 acre, bounded with street, south; Richard Roberts, east; creek or town common, north; William Cash, west; and he sold to George Hodges his new dwelling house and four acres of land, now in occupation of said George Hodges, bounded by sea or salt water, east; Henry Bartholomew and the common, south; common, west; Samuel Gardner, Jr., and salt water, north. This estate is on Pleasant street, at the eastern end of Washington Square, and a part of it is [1894], or was lately, in the possession of the Silsbee descendants of George Hodges.

In 1668, George Hodges appears on a list of petitioners against imports. Nothing is known of his occupation, but perhaps some infer-

ence may be drawn from the fact that Robert Gray bequeathed him a set of surveying instruments. He was in comfortable circumstances for those days. He died doubtless shortly before July 2, 1709, when administration of his estate was granted to his son, Gamaliel. The inventory of his estate, presented by his widow, seems to have been made as small as possible, the new house with its "best lower roome,"

etc., sold to him by Thomas Rootes, being described thus: -

"Imprimis: To an old, low dwelling house and a small old barn, standing upon ye Land, about three acres and a half, part of it a small old orchard—a highway going thro it at ye East end, bounded North with Nathaniel Beadle; East, ye Cove; South, with Mr. Willoughby's Land; West with Salem Training Place, £65.00.0—To old feather bed, curtains, old rugg and other furniture, £3.00.0—To old pine chest, 4 sh.; small table, 2 sh.; old chairs, 4 sh.; pr. stillyard, 6 sh.; £0.16.0—To Hake, 3 sh.; tongs, 2 sh.; two old spinning wheels, 4 sh.; 8½ lbs. powder, 8 sh. 6 d.; £0.16.6 [It adds up 17 sh. 6 d.]—To old Iron Pot, Iron Kettle, 6 sh.; small brass kettle, 2 sh.; £0.08.0—To earthen ware and glass bottles, 1 sh.; 1 small looksing glass, 1 sh. 6 d.; £0.02.6—To frying pan, 1 sh.; 2 old bibles and other small books, 2 sh.; £0.03.0—To a poor old cow, 40 sh.; Old gun and cutlass, 10 sh.; Old lumber, 2 sh.; £2.12.0—To old axheads, old wedge, all old iron and nothing more, £0.01.6—To wages due, £12; Logg wood, £5; £17.00.0—Total £89.19.6—Debts due, £20.13.8—Simon Willard, Jeremiah Neale, prizers."

The property was divided thus: — The widow had one-third; John, oldest son, a double portion; the rest equally to Katharine, Mary,

Hannah, Dorcas and Gamaliel.

Mary Hudson or Hutson was doubtless the daughter of "honest Francis Hudson" (as Shurtleff calls him) by his wife Mary. He came from England in the ship with Gov. Winthrop, and is said to have been one of the first to land on the peninsula of Boston. He was a fisherman and ran the ferry between Boston and Charlestown, Hudson's Point, from which Cobb's Hill rose, being his starting point. His brother was the well-known William Hudson who kept the Castle Tavern in Boston on Hudson's Lane, afterward Wing Lane, now Elm street. His father was William Hudson of Chatham, Kent County,

England.

Sarah Phippen was daughter of Joseph Phippen, who, with his wife Dorcas, was admitted to the First Church in Salem, from Boston, Aug. 6, 1667. Joseph made his will July 2, 1687, and died soon after, his will being proved Sept. 18 of the same year. He left a widow, Dorcas; sons, Joseph, David and Samuel; and daughters, Mary and Sarah. He was the oldest son of Gen. David Phippen and his wife Sarah who came to Hingham, Mass., in 1635, from Weymouth or Melcombe Regis in Dorsetshire, England; moved in 1641 to Boston, where he was "to have a house lott if it can be found," and where, on April 28, 1645, he was granted "liberty of wharfing before his propriety neere the Milne Creeke." David was second son of Robert Phippen or Fitz-Penn and Cecilie Jordan or Jourdain, whose oldest son, Owen, was a great traveler. The third son,

George, was rector of St. Mary's, Truro, Cornwall, in which church he placed, in honor of his brother Owen, a tablet thus inscribed: — "To the pious and well-deserved memory of Owen Fitz-pen, alias Phippen, who travelled over many parts of the world, and on the 24th March, 1620, was taken by the Turkes, and made a captive in Angier. He projected sundry plots for his libertie, and on ye 17 June, 1627, with 10 other christian captives, Dutch and French, persuaded by his counsel and courage, he began a cruel fight with 65 Turkes in their owne ship — which lasted three hours — in which 5 of his company were slaine, yet God made him captaine, and so he wrought the ship into Cartagene, being of 500 Tuns and 22 ordce. The King sent for him to Madrid, to see him, and he was profered a captaine's place and the K's favour, if he would turn Papist, which he refused. He sold all for 6000 l., returned into England and died at Lamoran, 17th March, 1636 — Melscombe in Dorset was his place of birth; Age 54, and here lies earth to earth — George Fitz-pen, alias Phippen, Ipsius frater, et hujus ecclesiæ Rector, H. M. P." The Rev. George identifies the family in America by naming in his will, 1650, "my brother David in New England," and thereby establishes also their right to be included among the few American families whom Mr. W. S. Appleton thinks entitled to bear arms. A writer in Notes and Queries (Series 3, Vol. 3, p. 33) says that these Phippens or Fitz-pens were descended from the Norman Fitz-paines, a family which had manors and lands in no less than twenty parishes.

The last records found of her are in 1712 and 1713. The first School Committee in Salem Village (now Danvers) was chosen in 1701 to select a school-master, but for nearly eleven years the town did little or nothing about a school. Rev. Mr. Green, pastor of the church, took the matter up himself, and in March, 1708, began to build a school house. On April 7 of this year, he engaged "Mrs. Deland" as teacher, and the next day hired a room and started the school. In the last month of 1709, an entry in the pastor's diary shows that he was "paying ye school-dame" himself. In 1712, the town appointed a second school committee to receive whatsoever might be furnished by the selectmen of Salem, and therefrom to make payment to "ye widow dealand" of "five pounds which is her due for keeping school in ye village formerly;" and also "to invite her to come and keep school in ye village again, and to engage her five pounds a year for two years, of that money that is granted to us by the Town for a school." About a year later, there is a copy of a receipt signed by "Katharin Daland" for this five pounds "due for keeping School at Salem Villag at ye School House near Mr. Green's." The schoolma'am is not responsible for the spelling, as the receipt was copied by the town clerk. In 1714, there was a movement to get a master for the school, and what became of Katharine Deland, after she lost her five pounds a year, is not known.

There is no further record of the daughter. The mother appears in several property transactions, signing herself "widow" as early as 1745 or earlier, and was living in 1763.

Gamaliel<sup>3</sup> Hodges was a cooper by trade. He was a town officer of Salem in 1721. His will, dated Aug. 2, 1765, was proved at Ipswich, Mass., Oct. 21, 1765. The N. E. Hist. Gen. Reg., Vol. 3, p. 129, gives the date of his death as Aug. 27, 1768, aged 59 years, 11 months, an evident misprint for Aug. 27, 1765, aged 79 years, 11 months,

SARAH (WILLIAMS) Hodges was granddaughter of John & Elizabeth (Skerry) Williams and great-granddaughter of George Williams of Salem, freeman in 1634 and an officer in the Custom House. On her mother's side she was granddaughter of Richard & Anstiss (Calley) Manning, whose family was connected with the Hodges family for several generations. Richard Manning never came to America, but his widow with five children came in 1679 in the ship Hannah and Elizabeth, her son Nicholas being "undertaker" of the voyage. Capt. Nicholas Manning was born in St. Petrox or St. Patrick's Parish, Dartmouth, England and married in Salem, Mass., Elizabeth, widow of Robert Gray. He served in the Mt. Hope campaign in June, 1675, was a judge under the Andros administration, and was imprisoned when Gov. Andros was overthrown.

DAVID<sup>5</sup> ROPES was variously styled "cooper," "trader," "gentleman," "innkeeper" and "merchant." He kept the Salem Coffee House and dealt largely in real estate. His homestead, which he inherited from his father, was on the north side of Browne street, near Howard street which was not then laid out. He lost most of his property

before his death. His widow long survived him, preserving in her last years a force of character and an amiability which made her the object of constant and grateful attentions from a large circle of relatives. Crayon portraits of Mr. and Mrs. Ropes are in the Essex Institute, Salem.

CAPT. RICHARD DERBY was an enterprising merchant and accumulated much wealth. When 24 years old, he became the master of the sloop Ranger, about to sail from Salem for Cadiz and Malaga. At a period when Great Britain was trying to repress the enterprise of the colonies, and when the Straits were infested with corsairs, he boldly crossed the ocean in a vessel which now would be deemed scarcely safe to run from Salem to New York. In 1739, he sailed to St. Martins. In 1742, he was master and part owner of the Volant, bound for Barbadoes and the French Islands. In 1757, he retired from the sea and became a merchant of Salem. During the French War, from 1751 to 1763, he owned several merchantmen of 200 and 300 tons burden, mounting 8 to 12 cannon, principally 6-pounders. Though he lost vessels and costly cargoes by privateers, he persevered in his commercial transactions and became wealthy. During the Revolution he was boldly loyal to his country. He it was who replied to the demands of Col. Leslie for the cannon in his possession: "Find them if you can! Take them, if you can! They will never be surrendered!"

RICHARD<sup>5</sup> DERBY, Junior, studied medicine in early life, but aban-

doned this profession for that of sea-captain and merchant. An earnest patriot, he took a leading and active part during the Revolution. He was a member of the Provincial Congress, held at Watertown, and became its President. He achieved reputation and financial success. His summer residence was the large estate at Rial Side, Beverly, known as Browne Hall from its original owner, Col. William Browne of Salem.

MARY<sup>5</sup> DERBY married her mother's cousin, George Crowninshield (he was only 3 years her elder), grandson of Dr. John Kaspar Richter von Kronenschildt, who came from Upper Saxony to America in 1688, married here and settled as physician. Mrs. Mary (Derby) Crowninshield had 3 sons in the U.S. Congress, one of these serving 4 years as Secretary of War in Madison's administration, and another declining an appointment as Secretary of War tendered by Jefferson. She had also a son-in-law in the U. S. Senate. Her son, Capt. George<sup>6</sup> Crowninshield, whose elegant dress and remarkable yellow curricle were among the wonders of Salem, was a daring sailor and a great swell and dandy. He owned the luxurious yacht Cleopatra's Barge, in which he made a famous voyage to Europe and entertained there many distinguished persons, among them the mother and sister, Pauline, of Napoleon Bonaparte. A detailed account of this yacht, its master and the voyage is printed in Vol. 25 of the Essex Institute Hist. Collections. The residence of Mrs. Mary Crowninshield was a noted one, a square, two-story house of substantial proportions and elegant appointments. It was furnished with heavy pilasters on the water front, stood about 60 feet back from the street, and was surmounted with a cupola, on the top of which stood the elaborately carved figure of a merchant clad in the garb of the Revolutionary period. In the rear was a famous garden stocked with the choicest flowers. The house was removed, in 1818 or 1819, to make way for the Salem Custom House.

ELIAS HASKET<sup>5</sup> DERBY sent the first ship to India from this country and was justly styled the "Father of the East India trade." He was a merchant of wonderful energy and ability. He entered his father's office at an early age and soon was trading extensively and successfully with the West Indies. During the Revolution he espoused warmly the cause of the colonies, giving always liberal support, as when, in 1798, he subscribed \$10,000 to the fund for building the frigate Essex. He lost much property by British ships, and in retaliation fitted out a fast privateer which soon captured six large ships and shared in the taking of a seventh. He followed this venture by others, and before the war was over had taken a prominent part in the equipment of at least 168 armed vessels, mounting more than 2000 cannon. In 1784, he despatched the ship Grand Turk to Canton and thus led the way to India and China and opened up the commerce which made Salem famous. In June, 1790, was entered at the Salem Custom House, in his ship Astraa, the first cargo of tea known to have been imported in an American bottom. The original manifest, more than eight feet long, is still on file. duties on the cargo, which was packed into a ship of only 330 tons, are stated to have amounted to \$27,000. A life of successful and upright commerce enabled Mr. Derby to "leave his children a fortune unequalled in amount by that of any person in the colonies before." He built, at the request of his wife, one of the most elegant mansions in Salem, at a cost of \$80,000. The land was laid out in gardens reaching from Essex street to a terrace which overhung the river. It was finished in 1799, but was occupied only a short time, the owner and his wife both dying within a few months of its completion. It was taken down and the Market House stands on its site.

John<sup>5</sup> Derby was a master mariner and a merchant. Among the vessels in which he had ownership were the ships *Columbia* and *Washington*, sent out from Boston in the autumn of 1787 on an expedition which resulted in the discovery of the mouth of the Columbia River. He was a prominent citizen of Boston and was deputed by the Committee of Safety of that town to carry an account of the battle of Lexington to England, a mission which he accom-

plished successfully.

Martha<sup>5</sup> (Derby) Prince lived in the brick house, on the corner of Essex street and Barton square, built by her father in 1763. Her husband was a merchant as well as a physician. He was a Tory and left Salem for Halifax in April, 1775, the Committee of Safety reporting that they did "verily believe that he voluntarily went to our enemies;" and a letter of agency for his estate was granted to Richard Derby, Jr. Dr. Prince afterwards returned to Massachusetts and died, in 1816, in Roxbury, where his son, Capt. John Prince, had bought, in 1806, the famous estate on Pond street, near Jamaica Pond, formerly the residence of the royal governors, Francis Bernard and Wm. Pepperell.

SARAH<sup>5</sup> DERBY married Capt. John Gardner, a man of most exemplary character, mild, genial, humane and universally respected. Most of his latter days were passed upon his farm, on the road from Salem to Danversport, which is still owned by his descendants. His house in Salem was at the corner of Essex and Newbury streets, and

was built by his father in 1730.

Hannah<sup>4</sup> Hodges outlived not only her children, but also her grandchildren, as we learn from Dr. Bentley's record (confirmed by other documents), which states that she "left no children, but great-grandchildren." It was through Dr. Bentley's later references to these great-grandchildren, that the name of Hannah's eldest child was ascertained.

Great stature is said to have been always a characteristic of the Hodges family of Salem. One of these sons having been taken prisoner by a British frigate [so the tradition runs, but the captors seem in fact to have been French], his size was commented upon. He proudly drew himself up and said: "I am the shortest of six brothers." Dr. Bentley thus records John Hodges' death:—"1799 July 20. Died, John Hodges, Captain, Hemmorhoids, et. 76. Fifty years married. Married at 23. A worthy man. He has left three sons and a daughter, all in reputation. Married a Manning." The doctor's figures are not exactly correct.

Mary (Manning) Hodges was a great-granddaughter of Richard & Anstiss (Calley) Manning, and therefore second cousin of her husband. She was the oldest, and the only one married, of a family of twelve children, of whom seven grew up to manhood and womanhood, and five lived to old age. Richard, called Esquire Manning, and his sisters, Margaret, Hannah and Elizabeth, were alive to the commercial opportunities of Salem, and amassed a large fortune. They lived in the house, 95 Essex Street, above Orange Street, afterwards occupied by their nephew, Gamaliel Hodges. In a little shop at the eastern end of the house, the sisters plied an active trade in the East India goods brought home by their brother. Later they became bankers, letting out money to those desirous of trying an "adventure" by sea. They are said to have kept much money in the house—firkins full of silver dollars, which they polished when these were to be sent to India, and gold coin in rolls. It is reported that \$20,000 were found in the house after the death of "Aunt Hannah," the last survivor, and that their property amounted to several hundred thousand dollars. They left large legacies to their sister Mary's children.

PRISCILLA PUTNAM, by marrying Henry Clarke, became cousin to Bryan, Eighth Lord Fairfax, and to Warner Washington, eldest cousin of George Washington; also, more remotely, to Lawrence Washington, brother of George Washington. Her mother's cousin, John<sup>5</sup> Derby, son of Richard & Mary<sup>4</sup> (Hodges) Derby, by marrying Hannah, sister of Henry Clarke, established the same connections, which were brought about in the following manner. William Fairfax married (1st) Sarah Walker, and (2nd) Deborah Clarke, aunt of Henry and Hannah Clarke. By his first marriage he had 4 children, one of whom, Anne Fairfax, married Lawrence Washington. By his second marriage he had 3 children, of whom one was Bryan Fairfax who became Eighth Lord Fairfax in 1793, and another was Hannah Fairfax who married Warner Washington.

GAMALIEL HODGES WARD was grandfather of Frederick Town-SEND<sup>8</sup> WARD, whose daring exploits in China during the great Taiping rebellion made him famous in both hemispheres during his life and an object of religious veneration in China since his death. In early youth he engaged in many daring adventures in Mexico and South America, and then served as an officer in the French army during the Crimean War. Happening to be in China, as mate of a merchant vessel, when the great rebellion seemed to be sweeping all before it, he offered his services to the Imperial government. By his valor and genius he soon rose to a commanding position and turned the tide of war. The importance of his services was recognized, and he was made Mandarin of the Empire, Admiral of the Chinese Navy and General of the Army. But while scaling a rampart, in the hour of victory, he fell mortally wounded, and died the next day, in Oct. 1862, being then not quite 31 years old. The Chinese government issued an imperial edict, directing monuments to be erected to his memory, and expressing the gratitude and admiration of the Emperor and the nation. The edict was officially communicated to the U.S. government.

JONATHAN INGERSOLL was a ship-master in his earlier life. He moved about 1814 to a farm in Windsor, Vt., where he remained until his death.

Mary<sup>6</sup> (Ingersoll) Bowditch possessed great personal attractions, was domestic in her habits, of a lively and cheerful disposition, and governed by the strictest religious principle. She was devotedly attached to her children and fairly worshipped her husband. She made her house the agreeable resort of friends, and by her active benevolence many sons and daughters of sorrow were helped and comforted. As early as 1826, she showed signs of consumption, of which she died in 1834, but during these 8 years she had intervals of apparent health, and her cheerfulness never deserted her.

JONATHAN<sup>5</sup> Hodges was probably the first of the name to live at the western end of Salem-"up town," as it was called. The original lot was at the eastern or lower side of the Common, and the descendants had remained chiefly in that neighborhood, until then the fashionable part of the town; but Jonathan Hodges appears as having a brick dwelling-house on Chestnut street in 1805, built by him this year. This was one of the first brick houses built in Salem. He was a ship-master, making various voyages to the East Indies as captain of vessels of which he was part-owner, and also a merchant,

being member of the firm of Ropes & Hodges, ship-chandlers. Nathaniel Bowditch, later so famous as mathematician and astronomer, was in their employ from 1785, when he was 12 years old, until 1790, when they went out of business. Jonathan Hodges retired from trade at an early age, but later, having lost money by the failure of one of his sons, accepted office in an insurance company and was also cashier of a bank. For many years he was Treasurer of Salem and for a time commanded the famous Salem Cadets. He was endowed with mechanical skill and taste and carved beautiful watch-cases, toys, etc., out of rosewood. He was very charitable and made it a custom each Thanksgiving Day to provide a bounteous supply of eatables for distribution to the needy.

ELIZABETH (ROPES) HODGES was a very quiet, retiring little woman, industrious, charitable and devoted to her home and family. She was daughter of Nathaniel Ropes, who was graduated at Harvard College in 1745 and became member of his Majesty's Council and Judge. He was also a loyalist and his death from small-pox, March 18, 1774, was hastened, if not caused, by the threats of a mob which had surrounded his house. His wife, Priscilla Sparhawk, was niece of Col. Nathaniel Sparhawk, who married the daughter of Sir William Pepperell, commander-in-chief of the forces which captured

Louisburg in 1745.

Francis Boardman was a sea-captain. He and his wife lived in the house on Pleasant street, Salem, which is still owned by their Silsbee descendants. It was sold to Capt. Boardman by his father-inlaw, John Hodges, and was part of the original lot belonging to George<sup>2</sup> Hodges, earlier to Thomas Rootes.

MARY BOARDMAN married her second cousin, Benjamin Williams CROWNINSHIELD, who was Representative of Salem in 1810, State Senator from 1811 to 1813, one of the first directors of the Merchants Bank of Salem, Secretary of War under President Madison from Dec. 1814 to Nov. 1818, and Representative to the U.S. Congress from 1823 to 1831.

ELIZABETH<sup>6</sup> BOARDMAN, a woman of remarkable intelligence, died a few months after her marriage, and her husband, Dr. NATHANIE BOWDITCH, afterwards married her second cousin, Mary<sup>6</sup> Ingersoll. The life of Dr. Bowditch is given in all the encyclopedias. Bred to his father's trade as a cooper and then apprenticed to the shipchandlers, Ropes & Hodges, he later acted in turn as clerk, supercargo and master of a merchant-ship in five long voyages. He acquired Latin that he might study Newton's Principia, and later studied French, Spanish, Italian and German. His New American Practical Navigator, published when he was 29 years old, and his admirable translation, with valuable annotations, of Laplace's Celestial Mechanics, brought him the highest honor both in America and Europe, and enduring fame as a mathematician and astronomer.

Benjamin<sup>5</sup> Hodges was one of the most famous sea-captains who sailed out of Salem harbor. He commanded the *Grand Turk*, the *Astrea*, and many other ships which made successful voyages for their owner, Elias Hasket<sup>5</sup> Derby. He also was himself an owner, or part owner, in several vessels. He possessed a vigorous mind and great executive ability, combined with a kind and philanthropic disposition, and was universally esteemed and respected. "Throughout his life he exhibited the principles of integrity and virtue. He was remarkable for his personal appearance and for his many excellent qualities of head and heart." In 1798, the citizens of Salem raised a fund and built the frigate *Essex* of 860 tons, and gave it to the government which paid part of the expense. The vessel was

launched Sept. 30, 1779, and cost \$154,687.77. The building of such a ship by a town of 9,000 inhabitants was praised throughout the country as an act of great liberality and patriotism. Benjamin Hodges was a liberal subscriber to the fund, and was chosen on the committee which had charge of building the vessel. He was a man of vigorous constitution, but succumbed at the age of 52 to the consumption, which disease proved fatal also to his wife and to six of his children, one of whom died when an infant.

Hannah (King) Hodges, wrote Dr. William Bentley, minister of the Salem church, was "well educated and unquestionably one of the best of women. She was of small person, pleasant aspect, even

virtues and uniform excellence."

Benjamin<sup>6</sup> Hodges graduated at Harvard College in 1803, being then only 18 years old, and the first of the name to graduate there. He then made a voyage to Italy, and being a young man of exceptional talents, inducements were held out to him to enter upon a commercial life. He decided to enter the ministry, and rejecting the mercantile offers made him, studied theology under Dr. Bentley; but his studies were soon ended by the development of consumptive tendencies. At his death Dr. Bentley published a sermon strongly eulogistic of his character. Among many other excellent qualities, he praised him for "a modesty with calmness, a cheerfulness with sobriety, an energy without offence which invited services but never intruded them. An ambition which commanded the powers, but never enslaved them by jealousy, envy or fear. A progress which never was without perseverance, but never with impatience . . . . And in his moral life he was uncommonly exemplary . . . . He found what was due to all, what was expected of all, and what could satisfy all. All were equally pleased, all returned the same love, and all forgot that any other persons were beloved by him besides themselves; so that no young man could enter life with kinder prepossessions than were everywhere ready to embrace and assist him."

A farmer, coming into town with produce for him, enquired for his residence in these words: - "I don't want the Mr. Hodges who is as high up as you can see [this was Gamaliel<sup>5</sup> Hodges], but the one who is as big round as you can see." He was doubtless the "shortest of six brothers" of the family tradition [see notice of his father], for, in 1797, the bark Eliza, Capt. George Hodges, bound for Canton, was captured by French privateers and carried to Hispaniola where the vessel and cargo were condemned. There is no record of the capture of any other member of the family. George Hodges continued to follow the sea as late, at least, as 1805, when, on his return from Russia in the ship Union, he rescued the captain and crew of the brig Eagle, which had been upset. During President Jefferson's administration, he was appointed Surveyor of Customs for Salem and Beverly, which office he resigned in 1820. During the Revolution he was active in upholding the cause of his countrymen, and in 1780 he commanded the Pallas, a 10-gun vessel, which was built, or fitted out, in Massachusetts.

GAMALIEL<sup>5</sup> Hodges took to the sea at an early age and soon rose to the command of ships. He was successful as a sea-captain and also as a merchant. He lived on Essex Street, at first a few doors below No. 95, and then at No. 95, which had previously been occupied by his aunts Manning. He was the tallest man in Salem, and correspondingly stout and vigorous. His wife, on the other hand, was very small. In her later years she seldom went out of her house, except to go to church. Then, as she could not keep pace with the long strides of her husband, she tripped along behind him. When he was too far ahead he would pause, saying, "Come on, dear love, come on," wait for her to reach him, and then stride on again to repeat the process in a few minutes. The married life of the pair lacked but six days of lasting 62 years, and the husband survived his wife only a little over two months, the final illness being short in both cases. Time had treated them kindly, Mr. Hodges especially

having few of the infirmities of old age.

SARAH (WILLIAMS) Hodges was, on her mother's side, a great-great-granddaughter of Philip English, a noted citizen of Salem. His real name was Phillippe L'Anglais. He was son of Jean L'Anglais, was baptized June 30, 1651, in Trinity Parish, Isle of Jersey, and came to Salem about 1670. He married Mary Hollingworth, daughter of William Hollingworth of Salem by his wife the accomplished and beautiful Elinor Story. Mr. and Mrs. English were persons of great ability and superior education, and they became very wealthy. In 1692, they were arrested for witchcraft. Dr. Bentley says that Mr. English was the only person "distinguished for property and known in the commercial world," who was accused of witchcraft. His wife had been considered "aristocratic," and there are intimations that some prejudices lay at the bottom of the accusations. They were sent to the stone jail in Boston together with Giles Corey, George Jacobs and others. Of these all perished except Mr. and Mrs. English, who escaped to New York, remained there a year, and then returned to Salem, where they were welcomed with bonfires and other marks of rejoicing.

SARAH<sup>6</sup> Hodges, who died of consumption, was very beautiful, and as lovely in character as in person. Some charming letters of hers still exist, written to her brother Richard when he was a student at Cambridge. His oldest daughter, Mrs. Swan, who was said to resemble her aunt Sarah, for whom she was named, when a young girl asked her grandmother if this resemblance was true. The little old lady threw up her hands in amazement, exclaiming, "Look like her,

child! Nobody ever looked like her."

ELIZABETH<sup>6</sup> Hodges, after marriage, occupied one-half of the large square brick house on Chestnut street which her father built. For many years before her death she was crippled with rheumatism, that she could not rise from her chair. "I can see her now," wrote her nephew, "seated at her corner window, never uttering an impatient word, and always welcoming me with a kind smile and a loving

greeting."

George Cleveland went to sea in early life, making, in 1800 and 1801, one of the earliest voyages to Japan with Capt. Samuel Derby. He held the position of Captain's Clerk, and his journal, giving an account of the voyage, was published in Vol. 2 of the Essex Inst. Hist. Collections. He was for many years President of the Commercial Insurance Company. He possessed a delicate and refined literary taste, with a keen sense of humor, and was a most charming and

intelligent companion.

John Fiske<sup>6</sup> Allen, who was second cousin of his wife's mother, was a prominent citizen of Salem from early manhood. He was first a bookkeeper and then commander of a vessel sailing from Salem. He later entered into mercantile partnership with his brother. This connection was dissolved after a few years, and he then devoted himself principally to the cultivation of the grape and of other fruits, being a pioneer in this line. He was very successful in his various horticultural operations, which he conducted on a large scale. He was a liberal contributor to the several horticultural exhibitions in Salem and Boston, and for many years obtained the prize of the Massachusetts Horticultural Society for the best display of fruit.

George Atkinson<sup>6</sup> Hodges, shortly before his marriage, established himself in business in Boston as merchant and importer, having his office on India Wharf. He removed to Philadelphia in 1830, but for the sake of his wife's health returned to Massachusetts in 1835, living two years in Salem and the following seven or eight years in Lowell. He then resided for a few years in Boston, but finally returned to Salem where he passed the remainder of his life. He was an accomplished musician and composed music of considerable merit. During his residence in Philadelphia, as a labor of love, he performed the duties of organist in the Unitarian church of which Rev. Dr. Wm. H. Furness was pastor.

ELIZABETH CARLETON<sup>7</sup> Hodges, by her kind aid, has rendered efficient help to the compilers of this history. Leading a seemingly quiet and uneventful life, she evidently retains a lively interest in her kin, and has her own proper share of pride in the good lives and good deeds of the family. Having long desired that these deeds should be recorded in permanent form, and having herself collected some material for this purpose, she was among the first to co-operate in this work and give the facts which had come to her

knowledge.

Samuel Ropes<sup>6</sup> Hodges, was a well-known citizen of Salem. He was fond of military matters, and at the age of 18, joined the Salem Light Infantry, of which he was Clerk, Ensign and Lieutenant. In 1828 he was elected Captain, unanimously, but declined and resigned.

Samuel Kelleran' Hodges was in the quartermaster's department of the United States Army and on service in Louisiana at the

time of his death.

HENRY STONE HODGES was a young man whose early death ended a career of great promise. "His character consisted of a rare combination of good qualities. Simple in his manners, his conversation displayed sound, practical sense, united with great refinement of taste and delicacy of feeling. His purity of conduct and correctness of principles were remarkable, and he possessed in an eminent degree those graces and amenities which attract and charm in society. Never has it been our lot to encounter a character more free from faults and crowded with excellences." [N.]

WILLIAM SILSBEE lived in the Hodges House on the eastern corner of Orange and Essex streets. He was an active, intelligent and enterprising merchant, an upright citizen, and was respected and esteemed in all the relations of life.

Benjamin Hodges' Silsbee, after graduating from Harvard in 1831, entered business life and made two voyages as supercargo in the ship Borneo. In 1839 he entered the firm of Stone, Silsbee & Pickman (which began to build its own ships about this time) and remained in active business until his death. He was prominent in business, religious and charitable circles; was President for 16 years of the East India Marine Society, and also of the Merchants National Bank, of the Salem Lead Company, and of the Association for the Relief of Aged and Destitute Women. He was a member of the East (Unitarian) Church, and for many years Superintendent of the Sunday School. He served on the School Board of Salem, and was Alderman in 1859. He had, however, a repugnance to holding political office, and refused to accept the nomination for Mayor which was offered him several times.

REV. WILLIAM SILSBEE possessed "a scholarly refinement and literary taste, joined with a philanthropy broad and sympathetic. In manners he was a model of courtesy and kindness. In the pulpit he won attention and sympathy by his reverent spirit, his manifest sincerity, his carefully considered and conscientiously expressed thought, as in the common intercourse of life he won the good will and confidence of all by his stainless integrity and uniformly considerate kindness."

George<sup>6</sup> Hodges possessed the solid frame and character of his branch of the family. He was a good business man, active, energetic and popular. He was a Captain of the militia and possessed considerable political influence. He moved from Salem to Andover in 1828 and there commenced the manufacture of flannels, meeting with success, and gradually enlarging his business until it became one of the most important industries of the town. In 1833, 1835, 1836 and 1837, he represented Andover in the lower house of the State legislature, and, in 1846 and 1847, he was a member of the Senate from Essex County.

Hannah<sup>6</sup> Hodges was a woman of great strength and beauty of character. Her life was filled with active usefulness in the domestic circle and in the parish. Her position, as wife of a prominent and successful physician, brought to her many calls for assistance, private and public, and to these calls she responded with ready sympathy tempered by good judgment. She was for many years President of the Ladies' Benevolent Society, and her charming house in Andover (now North Andover) was the center of radiation of unobtrusive charities.

Dr. Joseph Kittredge (husband of Hannah) graduated from Dartmouth college in 1804, studied medicine, and practised with great success in Andover, where he was the third physician of the name. He was a public-spirited man, and in addition to his large medical practice, found time for political duties. He represented Andover for a number of terms in the State legislature, and filled other public positions with acceptability and success.

Dr. Joseph Kittredge graduated at the Harvard Medical School in 1846 and practised in Andover, where members of the family have

cured the sick for a continuous period of more than 150 years.

Josephe Hodges is said to have been so small at birth that he was put into a silver tankard and the cover shut; but he grew to be a very large man, like most of his race. When Gen. Washington visited Salem, Oct. 29, 1789, the babe Joseph (then 13 days old) was held up at the window to see him. Joseph Hodges was a shipmaster in his younger days, but retired early from active business. He met his death through an accident. He was walking on the railroad bridge at the northern end of the tunnel when a train of cars came on the bridge behind him. He was large and heavy and unable to escape by running, so he crouched at the side of the track, but was knocked to the flats below and died a few minutes after he was taken up.

REV. RICHARD MANNING<sup>6</sup> Hodges was graduated at Harvard in 1815. He served as Librarian of the Salem Athenaum one year, and then studied theology at Cambridge under the direction of President John T. Kirkland, Rev. Henry Ware Sr., Prof. Sidney Willard and Mr. Andrews Norton. At that time the Divinity School, as it now exists, was not established. He was "approbated" to preach Sept. 6, 1819. After supplying several parishes, he was ordained minister of the First Congregational Church in Bridgewater (then Bridgewater South Parish) on Sept. 12, 1821. In May, 1833, he resigned his pastorate, without there being any alienation of the warm interest or affection which had sprung up between him and his church. Often afterwards he visited his old parishioners and not unfrequently officiated at the weddings and funerals in their families. After a short residence in Boston he moved, in 1834, to Cambridge, and there spent the remainder of his life. He never took another settlement, but kept up an active interest in church work and preached now and then. Finding a desire to form a Unitarian Society at Somerville, he gave his services as preacher gratuitously for a year - from March 17, 1844, to March 30, 1845, — during the organization of the First Congregational Church of that place. In 1852, he spent seven months in foreign travel. On his return home he was visited with a painful illness. The latter part of his life was spent quietly at Cambridge in the occasional duties of his profession in the pulpit and through the press. For several years he was necrologist for Harvard College, and his records were models of accuracy and carefulness. He took always a lively interest in all that concerned the University, preserved files of papers for the library, and in many other ways aided in promoting college interests. The doors of his hospitable home were always open to the students, who received a warm welcome from the owner and his charming wife. In all his relations he manifested the spirit of kindness and Christian good-will, and was ever an affectionate husband, father and kinsman, an obliging neighbor, and a warm-hearted friend. ELIZABETH QUINCY (DONNISON) Hodges left the social circles of

a city, where she was a favorite by reason of her beauty of person and brightness of spirit, to perform the duties of a country minister's wife; and these duties she discharged with a rare prudence, good judgment and sweetness which won the love and good-will of all. Her unselfishness throughout her whole life gave to her words and acts a constant charm, and her elastic cheerfulness diffused sunshine through her home and lightened the trials which fall to every human lot. Her home was her kingdom, which she ruled with the laws of kind-She seldom went abroad, yet was not narrow in her interests or affections, and her house was opened to all comers with an unfailing hospitality. Her kind, happy nature remained unchanged to the end, only ripened and mellowed by age. Her maternal grandfather, Henry Quincy, fifth in descent from the Edmund Quincy who came to Boston in 1633, was called the handsomest man in Boston. Her father, William Donnison, of Huguenot descent, came from Milford, Wales, to Rhode Island, and thence moved to Boston. He was a captain of the Revolution, and later Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, Adjutant General, and Aide of Governor Hancock.

John<sup>6</sup> Hodges was eager to go to college, but to this his father was not inclined; so, like other boys of the time, he applied for a position "before the mast." The reply to his application was, that he was a rich man's son, and must yield to those who had their own way to make. His first voyage, made when he was only 16, was to Sumatra, in a vessel commanded by his brother Joseph, and, in spite of his youth, he acted as supercargo. His second voyage he sailed as first mate, after that as captain; but he never went to sea after his marriage. At a very early age, he engaged in commercial pursuits, transacting business in his own name, before he was 21 years old, with Baltimore, and afterwards with Virginia, South America (on both the East and the West coasts), Marseilles, Antwerp and London. Apparently his was a most promising career, but he retired quite early from active business, chiefly owing to a slight lameness, which became more troublesome as he grew older. He was elected at an unusually youthful age member of the Salem Marine Society and the East India Marine Society, both of which organizations required as a condition of membership that the candidate should have passed round either the Cape of Good Hope or Cape Horn as master or supercargo. His early election made him in his after life for many years the oldest member, in date of election, of both societies.

Mary Osgood<sup>8</sup> (Deland) Hodges was a descendant of George<sup>2</sup> Hodges [No. 2], through his daughter Katharine<sup>3</sup> Hodges [No. 3] who married Benjamin Deland of Beverly, the line of descent continuing as follows: George<sup>4</sup> Deland [No. 3, iv.], George<sup>5</sup> Deland, Thorndike<sup>6</sup> Deland, Thorndike<sup>7</sup> Deland, Mary Osgood<sup>8</sup> Deland.

Col. John<sup>7</sup> Hodges entered Harvard in 1858, but left in the

middle of his Junior year to volunteer in the Únion Army. He received, however, the degree of A. B. in 1862 with his class, as a compliment to his patriotism and success. At the first call for troops, in April, 1861, he dropped his books and went to the front as private in Co. I, (Salem Zouaves) 8th Mass. Vols. On the return of his regiment, at the end of their three months, he promptly enlisted again, and was commissioned First Lieutenant of the 19th Mass. Vols., on Aug. 22, 1861. In April and May, 1862, he was with his regiment at the siege and capture of Yorktown, Va., and the battle of West Point, although weak with sickness, and pushed on to the Chickahominy swamps, which nearly proved fatal to him, but he was discharged in time to save his life. Returning home, he took a short time to recuperate, and in the following November was again on his way south as Major of the 50th Mass. Infantry. The regiment was sent out to Louisiana and took part in the siege of Port Hudson, the command devolving largely on Major Hodges, who at Port Hudson, although one of the youngest officers in the service, had two regiments under him, and was acting as Brigadier General. In August, 1863, the regiment returned home, its time having expired. February, 1864, he was commissioned Lieut. Colonel of the 59th Mass., and in May was fighting in the Wilderness, at Spottsylvania and North Anna. In June, he was in the battles at Cold Harbor and Petersburg. And on July 30, having commanded his regiment during nearly the whole of this fearful campaign, he was killed in "the Crater" at Petersburg, and buried by the enemy in the fort. Not 23 years old, of boyish appearance ("he was only a boy," said one of his Irish soldiers, "but he was the only man we had"), a Lieut.-Colonel with his commission as Colonel on the way to him, he had achieved the reputation of a gallant soldier, the devotion of his men, the love and respect of his acquaintances, and the glory of dying for his country. [See Harvard Memorial Biographies, ii, 2997.

Osgood Hodges graduated at Harvard in 1871, then studied at the Mass. Institute of Technology, and became a civil engineer. He was employed on the Boston City Water Works, the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fé Railroad, and the Pennsylvania Railroad. He was in the service of the last, with headquarters at Steubenville, Ohio, when he was attacked by the typhoid fever and went to his home in Salem, only to die there. He was much interested in athletic sports and was very popular with all who knew him.

MARGARET MANNING<sup>6</sup> Hodges possessed unusual physical and mental vigor, a fine personal presence and great dignity of bearing—qualities which she maintained to the end of her life. She lived to see her sons all successful and prominent in their various professions, and to have numerous grandchildren and one great-grandchild. She died at the summer residence of her son, Joseph Hodges Choate.

Dr. George Choate graduated from Harvard College in 1818, and from the Harvard Medical School in 1822. He practised medicine in Salem for many years, but was disabled in health somewhat early, and after his children had married and left Salem, he and his wife moved to Cambridge, where one of his sons resided. He belonged to the famous Choate family of Essex county—a family with far more than the average of mental ability, whose reputation for brilliancy is still well maintained by the children of Margaret Manning Hodges. John Choate, the first of the name here; Francis Choate, grandson of John, and the most prominent man in Ipswich; John Choate, brother of Francis and Colonel of the 8th Mass. Regiment at the siege of Louisburg, Cape Breton; Rufus Choate, "that

rare phenomenon of mind and eloquence:" all were members of

this family.

Dr. George Cheyne Shattuck Choate graduated from Harvard College in 1846, and from the Harvard Medical School in 1849. He practised medicine in Salem until, on account of his success and reputation, he was appointed, in 1853, the first Superintendent of the State Insane Asylum at Taunton, Mass. He remained here until 1870, when he resigned in order to devote himself to the private care of the insane.

CHARLES FRANCIS' CHOATE graduated from Harvard College in 1849, and from the Harvard Law School in 1853. He was a tutor at Harvard from 1851 to 1854, and then practised law in Boston with Hon. Francis B. Hayes. He gave up the private practice of his profession to take the Presidency of the Old Colony Railroad, in which position he displayed great executive ability, and became widely known. He lived at Cambridge for many years after his marriage, and then moved to Boston where he lives in the winter-time, having a summer house in Southboro, Mass.

SARAH ELIZABETH CHOATE, with her rare qualities of mind and heart and her charming modesty and grace, "was a woman of uncommon culture, of refined manners, of great intellectual and moral worth. Her memory will be cherished by all who knew her. A thorough education in all the more useful branches of knowledge was combined with a development of a taste for the beautiful in art; and over the whole was spread the lustre of a pure, benignant and

Christian spirit." [Salem Gazette.]

WILLIAM GARDNER CHOATE, Harvard College 1852, and Harvard Law School 1854, practised law in Salem until February 1865, when he went to New York City, and entered the firm of Prichard, Choate & Smith, with which he remained until April 15, 1878. He then was appointed Judge of the U.S. District Court, holding his office until June 6, 1881, when he resigned and became member of the firm of Shipman, Barlow, Larocque & Choate, now Shipman, Larocque & Choate. He resides in New York City, but has a summer

residence in Wallingford, Conn.

Joseph Hodges Choate received from Harvard his A. B. in 1852, and LL. B. in 1854. He began the practice of law in New York City in the office of Hon. Wm. M. Evarts, and soon became a partner of Mr. Evarts in the firm which is now Evarts, Choate & Beaman. His career has been brilliantly successful, and he is easily one of the leading lawyers and orators of the day. By his eloquence, ready wit and cool independence, backed by thorough knowledge, he charms, amuses and surprises, and at the same time compels respect and admiration. With a very large law-practice, he is constantly called on for services outside of his profession. When announced as a speaker, he is always sure of a large audience, and as his speeches are always reported in the newspapers, his audience is not confined to one locality.

Dr. Ernst Bruno de Gersdorff came to America in 1849, and practised Homeopathy in Andover, Salem and Boston. A talented and amiable man, with agreeable manners, he was much liked socially and professionally. He died June 30, 1883, in Pleasantville, N. Y., at the residence of his brother-in-law, Dr. Choate.

REV. CHARLES EDWARD HODGES graduated at Harvard College in 1847, and the Harvard Divinity School in 1850, and was ordained pastor of the Unitarian Church in Barre, Mass., June 11, 1851. Owing to his earnest advocacy of anti-slavery principles both in and out of the pulpit, such a strong opposition to him was made in his parish, that he resigned in 1854. During the following winter, he preached in Watertown and West Newton; but in the Spring of 1855 he left the ministry and soon after began the manufacture of chemicals at South Boston, continuing in this business until his death. He was a warm friend of Phillips, Garrison and Follen, and a co-worker in the anti-slavery struggle, being active in writing and lecturing on this subject. A number of his addresses and essays were printed and distributed as tracts. [Miss E. C. Hodges.]

Harrison Blake<sup>§</sup> Hodges graduated from the Boston Latin School in 1870, intending to enter Harvard College, but after the death of his father, he unselfishly relinquished this long-cherished plan, and entered his father's chemical works for two years. In 1872, he went to Germany and devoted three years to the study of chemistry at the universities of Leipzig and Bonn. He was Instructor in Chemistry at Harvard College from 1875 to 1880. In 1877, he published a college text-book in an entirely new field, which has proved a useful book and has reached a second edition. Its title is "A Course in Scientific German." From 1886 to 1891, he was Chief

Chemist and Superintendent of Tests in charge of the Department of Inspection of Tests of the Union Pacific Railway system, with headquarters at Omaha. In 1892, he was appointed to a similar position on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, with the title of Engineer

of Tests, and still holds this position, residing at Baltimore.

Charles Edward's Hodges, after graduation from the English High School in Boston, entered the employment of Mudge, Sawyer & Co., of Boston, but after a few years made up his mind to go to China and sailed for Hongkong on Jan'y 21, 1880. Here he made an engagement with Russell & Co., and was soon transferred to their house in Shanghai. The climate proved injurious to his health, and in the winter of 1881–2, he returned home. In the Autumn of 1882, he went to Detroit and entered the house of Thorndike Nourse, publisher. Early in 1884, he was given a position in the Chicago office of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy R. R. The next year he married and settled in Boston, where he has since resided. For a number of years (since 1887) he has been connected with the American Mutual Liability Insurance Co., of which he is Assistant Manager.

Nathaniel Devereux Silsbee is a great-great-grandson of Mary<sup>4</sup> Hodges [No. 9] by her husband, Capt. Richard Derby. He graduated at Harvard in 1852, and the same year sailed from Boston to Calcutta as clerk of the ship Sabine. From Calcutta he went, via the Red Sea and across the Isthmus of Suez, to Europe, where he spent the following winter and spring. In 1853 and 1854, he studied law with Wm. C. Endicott, who afterwards was Secretary of War. From 1854 to 1857, he was a member of the firm of Field & Silsbee and engaged in the Calcutta trade; and from 1859 to 1864 in partnership with his brother-in-law, Charles E. Hodges, manufacturing chemicals. After a year in the Burnettizing business, he became a merchandise broker. About 1889, he organized, and has since directed, two timber-land companies in Texas. In 1893, in connection with this business, he organized the Gulf, Beaumont & Kansas City Ry. Co., of Texas, of which he is Assistant Manager and Treasurer. During 1859, he commanded the Salem Light Infantry, of which for five years he had been Lieutenant. In 1859, he moved from Salem to Boston, and since then has lived in Roxbury and Dorchester.

NATHANIEL<sup>8</sup> SILSBEE was one of the original students of Adams Academy at Quincy, Mass. He took to the sea, and made voyages to California and Japan and also, as second officer of the bark *Harvard*, to Australia. After giving up his sea-faring life, he entered his

father's office.

George Hodges moved from Salem to (North) Andover with his parents in 1828, attended the Franklin Academy there, learned manufacturing in his father's mill, and later, in partnership with Henry H. Stevens, leased the Abbott Mill in Andover. He remained there until 1846, when he bought the Oxford Woolen Company's mill, moved to Oxford, and continued the manufacture of flannels successfully until his death. He was an able and energetic business man, public spirited and liberal. In his later years he entered considerably into public life — was Moderator, Selectman and Representative. In 1864 he was Democratic candidate for Representative to Congress, and delegate to the Democratic National Convention for the nomination of a Presidential candidate. The beautiful Episcopal church at Oxford was built under his superintendence and largely at his expense. He bought the house, then recently built, next South of the church (since given by his daughter to the church for a parsonage) and lived there until his removal, in 1862, to his new house at his factory village.

Gamaliel Hodges volunteered at the first call for troops to suppress the Rebellion, and was mustered into the U.S. service as 2nd Lieutenant, Co. A, 8th Mass. Vols. He was stationed at Washington, at Relay House, Md., and at Baltimore; was detailed to command the steamer Maryland at Annapolis, and later was made Superintendent of the Annapolis & Elkridge R. R., which had been taken possession of by Gen. Butler. Mustered out, at expiration of service, Aug. 1, 1861, he was mustered in again, Aug. 8, 1862, as 1st Lieutenant of Co. B, 35th Mass. Vols. He was in the battle of South Mountain, Sept. 14, 1862, and three days later at Antietam. In this last battle he was severely wounded in the thigh by a rifle-bullet, taken to the hospital and then furloughed. After partial recovery, he reported for duty at Washington, but on April 29, 1863, was discharged for disability, his wound preventing further military service.

REV. JOSHUA AUGUSTUS SWAN passed his boyhood in Lowell, Mass., to which place his parents moved when he was two years old. After receiving the common school education he worked two years in a machine shop, and then prepared for college. He graduated at Harvard in 1846, his merits and popularity being attested by the fact that he was, on graduation, Class Poet. He studied theology and graduated at the Harvard Divinity School in 1849. The next year he was settled as minister of the First Parish in Kennebunk, Me., and retained this pastorate until 1868, when, on account of failing health he resigned and moved to Cambridge, Mass. Until the very end, he continued in acts of usefulness; and in 1870 and in 1871 held the position of Secretary of the Boston Natural History Society.

Frank Bolles died Jan'y 10, 1894, at the age of 35, comparatively young, yet with a remarkable career. He was a writer of exceptional merit. His early sketches at once received the commendation of James Russell Lowell, other short articles increased his reputation, and his two books, "Land of the Lingering Snow" and "At the North of Bearcamp Water," placed him high in the ranks of authors favorably known both in this country and in England. But it was as Secretary of Harvard College that he made his greatest success and gained lasting fame. Bringing to this office great executive ability, untiring industry, indomitable energy and high ambition, possessing a keen knowledge of young men and strong sympathy for their needs, he was at once a trusted and useful friend of the students and a powerful help to the faculty.

Dr. William Donnison<sup>8</sup> Swan received from Harvard University

the degree of A. B. in 1881, and of M. D. in 1884. After graduation at the medical school he received an appointment in the Mass. General Hospital, and then completed his medical studies abroad, principally in Vienna, paying especial attention to surgery. He began professional practice in 1888 in Cambridge, where he still resides. In 1889 he was appointed Medical Examiner of his district.

Gov. William Eustis Russell graduated at Harvard in 1877 and two years later received the degree of LL. B. from Boston University. He began the practice of law in Boston, but his merits as a lawyer have been overshadowed by his extraordinary success in the field of politics. As Mayor of Cambridge, from 1885 to 1888, he came into great prominence. Possessing unusual ability as a speaker and debater, he was in constant demand, throughout the State, especially in the yearly political campaigns of Massachusetts; and he soon achieved such a remarkable popularity, that for three consecutive years, 1891, 1892 and 1893, he was elected Governor by large pluralities, although the other candidates of his party for State office were defeated. To be chosen chief magistrate of Massachusetts at the age of 34, is evidence of most uncommon personal influence. Having served in this position the extreme number of years now allowable by political customs, he retired from public office to the private practice of his profession.

Dr. Richard Manning' Hodges graduated at Harvard College in 1847, immediately entered the Harvard Medical School and took his M. D. in 1850. He then spent two years in Europe, studying anatomy and surgery in Paris and obstetrics in Dublin. In 1853, he commenced practice in Boston and at once took high rank in his profession. He was appointed Demonstrator of Anatomy at Harvard under Prof. Oliver Wendell Holmes in 1855, and Adjunct Professor of Surgery in 1866. In 1862, he was appointed Surgeon of the Mass. General Hospital. During the Rebellion he was assistant to the Surgeon General of Massachusetts and a member of the State Medical Commission; and he gave three months of volunteer service at the front during and after Gen. McClellan's Peninsular Campaign. He has served two terms as Overseer of Harvard University, and is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and of various medical and social associations. Among his published con-

tributions to medical literature are the two volumes entitled "Practical Dissections" and "The Excision of Joints," numerous articles in the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal, and two public addresses—a "Lecture Introductory to the Course of Lectures at the Harvard Medical School," and the Annual Address before the Mass. Medical Society. After 17 years of teaching, his connection with Harvard University was terminated by resignation, caused by the demands of his professional practice. In 1885 he resigned from the hospital, after 23 years of continuous service, and in 1891 he relinquished general practice. Remarkably successful as a teacher and a practitioner, no authority is quoted oftener in the lectures on his specialties at the Medical School, and no name in his line of practice is more widely known and respected in New England.

HARRIET (HODGES) STONE is descended from George Hodges [No. 2] through his son Gamaliel<sup>3</sup> Hodges and also through his daughter Katharine<sup>3</sup> (Hodges) Deland, as explained under No. 35. Those of the family who delight in theories of heredity may perhaps find in this fact pleasing explanation, to a certain extent, of her unusual interest in her kinsfolk, and of her peculiar fitness and ability for the task of recording the history of a family possessing strong ties of kinship. She has prepared a very interesting account of the Salem branch and of their connections by marriage, and from her manuscript the present account of this branch has been condensed by another hand, much of the charm of the original, unfortunately, having been lost in the condensation. She has also contributed a large part of the chapter on the early immigrants; and her studies of the possible and probable forbears in England promise to produce such definite results, that before long, it is hoped, the family will be enabled to trace back their ancestry far beyond what is possible at this present writing. Dr. Lincoln Ripley Stone practised medicine in Salem until the beginning of the Civil War, when he entered the service as Assistant Surgeon of the 2nd Mass. Vol. Inf., the first regiment enlisted for the war to leave the State. He remained with his command until early in 1863, when he came North to examine recruits for the 54th Mass. Vol. Inf., the first colored regiment to enter the service, of which he was appointed Surgeon. After the heavy losses of his regiment in the assault on Fort Wagner, he again came North to be examined for the United States Volunteer Corps. He was made Assistant Surgeon, U. S. V., in November, 1863, Surgeon in December of the same year, and appointed to the charge of the Military Hospital at Gallipolis, Ohio, where he remained to the end of the war. After closing this hospital, he was ordered to take charge of and close the Military Hospital at Harper's Ferry, Va. In the spring of 1866 he resumed the practice of his profession in Newton, Mass., where he now (1894) resides.

THORNDIKE DELAND, Hodges graduated at Harvard in 1857, studied law, and began the practice of his profession in Salem, but gave it up to enter the service in the Civil War. In August, 1862,

he was mustered into the United States Service and became Sergeant of Co. F, 35th Mass. Vol. Inf., being promoted 2nd Lieutenant the following January. In May, 1863, he was discharged for promotion, became Captain of the 35th U.S. Colored Vols., and was mustered out as Brevet Major, Jan'y 15, 1866. He resumed his practice as lawyer in Haverhill, Mass., which town he represented in the State legislature in 1869. He removed then to Elizabeth, N. J., and thence went to New York City where he now (1894) resides and practises.

Mary Williams Bowen lost both her parents and an only brother by a steamboat disaster on the Ohio River, which left her and an older sister, the sole surviving members of the family. NATHANIEL DANA CARLILE, Hodges graduated at Harvard in 1874 and then studied for a year and a half in Germany. Returning to Cambridge, Mass., he engaged in private tutoring in mathematics until appointed an assistant in the Physical Laboratory of Harvard College in 1877. He held this position until 1881, when he resigned, afterwards teaching physics in the Worcester Polytechnic for a short time. In February, 1883, he was made assistant editor of Science, a weekly journal which had just been established through the munificence of Prof. A. Graham Bell, who wished to see a weekly journal of pure science flourishing in this country. In the fall of 1885 he

was made editor, and the office was moved from Cambridge to New York City; and in 1886 the whole charge of the paper was put in his hands. He continued in charge until the spring of 1894, when the task of maintaining a weekly periodical, intended mainly for scientific men, was abandoned. The principal honor which has been conferred on him was his election as Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1879.

After serving as interne at the Mass. General Hospital, he spent several years in Europe in study and travel, and on his return in 1884, established himself as a physician in Boston. His summer practice was in Nahant, and eventually he became a citizen of that town, identifying himself with its interests, serving as Town Physician and on the School Board, and representing the town in the State Legislature of 1891. In 1892, he was on the Republican State Committee. He was a member of the St. Botolph Club of Boston, Oxford Club of Lynn, Secretary and Treasurer of the Nahant Club, and an officer of the St. Andrew Lodge of Free Masons. He belonged to the Mass. Medical Society, the Essex Agricultural Society, the American Climatological Society, the Boston Society of Natural History, and other scientific and medical associations. He was especially interested in matters pertaining to sanitation and meteorology. For a couple of years he had been in failing health, and at the time of his death had given up active practice. He was a man who endeared himself to those with whom he came in contact, and his kindly ministrations and cheerfulness won friends on all sides.

## CHAPTER IV.

## THE TAUNTON BRANCH.

William Hodges was very likely the "William Hedges" appointed on the jury at the Court held in Salem, Mass., March 27, 1638, although this may have been William Hedge of Lynn. It is a curious fact that the name of the founder of the Taunton branch occurs invariably as Hedges in the Plymouth Colony records, and Hodges in the Taunton records. Taunton, in the beginning, was a part of Plymouth Colony. William Hodges went to Taunton (perhaps from Salem) soon after Taunton was purchased by the first proprietors, and his name is in the second list of early settlers made out by the Town Clerk, John Wilbore. His first certain appearance on the records is in August, 1643, in the list of males at Taunton, between the ages of 16 and 60, able to bear arms. On March 24, 1643/4, the town voted "that a sufficient carte-way be made from the houses into the woods behind the ground of William Hodges, William Evans and Aaron Knapp, where it is most convenient." At Plymouth Court, Oct. 4, 1648, William Hodges was accused "for yt the sd. Hedgges, knowing of one yt hath traded shote unto the Indians, and refusing to declare who it is, by a sommons sent unto him is required to appear at the next Generall Court; accordingly hee did and was cleared." He was propounded freeman June 6, 1649, and admitted freeman June 5, 1651, on this last date being appointed constable at Taunton. He was on the Grand Jury June 2, 1652, and on a coroner's jury Aug. 2, 1653, at Plymouth Court. He was one of the original stockholders of the first Taunton Iron Works, subscribing £20 for a whole share. He seems to have held considerable property and probably was comparatively young when he died. There is still on file at Plymouth "an Inventory of the goods and chattles of William Hedgis, late of Taunton, deceased Aprill the 2cond Anno 1654, taken and aprised by James Wyate, Oliver Purchis and William Parker May the 15th of the same yeare as followeth: Imprimis, his wearing apparell, 08 lb. 05 s. 00 d.; Item, his woolen cloke, 02.13.00; Item, money and [change?], 03.00.00; Item, 2 throne cushens and a carpett, 01.07.00; Item, a childs wrapper, 01.10.00; Item, in the

[Signed by] James Wyate, William Parker, Oliver This Inventory was testified upon oath to bee a true Inventory of all the goods and chattles of the deceased William Hedgis by Mary the wife of the deceased before mee, John Browne, the 15th of March 1654 [i.e. 1654/5.]"

Mary Andrews, who married William Hodges, was daughter of Henry Andrews, one of the original purchasers of Taunton, in 1637, from the Indians, one of the first 7 freemen of Taunton, one of the first 2 deputies from Taunton to the General Court in 1639 (deputy also in 1643, 1644, 1647 and 1649), one of the first stockholders of the first Taunton iron-works, the builder of the first meeting-house in Taunton, and in other ways one of the first men of the town. His ancestry and that of his wife have not yet been determined. He was one of the wealthiest men of the place. He died in 1653.

On March 15, 1654/5, the will of Mary Andrews, widow of Henry, was proved. On this same date Mary (Andrews) Hodges, widow of William, testified to the correctness of the inventory of her husband's estate. And on this same date widow Mary Hodges executed the folling deed of gift to her two children: — "Bee it known unto all men that I, Mary Hedgis, widow, of the town and plantation of Taunton, within the pattent of New Plymouth, do give out of my estate left me by my husband as followeth. \*Imprimis.\* I give unto John, my eldest sonne, thirty pounds, with my house, home lott and all lands pertaining thereto. \*Item.\* I give unto Henery, my second son, the sum of thirty pounds, with a parcel of land given me by my father, lying between the Lotts of my brother Henry Andrews and John Cobb. \*Item.\* I reserve in my own hands the sum of thirty pounds of my estate to despose thereof as I shall think good. \*Item.\* I reserve in myne own hand power to despose of my own wearing apparrell as I

shall think good. Item. I bind Peter Pitts, in case I make him my husband, to perform the conditions of this my deed of gift, unless the hand of God doe disable him by some extraordinary accident as may fall out, as by his sickness or the like, and this to be judged of by those men whom she shall put in trust, and by them to be ordered what shee shall doe if god crosse him. I intend he shall maynetayne these my two children for the use of their portions I give them, untill they come of age or be otherwise desposed of in marriage. Item. My intent and will is to make Richard Williams, James Wyate and James Walker my trustees and overseers for the fulfilling of this my deed of gift. March 15, 1654. [Witnessed by] Richard Williams, James Wyate, William Pole, Samuel Williams, Peter Pitts."

There is no record extant of the marriage of widow Mary Hodges and Peter Pitts—the great Taunton fire destroyed many records—but it may safely be inferred that it occurred very soon after March 15, 1654/5, the day on which Mary settled up her business affairs. Mary survived her second husband, of whose will, proved Jan'y 12, 1692/3, she was executor. She was then called on the records "a very antient and infirm woman." She was about 63 or 64 years old, and probably her infirmities were not very great, as she was an innholder in 1700, the latest date on which her name has been found.

John<sup>2</sup> Hodges was bequeathed (under certain conditions) by his graudfather, Henry Andrews, "a certain dwelling house with a garden adjoining to it and a parcel of land belonging to it, scittuate and being in Taunton aforesaid near unto my [Henry Andrews] dwelling house." The conditions were that the house should belong to Mary, John's mother, and her heirs; if Mary should die before Henry Andrews' wife (who was made life tenant), then John was to have it. This house must have been on Dean street, not far from the Unitarian Church (First Church) towards Taunton River. John Hodges was a baby when his grandfather willed the property, and never made this his home, but lived a short distance west of Taunton Green on the old Providence road. His house stood on what is now the east corner of Tremont and Granite streets. It was torn down and a new one built on the same site by his son William as early as 1730, it is thought, and perhaps earlier. The house and lot have been owned and occupied by his descendants until the present time. They descended from father to son to the sixth generation: - John<sup>2</sup> to William<sup>3</sup> to Abijah<sup>4</sup> to William<sup>5</sup> to William Chandler<sup>6</sup>. On the death of the last, unmarried, they passed to his mother and then to his sister, Mrs. Mary Chandler (Hodges) Dean, who sold them to the present owner, Lewis Hodges' Goward, son of Eliza (Hodges) Goward, daughter of Josiah<sup>5</sup> son of Josiah<sup>4</sup> son of Nathan<sup>3</sup> son of John<sup>2</sup> Hodges.

John Hodges was a man of enterprise and accumulated a large amount of real estate. He was one of the original purchasers, Nov. 26, 1672, of Taunton South Purchase (Dighton) which was bought of King Philip. He was on a Coroner's Jury at Plymouth Court, Sept. 20, 1672. The roster of April 8, 1682, shows that he was then in the 2d squadron of the Taunton Military Company. There were 4 squadrons which took turns in bringing "their Armes to meeting on every Sabbath day untill the last of October, according to Court order." On June 3, 1684, he was appointed Constable of Taunton. On Jan'y 5, 1709/10, he gave an acre of land, as an inducement to settle, to the first minister who should settle in Taunton North Precinct (Norton). His will was dated May 27, 1719, and proved Oct.

1, 1719.

George Macey, father of Elizabeth (Macey) Hodges, was one of the original purchasers of Taunton. Enrolled in the Military Company there in 1643, he rose through the various grades to the rank of Captain. He was one of those appointed to "order town affairs" in 1648, 1650 and 1658, and was town surveyor in 1649, 1655 and 1668, and constable in 1650. In 1656 he was chosen "to order all matters in & about the erecting of seats in the meeting house, and to seat the inhabitants therein." He was selectman from 1671 to 1686 inclusive; deputy to the General Court from 1672 to 1677 inclusive and in 1686; and was a magistrate for the County of Plymouth in 1690. He was on the Committee appointed to take invoice of the

liquors, powder, shot and lead brought into the town, and was often called upon to take inventories of and settle estates, to bound lands, etc. His wife, Susannah, it is now generally agreed, was daughter of Rev. Nicholas Street of Taunton. Although the copy (original lost) of the minister's will gives her name as Susannah Mason, there is but little doubt that this is a clerical error for Macey, often spelled Masey.

Henry Hodges lived near the residence of his brother John. His house, it is stated in the first edition of this genealogy, was "within a few yards of the place where a red school house stood in 1820. At that time there were some indications on the surface of the earth of the spot where the cellar had been." The site of the red school house, on High street, opposite the Central Railroad Station, is now occupied by the old Niagara Engine House, used at present as a ward room, and during the winter months, the Niagara Evening School is held here. The exact location of Henry Hodges's house is difficult to fix. Henry Hodges certainly owned the ground here, and the city authorities have placed on the engine house a tablet inscribed "Homestead of Elder Henry Hodges, 1681-1717." From an examination of the ground, a consideration of the manner in which the roads were laid out in this vicinity, and the testimony of persons (some now deceased) who have been well acquainted with the locality for many years, it seems probable that Elder Henry's house stood where the freight house of the railroad now stands, on the corner of Tremont and Oak streets.

Henry Hodges was a leading man in all the affairs of the settlement. He was Captain of the military company, held the highest town offices for very many years, and was a deacon and Presiding Elder of the church, occupying, it is said, a seat in the pulpit with Rev. Samuel Danforth. He acquired a large amount of real estate, and his farm of "Crooked Meadow," at Burt's Brook, adjoining the boundary line of Norton and Taunton, is often referred to in the records. He was administrator of a large number of estates, and from

his prominence in the matter of allotment of lands, it would seem that he was a surveyor. He was on a coroner's jury at court held at Plymouth, Oct. 30, 1678, and on the Grand Jury, June 6, 1683. In 1681 he was appointed constable at Taunton. He was selectman for 28 years (1687 to 1701, 1703 to 1709, 1711 to 1716), was member of the Town Council 2 years (1689, 1690), and represented Taunton in the General Court 5 years (1704, 1713, 1715, 1716 and 1717). His name appears, April 8, 1682, in the roster of the 3rd squadron of the military company, ordered to bring arms to church on Sundays. He was elected Ensign of the First Military Company in March, 1690, when the town was greatly excited over the question as to who should command the company. At some undetermined date prior to 1703, the Second Military Company was organized. He was the first captain of his company and retained command until 1714. He was a subscriber to the fund for the Canada Expedition of 1690 under Sir William Phipp. When the North Precinct of Taunton was established, although he had been opposed to the separation, he donated land as an inducement for a minister to settle in the new parish. He was a shareholder in the first Taunton iron works. He was buried in the "Neck of Land Burying Ground," where is still to

be seen his gravestone inscribed, "Here lies the body of Elder Henry Hodges. Died Sept. 30, 1717. Aged 65 years." John Gallop (or Gallup), father of Ester (Gallop) Hodges, was son of Capt. John Gallop, the noted Boston pilot and sea-captain. He was born in England and came to Massachusetts with his mother, Christabel Gallop, in 1633, three years after his father's first arrival. He settled in Taunton some time previous to August 1643, when he was enrolled among those able to bear arms. He went to New London, Conn., apparently in 1650 or 1651, but probably did not take his family there for several years, as his daughter Ester's birth is recorded at Taunton among the children of Richard Burt. In 1654 he settled in Stonington, Conn., of which town he was representative in 1665 and 1667. He was employed often as Indian interpreter and in his career had much to do with the aborigines. He was a bold fighter and is supposed to have aided his father in what has been called the first naval engagement in New England waters, when, in 1636, "two men and two boys" attacked and captured the pinnace manned by 14 Indians who had murdered John Oldham. This murder led to the Pequot war in which John Gallop fought again, and for his services was granted 100 acres of land by the General Court of Connecticut. When King Philip's war broke out, he was called on still again and given command of a Connecticut company, and was one of the six captains killed in the Great Narragansett Swamp Fight, Dec. 19, 1675, the hardest battle of this war.

HANNAH (LAKE) GALLOP, mother of Ester (Gallop) Hodges, was daughter of John & Margaret (Reade) Lake. John Lake was a merchant in Dublin. After his death, his widow, with her daughters Hannah and Martha, and her sister Elizabeth, the new wife of Gov. John Winthrop Jr., accompanied the Governor on his voyage to New England in 1635. Margaret lived for a time at Boston in the family of Gov. John Winthrop senior. Her brother, Thomas Reade, came to Salem, Mass., and settled there, but returned to England and became Colonel in Cromwell's army. After Cromwell's death he assisted Gen. Monk in the restoration of Charles II and was placed in command of Sterling Castle. Margaret Reade's mother, Elizabeth, married for her 2nd husband the famous Hugh Peter, chaplain of Oliver Cromwell, whose career in New England and Old England, ending tragically, has been the occasion of much comment and controversy.

John<sup>3</sup> Hodges settled in Norton (then a part of Taunton) at or near "Lockety Neck," on the southwest side of Rumford river near its junction with Coweset (or Wading) river, where a fight with Indians occurred in 1676. Living "about 7 miles" from the original Taunton Meeting-house, he naturally was one of the original petitioners (Nov. 27, 1707) for forming Taunton North Purchase into a separate church precinct. In July 1692, as appears from the records, he served as a soldier in King William's War against the French and Indians, but no details of his service are known. His name appears also on the roster of the Taunton Military Company, May 30, 1700. He became very prominent in Norton, being selectman 9 years (1713, 1714, 1716, 1718-20, 1734, 1737 and 1739), moderator of the town meetings 4 years (1716-19), town clerk 16 years (1716-20 and 1731-42), representative in 1718 and 1723, and assessor in 1719. On Oct. 16, 1721, he was elected one of the three trustees, appointed from persons possessed of real estate worth at least 500 pounds, to let out at interest the town's proportion of the Fifty-Thousand-Pound loan emitted by the General Court. The town chose him in 1724 as their agent to arrange terms with the schoolmaster, and in 1734 as one of the committee in charge of the Town Common. He was deputy sheriff in 1733 but his term of office is not known. The History of Norton states that he was one of the wealthy men of that place who owned slaves.

NATHANIEL<sup>8</sup> Hodges settled in Norton between the homestead of his brother John and the location of the Norton meeting-house. His place was on the road now leading from Norton Center to the Copper Works village, and was owned by Thompson Tripp in 1858. His house stood back from the road, about midway between the houses of Mr. Tripp and of Mr. L. O. Makepeace, and very near where a large house now (1894) stands about one-half mile from the First Church. The site now is owned by the heirs of Mrs. Dennis. Nathaniel was one of the original and persistent petitioners for having Taunton North Purchase (Norton) set off from Taunton as a separate church precinct. He kept, in 1712, the first public house in Norton of which there is any record. He was drawn for service in King William's War, in 1695; was among those ordered to Boston to strengthen Castle Island, 1697, in the same war; and was on the roster of the Taunton Military Company, May 30, 1700.

Hannah (Deane) Hodges was granddaughter of John Deane, one of the first settlers of Taunton, who was born in South Chard, near Taunton, England, where his father William (son of Walter Deane) lived and died. John Deane came first to Dorchester, Mass., and thence to Taunton, where he was prominent in town and church affairs. His house was on the bank of Taunton river, on the street named for him and his brother. His opinion of the value of religious services found expression in his will. "My will is, that these my overseers, with the consent of my wife, shall in case there be no settled ministry in Taunton, they shall have full power to sell either the whole or a part of these my Housings and Lands, soe as my children and Posteritie may remove elsewhere, where they may enjoy

God in his ordinances." His wife, Alice, survived him.

Samuel<sup>3</sup> Hodges settled in Norton, before it was set off from Taunton, at the place, easterly of James O. Messenger's, now (1894) owned by the heirs of Hiram S. Freeman. His house was on the road from Norton Meeting-house to Judge Leonard's (now Chartley), and being originally "about seven miles" from the First Meetinghouse in Taunton, Samuel was one of those who sought, from 1707 to 1709, and obtained a church in their own vicinity. He succeeded his brother Nathaniel as an inn-holder, and kept the second public house in Norton, from 1713 to 1719. He was constable of Norton in 1710, representative in 1720, assessor in 1720, and selectman in 1724 and 1725. He was a man of influence and well-to-do. In the inventory of his estate, two gold rings are mentioned: one marked "No Recompence but Love;" the other, "Let virtue be thy guide."

EXPERIENCE (LEONARD) HODGES was granddaughter of James Leonard, the progenitor of the Leonards of Bristol County, and founder of the iron industry in New England. He was born, it is supposed, in Pontypool, Wales, and came to America with his brother Henry, who finally settled in New Jersey. James Leonard was first engaged in building forges in Lynn and Braintree. In 1652 or 1653 he erected at Taunton the first forge in Plymouth Colony, which probably became, soon after its erection, the principal one in America. He and his sons were among the most prominent men in the Old Colony. His family traded often with the Indians, evidently with great fairness, for when the Indian War broke out, King Philip (whose summer residence was in Raynham, about a mile from the forge) gave orders to his men never to hurt the Leonards. Such, at least, is the tradition.

NATHANIEL4 Hodges is here placed among the children of Samuel, although there is no absolute proof that he belongs there. Nothing is known of him except that John<sup>2</sup> Hodges in his will, dated May 27, 1719, mentions "my grandson Nathaniel who now lives with me," naming no other grandson. Samuel<sup>8</sup> Hodges, by the death of his wife in August 1716, was left with 5 children, or 6 if Nathaniel was William<sup>3</sup> Hodges, by the death of his wife in March 1716, was left with 2 children, or 3 counting Nathaniel. It would seem natural that the grandfather, in taking a child to his own home, would take one of these motherless children. On account of the greater number of children left with Samuel, Nathaniel is placed to Samuel's credit, rather than to William's. But there is no certainty that he was not the child of some other son of John<sup>2</sup> Hodges. He evidently died young.

WILLIAM<sup>3</sup> Hodges settled in Taunton North Purchase (Norton), "about 8 miles" from the Taunton Meeting-house, and was among the petitioners (1707 to 1709) for having the North Purchase made a separate church precinct. He built his house at the easterly end of what is now called the Common Burying Ground, which was then a Common, used for many years as a burying place and a training field. His house, near the principal highway from Attleborough to Bridgewater, was where Rev. Joseph Palmer afterwards lived. He took up some land which was claimed to be a part of the Common. Against this action protests were made and the town offered to give other land in exchange. He seems to have stood on his rights and not until 1728 was an exchange effected. After the death of his father, he moved to Taunton and occupied thenceforth his father's homestead on Tremont Street. About 1730, or earlier, he tore down his father's house, and, on the same site, built the house now standing on the east corner of Tremont and Granite streets. He was evidently a person of influence in Taunton, and was Captain of the Third Military Company of that town. He was one of the founders, in 1735, of the town of New Taunton on the Connecticut river. This place, then supposed to be in Massachusetts, is now Westminster, Vermont.

ELKANAH LEONARD, senior, grandson of James Leonard who built the first iron works in Massachusetts, was a stirring, energetic man. His father built a forge on Trout Brook, Middleboro, and Elkanah was placed in charge of it, although only 23 or 24 years old. He held town offices while still young, being selectman as early as 1709. He was agent of the town in various affairs, lieutenant of the military company, etc. Meanwhile he carried on his own private business of farming and dealing in real estate.

THOMAS LEONARD, father of Elkanah, came to New England when a small boy and afterwards worked with his father at the bloomery and in the forge. He was physician, major, justice of the peace, town clerk, deacon and judge of the Court of Common Pleas. An eulogy upon his character, by Rev. Samuel Danforth of Taunton, was

printed in 1713.

ELKANAH\* LEONARD, junior, was a lawyer. He practised in Middleboro, and was the first attorney who had an office there. He is described as "one of the most distinguished geniuses of his name and day." "He possessed strong powers of investigation, a sound judgment and an uncommon brilliancy of wit. His inventive powers

were not surpassed, if equalled, by any of his time. His assistance in the defence in criminal prosecutions was much sought for, and his abilities were never more conspicuous than in these defences." At an early age he rose to the rank of major in his regiment. During

the latter part of his life his mind was obscured.

Jabez Perkins, Charity³ (Hodges) Leonard's second husband, when quite young moved to Norwich, Conn., where he bought about 2,000 acres in that part of Norwich which afterwards formed the town of Lisbon. He was an active, energetic person and a leader in the affairs of the church and town. By his first wife, Hannah Lathrop, he had 8 children, of whom two married children of Charity³ Hodges by her first husband, as stated above, viz:—Jabez Perkins Jr. married Rebecca⁴ Leonard, and Jacob Perkins married Jemima⁴ Leonard.

HENRY<sup>3</sup> Hodges lived in Taunton on the Rehoboth road, about 3½ miles from the Green, on his homestead-lot of about 50 acres. He owned several other lots of land in Taunton and Norton, and also a tract of about 100 acres in Stoughton which he gave before his death to his sons Josiah and Eliphalet, who settled there. He was selectman of Taunton 8 years, 1731 to 1735 and 1737 to 1739. He was lieut. of (prob.) the 2nd Taunton Company, which fact gives rise to

the conjecture that he may have served in Queen Anne's War, but no record of such service is known. His gravestone in the West End Burying Ground (called also the Oakland Cemetery, on Glebe street) bears this inscription:— "In Memory of | Levt Henry Hoges | Who Died Septem | ye 18th, 1755 | in ye | 70th year of his | Age."

Major Joseph<sup>3</sup> Hodges was prominent in the civil, ecclesiastical and military affairs of Bristol county. Soon after his first marriage he settled in the southerly part of Norton, near the Taunton line, at the "Crooked Meadow," on the farm where his grandson, Capt. Seth<sup>5</sup> Hodges, lived in 1844, and which Ezra Perry owned and occupied in 1859. From documents on record, it appears that he built a saw-mill on Crooked Meadow Cedar Swamp Brook, near where his greatgrandson, Jarvis<sup>6</sup> Hodges, was living in 1859. He was assessor of Norton in 1723, 1724, 1725 and 1727; selectman in 1729, 1730, 1733, 1734, 1741 and 1742; and representative to the General Court in 1737. On Dec. 9, 1736, he was elected a deacon of the church, holding office until his death. Of his military service, which must have been considerable, the records are very meagre. The Norton town records entitle him Ensign in 1729 (and perhaps earlier), and Captain in 1737 (or earlier). In 1744 war was declared between England and France. In this—the "Old French War," or "King George's War"—the American Colonies participated. Massachusetts, the next year, sent out an expedition of farmers and fishermen, who, after a siege of two months, captured from the French the strongly fortified town of Louisburg on the Island of Cape Breton. The Bristol County regiment, in this expedition, was commanded by Col. Sylvester Richmond, with Ebenezer Pitts as lieut.-colonel and Joseph<sup>3</sup>

Hodges as major. No roster of this regiment exists, so far as known, except the roster of Major Hodges's company which has been preserved by his descendants. In those days the colonels, lieut.-colonels and majors had their own companies, as well as the captains. so-called "Pepperell Papers," owned by the Mass. Historical Society, a copy being in the Archives in the State House, Boston, contain rolls relating to the Louisburg Expedition. In Vol. 2, there is a list, duplicated with some changes on pages 58 and 59, which is headed as follows: - "Louisbourg, Octobr. 17th, 1745. a List of Officers Aged, Sick & whose Affairs require their goeing to New England this fall." Among the names given is that of "Majr. Jos. Hodges in Collo. Richmon's Regiment." One of these lists is subscribed: - "The above mentioned persons for ye reasons above & According to their request are dismist ye Service of His Majestys Garrison in this place & have Liberty to return to New England." Major Hodges never reached home, but died on the journey from wounds or sickness. His will, dated Feb. 25, 1744/5, was made when he was about to start on the Louisburg Expedition. His "Silver-Hilted Sword," mentioned in the will, descended to successive Joseph Hodgeses for several generations. The blade is now owned by Gilbert Hodges. of Boston. The following is the roster of Major Hodges's company:-

Benjamin<sup>3</sup> Hodges lived in the southerly part of Norton, near Crooked Meadow, at the place where Ephraim Allen resided in 1858. He was a carpenter as well as farmer, and on the formation (Feb. 25, 1723/4) of the company which built King's Furnace, on Littleworth Brook in the east part of Taunton, the oldest hollow-ware factory in the Old Colony, he took one-sixteenth of the stock. He kept a public house in Norton from 1727 to 1729. In 1730 he was among those who opposed setting off the North Precinct of Norton (afterwards Mansfield). He was an active member of the Norton church, of which he was chosen a deacon on May 1, 1746. He took a prominent part in the church proceedings which led to the resignation of Rev. Joseph Avery in 1749, and was frequently moderator of the church meetings between the ministry of Mr. Avery and that of Mr. Palmer. He died in 1754, between Nov. 17 (on which day he subscribed to a church covenant) and Nov. 22,—the date of appointment of the administrators of his estate.

Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Hodges enlisted early in 1745, when 18 years old, in the company of Major Joseph<sup>3</sup> Hodges and regiment of Col. Sylvester Richmond, which took part in the siege and capture of Louisburg, Cape Breton. From this expedition he never returned, but the details of his death are now unknown.

EPHRAIM<sup>3</sup> Hodges went to Norwich, Conn., where he was admitted to be an inhabitant by public vote in 1729. He returned to Taunton to be married, and then went back to Norwich, where he lived until 1737. There is no record of any children born to him in Norwich, according to the town clerk, but children may have been born and their births not recorded. There are several deeds on record, showing that he owned and sold considerable real estate in the town. O April 7, 1736, he sold to David Andrews all his farm (120 acres) in Norwich, beginning at the mouth of a brook which runs into the Quinebaug river near the falls, bounded on one side by Quinebaug river and on one side by Shetucket river. The next year he moved to Preston, Conn., where three children were born to him. After 1743, but little has been found of him or his wife.

BETHIAH (DANFORTH) Hodges was daughter of Rev. Samuel Danforth of Taunton, "one of the most learned and able ministers of the day." He was a man of strong character, "was the principal, if not the only, physician and lawyer of Taunton," and was successful in accumulating property. "His various qualifications rendered him extremely useful, and while he instructed his people in all things touching their spiritual welfare, they found his advice and aid no less useful in their temporal affairs. He acquired over them an unbounded influence which he exercised for their general good." His father, Rev. Samuel Danforth of Roxbury, Mass., was colleague of

the Apostle Eliot.

George Morey, who married Elizabeth Hodges, came when young from Bristol, R. I., and settled in Norton, where he became a man of property and influence. He was an inn-holder there from 1744 to 1773 and owned several slaves. He volunteered in the expedition which besieged and captured Louisburg, Cape Breton, in 1745, being Captain of the 4th company of the 9th Mass. Reg't, commanded by Col. Joseph Dwight, his commission being granted June 3, 1745. He was among those officers who, on account of sickness, etc., were discharged the service Oct. 17, 1745, and allowed to return to New England. After his wife Elizabeth's death he married

Benjamin<sup>5</sup> Morey served from May 12, 1759 to Jan'y 2, 1760 in

the French and Indian War, being private in the company of Capt. Nathan Hodges during the "Crown Point Expedition" which captured Ticonderoga and Crown Point and drove the French from Lake Champlain. He marched to Boston, at the Lexington Alarm of April 19, 1775, as Captain of a company of Minute Men, and is said to have performed other Revolutionary service, but the compiler of this book has not been able to pick out his record from those of others of his name in the rolls in the State archives. He was chosen Jan'y 16, 1776, by the town of Norton on the Committee of Correspondence and Inspection, this committee being elected "to see to the faithful performance of the recommendations of the Continental Congress." He lived in Norton until 1778 and then moved to Lyme, N. H.

Tithingmen were annually elected by the towns "of their most prudent & discreet inhabitants," to inspect houses licensed to sell liquors and see that they were conducted properly; to institute legal proceedings against disorderly and unlicensed houses; "to inspect the manners of all disorderly persons;" to present to a magistrate "stubborne and disorderly children and servants, night-walkers, typlers, Saboath-breakers, and such as absent themselves from the publicke worship of God on the Lord's dayes." The tithing-man's badge of office was a "black Staff, of two foot long, tipt at one End with Brass about three Inches; to be provided by the selectmen, at the Charge of the Town." Eliphalet, naturally, was an active churchmember. In the list of Major George Leonard's Company, the "First Norton Train Band and Alarm Men,"dated April 9, 1757, his name occurs as sergeant. This was at the time of the French and Indian War, and his rank indicates previous active service; but of such service no record has been found. During the last few years of his life his mind was obscured.

EDMUND<sup>4</sup> Hodges would seem to have been either wealthy or else a very earnest and liberal church-member. For the report of the committee, who had sold to the highest bidders "Places for the Pews in ye New Meeting-House" in 1753, shows that the maximum price (£ 10.13.4) received for the privilege of building a pew, was paid by only three men: - Edmund Hodges, Col. George Leonard, and Major Thomas Morey. Edmund Hodges was certainly earnest and active in church matters; but beyond this, only little information has been obtained concerning him.

EBENEZER<sup>5</sup> Titus, served at least once in the French and Indian War, being private, from May 12, 1759, to Jan'y 2, 1760, in Capt. Nathan4 Hodges's Co., in the "Crown Point Expedition," which captured Ticonderoga and Crown Point, and drove the French from the Lake Champlain country. He served several times during the Revolution. He was private in Capt. Benj. Morey's Co., which marched on Boston when the fight at Lexington, April 19, 1775, roused the country. He was sergeant in Sept. and Oct. 1776, in Capt. Elisha May's Co., and apparently in the regiment of Col. Thomas Carpenter which marched to New York State and was present, as reserve, at the battle of White Plains. In Sept. and Oct. 1777, he served a little over a month as sergeant in Capt. Isaac4 Hodges's Co., in the "Secret Expedition" to Rhode Island. On July 31, 1779, he was commissioned 2nd Lieut. of the 2nd. Co., 4th Bristol County Reg't. As lieut. he served nearly 4 months, July to Oct. 1780, probably in New York State, in Capt. Benj. Bates's Co. Very likely he rendered other service, the record of which has not yet been placed in the Mass. State Archives. On Aug. 4, 1789, he was commissioned Captain of one of the Norton companies and retained command for 3 years. He was chosen by the town on various committees, especially those in charge of school matters, was tithing-man in 1795, and deputy-sheriff from 1803 to 1808.

JONATHAN<sup>5</sup> FOLLETT was a soldier in the campaign of 1758, when the English and American forces attacked Fort Ticonderoga and were repulsed by the French and Indians with great loss. He enlisted again on April 28, 1759, in Capt. Jonathan Eddy's Co., and served, on the same ground as the year before, in the campaign which resulted in driving the French from the whole country around Lake Champlain. He seems to have served also in the Revolution: - as private

in Capt. Moses Wilmarth's Co., which marched to Boston, April 19, 1775, at the news of the battle of Lexington; and in the same captain's company in its service in Rhode Island in July and August, 1780.

NATHANIEL<sup>5</sup> CLAFLIN was a Revolutionary soldier, serving at the Lexington Alarm, and in the Rhode Island campaign of July and August, 1780, in the same companies as his half brother, Jonathan<sup>5</sup>

Follett.

MAJOR THOMAS MOREY, whose first wife was Mehitable<sup>4</sup> Hodges, came with his father and his brother George from Bristol, R. I., to Norton about 1720. On Feb. 7, 1744/5, he was commissioned Lieut, of the 7th Co., 6th Mass. Reg., commanded by Col. Sylvester Richmond, and served at the siege and capture of Louisburg, Cape Breton. He continued to hold the rank of Lieut. in one of the Norton companies until 1758, when he became Captain, being promoted in 1761 to the rank of Major in the 3rd Bristol County Reg. He was prominent in civil life. In 1752, he was one of the committee in charge of building the new meeting-house, and also of that elected to sell the old one. He was town assessor in 1752, 1754, 1756, 1760 and 1761; selectman, 1755 to 1760; representative, 1755 to 1763 and in 1774; moderator of the annual town meeting 1759 to 1761, 1770, 1773 and 1774; and town treasurer 1761 to 1764. In 1762 he was appointed Justice of the Peace. He was active during the agitation preceding the Revolution, being elected in 1773 on the committee appointed to consider "what is proper to be done" in view of "the incroachments made of late on our most valuable rights and priviledges" by the British government. He married 3 times. By his second wife, Lydia (Hall) White, he had 4 children, and by his third wife, 7 children.

EPHRAIM TURNER moved from Scituate to Boston, where he and his son William became celebrated for their "Schools of Politeness." Putnam's Magazine for Feb. 1857 has [condensed]:—"Old Master Turner, of honored memory, presided over the graces, and taught deportment and etiquette to the rising generation of his time. He exacted great respect from his pupils, and always paid them the compliment of appearing at his school in powdered wig, with all the paraphernalia of full dress. He was driven to the door in his own vehicle, attended by his black servant. Both father and son were of good standing or, a more appropriate phrase, good footing in society, belonging to the clubs and other respectable associations of their day. But the father was emphatically a gentleman, conscientious, punctilious and dignified; one who not only taught the outward graces, but was capable of instilling the more sterling and noble qualities of chivalry, honor and true courtesy." There are two portraits of Ephraim Turner in the rooms of the N. E. Hist. Gen. Society, Boston.

WILLIAM<sup>5</sup> TURNER resided in Boston and was in every respect a valuable citizen. He was with his father, and equally distinguished for polished manners. In 1769 he purchased "Concert Hall" of Stephen Deblois for £1,000 sterling, having the assistance of Gov. John Hancock, who made him one of his Aids with the rank of Colonel. He was also the first commander of the Independent Boston Fusiliers, for quite a long time Body-Guard of the Governor. liam Turner, during many years, had the management of the fee in the Concert Hall, which was famed for its frequent and interesting gatherings. "It is assuming no great hazard to say that there have been more meetings of a civil, social, convivial, literary, religious, political and military character in Concert Hall than in any other house in Boston, not excepting Fanueil Hall." At the Evacuation of Boston by the British, there was necessarily much confusion, doubtless many leaving with the effects of others, and Col. Turner acted as mediator and receiver. He was a signer of the petition for remitting the death penalty on the first person convicted of highway robbery in Boston, and was ever diligently seeking to do like good offices. His wife was of a highly respected family, descended from the French Huguenots. [Dr. T. Larkin Turner.]

MIRIAM4 Hodges lost her mother when she was five years old. Judge George Leonard was appointed her guardian and she was brought up in the Judge's family. After the death of her first husband she seems to have lived in Weymouth, where her mother's family resided; for the Norton church records state that she was received into communion, on Sept. 15, 1754 (three years after her second marriage), being "dismissed from and recommended by the Second Church of Christ in Weymouth." She had ten children. Those by Capt. Joseph Hodges will be noticed under their father's name.

NATHANIEL<sup>5</sup> BISHOF was a blacksmith. When young he plied his trade in Taunton, but during the Revolutionary War he was a resident of Attleboro. He had a long military career, the details of which are given in the chapter of Military Service. At the age of 17, he served 9 months in the unfortunate Crown Point Expedition of 1756. Doubtless he served at other times in the French and Indian Wars, for when he went out at the Alarm of the Battle of Lexington, it was as Lieutenant of an Attleboro Company. As an officer he probably performed more service in the Revolution than is contained in the Mass. State Archives, where, in the Revolutionary Rolls, are recorded his service at the Lexington Alarm; his commission, March 21, 1776, as Lieut. in the 8th Co., 4th Bristol County reg't; his service in New York State in September and November, 1776; in Rhode Island in December, 1777; and again in Rhode Island in August, 1780.

ELKANAH<sup>5</sup> BISHOP served in the Colonial Wars. He served as private with Capt. Nathan Hodges, 7½ months in the victorious Crown Point Campaign of 1759. He served again 7 months in 1761

under Capt, Samuel Bent, probably in Ohio and Michigan,

ZEPHANIAH<sup>5</sup> BISHOP was private for 7 months in 1761 in the same company as his brother Elkanah. Martha<sup>4</sup> Hodges is said to have possessed remarkable personal beauty and attractive manners. Her children, during the Revolution,

sided with the royalists.

ELIZABETH<sup>5</sup> TISDALE married a noted loyalist, Thomas Gilbert, who was a captain at the siege and reduction of Louisburg in 1745. In the war of 1755 he was Lieut.-Colonel, and engaged in the attempt against Crown Point, succeeding to the command of his regiment after the fall of Col. Ephraim Williams. In the Revolutionary controversy, he early took a decided stand in favor of the Crown. In 1774, he raised and commanded a force of 300 loyalists. In April, 1775, the Congress of Massachusetts denounced him as an enemy of the country, and a few days later he was obliged to flee. Some years ago, silver spoons marked T. G. were dug up at Freetown, evidently property buried by the Colonel when he fled. He went to Boston, and the next year went with the British forces to Halifax. In 1783 he went to Nova Scotia, and later, settled in New Brunswick where he died about 1786.

ABIGAIL<sup>5</sup> TISDALE was a handsome woman, with dark, piercing eyes. She was a strong Tory and, it is said, once threatened to whip an American officer for using language derogatory to King George.

Ephraim<sup>5</sup> Tisdale also was a Tory. In 1775 he fled from home and went to New York. During the war, while on a voyage to St. Augustine, he abandoned his vessel at sea, to avoid capture, and gained the shore in safety. Though nearly destitute of money, he accomplished an overland journey to New York, a distance of 1,500 miles by the route he traveled. In 1783 he went to New Brunswick where he held civil and military offices. In 1808 he moved to Upper Canada and died there in 1816.

Mary<sup>5</sup> Tisdale married Bradford Gilbert, who in 1778 was proscribed and banished as a loyalist. He was brother of Col. Thomas Gilbert. He settled in New Brunswick in 1783 and received the grant of a lot in the city of St. John, where he died in 1814.

Henry Tisdale was also proscribed and banished in 1778 for adherence to the cause of the Crown. When peace came he went to St. John, New Brunswick, and was a grantee of that city. Three years later he returned to Freetown where he carried on his trade of blacksmith until his death.

Seth<sup>4</sup> Hodges was a blacksmith by trade. He was evidently of a restless, pushing and speculative nature, for he frequently changed his residence, and was constantly buying and selling lands, at times with a quick and good profit. It was by means of the records of his land-transactions that his migrations were traced. He left Norton when quite young and went to Taunton, and there married a wife so young that he was appointed her guardian. He lived in Taunton until the fall of 1749 or spring of 1750, and there has been found no record of any children born to him during this period. He then went to Woodstock, Conn., jurisdiction over which town was disputed by Massachusetts and Connecticut. He evidently took an active part in the contest, for the records show that the Woodstock constable ordered a number of citizens to assist him in releasing the prisoner, Seth Hodges, from the hands of the Massachusetts Sheriff. Seth Hodges was on the winning side, and Woodstock became a part of Connecticut. Seth can be traced as a resident of this town until the spring of 1755, when his first known child was born. After this date, for a number of years, his residence has not been determined. From 1760 to 1770, Woodstock was losing many of its citizens who settled towns in Vermont, New Hampshire and New York, and from his nature, one may suppose that Seth would be among the first to go. In April 1773, at the first town-meeting held in Pomfret, Vt., Seth

Hodges was elected a collector, and chosen on the committee to "look out a Burying Yard." In 1776 he was moderator of the annual town meeting, a member of the Committee of Safety, and highway surveyor. In 1777 he served 50 days (at least), from Aug. 16 to Oct. 4, probably on the Hudson River, as Captain of a company raised partly, or wholly, in Pomfret, in Col. Joseph Marsh's regiment. His rank indicates previous military service, but no record of such service has yet been found. He may have served in the French and Indian War (1756 to 1760) or in the earlier years of the Revolution. The military rolls are very defective. In 1778 Capt. Seth Hodges was fence-viewer and brander of horses at Pomfret, and in 1779 surveyor of highways. He then went to Ashford, Conn., it is said. In 1780 he returned to Pomfret, reaching the town on Oct. 15, the day following the burning of Royalton. That night he and his family slept in a wolf-pit, through fear of the Indians. From that time until his death, he seems to have made Pomfret his home, although in landtransfers dated 1785 he is called "of Pomfret, Conn.," and in others dated 1786, 1787, 1789 and 1795, "of Douglas, Mass," his transactions extending to Douglas and Sutton, Mass.

Mrs. Elizabeth Tyler, second wife of Seth Hodges, is remembered by a descendant as a very small, bright, active woman who lived to be 100 years old. Her parentage and the dates of her birth,

marriages and death have not been obtained.

George Hodges was a man of more than ordinary mind and influence. His house in Norton was burned on Feb. 7, 1738/9, six months after his marriage—the first destruction of a house by fire in Norton of which there is any record. It was probably then that he moved into his father's house at the easterly end of the Norton Common Burying Ground, where he lived a number of years. The land and house were sold by his father in January 1754 to Rev. Joseph Palmer. In 1749 and 1750 George Hodges kept a public house. In 1753 he bought one of the 29 pews in the new meeting house. In April 1754 he bought of his cousin, Seth<sup>4</sup> Hodges, 60 acres of land, with a dwelling house and other buildings, in Woodstock, Conn., and at some date later than Aug. 11, 1754 (when his son Daniel was baptized at Norton) he took his family to Woodstock.

His wife, Susannah, was buried in the old graveyard at South Warren, Mass., according to the statement of his granddaughter, Mrs. Seraph<sup>6</sup> (Hodges) Ammidown, who thought that George was also buried there. Their son Daniel resided in Warren.

George Hodges served in the French and Indian War, from March 27 to Dec. 1, 1760, in Capt. Daniel McFarland's company, Col. Willard's regiment. Nothing further has been found concerning

him.

ABIGAIL<sup>4</sup> Hodges lived only a short time, if at all, in Meduncook. Her first husband, James Cook, sold his homestead in Kingston in 1749. He went to Meduncook, Maine, but evidently did not take his family there at first, as the eighth child was born in Kingston, according to the statement of a descendant, Mrs. Elsie C. Jameson of Friendship. Abigail, when appointed administratrix of her husband's estate in 1757, is called "of Dighton," and he "of Meduncook," but in all subsequent records relating to the estate, both he

and she are described as "of Dighton." Abigail and her children probably lived in Kingston until 1751, or a few years later, and then in Dighton. James Cook probably spent only a part of his time in Meduncook, being the rest of the time with his family. All the sons, later, went to Meduncook. All the daughters remained in Massachusetts.

ELIJAH<sup>4</sup> Hodges lived in the North Precinct of Norton, which became Mansfield in 1770. During the French and Indian War he served as a soldier. He was among those detailed from the 3rd Bristol County regiment, on Aug. 11, 1757, with orders to march and

report to Lieut. Gen. Sir William Pepperell. It is also recorded that he served in the Crown Point Expedition, from May 12, 1759, to Jan'y 2, 1760, as Second Lieutenant under Capt. Nathan Hodges. His rank is evidence of other service, of which the record has not been found. On April 19, 1775, at news of the battle of Lexington, he volunteered as a private, although previously an officer, and served 5 days in the 7th (Mansfield) company of Col. John Daggett's regiment. Mary<sup>4</sup> Hodges was a noted beauty, and said by some of her descendants to have been the handsomest New England woman of her day. She was of medium height, slender and straight, with a fair complexion, brilliant red cheeks and dark hazel or black eyes. Her waist was so small that it was the envy of all the other girls. Bright and lively, as a young woman she was evidently of a coquettish disposition; but as a married woman she seems to have settled down, and became a steady member of the Woodstock and, later, the Pomfret

church. A portrait of Mary, surrounded by her three oldest daughters,

was painted by the artist-brother of her first husband.

WILLIAM CHANDLER, first husband of Mary, was a skilled joiner, whose artistic work was long preserved among the family heirlooms. He was an intimate friend of George4 Hodges, who invited him to accompany him on a visit to the Hodges family in Taunton. William went, met Mary and married her before he returned to Woodstock.

Peter Chandler, second husband of Mary, was a prominent citizen of Pomfret. He kept a tavern for a short time, and then a store, and during the last part of his life, having accumulated much property, lived on the Dennison farm. He was a man of great industry and business ability and held various town and church offices. His religious sentiments were "liberal" and his brethren in the church tried to restrain his wauderings.

WILLIAM<sup>5</sup> CHANDLER was for a time a merchant in Keene, N. H. He then moved to Hanover, N. H., of which place he was a pioneer. He was a man of strong religious feelings and great mental power. In 1779 he founded at Hanover a Moravian Community, which was to have some things in common. His house was the center of opera-

tions. This community broke up after a year's experience.

HENRY CHANDLER was a tailor. He plied his trade at Pomfret, and had for his sign a cabbage, painted life-size. Later he moved to Hanover where he had a farm near his brother William. He joined the Moravian Community, but coming to the conclusion that the lazier members were receiving undue benefits at the expense of the workers, he left the society, and so many followed his example that the community was dissolved.

LEMUEL<sup>5</sup> CHANDLER served in the Revolution. He was private in the 1st Co. 11th Conn. Reg't., which was called out in August, 1776, (when the British landed on Long Island and defeated the Americans there) and served in the vicinity of New York City during the operations in September and October. After the war he was in business with his father-in-law in Pomfret, Conn., and Providence, R. I. Later he went to Keene, N. H., where he was in trade with his half-

brother William, and then kept the Chandler House.

John Wilkes Chandler was a successful farmer. The first year of his married life he kept a tavern in Pomfret; then he bought of his father the Chandler Homestead of 114 acres in Pomfret. He was a school-committeeman in 1799 and 1807, and a selectman 1804-5. He was commissioned Major of the 5th Conn. Cavalry Reg't. on May

Dr. George Chandler was noted as physician, genealogist, citizen and friend. He was graduated at Union College in 1829, received his medical degree from Yale College in 1831, and immediately began practice in Worcester, Mass. From 1833 to 1842 he was Assistant Physician of the State Lunatic Hospital in Worcester. In 1842 he was appointed Superintendent of the State Lunatic Asylum in Concord, N. H., the building having been erected on a plan submitted by himself. In 1846 he returned to Worcester and was given the superintendency of the Lunatic Hospital there. He remained in charge

ten years and then resigned, having devoted 25 years to the care of the insane, and having gained the highest reputation. He retired from practice and spent the remainder of his life in historical and literary pursuits and travel. In 1862 he responded to the call for volunteer surgeons and went to Fortress Munroe, where he did good service. He compiled the large and excellent Chandler Genealogy. This was in the binder's hands, when the Great Boston Fire of 1872 destroyed the edition with the exception of a few copies. In Feb. 1882 he began, and in March 1883 completed, the second edition of the Chandler Genealogy. This work cost him, all told, from \$18,000 to \$20,000. He gave most liberal and courteous help in the preparation of this present genealogy, and took proper pride in his Hodges ancestry.

Nathan<sup>4</sup> Hodges served in the French and Indian War, the Muster Rolls at the State House, Boston, showing that he was out 42 weeks in 1756, during the "Crown Point Expedition," as Lieutenant of Capt. David White's company; and also that, as Captain, he served 34 weeks in the successful "Crown Point Expedition" of 1759. Doubtless he saw other service. The archives show that he was engaged in raising and mustering troops during the early years of the Revolution, but no record of active military service is known. He was prominent in the civil affairs of Norton. In 1758 he was on the school-committee of the South Precinct of Norton; in 1775 he was representative; in 1776 he was on the committee chosen to report on the adoption of a State Constitution; and in January, 1778, he was elected on the town committee to report on the Articles of Confederation adopted by the Continental Congress. In 1778 he moved with his family to Lyman, N. H., where he at once became prominent, and for many years was a leading citizen. In 1779 the inhabitants of Lyman petitioned the State legislature for abatement of taxes from 1776 to 1779, and requested that Capt. Nathan Hodges be appointed to call a town meeting. This same year he was a selectman of Lyman, and was elected by the State Legisla-

ture a Justice of the Peace for Grafton county. On April 6, 1781, he took his seat in the Vermont Assembly as representative of Lyman, which town (with others) had voted to unite with Vermont. On April 17, 1781, he was appointed Justice of the Peace for Orange county, Vt.; and on Oct. 15, 1781, the Vermont Council appointed him on the State Committee of the Betterment Acts. The town of Lyman did not remain in Vermont. On Jan'y 19, 1786, the town elected Nathan Hodges its "agent to send to Court" and paid him 12 pounds, 19 shillings and 9 pence "in wheat at six shillings per bushel." He was chosen moderator of town meetings and elected to important town offices for many years. The last entry of his name on the Lyman town records is under date of Aug. 29, 1799, when he was chosen moderator. His name is not on the tax list of 1800, nor on any subsequent tax list. But in the Registry of Deeds at Woodville (the county seat of the Judicial District in which Lyman is situated), there are recorded two deeds: - one, dated June 3, 1803, and acknowledged Oct. 8, 1803, of land in Lyman sold by "Nathan Hodges Esq., of Lyman;" the other, dated and acknowledged Sept. 24, 1803, of land in Lyman sold by "Nathan Hodges of Lyman, gentleman." Probably Nathan Hodges moved from Lyman in 1799, and in the deeds of 1803 called himself "of Lyman" simply for business convenience. Whither he went, has not been ascertained.

No will of any member of his family is to be found at Woodville, and no deed of later date than 1804; and in 1805 the name of Hodges had disappeared from the Lyman tax lists. Descendants of Capt. Nathan's oldest child have been found, and this line has been traced out; but the other children have vanished. Lemuel, Lucy, Lanson and Schuyler probably died unmarried or, at least, leaving no family; Sanders probably married and died at Lyman. These probabilities, deduced mainly from Lyman town records and deeds, are discussed more fully below. Whether Sanders had any children, and what became of Lyman, are questions concerning which these records

and deeds are silent.

Lemuel<sup>5</sup> Hodges served 8 days in Capt. Silas Cobb's company which marched from Norton, April 19, 1775, on news of the battle of Lexington. In August to November, 1777, he served nearly 4 months in Capt. Joseph Fuller's company, Col. Samuel Bullard's regiment, "at the Northward," and was in the campaign in Vernont and New York which resulted in Burgoyne's surrender. In 1779 he was living in Lyman, N. H., where he bought a farm. It is supposed that he died unmarried at Lyman, since his father, "as heir to Lemuel Hodges deceased," executed a deed at Lyman on Aug. 8, 1789.

Lucy<sup>5</sup> Hodges evidently went to Lyman with her father. Her name occurs as witness to several deeds of real estate there, the latest found being dated July 2, 1799. She was then nearly 42 years old and unmarried. The chances of her having married after this

age are small.

Lanson<sup>5</sup> Hodges (as his name is spelled invariably in all records) served 8 months in 1775 at the siege of Boston in the Norton company commanded by Capt. Silas Cobb. He was then not quite 15

years old. He became a seaman. On Feb. 8, 1786, Lanson Hodges of Lyman, N. H., mariner, bought land in Lyman of his father. On Oct. 22, 1787, the town of Lyman voted to lay out a road "between Lemuel Parker and Lanson Hodges." On Aug. 8, 1789, Nathan<sup>4</sup> Hodges, "as heir to Lanson Hodges deceased," executed a deed at Lyman. Lanson was lost at sea, as stated by a descendant of his oldest brother, probably, as inferrred from the above, between the summer of 1787 and the summer of 1789.

LYMAN<sup>5</sup> Hodges. His name occurs frequently in Lyman land deeds, from 1789 to 1800 inclusive, as "of Lyman." It appears also in the Lyman tax lists of 1802, 1803 and 1804. Nothing further

has been found of him.

Sanders Hodges. His name appears on the records generally as Sanders, occasionally as Saunders, never as Lysander. From 1789 to 1804 Feb. 3, deeds of land in Lyman bought and sold by him were frequent. One of these, dated Oct. 25, 1799, is signed by Sanders Hodges and Joanna Hodges (evidently wife of Sanders), whose name has not been found elsewhere. Sanders Hodges was a prominent citizen of Lyman, and was frequently described as "gentleman." He was elected selectman of Lyman in 1791, 1796, 1797, 1801 and 1803; hogreeve in 1791, 1796, 1797, 1800 and 1801; highway surveyor in 1792; constable and collector in 1794, 1795, 1796, 1801 and 1802; moderator in 1797; and grand juror in 1801. His name is in the tax lists of 1800, 1801, 1802 and 1803. He died probably at Lyman between Feb. 3 and March 13, 1804, as inferred from the following facts: -(1) elected in 1803 as one of the three selectmen of Lyman, his name is not signed with the other two in 1804; (2) he acknowledged a deed on Feb. 3, 1804; (3) on March 13, 1804, the town of Lyman voted "that the bondsmen to Sanders Hodges shall be empowered to collect the taxes that is the Reariges [in arrears] of said Hodges tax bill [as collector] which he has not collected, upon thire one [their own] Cost."

Schuyler<sup>5</sup> Hodges probably died young. No record about him has been found in any town in Bristol county, Mass., or in Lyman,

except that of his birth in Norton.

CAPT. Moses Wilmarth was a prominent citizen of Attleboro. He was on the roll dated April 8, 1757, of the second military company of Attleboro, and doubtless saw service in the French and Indian War. Otherwise it is improbable that he would have been First Lieutenant of this company in 1771 (or earlier), and Captain when the Revolutionary War broke out. On April 19, 1775, he commanded a company of Minute Men from Attleboro, and again when the news arrived of the battle of Bunker Hill. In 1778 he served as Captain from Jan'y 1 to April 1, in Gen. Spencer's campaign in Rhode Island, and also in August and September in the same State, in Col. Thomas Carpenter's regiment. In July and August, 1780, he was a Captain of Col. Isaac Dean's regiment, serving in Rhode Island. This record doubtless covers only a part of his service.

JONATHAN<sup>5</sup> WILMARTH served in April and May, 1777, in Rhode Island under Capt. Stephen Richardson, and perhaps in May, June and July of the same year in the same State under Capt. Israel Trow. From January to April, 1778, he was in Rhode Island as private in his father's company, and in June and July, following, as private in Capt. Samuel Robinson's Company. In 1780, Jonathan<sup>5</sup> Wilmarth of Attleboro, private, age 18 years, height, 5 feet and 9 inches, complexion ruddy, marched from Attleboro as volunteer for six months' service in the Continental Army. He reached Springfield, Mass., on July 9th, and on the 11th marched for New York State where he served along the Hudson and elsewhere. A muster roll, dated at Camp Totoway in New Jersey, shows that he was in the Colonel's company of the 14th Continental Regiment, Col. Gamaliel Bradford commanding.

LIEUT. JAMES4 HODGES lived in the south part of Norton, near the Raymond Cotton Factory. He was rigidly honest, a strict church member and inflexible and uncompromising in whatever he thought just and right. He had certain eccentricities of manner, among them a strong opposition to "innovations" in the matter of clothes. His dress was always of the style of the Continental times, and when he could not get it made to suit him, he fashioned it after his own ideas. He was much respected despite his peculiarities. In 1776 he was elected on the Committee of Correspondence and Inspection, warden in 1782, and school trustee in 1787 and 1788. He saw considerable military service, more than what is here given on the authority of the State Archives. In 1758 he served as private in Capt. Philip Walker's Co., Col. Thomas Doty's Reg't, "raised for the reduction of Canada." The service of the company seems to have been from March to November, in the expedition under Gen. Amherst, which seized Prince Edward's Island and Cape Breton, besieging and capturing Louisburg, which had been given back to the French after its capture in 1745. During the Revolution, in which he took part, he always kept his musket ready near his bed, that he might not be delayed in starting out, in case an "alarm" came by night. His wife often told her grandchildren of those days, when frequently she was obliged to harvest the crops during the many absences on military duty of her husband. In January 1776, being a Lieutenant, he was one of the officers who joined Col. J. Ward's regiment in the American army besieging Boston. He remained at Boston in the army until the end of the year. In December he returned home; and it was characteristic of him that, although an officer, when the "Tiverton Alarm" came, he volunteered as private and served in Rhode Island under Capt. Isaac Hodges in December 1776 and January 1777.

LABAN<sup>5</sup> Hodges bore so strong a resemblance to his twin brother, from whom he never differed more than a few pounds in weight, that even the father could not tell them apart. The two boys often

answered to the other's name, took one another's place, and played many a mild trick on other people.

WILLIAM4 HODGES, lived a quiet life and very little is known of him or found on the records. He was one of the Taunton signers of the Solemn League and Covenant of May 1, 1776, which pledged the subscribers to refrain from aiding in any manner the naval or land forces of the King of Great Britain, but, on the contrary, to "defend by Arms the United American Colonies, and every part thereof, against every hostile Attempt of the Fleets and Armies in the Service of Great Britain."

John<sup>5</sup> Hodges also signed this Solemn League and Covenant, and fought in the Revolutionary Army. He served eight months in 1775, at the siege of Boston, as private in Capt. Oliver Soper's company, Col. Timothy Walker's regiment. He was eight days in Rhode Island, under Capt. Ichabod Leonard, at the Tiverton Alarm of Aug. 1, 1780. Dying unmarried, his estate was divided among 17 nephews and nieces.

[See No. 152.] Jemima<sup>4</sup> (Hodges) Shaw died before Dec. 28, 1757, the date of her father's will, which mentions "children of daughter Jemima deceased," without giving their number or names. The destruction by fire of so many of the records at Taunton has rendered it impossible to tell how many children were born to Jemima, or to give documentary proof that the two named above were really hers; but collateral evidence seems to justify placing their names here.

DEACON SIMEON WILLIAMS was one of the many members of the First Church of Taunton who withdrew from the Society in 1792, and founded the Westville Congregational Church. The cause of withdrawal was dissatisfaction with the new minister selected for the original church, a dissatisfaction which seems to have been proved well grounded. Deacon Simeon was a man of ability, strength of character and influence. His first wife, Zipporah Crane of Raynham, whom he married Aug. 26, 1742, died in Taunton May 21, 1748. doubtless served in the French and Indian War, for, being corporal of the 2nd Taunton company on April 6, 1757, according to the roster of that date, he rose to be Lieutenant and Captain of the company. As he was on the Alarm (or reserve) List, Dec. 6. 1776, he probably saw no active service in the Revolution. But in 1775, 1776, 1777 and 1778, possibly also in other years, he was elected a member of the Taunton Committee of Correspondence, Inspection and Safety, whose multifarious duties included the discipline and reformation of Tories, the care of confiscated property, the regulation of prices, obtaining supplies for the American troops, etc., etc. He was selectman of Taunton from 1760 to 1766, in 1770, and in 1777.

Andrew<sup>4</sup> Hodges lived at the Crooked Meadow, Norton, near the Taunton line, on the place where his father lived before him, and his son Rufus after him. He served in the French and Indian War, but the details of his service have been lost. He was sergeant of the detail from the 3rd Bristol County regiment, ordered Aug. 11, 1751, to march and report to Lieut.-Gen. William Pepperell, on news of the

attack on Fort William Henry, N. Y., by the French and Indians. In July, 1771, he was 2nd Lieut. of the 2nd Troop of Horse, 3rd Bristol County reg't. He was a strong advocate of the cause of the United Colonies when the Revolution began, and in 1776 was elected on the Norton Committee of Correspondence and Inspection. This committee was first chosen in 1775 to see to the faithful performance of the recommendations of the Continental Congress (the one which met at Philadelphia in 1774), and was continued yearly with increased powers.

John<sup>5</sup> Hodges was a Minute Man at the beginning of the Revolution, and seems to have remained almost or quite continuously in the ranks of the American Army until his death. When the news of the battle of Lexington roused the country, April 19, 1775, he marched to Boston as corporal of Capt. Silas Cobb's company. He remained under the same captain in the regiments of Col. John Daggett and of Col. Timothy Walker during the remainder of the year, participating in the operations which ended in driving the British from Boston. He apparently then went with the main part of Gen. Washington's army to defend New York against the threatened attack of the British, since he died in the service at New York City on July 28, 1776. The first edition of this genealogy gives his age at death as twenty-four years. If this be correct, then he was the oldest child of his parents, and born in 1751 or 1752, when his father was only 22 years old. It would appear more likely that there is an error in the statement of his age, that he was 20, instead of 24 years old when he died, and thus the second child.

Rufus Hodges, widely known as Capt. Rufus Hodges, inherited his father's homestead and lived there until his death. Like his father and brother, he was a Revolutionary soldier. As private under Capt. Isaac Hodges, from July to November, 1776, he served in the defense of Boston against efforts of the British forces to retake the city. In December, 1776, and January, 1777, he served under the same captain in Rhode Island. In July, 1780, as corporal in Capt. Israel Trow's company, and the next month as corporal in Capt. Israel Trow's company, he saw service in Rhode Island. After the war he continued in the militia, rising to the command of the Norton company on the West side of Rumford River. He was Captain of this company from May 5, 1801 to Dec. 3, 1804, when he retired. He was assessor of Norton in 1801. A prominent and influential citizen, he commanded the esteem and respect of all his fellow townsmen.

Josiah<sup>4</sup> Hodges located in what was called Robbins Corner in Stoughton, established as Foxboro in 1778, annexed to Sharon about 1790, and set back to Foxboro in 1850; now called East Foxboro. Originally in Suffolk county, the place is now in the county of Norfolk. Thus without moving his residence, he lived in three towns and two counties. He moved from Taunton to this place before his marriage, and his father purchased about 100 acres here and deeded them to Josiah and his brother Eliphalet. Josiah<sup>4</sup> Hodges was named in the roster, dated March 12, 1757, of the Stoughton Train Band commanded by Capt. Elkanah Billings, whose company, according to the History of Norfolk County, served at Crown Point, Ticonderoga and Fort William Henry.

MARY (COOLIGE) Hodges lost her father when quite young, and, according to the family tradition, on the second marriage of her mother, left Watertown and went to Stoughton to earn her living. She was a remarkably energetic, active and industrious woman, and retained her physical and mental powers almost unimpaired to the very end of her long life. It is said that in her old age—she lived to be eighty—she often "trotted off to Stoughton to visit her married daughters, knitting work in hand, improving her time while

walking the six or eight miles."

He was a man of property and owner of a large landed estate. From the soldierly qualities which he evidently possessed, it seems probable that he served in the war with the French of 1744 and 1745, and perhaps in the first year of the French and Indian War. But the record, thus far found, of his military service begins in 1757. He was then Ensign of a company stationed at Fort William Henry when the French and Indians under Montcalm invested the place on Aug. 3, 1757. He was sent out, at the beginning of the siege, under Capt. Saltonstall, but his party was driven back and he himself taken prisoner. He was released not long after, and returned to Taunton. He rose to the rank of Captain of the 3rd Taunton company and in 1772 was Major of the 3rd Bristol County regiment. On Feb. 2, 1776, he was elected Colonel of this regiment by the legislature, and commissioned Feb. 7, and did good service during the Revolution. His principal military operations were in Rhode Island, which State was constantly harried and threatened by the British navy. He was a prominent member of the Taunton Committee of Correspondence, Inspection & Safety for several years beginning in 1775, and was selectman of Taunton in 1780.

George Williams was a man of fine personal appearance, according to the accounts which have been handed down in the family. He was a farmer, owned a handsome property and spent the greater part of his life in Raynham. He did service in the Revolution, but it is difficult to pick out his record from those of the many of his name. Possibly he served in New York State from about the beginning of 1776 until December, being or becoming a sergeant in Capt. James Allen's company, Col. Simeon Carey's regiment. He certainly was Quartermaster of his father's regiment in Rhode Island, Dec. 1776 and Jan'y 1777.

RICHARD<sup>5</sup> WILLIAMS was one of the Minute Men of Capt. James Williams Jr.'s company, who marched to Roxbury at news of the battle of Lexington. The last 6 months of 1776 he was serving at the "Defence of Boston," being sergeant under Capt. Joshua Wilbore. He very likely served at other times; but the Revolutionary Rolls are not sufficiently explicit for his identification among the

many soldiers of the same name.

ELIPHALET Hodges, as corporal of the company of his uncle, Major Joseph<sup>3</sup> Hodges, in Col. Sylvester Richmond's regiment, went to Cape Breton in 1745, and took part in the remarkable siege and capture of Louisburg. On his return he settled in Stoughton where his father gave him a farm of 50 acres about the time of his marriage. farm, through alteration of town and county lines, has been in the towns of Dorchester, Stoughton, Sharon and Foxboro, and the counties of Suffolk and Norfolk. It is the place in East Foxboro now owned and occupied by Marcus Pratt<sup>7</sup> Hodges. Of Eliphalet's life subsequent to his marriage, almost nothing is known. His name is on the Alarm (or reserve) list of the Stoughton company, March 12, 1757.

CAPT. HENRY Hodges lived on the south side of the road to Norton (now Tremont Street), about one-quarter mile east of Three Mile Bridge and a mile from the Green — just beyond the residence of his brother-in-law, Gen. George Godfrey. He was prominent in church, civil and military matters. He was selectman in 1755, 1762, 1763, 1768 and 1770, and held other offices. In all probability he saw considerable service in the French and Indian War, the records of which are so scanty and imperfect. On April 6, 1757, he was Ensign of the 2nd Taunton Company, and on Aug. 11 of the same year, he was Lieutenant of the same company and ordered to place himself and his men under the command of Lieut.-Gen. William Pepperell to protect the frontiers against the forces of Montcalm, who this month captured Fort William Henry. The roster of the officers of the 3rd Bristol County regiment, March 25, 1762, gives his name as Captain of the 2nd Taunton company, which position he held until 1772. In January, 1776, he was Captain of a company raised in Taunton and Raynham for Col. Joseph Reed's regiment, and served at the siege of Boston. He was elected a member of the Taunton Committee of Inspection, Correspondence and Safety in 1775, 1776 and 1778. Among his duties as committee-man was that of taking charge of the estates of loyalists or "persons who fled to Boston for refuge [before the British evacuated the city] or are enemies of the

Continent." He held a similar position under the State, and as Commissioner of the Commonwealth confiscated the Three Mile River iron works, the owners of which were tories. If we can believe the statements handed down verbally, it was through the performance of his duties as member of the Committee of Safety that he met his death. The care and conveyance to the hospital of sick soldiers, many of them suffering from the small-pox, devolved on him. He caught from the soldiers this dread disease, and died in the small-pox hospital on Hospital Hill, not far from Broadway and near to the Raynham line. Here he was buried; and for 116 years his grave, marked by head and foot-stones, occupied a lonely spot in the woods, so solitary that none but hunters or searchers for early flowers ever saw it. In 1894, his great-great-grandchildren, Henry Arthur Hodges and Alfred W. Woodward, removed the veteran's remains and the gravestone to the family burial lot in Oakland Cemetery. The stone bears this inscription: — "In Memory of | Capt. Henry | Hodges who | died June ye | 29th 1778 in | ye 61 year of | his Age."

Mercy (Eddy) Hodges was one of the members of the Taunton Church who withdrew in 1792 and formed the Congregational Church in the West of Taunton. All of the old church, except four persons, withdrew on account of the calling of Rev. John Foster. Her gravestone in Oakland Cemetery is thus inscribed:—"In Memory of Mercy Hodges | Widow of Capt. Henry Hodges | Who died Sept. ye 29th 1811 | Aged 93 years and 5 m. 15 d. | Death is a debt to nature

due | Ive paid the debt and so must you."

JAMES<sup>5</sup> Hodges was a Revolutionary soldier. At the news of Lexington fight, he marched to Boston as private in Capt. Robert Crossman's company, and then, enlisting at once in Capt. Oliver Soper's company, remained the whole year in the army besieging Boston. From June to December, 1776, he was a sergeant in Capt. Matthew Randall's company, defending Boston against efforts of the British to recapture it. Returning home, he immediately served in Rhode Island, in December and January, under Capt. Elisha Barney, going out as private, despite his previous rank. He was one of the Taunton signers of the Solemn League and Covenant of May 1, 1776.

ELKANAH<sup>5</sup> Hodges was a martyr of the Revolution. With his brother James, he marched to Boston, April 20, 1775, in Capt. Robert Crossman's company. With his brother he transferred to Capt. Cliver Soper's company, and remained with the American Army until Boston was captured. Then, early in 1776, still under Capt. Soper, he went to New York and served in and near New York City, which was threatened by the British. Possibly from wounds received in a skirmish, or perhaps from sickness which was prevalent among the American troops, he died on Aug. 8, 1776, shortly before the disastrous battle of Long Island.

GEN. George Godfrey was one of the most prominent men of Taunton. He was noted for his ready wit, sound judgment and tenacity of opinion; was distinguished for military ability; and filled many civil positions. For more than 30 years he kept a record of deaths, marriages, etc., in Taunton, as well as letters, military orders, etc., etc. These, fortunately, have been preserved; and the "Godfrey papers" have supplied many historical facts, which otherwise would have been lost when the Taunton town records were destroyed by fire in 1838. He was assessor for over 30 years, county treasurer from 1776 to 1791 and selectman from 1789 to 1791. He was chairman of the Committee of Correspondence and Safety of the Revolution. He began his military career in 1746 (or perhaps 1745) as private in the Old French War, passed through almost every grade from Ensign to Colonel in the provincial service, and on Feb. 9, 1776, was made Brigadier-General and commanded the Bristol County brigade during the war.

James Hodges was perhaps sergeant James Hodges, who served in New York State, from July 2 to Nov. 18, 1756, in the company commanded by Captain and Major James House, later by Captain Thomas Mitchell, in the Crown Point Expedition which was unsuccessful. On March 12, 1757, Jonathan Barney of Taunton was appointed guardian of Phebe<sup>5</sup> Hodges, daughter of James Hodges late of Taunton, deceased.

Joseph<sup>4</sup> Hodges was the first child baptized (Nov. 24, 1714) in the Norton church after it was gathered. He lived in the southerly part of Norton, about half a mile west of his father's place (at Crooked Meadow), on the same road, and where Williams<sup>6</sup> Hodges resided in 1850. He owned considerable property and was a prominent citizen. In 1750 he was elected tithing-man. The tithing-men were chosen "of the most prudent and discreet inhabitants;" their duties were to inspect and regulate all licensed and unlicensed houses and, in general, to see that people behaved properly and attended church on Sunday; and their badge of office was "a black staff, of two foot long, tipt at one End with Brass about three inches, to be provided by the selectmen at the Charge of the Town." In 1751 Norton South Precinct decided to build a new meeting house, and Joseph Hodges, like many others, agreed to provide material. His agreement, preserved in the town records, reads:—"I promise to Gitt 2 Beems, forty-two feet

Long, twelve and ten Inches square; and four lock-tenant's Posts, to be 26 feet Long, 10 inches square; to be Good white-oake timber, well Hewed; at 19 lb. 10 s., old tenner, to be Paid out of my rates, John<sup>3</sup> Hodges' and Timothy<sup>4</sup> Hodges' Rates." In 1753 or 1754 he, with his brothers Timothy and Isaac, and his cousin Ephraim Hodges, repaired or rebuilt the saw-mill erected by his father. In 1755 he was assessor. In the French and Indian War, he served from Feb. 18, to Sept. 19, 1756, as Captain of a company detailed from the 3rd Bristol County regiment and ordered on the Crown Point Expedition under Col. Richard Gridley. Evidently (from his rank) he must have done previous service of which we have no account. Before starting on this campaign he made his will. He served as Captain 30 weeks and 5 days and then met his death. He was stationed at the time at Fort William Henry and went with a scouting party which was ambushed by the Indians. As described by William Merry, one of the party, "Captain Hodges volunteered in place of another officer who was sick, and those who went with him were volunteers. His command numbered 60 men. The company had marched nearly to the point designated in the order given to Captain Hodges, when he made a halt for the purpose of refreshment. A party, despatched to the lake [Lake George] for water, returned with information that they saw on the shore hundreds of fresh tracks of Indians. The order was immediately given to resume the march. The company had proceeded but a short distance when they were fired on from all sides. Capt. Hodges charged his men 'to fight for their lives,' and set the example by the energetic use of his own gun, which he carried on this occasion. But they were overpowered by numbers. Merry's testimony was that he fought by the side of his commander, who was first wounded in the ankle by a musket-ball, when he dropped on his knees and continued to fire and encourage his men. Another ball struck him in the breast. Placing one hand on the wound to check the flowing blood, with his musket in the other, he still kept the Indians at bay, one of whom reached forward to sever his scalp. Foiled thus, the Indian shot him through the head and the brave captain fell." It has been suggested that the place of battle was at or near Sabbath-Day Point. Niles, in his history of the war, states that it was on the west side of Lake George, about 12 miles from the fort. He adds: - "Ten were killed and their bodies stripped naked and miserably mangled; three had their heads cut off and stuck on poles. Among the slain was Capt. Hodges. They were after brought in a bateau and buried. \* \* The loss of Capt. Hodges and men was greatly lamented, as he was a worthy commander."

CHARITY4 Hodges "was an excellent woman" and her virtues are still extolled by descendants of her friends and neighbors. Doubtless the respect and admiration which she enjoyed had an effect in preserving the high position of her family at Freetown at the time of the Revolution, when her husband espoused the unpopular side.

Col. James Winslow was a clothier as well as farmer. He was Justice of the Peace, town treasurer from 1755 to 1763 and selectman in 1762. He was Lieutenant of the 1st Freetown company as early as 1757 and Captain-Lieutenant in 1758 and, hence, probably saw service in the Old French and French and Indian Wars. He became Captain June 4, 1762, and Lieutenant-Colonel of the 2nd Bristol County regiment July 25, 1771, holding the last office until Sept. 19, 1775. Thomas Gilbert, the noted loyalist, was Colonel of this regiment, and James Winslow also was an adherent of the Crown, but seems to have lived unmolested despite his politics. was accidentally killed by being run over by a loaded ox-sled.

EPHRAIM<sup>5</sup> Winslow succeeded to his father's business as clothier. He was prominent in town affairs, being Justice of the Peace, assessor and representative to the legislature for several years. He was elected town clerk April 7, 1788, and held the office seven years.

Shadrach<sup>5</sup> Winslow graduated at Yale in 1771, studied medicine, and became an emineut physician and surgeon. On Jan'y 6, 1772, he was elected at Freetown "town's grammar schoolmaster for two months at 40 shillings per month and 6 shillings per week for board." In the Revolution he sided strongly with the Colonists and contributed largely to fitting out an armed vessel in which he sailed

as surgeon. He was taken prisoner by the British, detained for a time off the coast of Spain, and afterwards imprisoned on the "Old Jersey Prison Ship" in New York harbor. Here he suffered many privations, and his health was seriously impaired. After his release he settled in Foxboro, where he had a very extensive medical practice and gained a high reputation.

TIMOTHY4 HODGES settled in Norton at the Crooked Meadow near the Taunton line, a little east of the residence of Andrew Hodges. His children were baptized in the Norton Church and he seems to have lived in Norton until after his wife's death. Apparently he moved to Taunton, as he was among the Taunton subscribers to the Solemn League and Covenant of May 1, 1776, and he and his children are described as "of Taunton" in the later records.

TIMOTHY HODGES served at the Defence of Boston in 1776 as private in Capt. Matthew Randall's company. In 1780 he was in the company of Capt. Jacob Hoskins, and regiment of Col. Abiel Mitchell, raised "to reinforce the Continental Army." In 1781, as corporal in Capt. Jacob Hoskins's company, he served a short term in Rhode Island. His name is given in the list of 1787 of members of the Episcopal Church of Taunton. He moved to New York State and settled at Greenfield, in what was then a wilderness. He was at one time quite wealthy and is remembered as a man of strict ideas and strong convictions.

JONATHAN4 HODGES was a farmer. He was also a "clothier," that is, he owned a fulling-mill and carried on the business of fulling, dyeing and dressing cloth. When a young man he went to Freetown, Mass., and there carried on his business of clothier. He was a member of the church in Berkley and may have previously lived a short time there. Soon after his marriage he settled in Norton, and about 1745 built there his fulling-mill, the first one erected in that place. It stood on Goose Brook, a few rods below the bridge, near where George H. Arnold lived in 1850. As the mill-pond overflowed Judge Leonard's land, Jonathan Hodges soon moved the mill about 35 rods further down the stream, and ran it until about 1784, when his son Jonathan assumed the business. He was an earnest and prominent church member and an influential citizen. In 1745 he was admitted to the Norton church, by letter from the Berkley church, and doubtless at this time made his confession of faith. "I desire to bless God for that he hath cast my lot in a Gospel Land, where I have the Glad tidings of a Saviour proclaimed in mine ears, and for that I have the holy Scriptures to Read & to direct me in the ways of God's comands. And I allso desiar to bless God for his Goodness to me, that I desended of such parents, who taught and instructed me, and gave me up to God in mine infency in baptisem, which is an ordinance apinted by Christ to beleivers and their infant seed, &, notwithstanding God's goodness to me, I have sined against him. I therefore acknowledge I deserves nothing from the hand of God but his wrath and indgnattion to be poured out upon me. But I would bless his most holy name, that he hath put it into my heart to be making my peace with him. I have had a desire for som time to come to the Lord's table; but being in som measure sensable of my own unworthness, I daust not, least by coming unworthily, I eat and drink judgment to myself. But I have taken incourigement from the word of God, to come up to this holy ordinance; as in marthew xi. 28, Come unto me, all ye that Labour and are heavy Laden, & I will give you rest; John vi. 37, And he that cometh to me I will no wise cast out. I desire to come hungering and thirsting after Christ, & to be putting my trust in him. I allso desire to forsake all sin, as it is a braaking of God's holy & iust law. I also desire the prayers of this Church to God for me, that so I may become a worthy communicant at the Lord's table. [signed] JONATHAN HODGES." In 1767 he was elected a warden of Norton, being "of good substance and of sober Life and conversation"

(as the law directed), with the duty of seeing "that the Sabbath was duly observed in all public houses and elsewhere, and to examine all persons suspected of unnecessary travelling on Sunday," etc. His badge of office was a "white wand, not less than seven Feet in length." No record of active service in the French wars by Jonathan Hodges has been found; yet it seems probable that he served. For he was Ensign of the First Norton company in 1756, and "Captain-Lieutenant" in 1762, and apparently full Captain not long after, being styled Captain in the town records.

ÅBIGAIL (SANFORD) HODGES, through her mother, was great-granddaughter of Mary (Andrews) (Hodges) Pitts, whose first husband was William<sup>1</sup> Hodges, the founder of the Bristol County branch.

Lydia<sup>5</sup> Godfrey married two men distinguished, the one for killing (so to speak), the other for curing. Her first husband, Jonathan Shaw, was a gallant soldier of the Revolution, who served as Captain in 1776, 1777 and 1778, and as Major in 1780, becoming Lieut.-Colonel after the War. Her second husband, Dr. George Wheaton, was an eminent physician, who had previously married a member of the Hodges family. [See No. 20.] In 1758 he served as surgeon's mate in the "Expedition for the total Reduction of Canada." He was prominent also in civil life, having been chosen selectman, assessor, representative, Justice of the Peace, etc.

George<sup>5</sup> Godfrey served 6 months in 1776 as private in Capt. Matthew Randall's company, which was stationed at Boston Harbor to ward off attacks by the British ships. Returning home, he at once re-enlisted under Capt. Ichabod Leonard and served in Rhode Island in the winter of 1776-7, and again, under Capt. Josiah King, in the autumn of 1777. In May, 1778, he enlisted for 9 months in the Continental Army and served in New York State, the descriptive lists of June showing him to be 19 years old, 5 ft. 11 inches in

height, with light complexion, dark hair and black eyes.

Rufus<sup>5</sup> Godfrey, at the age of 15, made his first appearance as a soldier (so far as the State Archives show) on Dec. 8, 1776, when called out to prevent the captured Highlanders from breaking out of Taunton jail. In 1778 he served two terms in Rhode Island. In 1780 he served 3 months in the Continental Army in New York State, and in 1781 he was again in Rhode Island. For his services in the Revolution, he received a pension.

George Morey, first husband of Mary<sup>4</sup> Hodges and son of Elizabeth4 (Hodges) Morey, received the commission of Ensign (according to the Morey Ms. Genealogy by Herbert E. Morey of Boston) from Gov. Shirley in 1746. If this is correct, then he must have served in the wonderful siege and capture of Louisburg, Cape Breton, the records of which campaign are so incomplete. He died at a compara-

tively early age.

Samuel Newcomb, second husband of Mary, moved in 1728 with his parents from Braintree to Norton, where he became an influential citizen. He was town treasurer in 1757 and selectman in 1773 and 1774. He served in the Old French War; and when the Revolution broke out, although nearly 50 years old, he seized his musket and marched with the Minute Men to Boston, and then served during 8 months of the same year in the American forces besieging that city.

Rev. George<sup>5</sup> Morey, born Dec. 18, 1750, graduated at Harvard in 1776. After completing his theological studies, he was ordained, on Nov. 19, 1783, a Congregational minister at Walpole, Mass., where his labors continued 42½ years. He then retired from the active duties of his office. During his entire ministry he was detained only once by sickness from the Sabbath services and then by a cold. His mind was strong, his talents were practical, and his judgment of men and things was excellent.

Sylvester<sup>5</sup> Newcomb was evidently a man of influence and good standing in Norton, being elected selectman and assessor for 6 successive years, from 1829 to 1834.

He was a farmer and owned an interest in the saw-mill built by his father. He was much respected and very influential. He was fre-

quently entrusted with the disposal of public lands and the arrangement of school matters, and was elected trustee of school funds. He was coroner for 35 or 36 years, assessor 8 years, selectman 10 years, and representative 2 years, being the first Norton representative under the State Constitution. He was town warden in 1790. He was prominent in the church, and in 1783 was elected one of the trustees of the Congregational Parish of Norton, and chosen agent to present to the legislature the petition for incorporation of the parish. Probably he served in the French Wars, but no record of such service is known. He took an active part in the Revolution, being Captain of the 2nd Co., 4th Bristol County reg't as early as 1776, perhaps earlier. On Jan'y 16, 1775, he was elected on the Norton Committee to provide for the faithful performance of the recommendations of the Continental Congress. As Captain, he is on record as having served from May to December, 1776, under Col. Ebenezer Francis at the Defence of Boston; in Dec. 1776 and Jan'y 1777 in Rhode Island; and, also in Rhode Island, in terms of about a month each, in the fall of 1777, in 1778 and in 1779. On June 10, 1779, he was commissioned Lieutenant-Colonel of the 4th Bristol County regiment, of which Isaac Dean was Colonel. His service with this regiment, whose records are very imperfect, has not been ascertained.

Beach Cutler resided in Pomfret, Killingly and Plainfield, Conn., then in Cumberland, R. I., and again in Plainfield, Conn. He finally moved to Plainfield, N. H., this township having been granted to him and fifty others on Aug. 14, 1761. He married 2nd, Lydia Knight,

and 3rd, Miss Hall.

BENJAMIN<sup>5</sup> CUTLER served in the Revolution. He probably served as private in Capt. Ezra Towne's Co., Col. James Reed's Reg't of N. H., from May 4,1775, to the end of the year, his name appearing in print as Cutter. Or perhaps he was the Benjamin Cutler who served in New York State under Capt. Abijah Smith and Col. Enoch Hale. He certainly was corporal under Capt. Russell and Col. Jonathan Chase, serving from May 7 to June 18, 1777, in the campaign in New York against Burgoyne. He moved with his parents to Plainfield, N. H., built a log house and accumulated a considerable sum of money which he lost through the burning of his house (occasioned by the careless-

ness of his housekeeper) during his temporary absence. Tradition says he henceforth kept his money in a hollow log known only to himself. He recovered from his loss and prospered. A marked trait of

his character was kindness to the poor.

WILLIAM<sup>5</sup> CUTLER served from April 10, 1776, to the end of the year in Capt. James Osgood's Co., Col. Timothy Bedell's N. H. regiment. He was sergeant, September and October 1777, in Col. Jonathan Chase's regiment under Gen. Gates, and in the Continental Army which defeated Gen. Burgoyne in New York State.

BENJAMIN<sup>5</sup> WILD probably served during the early years of the Revolution, but from some other than his native town, and so has not been identified in the records. In December 1776 and January 1777, he served in Rhode Island under Capt. Israel Trow, being sergeant, a rank which would never have been entrusted to one serving for the

first time. In August, 1780, he served again as sergeant in Rhode Island, with the same captain. In 1787 he was elected school trus-

tee of Norton, and in 1789 and 1790 was tithing-man.

RECORD FRANKLIN served in the French and Indian War, on the Crown Point Expedition, from May 12, 1759, to Jan'y 2, 1760, as private under Capt. Nathan Hodges. He was warden of Norton in 1769, assessor in 1771, 1772, and 1776, and on the Committee of Correspondence and Inspection in 1777. It is supposed that he moved away from Norton with the greater part of his family, possibly to Dorset, Vt., where his son Abel is known to have settled.

JONATHAN<sup>5</sup> FRANKLIN served as private, under Capt. Silas Cobb, at the Lexington Alarm of April 19, 1775, marching to Boston and remaining there the rest of the year, under the same Captain, in the American Army besieging that city. EPHRAIM4 Hodges must have been a man of solid worth, for he was made tithing-man of Norton in 1758, when only 28 years old; and tithing-men were elected "of the most prudent and discreet inhabitants," and given large powers for inspecting licensed inns, searching houses suspected of selling liquors without a license, and bringing before the magistrates "stubborne and disorderly children and servants, night-walkers, typlers, Saboath-breakers," and all persons whose conduct tended "to debauchery, irreligion, prophaness & atheisme." In 1767 he was assessor. He served in the French and Indian War, enlisting, in June 1758, as private in the force raised to invade Canada. He was sent to Castle Island, Boston Harbor, and thence to Maine, where he rose to the rank of sergeant in Capt. John North's company, and served until December, or later. In 1759 he served 33 weeks as sergeant in the company of Capt. Nathan Hodges. which went to New York State in the Crown Point Expedition. He was sick or wounded in this campaign, being in the hospital at Fort Edward from June 19 to July 15. He met his death on a whaling voyage. He and his son Benjamin were in a boat in pursuit of a whale, which, being harpooned, struck the boat. Ephraim was knocked overboard with others, and drowned in sight of his son.

Benjamin<sup>5</sup> Hodges led an adventurous life. He was only 15 when he went on the whaling voyage and saw his father drowned. He enlisted in the Revolutionary Army, and served in Rhode Island almost continuously from April 1777 to April 1778, first as private in Capt. Israel Trow's company, then as corporal in Capt. Silas Cobb's company, and lastly under Capt. Samuel Fales. In 1779 he served 3 months under Capt Joseph Richardson, in New York. Very likely he saw other service, the record of which has not been found. 1777 he bought land in Hardwick, Mass., went to reside there apparently in 1779, and sold his real estate there in 1780. Later, he went to Providence, R. I., and became a successful merchant. But he met with a disastrous reverse when he fitted out a vessel and went with it on a trading voyage to the West Indies. He sold his cargo at a good price and received his pay in specie. On the return voyage, when becalmed, the vessel was boarded by pirates, who seized the specie and everything else of value, and then went away, telling the captain and the owner that they were very fortunate in not being compelled to "walk the plank." During the last 15 years of his life, his health was broken and part of the time he was in the Dexter Asylum in Providence. He returned to Norton shortly before his death. Notwithstanding his checkered life and his misfortunes, he retained his cheerfulness, and his young relatives always were heartily welcomed and cheerily entertained by "Uncle Ben."

Samuel<sup>5</sup> Morey married his cousin, Mary<sup>5</sup> Hodges, when she was not quite 16 years old, and a month after their marriage he was appointed her guardian by the Probate Court. When in Sept. 1779, the town of Boston wrote to the town of Norton, asking for supplies of food which were sadly needed, he was elected on a committee "to collect sheep and grain for to carry to Boston, for the supply of sd. town of Boston." He was appointed Justice of the Peace, Jan'y 9, 1789.

Dr. Samuel Morey graduated at Yale in 1777, and soon after entered the Revolutionary Army as surgeon. After the war he practised medicine in Norton and became quite distinguished in the profession. He was a popular and influential citizen and was elected town treasurer 6 years and representative to the State legislature 2 years. He was a school trustee, and one of the original board of directors, in 1794, of the Norton Library. He was charter member of the Bristol Lodge of Freemasons, organized in Norton June 14, Anno Lucis 5797.

Daniel Morey was a Revolutionary soldier. He was at the siege of Boston, serving as private under Capt. Macey Williams, May to December, 1775. In 1777 he enlisted for 3 years, receiving £20 bounty, in Col. Crane's Artillery regiment, and was gunner in Capt. Cook's company. He served from April 1, 1777, to June 25, 1778, if not longer.

Their deaths are not recorded at Norton, nor the births of any children. Perhaps they went to New York State, as did many who had campaigned in that State.

NOAH WISWALL, senior, was assessor and town treasurer of Norton for several years, and was on the committee which divided the town into school districts in 1785. He was active at the time of the Revolution, marching to Boston, although nearly 48 years old, as sergeant of Capt. Seth Gilbert's Minute Men of April 1775. For a number of years, beginning in 1774, he was on the Norton Committee of Correspondence and Inspection, whose manifold duties included furnishing men and supplies to the American forces, caring for the sick soldiers, etc., etc. During the war he united with another member of the family [See No. 32] in an attempt to manufacture molasses out of the stalks of Indian corn, but the success was not great.

NOAH6 WISWALL, junior, was a Minute Man of '75 in the same company as his father. Having marched to Boston as Minute Man, he remained there until December, besieging the town, having at once

re-enlisted for 8 months under Capt. Silas Cobb.

Macey<sup>6</sup> Wiswall served a little over 3 months in 1780 in the troops raised to re-inforce the Continental Army.

EDMUND<sup>5</sup> Hodges had a long and honorable military service, and it is principally by the records of this service that his career has been traced. While still a youth, he went to Sutton, Worcester County, and at this place, when 15 years old, enlisted in Capt. Sylvester Richmond's Co., and served nearly 20 weeks (June 18 to Dec. 1) in 1760, during the French and Indian War. He married in Norton when not quite 20 years old, but probably was then a resident of Worcester County. When the news came of the battle of Lexington, he at once volunteered as a Minute Man under Capt. Simon Hazeltine, and marched to Boston, serving from April 19 to 29, 1775. On April 29 he re-enlisted as sergeant of Capt. Silas Cobb's Co., and served at the Siege of Boston; and when his company's term of 8 months expired, in December, he became sergeant of Capt. Barnabas Sear's Co., and continued at the Siege. When the British evacuated Boston, he went with the American army to New York, as Ensign and then Lieut. in Capt. Nathan Hamilton's Co., Col. Samuel Brewer's Reg't, and probably was in the battles of Long Island and around New York City, and at Trenton and Princeton. On March 18, 1777, he was commissioned Captain of the 6th Co., 4th Worcester County Reg't. In May, June and July, he served in Rhode Island under Col. Josiah Whitney. In July and August, he was in Col. Job Cushing's Reg't, which went to Bennington, Vt., and he probably fought in the battle of Bennington on Aug. 15. Thus, as shown by the rolls, he performed almost continuous military service from April 19, 1775 to Aug. 29, 1777. In the latter part of 1777 or the beginning of 1778, he moved to Barnard, Vt., and on the organization of the town, April 7. 1778, he was elected assessor, and this year (according to the History of Hardwick, p. 399) he was in the legislature of Vermont. He was a member of the legislature in 1779, was one of the 18 persons nominated by a legislative committee for members of a Board of War (but was not one of the 9 elected), and was appointed by the Council a member of the Committee to Report on the Town of Royalton. In 1780 he moved from Barnard to the adjoining town of Pomfret. In Oct. 1780, he had command of a company which served

14 days at Fort Fortitude, Bethel, Vt. He was quite prominent in Pomfret, was selectman in 1782 and was elected to various town offices from 1780 to 1785. He sold land there in 1787. After this date he disappears from the town records, which contain no mention of his 2nd marriage or of his death. But these records are defective. There is no mention of him in the Probate Records at Woodstock, so that possibly he moved from this neighborhood. His widow (according to family records) died in Woodstock, July 26, 1814. How many children he had is not definitely known. Only one, Margaret, has been positively identified by family records. But he lived in towns where the records were kept imperfectly, and there are indications that he had other children, as suggested above.

GEN. SILAS COBB was one of the most prominent men ever resident in Norton. He was Captain of a company of Minute Men, who marched to Boston at the Lexington Alarm, commanded a company during the Siege of Boston in 1775 and 1776, and perhaps (the records are not definite) served in the subsequent "Defence of Boston." In 1777 he served at least 6 months in Rhode Island. He was commissioned Major in 1780, Colonel in 1788 and Brigadier-General in 1792. After all his fighting in the Revolution, he voted, at a town meeting called to consider the subject, against the continuance of the

War of 1812. He held many town offices, being on the Committee of Correspondence and Inspection 2 years, selectman 1 year, town treasurer 2 years, warden 3 years, town clerk 6 years, and assessor 7 years. He was a Justice of the Peace. He was an earnest advocate of public schools, held the positions of school agent and school trustee 6 years, and was a founder and original director of the first Norton Library, organized in 1794. As illustrative of the customs and ideas of his time, it may be mentioned that he held an inn-keeper's license for 30 years, and was for a long time pound-keeper.

SILAS<sup>6</sup> COBB studied law and opened an office in Rehoboth, but soon removed to Swansea, where he spent most of his subsequent life.

DR. ADAM JOHNSTONE, a Scotchman by birth, came to Norton about 1772, and practised medicine there. He is said to have served as surgeon during the Revolution. He kept a public house in Norton from 1780 to 1787 and then seems to have gone to Pelham. Mass., and resided there for a time. From there he went to Danby, Vt.

TISDALE<sup>5</sup> HODGES served in the Revolution, marching to Boston on the news of the battle of Lexington as private in Capt. Silas Cobb's company. In 1780 he served a short term in Rhode Island as private in Capt. Israel Trow's company. He may have done other service, but no record of such has been found. He continued in the militia after the war, rising through the various grades to the captaincy of a troop of cavalry, which he received Dec. 17, 1793. He was a man of advanced and liberal ideas and owned considerable property. He sent several of his sons to college. He was warden of Norton in 1782, and selectman in 1794, 1795, 1796, 1797, 1799 and 1800. In 1804 he bought a farm of 190 acres in Petersham and soon after moved to that town, where he passed the rest of his life.

DR. TISDALE<sup>6</sup> HODGES, when a boy, had his leg so badly cut with a scythe that he ever afterwards was lame. He was graduated as the Brown University in 1804, studied medicine, and practised a short time in Bristol, R. I., where he was successful and popular. In July, 1806, he left Bristol on the brig Jay, with the intention of transferring to the ship Semiramis, which he expected to meet on the coast of Africa. A Bristol newspaper, in a flattering notice of his career, states that he died "at the Galinas, Africa," doubtless island of Gallina, or Gallinhas, one of the Bissagos group, on the west coast

of Africa.

John<sup>5</sup> Hodges served in the Eight Months' Service, at the Siege of Boston, in 1775, as private in Capt. Silas Cobb's company. In 1777 he served about a month under Capt. Isaac Hodges in the Secret Expedition to Rhode Island. In August, 1780, he was again in Rhode Island, as corporal of Capt. Seth Smith's company. He evi-

dently continued in the militia, as in 1802 "Lieutenant" John Hodges was a selectman of Norton, but he could have held the civil position only a short time, as he died in the spring of this year. He seems to have been actively interested in school matters. As soon after the Revolution as the finances became somewhat settled, he headed a movement for the building of school-houses, and carried a vote to this effect in the town meeting of Dec. 30, 1789; but this vote was reconsidered the next month, and for several years nothing was done.

Daniel<sup>5</sup> Hodges, at the age of 14, was fifer in Capt. Silas Cobb's company, and served from July 29, 1777, to Jan'y 2, 1778, in Rhode Island. In the fall of 1779 he served about a month, also in Rhode Island, under Captain Enoch Robinson. In July, 1780, he enlisted for six months in the Continental Army and served in New York and New Jersey. From the descriptive lists it is known that he was then 17 years old, 5 feet 5 inches in height, and of dark complexion. Again in March, 1781, he served a short term in Rhode Island. After the war he went apparently to Rehoboth, where he married, and certainly to Hardwick, Mass., where he died.

JONATHAN<sup>5</sup> HODGES, sergeant of Capt. Silas Cobb's company, went to Boston on April 29, 1775, and served for 8 months at the siege of that city. In December 1777, and Jan'y 1778, he served as sergeant in Rhode Island under Capt. Isaac Hodges, and again in Rhode Island in August and September 1779 as sergeant under Capt. Samuel White.

When the call for help came from Tiverton, R. I., in August 1780, he did not insist upon his rank as sergeant, but voluntered as private and served a short term under Capt. Israel Trow. About 1781 or 1782 he moved with his family to Saratoga County, New York, going first to Ballston; thence, after two years, to Greenfield; and finally to Corinth, where he made a home in the forest wilderness and lived for the rest of his days.

JONATHAN<sup>6</sup> HODGES, when very young, studied medicine and was in a hospital in Albany, when he caught the small-pox of which he died.

CLAUDIUS<sup>6</sup> Hodges lived in Corinth on the family homestead with his bachelor brother, Leonard, and his married sister, Deborah. For more than fifty years he was a prominent member of the Methodist church. In politics he was a Whig and then a Republican, and during the war contributed liberally to the Union cause. He was an entertaining talker, and when he was old, the young people were wont to visit him and listen to his stories of pioneer life and adventures, and of the changes in the place which he, as an early settler, had helped to clear of the forests originally covering the region.

Deborah<sup>5</sup> Hodges was a woman of strong common sense and practical ability, managing her household well and economically, and greatly admired and respected by those who knew her well, especially by those of her own sex. She is said to have left considerable property at her death. When her second husband came to Norton, a poor man but an able physician, she aided him in many ways, buying for him the first horse and saddle which he owned in America. Her only child, a son by her second husband, one day followed his father to the small-pox hospital in Franklin, and caught this disease which proved fatal. [Mrs. D. A. L. (Davis) Clothier.]

JOHN ALLEN, first husband of Deborah, is thought to have been the John Allen of Norton who saw much service in the Revolution, beginning, in April, 1775, as 2nd Lieutenant of Capt. Silas Cobb's

company of Minute Men, and rising to the rank of Captain.

Dr. Lewis Leprilete was a noteworthy man. He had many peculiarities, but was a very able physician, standing high in the opinion of his fellow-practitioners. His name was borne by quite a number of the sons of his medical pupils, who were numerous. One of these sons, Dr. Lewis Leprilete Miller of Providence, R. I., is said to have possessed a very good portrait of his father's teacher. Dr. Leprilete came to Norton about the end of the Revolution, and remained there until about 1792, when he removed to Jamaica Plain, now a part of Boston. After two or three years he

returned to France, and was absent about seven years. During this absence, he was compelled to serve in the French Army. He was reticent of his personal history and not many details of his life are known. He always refused to speak of Napoleon. On his return to the United States, he located at Franklin, Mass., and there remained until his death. He was buried at Jamaica Plain, and over his grave the Mass. Medical Society (or members therof) placed a stone with an inscription reciting that he was "very celebrated in surgery." He had given his body to Dr. Warren of Boston for anatomical purposes, and it was removed from the grave after the funeral services.

DAVID HODGES had a long Revolutionary record. When the news came of the battle of Lexington, he marched to Boston, a private in Capt. Silas Cobb's company, and remained under the same Captain until the end of the year, besieging Boston. He then, in December 1775, enlisted for one year in Capt. Thomas Pierce's company of Col. Knox's artillery, staid at Boston until it was evacuated by the British, and then served in New York. In May 1778, he re-enlisted for 9 months in the Continental Army and served again in New York State. The descriptive list of May 21, 1778, gives the following details:— Age, 26 years; height, 5 ft. 8 in.; complexion, dark; hair, black; eyes, dark. In 1779 he was living in Lyman, N. H., his name being signed to petitions that year for abatement of taxes of inhabitants of that town. After his marriage he returned to Norton, of which town he was a tithing-man in 1805. His widow received a pension on account of his Revolutionary services, and not long after his death moved with her family to Corinth, N. Y.

Mary<sup>5</sup> Hodges was a woman of great industry and energy. Very pious, she and her husband belonged to the Baptist denomination. As in her day there was no Baptist meeting-house in the vicinity, the society assembled for worship at the houses of the members. I well remember the meetings at the Porter house. It was a pleasant time for the followers of John. The great iron pot was suspended on the crane, and the most appetizing odors from beets, carrots, turnips, cabbage and the Indian pudding in a bag, fell like a benediction on the worshippers in the "best" or "square" room. And while the pot was boiling, a neighbor would be baking "short-cakes," made of wheat flour "wet-up" with butter and cream. Mary had great ability as a speaker and leader at the meetings, but her feet ever abided in her own house. For twenty years, on account of asthma, she was unable to lie down, and took all her sleep in a chair; yet her industry continued, spinning and weaving the garments worn by her family, as was the custom of those days. Articles she thus made, I still keep. They are homely and colored with age; but I would like to know the thoughts woven into them. [Mrs. Jane F. Porter.]

JUDGE JOHN<sup>6</sup> PORTER, at the age of 18, taught school near Hartford, Vt. Then he taught in Rodman, N. Y., and on two occasions made the entire journey (300 miles) there and back on foot. From 1840 to 1849 he represented Hartford in the State legislature, except two years when he was a State senator. In 1850 he was made Probate Judge of Hartford judicial district, holding the position until his death. On the organization of the Republican party in 1856, he was a director of the Woodstock Bank. From the time he took the freeman's oath until his death, he occupied some important public office and discharged every duty with ability, winning an enviable reputation throughout the State. His widow, JANE FRANCES (FOSTER) PORTER, at the age of 83 years, still preserved her good health and her mental quickness and ability, retaining a strong interest in a wide range of subjects, and maintaining the dignity and respect of the family.

Seth<sup>5</sup> Hodges came with his father to Pomfret, Vt., in October, 1780. When the Indians attacked and burned Royalton this month, he enlisted in Lieut, Bartholomew Durkee's company, which went in pursuit of the marauders who were retreating towards Canada with a number of prisoners and much plunder. An account of this event states that the pursuers came up with the Indians on the second day, but after the exchange of a few shots the commanding officer of the Colonists discontinued the attack and allowed the Indians to retreat without further molestation, against the protest of many of his soldiers. In March, 1781, Seth Hodges served in a similar manner under Capt. John Throop. Soon after he enlisted in Capt. John Benjamin's company and served until the end of November, apparently nine months. For his Revolutionary service, he received a pension of about \$100 per year, which was continued to his widow.

Dr. Silas Hodges practised medicine for a number of years at Woodstock, Conn., and afterwards at Dunbarton, N. H., where he was living when the Revolution began. He served as surgeon in the Continental Army and was for some time in personal attendance on Gen. Washington, who entrusted him with important commissions and admitted him to a friendly social relationship. His granddaughter, Mrs. Emma F. Gillette, remembers accounts of his attending the receptions of Lady Washington, and how at times, as her partner, he led the minuet. The sleeve buttons and a shirt stud worn by him while surgeon on Washington's staff, were presented to the Antiquarian Museum at Rutland, Vt. He seems to have had a semi-official connection with some of the New England State governments, and his name occurs frequently in the Resolves of the General Court of Massachusetts and in other public documents. After the war he practised medicine at Concord, Mass. About 1784 he moved to Clarendon, Vt., where he purchased land in the intervale of Otter Creek, and resided until his death in a house which stood west of the junction of the Middleton road with the road from Manchester to Rutland. He likewise bought numerous tracts of land in what were later Addison, Chittenden, and Franklin counties. The care of these estates and a mercantile business in which he had embarked, rendered it necessary for him to relinquish his medical practice. He was an able business man, and a shrewd financier of foresight and prudence. He was very hospitable and fond of entertaining guests at his home. He occupied a conspicuous position in society and had a wide circle of acquaintances extending beyond the bounds of the State. It was his custom on Thanksgiving Day to provide a bountiful repast at his house for his tenants and their families. He was an ardent Federalist and devoted adherent of President Washington, and like the leaders of his party, was charged by his opponents with tendencies towards a monarchy. He often went to Boston, probably during the sessions of the legislature, and was there when attacked by his last illness, but was carried to his home in Clarendon, where he died. His widow, soon after his death, built the house near the bridge across Otter Creek, which was inhabited by her children and grandchildren.

Dr. Elkanah<sup>5</sup> Hodges settled in Torrington about 1772 and immediately commenced the practice of medicine, which he continued for 25 years with great success. Possessing medical ability combined with unusual business energy and talent, as well as great tact, he not only inspired confidence as a physician, but also commanded respect for his judgment in business matters. In 1776 he bought a house and farm on Brandy Hill and started a store which became the center of trade for the western part of the town. He extended his business, entered into and directed many other enterprises with uniform success, and became a large land-owner and one of the wealthiest men of the town. From the fact that he received the same payment as was made to other men for military service, it appears probable that he served during the Revolution in the militia when they were called out on several occasions. In December, 1778, he was on the town committee to procure clothing for the soldiers. He was selectman in 1786, 1787, 1791, 1792 and 1793, represented Torrington in the State legislature in 1792, and held other important positions. He likewise was influential in church matters.

Zephaniah Hodges apparently was accused of being a loyalist at one time during the Revolution, for he was the only one of the name known at Mansfield when, in June, 1777, it was voted to try "Zephaniah Hogges" by a special court as "a person Dangerous to our cause." The town records contain no account of the trial itself; so either the accusation was not pushed, or he was acquitted. Probably the charge was unfounded, as in July and August, 1780, he served in Rhode Island as a Revolutionary soldier in the companies of Capt. John Allen and of Capt. Seth Smith. After the war he moved to Boston and did business as a miller. His widow was appointed administratrix of his estate, June 9, 1795; and on Aug. 9, 1796, she was made guardian of her son Charles, no mention being made of her son Leonard who, therefore, probably had died.

Charles Hodges was a mariner, as is learned from the Suffolk County Probate Records, which show that on Feb. 22, 1808, his mother, again a widow, was appointed to administer on his estate.

EMERSON<sup>5</sup> Hodges was living in Westmoreland, N. H., in 1789 and for an unknown length of time before this year. On March 24, 1789, he bought land in Londonderry, Vt., and probably moved to that place soon after. He seems to have been quite prominent there, and was elected constable, collector and pound-keeper in 1797, and selectman in 1801. On Jan'y 19, 1808, he had recorded on the town records the births of the 5 children above, "all born in Londonderry." The record is signed by Emerson Hodges and Suse Hodges, his wife, and attested by the town clerk. This is the latest date on which his name appears in the town records of Londonderry. Very likely he moved then to New York State, where his daughter Polly and son James are known to have resided.

Major Joseph Shepard (who married Abigail Hodges) lived in the part of Wrentham which became Foxboro, and was a prominent citizen. He served in the Revolution, but the full extent of his service is unascertained. The State Archives show that he was one of the Wrentham Minute Men who marched to Boston at the Lexington Alarm, and that, as corporal of Capt. Samuel Fisher's company from Wrentham, he served in Rhode Island in December, 1776. A granddaughter now living [1894], who often talked with him about Revolutionary days, says that he was at the Battle of Bunker Hill. He doubtless served, at various periods, as sergeant and Second Lieutenant, since, on July 1, 1781, he was commissioned First Lieutenant, and held this rank at the end of the war. He was commissioned Captain of the 4th Reg't, 1st Division, June 19, 1788, and Major of the 2nd Reg't, 2nd Brigade, 2nd Division, Oct. 9, 1797, serving doubtless until the election of his successor on Dec. 8, 1800.

ELIJAH<sup>5</sup> Hodges was born in that part of Norton which was set off as Mansfield in 1770. He was living in Mansfield when the battle of Lexington was fought, and went out with the Minute Men of the 7th Mansfield company in Col. John Daggett's regiment. Not long after, he moved to Norton, being a resident of this town when he served in Rhode Island in July and August 1778, under Capt. Isaac Hodges, and again in August 1780, under Capt. Israel Trow. On March 28, 1785, he was appointed on the committee to divide Norton into school districts. In 1786 he bought land in Foxboro and settled there for a couple of years at least.

Zebulon<sup>5</sup> Hodges did duty as a Revolutionary soldier at least 5 times in Rhode Island. In December, 1776, he served under Capt. Joseph Lovell; in April and May, 1777, under Capt. Israel Trow; in September and October, 1777, under Capt. Israel Hodges; enlisting in January, 1778, he served 3 months under Capt. Israel Trow; and 54 days more under the same captain, beginning in May, 1778. After the war was over, he moved to Westmoreland, N. H., and there married and settled. He was a very handsome man, of large and commanding figure, and endowed with considerable pride. He was brought up, it was said, as a gentleman, and a gentleman he remained to the end of his life. He possessed much inventive ability and eleverness, and as his second marriage brought him many houses and lands, he was enabled to live in quite a princely way. All his children inherited ingenuity and pride to a notable degree. [Mrs. Ella E. Abbott.]

ELIZABETH Howe was the favorite child of Samuel Howe, an original proprietor of Westmoreland, and a very wealthy man according to the standard of his times. He owned a very large amount of real estate and gave to each of his children, when married, a well-stocked farm. His fondness for Elizabeth, fully shared by his wife, was said to have caused him to give this daughter the lion's share of his property. He was a soldier in the Revolution and took part in the battle of Bunker Hill, on which occasion, history tells us, he lost a portion of his clothing. [Mrs. Ella E.

He was a farmer and not without

influence in town and church affairs.

ELIJAH<sup>6</sup> Hodges, like his father, rose to be Captain of a Mansfield militia company. He served an apprenticeship as clerk, and then began business on his own account in West Mansfield, near Balcom's Corner, where he conducted a successful trade until 1834. He then built a house near the center of the town and engaged in the manufacture of straw bonnets for many years. The latter part of his active life was spent on his farm, which he thoroughly enjoyed. He was always interested and active in public affairs. He was a leading member of the Unitarian Society, represented his town in the State legislature in 1843 and 1848, was selectman, Justice of the Peace for many years, and deputy sheriff. Earnest and outspoken, with an active mind, quick sympathies and generous impulses, he was widely known, highly respected and influential in the business, social and political circles of his town.

Samuel<sup>5</sup> Hodges was the second postmaster of Taunton, being appointed July 1, 1803, and serving until the next year, when he was succeeded by his brother, and he, in turn, by his sons, the family holding this position for 26 consecutive years. Samuel moved, probably about 1804, to Easton, Mass., where he owned real estate, ran a grist-mill, and for many years kept a noted inn on the Bay Road at what was afterwards known as the Shepard Place. He held the rank of Captain of the militia and was commonly spoken of as Captain Samuel Hodges. He took great interest in political matters, and being of sturdy character and strong convictions, was widely known and universally respected. He died in Easton and was buried in the old Bay Road cemetery, but his body was afterwards removed to Stoughton.

WILLIAM<sup>5</sup> Hodges was born, lived and died on the east corner of Tremont and Granite streets, Taunton, in the house built by his grandfather on the site of the original house built by John<sup>2</sup> Hodges. He was a man of good business and social position, and was one of the founders and first directors of the old Cohannet Bank. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity and adhered firmly to this order during the years of strong opposition arising from the Morgan episode.

WILLIAM CHANDLER<sup>6</sup> Hodges lived a quiet life, devoting his time to private business rather than to public affairs. When the Civil War broke out, he came forward as an active supporter of the Union and, as is recorded, subscribed liberally for the support of the soldiers and

their families.

HENRY BLATCHFORD WHEELWRIGHT, who married Abbie Stearns<sup>6</sup> Hodges, was a man of marked individuality and ability. He graduated at Harvard in 1844, and after teaching two years entered the Harvard Medical School. He did not complete his medical studies, but returned to the vocation of teaching for which he had special aptitude. He came to Taunton to take the position of Principal of the Bristol Academy, and his services there as teacher raised the fortunes of the school to their highest mark. He awoke enthusiasm among the boys for college life and inspired them with a love of study. He was a thorough disciplinarian as well as teacher and his methods were most successful. After he retired from the Academy, he maintained for a number of years a private school. He took much interest in the matter of charities, was for several years Commissioner of Alien Passengers and Foreign Paupers, and afterwards General Agent of the Board of State Charities, which office he resigned on account of ill health. He was an overseer of Harvard College from 1855 to 1867.

NATHAN<sup>5</sup> Hodges was a sea-faring man and a wanderer. About the time of his marriage he was in Lyman, N. H., where he owned land in 1777. GALEN<sup>5</sup> Hodges passed his early years on his father's farm in Norton. He moved to Providence, and in 1809 engaged in business under the firm name of Hodges & Burr. The firm kept a large variety store and for a number of years were very successful, but became embarrassed through Mr. Burr's endorsement of his friends' notes. Galen Hodges was of a kind and genial nature, but so sensitive about the unfortunate turn of his business affairs as to be despondent at times. DIMMEY KING (ANDREWS) Hodges was named Damaris King, after a friend of the family, but always wrote her first name Dimmey. Her father enlisted at the age of 15 as a soldier in the Revolutionary Army, and served until the end of the war. He was in many battles, and the regret of his life was that he missed the fight at Bunker Hill, being detailed upon an expedition before the fight, and getting back just too late to take an active part. Thomas Hodges lived in the Willis neighborhood in the west part of Taunton, on what is now Worcester Street, near Oakland village. He and his brother John (who never married) inherited the homestead here of their uncle, Seth Hodges. He was one of the signers, May 1, 1776, at Taunton, of the Solemn League and Covenant to aid the United Colonies against the fleets and armies of Great Britain. He gave active aid to his countrymen by serving as private soldier at least four times in Rhode Island:—in December 1776 and January 1777 under Capt. Ichabod Leonard; in September and October 1777 under Capt. Josiah King; in July and August 1778, and in August 1780, under Capt. Ichabod Leonard. He was a man of stern and unflinching integrity, kind and benevolent to the unfortunate, having always in his house a room where he could keep the poor wayfarer over night, and ready with council and assistance for those in need. He was strict in his observance of the Sabbath, allowing no work, except that absolutely necessary, to be done by his family between the sunsets of Saturday and of Sunday. He was a farmer and raised large quantities of corn, rye, flax and hay. He always had one year's corn ahead. In 1816 the terrible frosts caused great losses among the farmers, and in the winter the price of corn rose to two dollars a bushel. He refused to take more than one dollar for his, of which he had a large supply, and to prevent speculation, sold only half a bushel to any one man at one time. When that was actually consumed for food the purchaser was allowed. another half bushel. [Mrs. Wm. V. Hodges.]

Leonard Hodges went with his mother to Newport, R. I., when she married her second husband, and remained there until he was about 14 years old, attending the school of Master Goddard of whom he spoke always as an excellent teacher. He then lived with his brother Rufus on the Norton homestead at Crooked Meadow. He served an apprenticeship in the trade of carpenter and wheelwright with Ichabod Perry of Norton. When 21 years old he went to Williamstown, Mass., and there followed his trade a few years. About the time of his marriage he returned to Norton and settled on the old homestead, carrying on the business of contractor and builder in connection with farming, until shortly before his death. Many memorials of his handiwork exist in Norton and vicinity. He built the Norton Academy, Free Masons' Hall (subsequently converted into a dwelling house), the Major White homestead (in 1810), the Talbot factory (recently burned), and many other buildings. In politics he was a staunch Democrat of the old school; in theology he was a firm Methodist; in daily life he was modest, energetic and scrupulously honest. [Mrs. Lydia T. Caswell.]

Rufus<sup>6</sup> Hodges graduated at Brown University in 1823, teaching school in Norton at intervals during his college course. Almon D6. Hodges, compiler of the second edition of this genealogy, was one of his Norton pupils and bore testimony to the excellence of his teaching. After graduation he moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, where he became distinguished as a lawyer. He was the author of the origi-

nal Record of the Families in New England of the Name of Hodges, published in 1837, a second, enlarged edition of which was published in 1853, this work being the third edition. He was a man of talent and was much beloved by his friends and acquaintances. To his many fine qualities and moral worth, the author of the History of Norton has borne testimony.

ZEPHANIAH<sup>5</sup> Hodges lived in Taunton on the homestead of his father. He possessed much character and influence and bore the title of Captain. He was one of those who pledged themselves to aid the cause of the Colonists and resist the British forces, by signing the Solemn League and Covenant of May 1, 1776. He also did active service in the cause, the full extent of which is not known; but the Mass. State Archives contain the records of two terms of service,—in December 1776 and January 1777, and in July and August 1778,—both in Rhode Island, and both in Capt. Ichabod Leonard's company, of which he was a sergeant.

He was a man of untiring industry and it is thought that he injured his health by excessive toil, for in his last years he became a victim of melancholy, and ceased to be interested in the activities which had been so engrossing in his earlier life. Henry's Hodges lived in Taunton in the house next east of his father's, but on the opposite side of the road. CAPT. JOSEPH<sup>5</sup> HODGES lived in Norton on the place where his father lived, from whom he inherited considerable real estate and also the silver-hilted sword of his grandfather, Major Joseph<sup>3</sup> Hodges. He had a long record as a Revolutionary soldier. As private he marched to Boston, April 19, 1775, in Capt. Silas Cobb's company of Minute Men. In June and July, 1775, as sergeant of Capt. Samuel Robinson's company, he served in Rhode Island. In August and September, 1778, he was again in Rhode Island, sergeant under Capt. Josiah Keith. On July 31, 1779, he was commissioned First Lieutenant of the 2nd Co. of the 4th Bristol County reg't, and served in August and September in Rhode Island, and also in August, 1780. On July 1, 1781, he was commissioned Captain of one of the Norton companies. In October, 1786, he marched his company to Taunton and confronted the insurgents of Shays' Rebellion, but fortunately there was no fighting. He was a public-spirited man and influential in church and town affairs. He was one of those who, in April, 1793,

made up a purse for the object of obtaining the services of Rev. Pitt Clarke as pastor of the Norton Church. On Oct. 6, 1783, he was elected a member of the committee chosen "to divide the school ground" at the first town meeting after the war, when steps were taken to establish a school-system, was on a similar committee in 1789, and in 1801 built the first school-house erected in school-district No. 4, which cost \$190.

JOSEPH<sup>5</sup> HODGES, when young, moved to Taunton and was a member of the Episcopal Church there in 1787. In 1786 he aided in suppressing the Shay's Rebellion. In 1795 he was a resident of Sutton, Mass., but in this year he sold his house and land there, and returned to Norton. About 1804 or 1805 he moved to Barre, Mass., where he

owned a large farm.

SILENCE (WHITE) Hodges was daughter of Hon. Abraham White of Norton, who is said to have descended from Peregrine White, the first English child born at Plymouth. Abraham White was a somewhat eccentric man and could not read or write, but was possessed of much native talent, practical good sense, and sound judgment. He was much employed in public life, where energy and decision of character were needed. Numerous anecdotes are related of him, all of which illustrate his ready wit, keen satire and ability to meet any emergency which arose.

BETHIAH<sup>5</sup> (Hodges) Freeman was noted for her domestic ability, her hospitality and her kindly disposition, which made her a great favorite, especially with the children who were fond of visiting her, and were sure of finding something good reserved for them. Long and pleasantly was she remembered, as evidenced by the following

testimony penned a quarter of a century after her death:

"We [children] looked forward to this day [of the Regimental Review at Norton]—the most interesting holiday of the year—with a great deal of pleasure. At these trainings there was a collection of tents where gingerbread, cookies, liquors and various kinds of faney articles were sold; and exhibitions of different kinds were to be seen. We were accustomed to start early in the morning, and, after tramping around the camp-ground until we were tired, to go to Aunt Freeman's, near the Common, to rest. Her son Sanforth was Captain of one of the militia companies, and after his company had dined at Aunt Freeman's, we boys would have an invitation to sit down to what was left; and if it fell short, Aunt Freeman would make it up with her good doughnuts. It was at her house that I saw the first exhibition of skill in balancing. A man walked backward and forward from one end of a large room to the other on a slack wire,—a great feat in our opinion; and it cost only 6½ cents to see this wonderful performance." [Journal of A. D<sup>6</sup>. H.]

NATHANIEL FREEMAN, husband of Bethiah, is supposed to have been the "Nathan Freeman" of Hardwick, Mass., who served in 1777 as private under Capt. Edmund Hodges, 2 months in Rhode Island and a little over a month in Vermont. He must have served in the earlier years of the Revolution, as in July and August, 1778, he was sergeant under Capt. Isaac Hodges in the Rhode Island campaign. On his gravestone he is entitled Ensign. He was a man of considerable influence in Norton, and was warden in 1785. And he was one of the few Christians in 1789 who felt able to pay money for pew-

ground in the Norton meeting-house, on which they were allowed to build their pews.

JOSIAH COBB settled in Orange, Mass., not long after the town was organized, which occurred in 1783. He became one of the prominent and influential citizens of the place, was its first representative in the State legislature and was selectman 1805, 1807, 1808, 1809 and 1813. He was a Justice of the Peace and was often consulted on legal questions.

THOMAS<sup>6</sup> COBB lived in Orange, where he was popular and influential. He had a store at the Center and did a good business. He was selectman in 1810, 1811 and 1822, and was representative at least one term. He was appointed, in 1823, the first postmaster at Miller's Bridge which afterwards was called South Orange and now Orange Center. It was not a very lucrative office in the beginning. The

office receipts for the first quarter were 31 cents, and his commissions amounted to 8 cents.

George<sup>5</sup> Hodges lived in Norton on a farm inherited from his father and adjoining the residence of his brother Jonathan. He was a farmer and also a "clothier," and, about 1810, built a fulling-mill on Wading River, a short distance below Barrowsville. The owners of the factory complaining that the water of his mill-pond flowed back upon their water-wheel, he took down his dam, and moved his mill to the little stream near his house (where Samuel H. Lane lived in 1859), and here carried on business until his death. He took an active part in the Revolution, serving at least 7 months in 1776 as private in Capt. Zebedee Redding's company and Col. Josiah Whitney's regiment. In 1777 and in 1778 he served in Rhode Island under Capt. Isaae Hodges, and again in the same State in 1780 under Capt. Israel Trow. After the war he took much interest in the schools of

Norton, was elected a school-trustee in 1786, and, in 1801, built the first school-house erected in School-District No. 3.

JONATHAN<sup>5</sup> Hodges, when only 16 years old, entered the Revolutionary Army and served in Rhode Island as private of Capt. Enoch Robinson's company in August and September, 1779. The next year, in July, he volunteered for six months' service in the Continental Army and was sent to New York State, being (according to the descriptive roll) 17 years of age, 5 feet 10 inches high, and of ruddy complexion. He was in the company of Capt. Hayward of Bridgewater, Mass., and was stationed at West Point at the time of the treachery of Benedict Arnold. In 1781 he served a short term in Rhode Island under Capt. Josiah Keith. After the war ended he followed the occupations of his father, being farmer and clothier. He inherited from his father the homestead farm and the fulling-mill, and lived on Goose Brook at the place occupied in 1859 by George H. Arnold. He was energetic and industrious. Often, when there was sufficient water, he ran his mill at night, the mill being near his house. His ear was so trained to the sound of the hammers falling on the cloth that, having started the machinery, he could go to sleep, to be awakened by the difference in the sound when the cloth was finished and needed to be changed. He continued the business of fulling and finishing until his death. He was patriotic and public-spirited, an earnest church member, and an honest and respected citizen. He was a strong believer in the utility of maintaining a citizen-soldiery, continued in the militia after the war, and rose to the rank of Captain, commanding the Norton company on the west side of Rumford River from 1798 to 1801. After his resignation he encouraged and helped the militia organizations of his town. He was assessor from 1799 to 1801. It may be worth mentioning that the Norton town tax in 1799 amounted to 264 dollars 15 cents and 2 mills. He was selectman from 1803 to 1806. His neighbors would fain have given him other offices, but he declined, serving only from a sense of duty and not from ambition.

SARAH (DANFORTH) Hodges was great-grandchild of Rev. Samuel Danforth of Taunton, of whom mention has been made under No. 17.

She was an able, conscientious, God-fearing woman, who strove earnestly to train her children aright and to perform the duties devolving upon her as wife, widow and neighbor. Hers was an earnest and independent character, and she taught her children, the oldest of whom was twenty years of age when the father died, to be industrious, economical, self-reliant, cheerful, honest and religious.

SUSANNAH<sup>6</sup> Hodges, commonly called Susan, was a type of the bright, active and energetic New England woman, capable of performing well the household duties, and entertaining her social circle by her shrewd and witty remarks. She lived with her brother Jonathan in Taunton until his death, and then spent the remainder

of her days in her native town.

JONATHAN<sup>6</sup> Hodges was quite a mechanical genius and a number of his inventions, applied to locomotives, came into general use. He found a ready market at the Taunton Locomotive Works for all such improvements, and for this reason, and by cause of his easy-going nature, did not achieve so much of a reputation as would have been the case with a more ambitions and pushing man. He was a pleasant, kind-hearted, genial companion, possessed decided musical ability, belonged to the Old Taunton Band, in which he played the clarinet, and was member of a double quartette of vocalists which was quite famous in Taunton in his day.

JESSE<sup>5</sup> Hodges served at least three times in the Revolution, each of these three times in Rhode Island. In December, 1776, and January, 1777, he was private under his father, Capt. ISAAC<sup>5</sup> Hodges was a Revolutionary soldier. His full military record has not been obtained, but there is documentary evidence in the Mass. Archives that, in April 1775, he was a Minute Man under Capt. Benjamin Morey; that in 1779 he served 31 months in Rhode Island as private in Capt. Joseph Franklin's company; and that in July and August, 1780, he served again in Rhode Island, being sergeant, first under Capt. John Allen and then under Capt. Seth Smith. He was one of the most influential men in Norton, prominent in the church, and chosen repeatedly to town office. He was assessor 10 years, selectman 16 years, moderator of the annual town meetings 3 years, and representative 4 years. He was member of the State Constitutional Convention in 1779 and 1780, was Justice of the Peace, and held the office of coroner for 32 years. He was appointed on many town-committees, and was frequently entrusted with the administration of the estates of his neighbors. He possessed a strong, well-balanced mind, a fine presence and a vigorous frame, and retained the respect and esteem of his fellow-townsmen to the end of his long life.

Bradford<sup>6</sup> Hodges went, while quite young, to Providence. He was a house-painter in his early days; later, he was connected with a bank. He was prominent in military circles and became Colonel of the United Company of the Train of Artillery in the Town of Providence as early (at least) as 1824, in August of which year he took part in the reception at Providence of General Lafayette, his command firing salutes from Prospect Hill. At the time of the Dorr Rebellion in Rhode Island, in 1842, the United Train of Artillery was reorganized and, under the command of Col. Hodges, aided in suppressing the insurrection. Bradford Hodges is described as a gentleman of the Old School, hospitable, exact in his dealings, a kind neighbor and a warm friend. Working hard in his youth, he acquired a competence which rendered his later circumstances easy and comfortable. He was very domestic in his tastes, happy in his disposition and exceedingly fond of music. [Mrs. J. G. H. Burstow.]

same fever, and came so near dying that her sister Rachel prepared her burial robe, as death was hourly expected. But Olive recovered, and then the deadly disease seized the rest of the family. EPHRAIM<sup>5</sup> Hodges, settled in Hardwick, Mass., when he was a very young man. NATHANIEL<sup>5</sup> Hodges, after his father's death, went to Pembroke, Mass., where his mother's family lived, and from this town enlisted as private in the Revolutionary Army. He served 6 months in 1776 in Capt. William Weston's company which was sent to "the Gurnet," at Plymouth harbor, to defend the place. In December, 1776, he went to Bristol, R. I., in Col. John Cushing's regiment. In 1777 and and again in 1778 he served in Rhode Island, first under Capt. John Turner and then under Capt. Calvin Partridge. After the war he moved to Duxbury, where he had a blacksmith's shop on Captain's Hill on the Miles Standish Farm. He seems to have prospered, but when advanced in years his mind became affected, and through his mental inability he lost his property. On account of his Revolutionary service he was granted a pension.

EZRA<sup>5</sup> HODGES, at the age of 16, entered the ranks of the Revolutionary Army and served every year to the end of the war. The details of his service, so far as they are contained in the Revolutionary Rolls in the Mass. State Archives, are given on another page. He served in the Norton quota at least three months in 1778 and at least one month in 1779, being in the vicinity of Boston, and also in Rhode Island. In 1780 he enlisted from Hardwick, Mass., whither he and his brother Ephraim had gone, as well as other members of the family, and served for six months in New York State. In 1781 he enlisted from Norton for 3 years in the Continental Army. According to the statement of his only surviving daughter, he was a member of Washington's body-guard; and a grandson remembers his grand-father's saying that he had often slept so near Washington that he could have put his hand on him. This body-guard, it may be noted, was organized in 1776 and consisted originally of about 175 men, all

from Virginia. In 1778 the guard was increased by 100 additional men taken from other States. It was required that the members of the guard should be from 5 ft. 8 in. to 5 ft. 10 in. in height, between 20 and 30 years of age, of established character and fidelity, and American-born. The troop was disbanded with the army in June 1783. Ezra Hodges then went to Maine, married, and settled in Hallowell, which then included what is now Augusta. He lived a short time in Farmington and also in Belgrade, but his residence until his death was chiefly Augusta or its immediate vicinity. During the War of 1812, he again shouldered his musket and went out in the service of his country, although 50 and more years old.

ALLEN<sup>6</sup> Hodges moved from Norton to Orrington, married and settled in a part of Orrington which was set off as Brewer in 1812 and as Holden in 1852, and then resided in the part which has remained Brewer. Besides having a farm, he kept a store. It was his custom to drive with his own team to Massachusetts, when his stock of goods needed replenishing. On his last trip he contracted a severe cold which changed to fever and proved fatal after a few days. [Mrs. Annie M. Hopkins.]

ABIGAIL (BROOKS) HODGES, daughter of one of the wealthiest and most influential men of the vicinity, was a woman of noted energy and sterling integrity. After her husband's death, she had a hard struggle to keep her family together. Friends offered to adopt some of the younger children, but she refused to give them up, and by good management succeeded in maintaining a home for them and providing well for all their wants until they made homes of their

own. [Mrs. Annie M. Hopkins.]

EMILY (HODGES) SHEDD, at the age of eighty-five, was still a vigorous, energetic and capable woman, active and interested in good works. Her husband, Daniel Shedd, was formerly a mastermariner, but was able to give up following the sea, and from Jan'y 1, 1868, until now (1891) has been postmaster of South Brewer. Both he and his wife have shown kindly interest in the record of the family, and from them came the first response to the blanks sent out for this history.

Dr. Jerry Hodges (as he always wrote his name) studied medicine with Dr. Thomas Nelson of Bristol, R. I. In 1804 or 1805 he removed with his father to Petersham, Mass., and about two years later commenced practice in Templeton, Mass., where he resided about 10 years. He then went to Hinsdale, N. H., but returned in 1819 to Petersham where he passed the remainder of his life. On May 3, 1820, he was commissioned surgeon's mate of the 3rd regiment, 2nd Brigade, 7th Division of Mass. Militia, resigning in 1826. Possessing much tact as well as ability, he was successful in his practice and earned a high reputation among his fellow-physicians.

ELISHA TISDALE HODGES, having a great foundness for the sea, went in early life to New Bedford, where he had relatives, and made a number of whaling voyages. He was a good sailor and was rising in his calling; but on one of his trips he was so badly injured that

he was an invalid for the rest of his life. [Wm. A. Hodges.]

Francis Mason<sup>7</sup> Hodges was the student of his family. He received his education at Jenks Academy, and took up teaching as a profession, beginning at the age of 17 and continuing until the Civil War broke out. His residence was at Middleboro, Mass., but he taught for short periods elsewhere. When the call came for volunteers, he decided that it was his duty to enter the army as private, although he could have obtained a commission. He joined Co. E, 40th Mass. Vols., and was mustered into the service Aug. 31, 1862. Before long he was made corporal and seemed to be on the road of steady promotion, when he was attacked with fever which finally caused his death. [Wm. A. Hodges.]

CHARLES PINKNEY Hodges came to his death as a result of the Millerite excitement. A party of Millerites, residents of Petersham and vicinity, deciding that the end of the world was at hand, assembled in their robes ready to ascend to Heaven. An elm tree shaded the spot of their selection, and they proceeded to cut the tree down, that the branches might not impede their ascent. Such an event naturally drew a crowd, and when the tree fell, Charles Pinkney Hodges, a boy of not quite 12 years, was caught and crushed by the tree. [Wm. A. Hodges.]

Dr. Lewis Hodges served as surgeon in the War of 1812, and for his services the government gave his widow 160 acres of land. He was an energetic man, endowed with great executive ability. Besides his medical practice, which covered a wide territory, he conducted a large wheat farm and had a drug and book store in the village of West Bloomfield. Generous and sympathetic, devoted to his patients, for whom in critical cases he often was nurse as well as doctor, he gained the confidence, esteem and affection of all classes of people. But his labors told heavily against a nature so keenly sympathetic, and he literally wore himself out for others. His gravestone in the old cemetery in West Bloomfield is inscribed, "By those who loved him was this stone erected." [Mrs. Susan Hodges Nutting.]

Francis Louis' Hodges graduated at Yale College and studied law,

and was engaged in legal practice at the time of his death.

WILLIAM CARPENTER<sup>6</sup> Hodges went to Poughkeepsie about 1811 and lived there until 1839, when he, with nearly all his family, went back to the family homestead in Corinth, where he spent the

rest of his life.

Capt. Lewis Bemis' Hodges, determined to be a sailor, ran away to sea when only 13 years of age, and always followed the profession which he had then chosen. He rose rapidly through all the grades and became a noted captain of famous American clipper ships. He was one of that class (now extinct) of American sea-captains which made the reputation of the American marine — able, energetic, brave and generous, and favorites with passengers as well as ship-owners. For his gallant conduct in saving lives from a British ship which was wrecked, he was presented, in the name of the Queen of England, with a gold medal. This and many other tokens of love and appreciation are preserved by his family as heirlooms.

CHARLES WESLEY DAVIS, in September, 1863, joined Co. H., 5th New York Infantry, and was with Gen. Grant in the last advance on Richmond in 1864. He was a sharpshooter and was in numerous skirmishes. While on the skirmish line on the Weldon Railroad, in the vicinity of Petersburg, Va., he was captured, during an assault by the Confederates, on Sept. 21, 1864. He was taken to Libby Prison (some accounts say first to Salisbury Prison and then to Libby), and died there of chronic diarrhœa, only a couple of weeks before the Union troops entered Richmond. He was a young man of many excellent qualities and was class-leader of the Methodist Episcopal church at Corinth.

Samuel<sup>6</sup> Hodges was a farmer. He went, when a young man, to the western part of Massachusetts. In 1796 he moved to Winfield, Herkimer Co., N. Y., where he spent the remainder of his life. He was a useful and respected citizen and was chosen at various times, while living in Winfield, to fill township and county offices. He was a man of strong convictions, as indicated by the story concerning a trial at which he was a juror. On a Fourth of July, a man had been killed by the accidental or careless explosion of a cannon, and the gunner was being tried for murder. Popular opinion was strongly against the accused, and eleven jurymen were solid for conviction, on the ground that carelessness was as bad as murder. But Samuel Hodges, while sharing this opinion to a great extent, held that his oath as a juror would not allow him to vote thus; and as he held firmly to this idea, the accused was acquitted. Samuel was a strong Universalist and an admirer of Hosea Ballou. Nevertheless, when a Congregational church was built in his neighborhood, in 1800, influenced doubtless by his wife, who belonged to this religious society, he subscribed liberally, only one gift exceeding his in amount. [Samuel Hodges.]

Lydia (Bradley) Hodges, possessing sound judgment, executive ability, patience and exceeding cheerfulness, was well fitted to aid her husband in founding a home in a new country and making their lot a happy and successful one. To these natural endowments was added the charm of piety; and for seventy years, as a member of the Congregational churches in Lee and Winfield, she presented to the community an example of quiet and simple Christian life. Simeon Hodges, when young, went with his father to Savoy and lived there until 1820. At some date previous to 1817, he went to Newbury, Geauga Co., Ohio, and purchased 170 acres of unimproved land, returning then to his home. In the Spring of 1817, his eldest son, Samuel, and two other young men, with packs upon their backs, traveled on foot from Savoy to Newbury, and there Samuel began to make for himself a home on his father's land. On May 17, 1820, Simeon started from Savoy for Ohio with his wife and family. He took along a 4-ox team, a 2-horse team, a 1-horse wagon and horse, and two cows. His ox-team was driven by the young man who afterwards became his son-in-law. After a journey of 42 days, on June 27, 1820, the family arrived at Newbury and staid about two months with Samuel. During this stay, Simeon bought from Ralph Bacon a farm in Mentor, Geauga Co. (now Lake Co.), and in September moved thither with his family, and there spent the rest of his days. SILAS HODGES went to western New York in 1808, and took up a large tract of land in what was then a wilderness. He built a log house in the woods in what is now the town of Eagle, and, late in the

fall, went to Lock, N. Y., and married. In January he started back with his wife, traveling with an ox-team. The trip occupied two weeks. Soon after his arrival at his new home, he was joined by his brother William and wife, who brought a span of horses and an additional stock of provisions; and the two families lived together in the log-house for a time. In about ten years Silas had paid for his farm, cleared off all debts, and built a frame house on the part of his farm which was in the town of Gainesville. He prospered, and at the time of his death was owner of 500 acres of land. He was a good neighbor, knew how to protect his own rights without unnecessary friction, and never had a law-suit. [Mrs. Alma (Hodges) Eldridge.]

EXPERIENCE (TOBEY) Hodges was daughter of Nathaniel Tobey, who came to America during the Revolution and served under Gen. Lafayette. His wife was born in England. Experience received a sensible education, and, before marriage, fitted herself for all kinds of work devolving on the wife of a pioneer farmer. She cooked the first meal ever prepared for a white family in the town of Eagle. She spun, wove and fashioned all the garments of the family. She was courageous and faced without fear the dangers of the wilderness into which she had ventured, as a young wife, in midwinter. The dangers were by no means imaginary. On one occasion, with a child in her arms, she and her sister, Abigail (Howard) Hodges, started to visit a neighbor living several miles away. While passing through the dense forest, they encountered a large wolf, who blocked the way; but they advanced boldly, and the wolf fled, frightened, they said, by the searlet cloak which Abigail wore. WILLIAM HENRY Hodges, fatherless at an early age, was compelled in his youth to work hard; but by attending school during the winter months and improving his opportunities, he managed to acquire a fair education. He owned and managed a farm during his early life, his sister Mary, a woman of rare strength and beauty of character, acting as his housekeeper and adviser. In 1864 he began the manufacture of cheese at Coleman's Mills, but sold his factory, about 1874, and moved into the village of Oriskany. Purchasing the Rice Estate, he built here one of the best-equipped cheese factories in the State, which he managed successfully until his death. He was a man of strong convictions and marked characteristics, but so truthful and upright in all his dealings that, although considered eccentric, he was highly esteemed and respected. He was a zealous worker in everything he undertook, a strong Democrat, an earnest member of the Masonic Order, being Treasurer of the Oriskany lodge at the time of his death, and a conscientious communicant of St. Peter's Episcopal church in Oriskany. Dr. Isaac<sup>6</sup> Hodges in his youth was a schoolmate of William Cullen Bryant at the academy in Plainfield, Mass. He studied medicine and practised in Savoy, and then in the part of Adams which is now North Adams, settling in the last place about 1824. He was successful in his profession and accumulated considerable property. In 1830, he purchased the "Union Privilege" (land and waterpower) in North Adams, and in 1831 or 1832, in partnership with Joshua Burnet Hodges (his nephew), Alvin Sanford and Oliver Arnold, under the style of Hodges, Sanford & Co., built the "Slater Mill," with 14 looms and machinery for carding and spinning. In 1836 the firm sold out to O. & H. Arnold. Dr. Hodges and his professional partner, Dr. E. S. Hawkes, were much interested in increasing the educational advantages at Adams, and largely through their efforts Mr. Nathan Drury was led to bequeath his property to the Drury Academy. About 1840, Dr. Hodges was appointed receiver of this property and given charge of the financial management. He superintended personally the construction of the building, and was the first president of the board of trustees of the academy.

Commodore John Hodges' Graham entered the U.S. Navy as midshipman in 1812, was made Lieutenant in 1817, Captain in 1849 and Commodore in 1867. He gained a brilliant reputation for ability and daring in the War of 1812. He was one of the twelve officers who took part in the bold expedition against the British stronghold opposite Black Rock, N. Y., when nine of the party were killed or wounded. He was wounded so severely in the leg that amputation was necessary. In the naval battle on Lake Champlain, Sept. 11, 1814, he had command of Commodore McDonough's flagship. ELIZA ANN<sup>7</sup> (FULLER) DANA possessed much literary ability and was a poetess of considerable distinction. A number of her poems have been collected and published. Her husband was one of the

most prominent citizens of Brandon.

EMELINE (FULLER) GILLETTE has been a very kind and useful contributor to this family history. Although having reached the age at which most persons, of her sex at least, are wont to restrict their interests to a very narrow circle, and in despite of impaired health, her vigorous memory and family pride have enabled her to furnish many interesting facts which others had forgotten, and which would have been lost for all time without her aid.

Henry Hodges, about 1810, purchased the farm adjoining his father's on the south, and in 1812 built a house there and made the place his home for life. On account of his father's failing health, he was compelled to assume the burden of business quite early in life, and was prevented from obtaining such an education as he ardently desired. Nevertheless, he was all his life a studious reader of well chosen books, and in certain directions, especially in history, was equaled in the extent and accuracy of his information by only a few men of his section and period. He was a most capable business man, and widely noted for the energy and sagacity he displayed in the management of affairs entrusted to his charge. To this he added a wonderful capacity for remembering every one whom he had ever known, and for insight into their characters. His courtesy and suavity were such as to draw from his staunchest political opponent the remark, "if there is a polite man in Rutland County, Harry Hodges is the man." His firm adherence to the Federal party prevented him for many years from receiving popular honors in a town under strong Democratic rule; but as soon as the asperity of party had died away, his popularity was made evident. He represented his town in the State legislature for 4 years, beginning in 1819. In 1821 he received the appointment of Assistant Judge of the County Court and held the position 13 years. He was active in promoting the welfare and improvement of his town, and aided largely in organizing and sustaining the first Congregational church in Clarendon South Flats. In the panic of 1837, the failure of a manufacturing firm whose paper they had largely endorsed, involved him and his brother, Silas W., in very heavy losses. Only the most untiring energy, perseverence and sagacity enabled them to weather the storm successfully. fatigue and exposure attendant upon his exertions brought on an incurable disease to which, after a long struggle, he was compelled to

SILAS WYLLYS' Hodges dwelt nearly all his life in the house built by his mother in Clarendon. He and his elder brother Henry, early in life, formed a mercantile connection which was terminated only by the death of the latter. They carried on many branches of business in Clarendon, Dorset, Manchester, Castleton and Brandon, and their operations in furnaces, marble quarries, land-purchases, wool, lumber and general merchandise were, for those times, extraordinarily extensive. He was of a retiring disposition, yet his uncommon ability, good judgment and uprightness won the confidence, esteem and friendship of his townsmen. Besides discharging other trusts, he represented the town in the State legislature in 1824 and 1825, and was town clerk from 1819 to 1831. Being afflicted with a cancer, he spent two or three winters in the South, in the endeavor to obtain relief; and thus it happened that he died away from home.

George Tisdales Hodges entered Middlebury College about 1802, but left it when his father died and devoted himself to mercantile business which he prosecuted successfully until his death. He settled in Rutland about 1808. While his business capacity and prudence brought him unusual financial prosperity, his intelligence, dignified demeanor and courtesy made him highly respected and esteemed by a wide circle of acquaintances. He took an active part in military matters, served in the War of 1812, and rapidly rose to the rank of Major in the State Militia. For several years he represented his town in the General Assembly, and for 3 years (1845-7) he was in the State Senate, being President pro. tem. of this body for 2 years. In 1848 he was elected as a Presidential Elector and cast a vote for Zachary Taylor. In 1856 he was sent to the U. S. Congress. He was a director of the Bank of Rutland from its organization until his death, and its president from 1834. He was a director and the vice-president of the Rutland & Burlington Railroad from its commencement. He was chosen to numerous other positions of honor and trust

and for a long time was one of the most prominent and respected men of the State of Vermont.

James Bliss' Hodges entered the naval service of the United States in June, 1848, was at the Naval Academy in Annapolis until December of the same year, and then was ordered to join the frigate Savannah as midshipman. In this vessel he went in 1849 to San Francisco, Cal. He remained inside the Golden Gate about two years, a witness of, and participator in, the peopling and founding of a new State. In this period a quarter of a million of men poured into the State in a mad rush, and one hundred and five million dollars of gold were produced. In one year San Francisco grew from almost nothing to a city of 20,000 inhabitants, and in one year it was thrice destroyed by fire. In 1851 Mr. Hodges returned to the East with the frigate, and soon after resigned from the navy and began business life in which he still continues.

John Hopkins' Hodges graduated at Trinity College, and shortly afterward went to New York City. For many years he was connected with the banking firm of Heiser & Son, which was prominent during the war. He was a man of independent means and was out of business for some time previous to 1881, but in that year his great love for art led him to enter the firm of Reichard & Co., of New York City, picture dealers, as a special partner. He was well known for his excelent taste and judgment in paintings, and his name was as familiar to artists in Europe as to those in America. He had a wide education and was universally popular. His death occurred on a trip which he

was making for the purpose of purchasing pictures.

Hannibal Hodges lived in Clarendon and was engaged there in business part of the time, at least, with his cousin Henry Hodges [see No. 244] until 1836 or 1837 when he moved to Castleton Mills (now Hydeville) and took charge of the business of a large lumber company. Subsequently he became a member of the firm of Hawkins & Hodges and, after the dissolution of this partnership, engaged in trade on his own account under his own name. He was appointed postmaster of Castleton in 1848 and held this office until his death.

CYNTHIA FINNEY was celebrated for her beauty. She had dark (not black) hair of unusual length and luxuriance, black eyes and an

oval face.

EVELINE ATWILL was engaged to a young man named Colburn who was attacked by a lung disease which developed into quick consumption. When he became very sick and helpless, she married him so that she could nurse and comfort him in his last days. He lived only a short time after the marriage, and she was left a very young widow.

She is spoken of as a charming and affectionate woman.

George Tisdale Hodges was a clerk in the Bank of Rutland when the war broke out. He then was appointed Second Lieutenant of the 6th Regiment of Infantry, U. S. Army, and commissioned Aug. 14, 1861. He served in the Army of the Potomac in 1862, taking part in the siege of Yorktown in April, the battle of Gaines Mill on June 27, the battle of Malvern Hill on July 1, the battle of Manassas on August 30, and the battle of Antietam on September 17. In the Pennsylvania campaign of June and July, 1863, he was Aidede-Camp and Acting Assistant Adjutant-General to Gen. Hannibal Day and took part in the battle of Gettysburg. He participated in numerous smaller engagements and expeditions. In 1863 he was appointed Adjutant of the 6th Infantry and served as Regimental and Post Adjutant at forts around New York Harbor. He resigned from the army, April 5, 1865. From 1865 to 1872 he was chief clerk in the Quartermaster's Department of the U. S. Army, and then engaged in private business until 1876. From March to December, 1876, he was Captain of the Centennial Guard in charge of the Main Building of the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia. Then he engaged in railroad business until August, 1878, when he was appointed chief clerk in the office of the Engineer of the 7th Lighthouse District and stationed at Key West until March, 1880. From this date until May, 1891, he was chief clerk in the office of the Engineer of the 7th and 8th Lighthouse Districts and of the U.S. Engineer in charge of River and Harbor Works at New Orleans. While here he was Commander of the Department of Louisiana & Mississippi, Grand Army of the Republic. In May, 1891, he was sent to Duluth as chief clerk of the U.S. Engineer there; and in 1892 he was transferred to Jeffersonville, Ind., as chief clerk in charge of the Quartermaster's Depot there.

Col. George Tisdale<sup>7</sup> Roberts was First Lieutenant of Co. K, 1st Vermont Infantry when the war broke out. On May 8, 1861, he was mustered into the United States service for 3 months with the same rank, went to Fortress Monroe, and took part in the battle of Big Bethel on June 10. After his term of service had expired, he assisted in recruiting the 7th Vermont Vols., was commissioned Colonel of this regiment, Dec. 5, 1861, and went with his regiment to Louisiana the next spring. He led his regiment in its campaign in Louisiana, and at the battle of Baton Rouge, August 5, 1862, was mortally wounded, dying two days later.

Willard Hodges, after his father's death, continued the business, in partnership with his brother Erastus, in the old store on Brandy Hill until about 1809, when the firm dissolved. He then bought the Aaron Loomis place and there lived the rest of his life. He had a large farm which included the old Priest Robert's place. He was a kindly man, who possessed very many agreeable qualities. His widow survived him many years. She was noted for good sense and strong religious character and was much liked, especially by children to whom she was always kind. The school house was near her farm and she gave one of her best apple trees to the school children, which they had for their own exclusive use.

ERASTUS<sup>6</sup> Hodges inherited his father's business talent, and continued his father's business enterprises, which he extended until he had virtual control of mercantile affairs over a large part of the surrounding country. No business man in Torrington was more successful than he, whose ability and sagacity enabled him to take hold of the most varied enterprises and push them to success, even when others had failed. It is said that only one of his many adventures was ever known to go amiss. He was exceeding popular, was sent to the State legislature in 1826, 1827, 1832 and 1833, and was selectman in 1831, 1832 and 1833. He was repeatedly asked to hold other public positions, but felt unwilling or unable to accept.

Henry<sup>6</sup> Hodges received his education in the public schools of his native town. For a number of years he owned and managed a farm in the western part of Richmond township. In 1830 he sold his farm and moved into the village, and the next year went into business with his cousin Hannibal Hodges [No. 230], then of Clarendon, Vt., under the firm name of H. & H. Hodges. Their trade was in all the kinds of merchandise usually kept in a country store. The partnership expiring at the end of three years, he bought a farm in the east part of Richmond and lived on it about five years. Then he sold out and moved back into the village, but soon purchased another farm which he owned at his death. He did quite a large business in purchasing cattle and fattening them for the market. This necessitated much riding about the country in order to pick up animals. ALCOTT<sup>7</sup> HÁRDON enlisted Sept. 16, 1861, in Co. G, 22nd Mass. When young, he was a dancing-master of considerable reputation. He retained to old age his vigor and grace, and when sixty years old, danced the hornpipe before a select company with perfect ease. DANIEL WARREN PATTEN, who married ELIZABETH HOWE HEUS-

TIS, has always been respected and looked up to as a leader of men in the community in which he resides. Although self-made, his general knowledge is extensive and his mathematical knowledge is equaled but by few in his State. His gifts in that direction are phenomenal, enabling him to solve the most difficult problems in an incredibly short time. Nothing pertaining to figures has seemed to be difficult to him. He learned civil engineering, when young, by watching the surveying of the Cheshire railroad, and has exercised this profession with great success and increasing reputation. [Mrs. Ella E. Abbott.]

GILBERT BAXTER HEUSTIS was a sea-captain in his early manhood and has visited nearly every sea-port of importance in the world. Since he left the sea, he has been something of a rover, having lived in New Hampshire, California and Iowa, in all of which States he has been an active business man, much respected for his honesty and good judgment. He now [1894] lives in Iowa, where his children are all married and settled near him. In the course of a long and eventful life he has been a keen observer and has acquired a great

store of useful information. [Mrs. Ella E. Abbott.]

Milton Lewis Perry Heustis, when a young man, was very desirous of becoming a doctor, and for several years was in Boston, studying medicine with Dr. Chapman. His health failed and he was obliged to abandon his studies and return to country life; but he had acquired considerable medical knowledge, and although never practising, was always familiarly called "Doctor" by his intimate friends. After a time he settled in Charlestown, Mass., and was engaged in the grocery business for the rest of his life. He was very popular, belonged to several secret societies, and was sent to represent his city in the General Court of Massachusetts. He was one of the

kindest-hearted men that ever lived. Whoever applied to him for aid, received it—no matter whether white or black or how lowly, he always found a way to help. And all these things he did in a quiet, unobtrusive way, which made his charities doubly sweet. [Mrs.

WILLIAM GREENE' HEUSTIS went West when young, and was one of the pioneers of Stillwater, Minn. He was a carpenter and builder. He enlisted, April 7, 1862, in the 5th Minn. Inf. and became corporal, and was discharged April 7, 1865. His regiment was split up, and he was on detached duty, so that promotion came slowly, if at all, to many who deserved it. He took part in the capture of Corinth, Miss., in May, 1862, and in its successful defense in October following. He was at the Siege of Vicksburg and at the battle of Jackson, Miss., when the Confederates who were coming to the relief of Vicksburg, were routed and driven back. He was at the battle of Harrisburg, Miss., and at Nashville when Thomas routed Hood. Since his return from the war he has not enjoyed robust health.

Aristides' Heustis was a young man of thoughtful and studious character and quiet, dignified manner. He went into the military service of the United States from no love of fighting, nor desire for glory, but simply as a duty which he owed to his country. He enlisted May 31, 1861, in Co. A, 2nd N. H. Vol. Inf. His physical strength was insufficient for the hardships of the life of a private soldier, and his health gave way under the strain after a service of about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  years. He died at the Summit House Hospital in Philadelphia, and was buried in that city in the Mt. Moriah cemetery. [Mrs.

Samuel<sup>6</sup> Hodges was educated at Wrentham Academy and then engaged in business with his father in Easton. When the War of 1812 broke out, he recruited a company and, on Sept. 1, 1813, was appointed 1st Lieutenant of the 40th Infantry, U. S. Army. He was on recruiting service at Taunton from Nov. 13, 1813, to May, 1814, when he was ordered to join the headquarters of his regiment at Boston. He resigned Sept. 27, 1814, and took up his residence in Stoughton, Mass., where he became a member of the Gay Manufacturing Co., makers of cotton and woolen yarns. On April 20, 1818, he was appointed the first American consul at the Cape Verde Islands, Africa, and went to his post the following October. He came home to be married in 1821, and immediately returned to the islands, where, in addition to his consular duties, he engaged in the commission business. Goat skins, hides and salt were the principal articles of export. His death was caused by the malarial fever which was prevalent on the islands during the wet season. [Jennie A. Hodges.]

LEONARD<sup>6</sup> Hodges lived in Taunton until 1820, when he moved to Stoughton and established himself there as a jeweler. About 1822 he began the manufacture of satinets in a small way and gradually increased his works. After a few years he began to make hosicry yarn, extending the business from year to year until he became one of the largest and most successful manufacturers in Stoughton. He retired from active business in 1851, and in 1857 he sold his mill and closed his connection with manufacturing. For many years he was a director of the Neponset Bank of Canton. He was a very able, shrewd and careful business man, not fond of display or of public office, quiet and reserved in his intercourse with others; but he possessed untiring industry, great strength of character and steadfastness of purpose; and he was able to accumulate one of the largest properties owned by a private individual in Stoughton.

ELIZA EVELINE<sup>6</sup> (HODGES) LEONARD was a woman of superior education and refinement, of great tact and perseverance, of executive ability in domestic affairs, and of strong religious convictions. She was a Congregationalist of the most pronounced type, though more independent in thought and action than in theory. Although her theology differed widely from her husband's, this fact caused no domestic infelicity. Husband and wife each respected the honest convictions of the other; and as Mrs. Leonard possessed both loving heart and wise head, she was entrusted to a great extent with the family government and the religious training of the children. She did her duty always as she saw it. Honest, dignified and of strong determination, she brought to the government of the family an integrity of character, a clearness of judgment and a singleness of purpose which won respect for herself and conferred lasting benefit on her children. [Georgia L. Leonard.]

Jonathan Leonard Jr. studied medicine, but abandoned medical practice on account of delicate health, and for several years engaged in the manufacture of woolen goods in Stoughton. About 1826 he moved to Middletown, Conn., and then to Meriden, where he took up his permanent residence. In 1849 he became imbued with the "gold-fever" and went to California, returning in 1852. In 1854 he moved to New Haven and in so doing contracted pneumonia, of which he died. He was a great student and was exceptionally well informed in botany and chemistry. In theology he was, what was then called, a "free-thinker." He was a friend of Garrison, Phillips and Abby Kelly, was one of the first to take an active part in the anti-slavery movement, and being a ready debater, became prominent in this cause when the cause was very unpopular. But his honesty, loyalty to his convictions, untiring industry and wide knowledge of books and of men, united with great kindness of heart, gained for him the lasting

respect of all who knew him. [Georgia L. Leonard.]

EMILY JOSEPHINE LEONARD received an excellent education, and grew up to be one of the most talented women of New England. Her unusual mental ability was manifest almost from the cradle. She mastered her letters while learning to talk, and when three years old could read with facility. So rapid was her progress that at the age of twenty-one, she was able to teach, besides the usual English branches, Latin, mathematics (algebra, geometry and trigonometry), astronomy, natural philosophy, chemistry, botany, rhetoric, composition, ancient and modern history, physiology, pencil, erayon- and pastille-drawing and oil-painting. She was also well grounded in French and music, and had some knowledge of German and Greek. She had chosen the vocation of teacher, and showed such ability in smaller schools that, in 1861, she was appointed Assistant Principal of the High School in Medford, Mass. Here she taught for 5 years, and not only discharged her school duties in a manner which evoked the highest praise, but also pushed her own studies in the higher branches. Taking French lessons of Prof. Bocher of Harvard College, she made such remarkable progress that her teacher soon selected her to assist him in preparing his American edition of Otto's French Grammar. From her 21st to her 40th year she continued to teach with great success and to study, impelled by her insatiable love of learning and desire to master all that came in her way. At the age of 40 she was a fine scholar in English, Latin, Greek, French and German, could read Italian and Spanish with ease, possessed an exceptional knowledge of botany, could play well on three musical instruments, could sing, draw and paint, and was skilled in domestic duties. She had studied economics, and the favor with which her writings on the subject had been received, and her love of study, combined with some indications of fading health, caused her to give up teaching and to devote herself to literary pursuits exclusively. Her contributions to literature now became frequent. A constant succession of papers on the various branches of economic and monetary science, botany, history and numberless other subjects, and her addresses before various associations, testify to her unflagging industry, brilliant mental ability, and wide grasp of intellect. Probably the work by which she is best known is her excellent translation of Blanqui's History of Political Economy, which at once brought her fame, and has been adopted widely as a textbook. She took a prominent part in the woman suffrage agitation and in various reformatory movements. Her exertions reacted disastrously on her physical constitution and engendered a disease of the heart which carried her off when only 47 years old. An excellent account of her life has been printed by her niece, Miss Georgia Louise Leonard, herself well known in literary circles.

CHARLOTTE<sup>6</sup> (Hodges) Morton was noted for her beauty, grace of manner and intelligence. Wherever she went, at home and abroad, she was charming and attractive, and a favorite with both sexes. So, was of comparatively delicate figure, refined in her appearance and conversation, and sweet and winning in her ways. She presided with charming dignity and hospitality at the social gatherings in her beautiful residence, which has since been given by one of her daughters to the city of Taunton and now, dedicated to the purposes of charity, is known as the Morton Hospital.

Gov. Marcus Morton graduated with the highest honors at Brown University in 1804, commenced the study of law in the office of Judge Seth Padelford of Taunton, completed his legal education in the law school in Litchfield, Conn., where John C. Calhoun of South Carolina was a fellow student, and began practice in Taunton in 1807. He rose high in the legal profession, and although a Democrat residing in a Federalist town, held nearly every office in the gift of his townsmen. In 1811 and 1812 he was Clerk of the Massachusetts senate. He was attorney for Bristol county. From 1817 to 1821 he represented his

district in Congress. In 1823 he was a member of the executive council of the State. In 1824 he was elected Lieut.-Governor and, after Gov. Eustis's death in 1825, acted as chief magistrate of the State until the end of his term. He was re-elected Lieut.-Governor and the same year appointed on the Supreme Bench, where he served from 1825 to 1840. He was elected Governor by popular vote in 1839, and again by the legislature in 1842. He was Collector of the Port of Boston from 1845 to 1849, was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention in 1853, and was again in the State legislature in 1858. For several years he was an Overseer of Harvard College. He held many other positions of trust, such as Trustee of Taunton Lunatic

Hospital, etc.

JUDGE MARCUS' MORTON entered Brown University with advanced standing at the age of 17, and graduated two years later, in 1838. A year of study in an office in Boston and two years at the Harvard Law School laid a good foundation for his legal knowledge. He was admitted to the bar of Suffolk County in 1841, immediately opened an office for himself, and quickly obtained a high reputation and a large practice. He moved to Andover in 1850, and was sent by this town as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention in 1853, and as its representative to the State legislature in 1858. His father was a fellow-delegate to the convention and a fellow-member of the legislature. In 1858 he was appointed a justice of the Suffolk County Superior Court. The court system was entirely changed the next year, the present Superior Court of the State was organized, and he was on the bench of this court. For 10 years he held this position until appointed associate justice of the Supreme Judicial Court of the State; and in 1882 he was made Chief Justice, resigning in November, 1890, on account of ill-health. It is said that there never has been a more popular member of the bench in this State, not only with the bar and judiciary, but also with the general public. He possessed a keen sense of humor and ready wit. His native shrewdness and practical sense played a large part in his decisions, appeals from which were uncommonly few. And the ease with which he appeared to perform his difficult work was always a matter of remark among his associates.

NATIANIEL MORTON graduated at Brown University in 1840 and from the Harvard Law School in 1843. He died at the age of 34, having practised as a lawyer only about ten years, but in this short time he gained a prominence in his profession reached by few, if any, of his brethren at the bar at so early an age. He "had in its strictest sense a legal mind. He grasped the essential points of a case instinctively, and presented them with a smooth, easy, insinuating address that was exceedingly effective. In his arguments there was a logical force, and an indefinable charm of manner to please and

convince."

JUDGE JAMES HODGES MORTON graduated at Brown University in 1844, when he obtained the highest honors of his class. He was distinguished in college for his scholarship, taking every prize offered during the four years of his course. He next entered the Harvard

Law School and graduated there in 1846 with the degree of LL. B. Going thence to Springfield, he was admitted to the bar in 1847, and was appointed judge of the police court on its establishment in 1852. He retained his judgeship for the long period of 24 years, resigning on account of failing health only a few weeks before his death.

James Leonard Hodges occupied a prominent position among the citizens of Taunton and held numerous offices of honor and trust. He was appointed postmaster of Taunton, Dec. 8, 1810, as successor to his father, and yielded the position to his next younger brother in 1826. He was elected member of the Convention for the revision of the State Constitution in 1820, was State senator in 1823 and 1824, was elected town treasurer in 1826, and was county commissioner from 1826 to 1831. He was representative in the U.S. Congress in 1827 and re-elected twice, thus serving six years. He was the first cashier of the old Taunton bank, holding office from 1812 to 1827 and being a director during the same period. He was a founder, in 1820, of the Bristol County Agricultural Society and corresponding secretary from 1821 to 1834. He was prominent in the Unitarian Church and in the Masonic Order. Of a genial, pleasant disposition, he was a warm friend, a good neighbor and a kind-hearted man. He was a pleasing and convincing orator, and always ready to speak in any good cause, always courteous in his deportment, and one of the most popular men of the day. He died of consumption.

David Cobbs Hodges was appointed postmaster of Taunton, Sept. 9, 1826, succeeding his brother. He held the office 3 years, completing the term of 26 consecutive years during which this position was occupied by 3 members of the same family. He unfortunately lost his sight and was incapacitated thereby for any kind of business. He went to Bar Harbor, Me., where he lived until just before his death, which occurred in the house of his sister, Mrs. Jones, in Ellsworth. At Bar Harbor he entertained himself with teaching. He was a kind, genial man, and very fond of children whom he called in from the neighborhood and taught; nor did he confine his instruction to the small children. Thus he made himself useful and respected throughout the vicinity; and his annual visits to Ellsworth were greatly enjoyed by his little nephews and nieces by whom he was much loved. [Mrs. Helen F. Henry Sargent Jones was descended on his mother's side from Gov. John Winthrop of Massachusetts, and also from Gov. Joseph Dudley, once President of New England. He engaged extensively in farming, the lumber business and merchandising, was a large realestate owner, and by his energy and ability acquired a fortune. He was fond of military matters and rose step by step to the position of Major General of the 7th Division of the State Militia. He was

a firm adherent to the principles of Jefferson and Jackson, took an active interest in politics, and was long a leader of his party. He was postmaster and Collector of Customs at South West Harbor, postmaster at Ellsworth, Collector of Customs for the District of Frenchman's Bay, and held other official positions. He had a fine personal presence and enjoyed the esteem, confidence and respect of his fellow-citizens. [Mrs. H. S. Jones.]

GALEN<sup>6</sup> Hodges taught in one of the high schools of Providence for several years. In the autumn of 1834 he went to Darien, Ga., where he was clerk in the store of D. C. Hawes. In 1836 he went to Macon, Ga., and remained there several months as clerk. Thence he went by coach to Columbus and by boat to Irwinton (now Eufaula, Ala.) on the Chattahoochie River, which was then a small village, surrounded by a stockade of logs, in the territory of the Creek Indians. Again he moved to Apalachicola, Fla., and thence to New Orleans. At the time of his arrival in the latter place there was great excitement about Texas, and men were being recruited for the Texan army. In March, 1837, he took passage in the brig, Amelia Chase, and arrived at Matagorda, Texas, on April 9, 1837. In a few days he started on foot for the Texan army, which he reached near Texana, and enlisted, April 12, for 12 months in Capt. Weihl's company of volunteers in Col. Wigginton's reg't. He served his time and for his services received a large land grant. While locating his lands he became so charmed with the country that he decided to live there, and settled in Matagorda which was a beautiful place and became a fashionable resort. He was appointed Inspector, then Deputy Collector of Customs, and then President Houston made him Collector, and he held this office until Matagorda became a sub-port of entry. He owned extensive landed property, had a large store in Matagorda, was proprietor of the best hotel there, the Colorado Hotel, held the

office of County Judge, was at one time mayor and also for a time postmaster. During the war he lost heavily, like all others at the South, but retained his real estate. During the last years of his life he devoted himself to the care of his private business. Of his beauty of character and disposition much might be said. He was sympathetic and honorable, straight-forward and true. He seemed by his very appearance to inspire all who met him with a feeling of trust. An instance of this occurred during his residence in Georgia, when the Cherokees were being paid by the Government for their lands. One day when he was in the store alone, an Indian entered and, after looking him over, handed him a bundle containing money with the request to keep it while the Indian went on a hunting excursion. Galen took the bundle and kept it until the Indian returned and claimed it and, on receiving it, said that he had been sure he would get it back. [Mrs. J. G. Barstow and D. E. E. Braman.]

Julia Granville<sup>6</sup> (Hodges) Barstow, at the age of about fourscore years, has given much encouragement and aid in the preparation of this history. To judge from her letters, she possesses an active mind, quick to note what is going on around her, a strong memory, storing facts ready for use, an affectionate interest and pride in her kinspeople, and a spirit of sympathetic and helpful kindness. What she has written has been well and pleasantly expressed and to

the point.

WILLIAM BARSTOW began his business life as clerk in the drygoods store of Isaac Hutchens Cady. He was employed in several
similar establishments until 1837, when he formed a partnership with
his cousin, Ephraim Randoll Barstow, and carried on a dry-goods
business. After some years he sold out, and entered the carpet-trade
with John Henry Aldrich, having two large stores, one in Providence
and another in New York City. The firm also engaged with John
Sanford in the manufacture of carpets. In 1846 he sold his interest
in the New York store and conducted the Providence establishment
alone for a year or two, until his brother-in-law, James Raymond
Hodges [No. 294.] joined him under the firm name of Wm. Barstow
& Co., a name retained after Mr. Barstow's death.

LEONARD<sup>6</sup> Hodges was educated in the public schools of his native town. His father being a carpenter, he early learned that trade, then completed his apprenticeship in Boston, and thereafter followed the business of contractor and builder. While yet a minor, in 1819, he took and successfully carried out the contract for building the Armory of the Norton Artillery Company, of which organization he became, at a later date, First Lieutenant. His reputation as a skilled mechanic, and for honest and fair dealing, grew rapidly, and soon brought him to the front as a business man. Among the many buildings which he erected, and which still testify to his skill and thoroughly good work, are the residence of Gov. Marcus Morton in Taunton (now the Morton Hospital) built in 1827; the Bristol County Bank Building, finished in 1833, which has long been considered an ornament to the city of Taunton; the two "Bliss houses" in Attleboro, erected about 1829, long occupied by George Bliss and Jonathan Bliss, and at the time regarded as the finest residences in that section of the State; and the Unitarian church in Norton, built in 1835, and still occupied by the Society. Enjoying the confidence and respect of his townsmen to an unusual degree, he was called on to fill many official positions, although he was not an office-seeker and his private business was sufficient to occupy all his time. He was 8 years, (1837-39 and 1867-71) selectman, assessor and overseer of the poor and 3 years Special County Commissioner. He represented Norton in the State legislature in 1857. He was Justice of the Peace. He was prominent in the Church and superintendent of the Congregational Parish Sunday School. In politics he was a Whig, so long as that party existed; then he united with the Republican party. By his energy, ability, industry and economy he amassed quite a fortune. Many instances could be cited of his faithfulness in discharging his duties, his conscientiousness and indomitable energy. While on the Board of Selectmen, the meetings were held about four miles from his home. When nearly 70 years old, he drove one dark evening through a blinding snow-storm, over nearly impassable roads to the

place of meeting, to find himself alone, the younger men, living a short distance away, not daring to brave the storm. [Leonard M. Hodges.]

Earl's Hodges followed his father's trade and was a carpenter and builder. He passed his life in Norton where he was prominent and influential, and active in ecclesiastical, military and civil matters. He was Captain of the Norton Artillery Company from 1836 to 1839 and on July 10, 1844, received the commission of Major in the State Militia, but decided not to accept. He was Justice of the Peace, was selectman in 1840, 1841 and 1842, and representative in 1844 and 1845. He was appointed postmaster in 1845 and held the position until his death when he was succeeded by his widow. He was much interested in the temperance movement and was the second President of the Norton Total Abstinence Society.

SAMUEL SEAVER was a contractor and builder and always resided in the place of his birth. He and his wife celebrated their golden wedding in 1882 and his widow passed her last days in the house which, built on the same site, replaced the one which she had entered as a bride.

Samuel Leonard Seaver received his education at the Bristol County Academy and the Taunton High School, and then engaged in business with his father. In 1873 he became agent of the Carver Cotton-Gin Company of East Bridgewater, and traveled extensively through the Southern States in the interest of his company. His health failed, compelling him to relinquish his position, and he engaged in his former business as contractor. He belonged to the Masonic Fraternity and was a member of the Old Colony Commandery

of Abington, Mass.

George Francis7 Seaver enlisted at the first call for troops in 1861, and served for three months with the Marine Artillery Co. of Providence, R. I. In the same year he was commissioned Second Lieutenant of Co. C, 3rd R. I. Artillery. He was engaged at the capture of Fort Pulaski, Georgia, in April, 1862, and at the siege and reduction of Fort Wagner, in Charleston harbor, June to September, 1863. In the autumn of 1863 he resigned. He was City Marshall of Taunton in 1877 and 1878, and was then appointed to a position on the Mass. State Police. He was a member of the Taunton Com-

mon Council in 1870, and Alderman in 1871 and 1872. James Edward Seaver was mustered into the U.S. Service, June 15, 1861, as private in Co. D, 7th Mass. Infantry and was promoted through the different grades of non-commissioned officers. On Nov. 22, 1862, he was commissioned Second Lieutenant, and on May 5, 1863, First Lieutenant, acting as Quartermaster of the regiment. He was wounded in the charge on Marye's Heights, Fredericksburg, Va., May 3, 1863, and as his wound finally incapacitated him for further active service, he resigned the following November. has studied the history and genealogies of his native town, has liberally given information to the compilers of this history, and was one of the principal contributors to the History of Taunton, published in 1893, the long and interesting chapters on Taunton's military history, from the beginning to the present time, being from his pen. He was City Marshall of Taunton in 1884 and 1885, and at the end of 1894 was appointed Chairman of the Board of health.

Andrew James Hodges, having learned the trade of carpenter, went to Delavan, Ill., in 1837, to assist in building the large hotel there of the Delavan Association, and thus became one of the first settlers of Delavan. He remained in that place until 1848, when he removed to Peoria. ROYAL PECK<sup>6</sup> Hodges at the age of 15 began to learn the carpenter's trade with his father and older brothers. Having completed his apprenticeship he went to Delavan, Ill., in 1837, for the Delavan Association, and when their hotel was finished, went to Salem, Ind., and thence, after about a year, to Greencastle, Ind. At this last

place he was engaged on the construction of the buildings of Asbury University, on the completion of which in 1840, he went to Natchez, Miss., and thence to New Orleans. The winter of 1840-41 he devoted to a pleasure-trip to Cuba, visiting different parts of the island. He returned to Norton in April, 1841, and not long after entered into partnership with his brother Earl, in the manufacture of sashes, doors and blinds, having a saw mill and a sash mill on the Rumford River. Subsequently he sold the machinery to parties in Lewiston, Me., and set it up in that place for the purchasers. On March 28, 1850, he started for California and arrived in San Francisco May 14. He spent about 3 years in this State, working for a few months in the gold mines, but the rest of the time practising his trade of car-penter and builder in San Francisco. Returning to Norton he devoted his attention chiefly to farming, giving but little time to his trade except to build a number of houses for himself. He was much interested in the Bristol County Agricultural Society, served on many of its committees, and was a director for 12 or 13 years. He filled several town offices in Norton, where he was assessor, selectman and Justice of the Peace. He retained his vigor of mind and body to the end of his days.

Sewall<sup>6</sup> Hodges was a farmer and lived on the land taken up by his father. He was an earnest, industrious and honorable man, just in his dealings and strong in his convictions. He signed the first temperance-pledge and cast the first Free Soil vote in the town of Sharon. He was actively interested in the cause of education and contributed liberally to the establishment and support of the circulating library in his town. He was a cordial friend of Rev. Jonathan Whittaker, and when the pastorate of this minister was terminated by a schism in the Church and Society, he joined the Friends' Society in Mansfield, and sent all his children to finish their education at the Friends' school in Providence, R. I. In 1834 he built that part of the Boston & Providence Railroad which passed over his land. After the double track was laid, while crossing the railroad, he was struck by a train and died in a few hours.

Benjamin<sup>6</sup> Hodges was a farmer and passed his long life on the homestead of his father, seldom leaving his native town. He was a man of quiet habits, modest and unassuming, genial and hospitable, and of such sterling honesty and uprightness that he was loved and respected by all his neighbors. He joined the Congregational church in Sharon and afterwards became a member of the Congregational church in Foxboro. By persistent industry and steady economy he acquired a competence, and was able to do many kindly acts in unobtrusive ways. He was fond of his kin, and for 22 consecutive years, and until his death, the annual gatherings of the descendants of Josiah<sup>4</sup> Hodges were held at his farm. At these merry reunions of the family, no one was happier than he. His homestead was in that part of Sharon which was annexed to Foxboro in 1850, and is now called East Foxboro. It is now [1894] owned by his son, Marcus Pratt<sup>7</sup> Hodges, who has contributed many facts to this family history.

ZEPHANIAH LEONARD6 HODGES entered Brown University, but did not complete the course of study. He was a man of cultivated mind, and a great reader. He was very fond of music, could play remarkably well on several instruments, and was one of the original and prominent members of the Beethoven Society of Taunton, which was organized in 1821. He had a strong mechanical bent and engaged in several mechanical pursuits, at one time being a manufacturer of musical instruments, in which business he attained considerable reputation. He built in 1823, the first organ used in the Broadway Congregational church of Taunton, and in 1829 the organ of the St. Thomas Episcopal church of Taunton. Both of these instruments were in use for many years. He achieved an especial reputation for his violincellos, a number of which proved to be of exceptional value. He was a strong temperance man and a courageous Abolitionist. At the age of 82 [wrote one of his children whom he was visiting] he was in full possession of his mental powers, took long walks, read without glasses, and enjoyed playing the violincello with an accompanying instrument, by the hour; he read at sight any music placed before him, and showed in his playing no sign of age except a slight tremble in drawing the bow.

WILLIAMS Hodges and his wife, immediately after their marriage, with bright anticipations of the future, set out in their own conveyance for New York State, and after a journey of nine days reached Decatur, where he had purchased land and decided to make a Here they lived about 14 years, and here all but three of their children were born. But through the trickery and dishonesty of another, they lost their farm; and in 1826 they moved to New York Mills. Although many trials came to them - in loss of property and deaths of children—they maintained their sterling integrity and sturdy independence. Both were strong in their ideas of right and wrong, strict in the observance of the Sabbath, and imbued with an abhorrence of getting into debt. When Mr. Hodges died his widow showed even more plainly than before her strength and ability, and managed to bring up her family without deviating from her principles of right and independence, which she tried, and with success, to instill into the minds of her children. Of these children, none married, and only two are now (1893) living. [Martha Hodges.

ELKANAH<sup>6</sup> Hodges was a carpenter by trade. He served in the War of 1812.

ALBERT CLARK' Hodges early in life engaged in the straw goods business in Foxboro, and afterwards carried on the same trade for years in New York City. He was very successful in his business, but finally lost heavily by the failure of Vyse & Sons. His business took him frequently to Europe and thus he had the opportunity of visiting many foreign lands. It is stated that no man connected with the millinery trade had a more extensive acquaintance with its members, or was more popular with those brought into contact with him by his business. His kindness, courtesy, social ability and pre-eminent conversational powers made for him hosts of friends to

whom he was very dear.

Henry Albert<sup>8</sup> Hodges spent much of his youth at school in Foxboro. In 1870 he went to Europe with his mother and studied: first, in a school near Geneva, Switzerland; next at Neuilly, near Paris; and then in Dresden. After a trip through Germany and Italy he went with his mother to Valencia, Spain, where he was dangerously sick for many weeks with rheumatic fever. This left him with an organic disease of the heart and was the origin of the trouble, Bright's Disease, which caused his death some ten years later. He returned to the United States and spent four years at the Columbia College School of Mines, New York City, where he graduated in 1878. After graduation, he entered the office of a New York firm which was engaged in the business of tube and driven wells. His brilliant intellectual abilities, rendered the more attractive by a sunny nature and kindly wit, were rapidly bringing him into prominence, when his disease compelled his retirement from active business and finally ended his life.

Joseph<sup>6</sup> Hodges was a farmer and a surveyor. Having a very high reputation for honor and justice, as well as ability, he was in much demand as arbitrator in cases of disputed boundaries, and in all matters relating to real estate questions. He was a kind-hearted man, genial and pleasant, and was very popular and much respected. He lived in Taunton at the time of his marriage, and was Captain of one of the militia companies from 1807 until 1812. When on military duty he wore the famous silver-hilted sword which had descended by inheritance to him from his great-grandfather, Major Joseph<sup>3</sup> Hodges. About 1812 he moved to Norton and lived there some 14 or 15 years. He was a resident of Norton when appointed Justice of the Peace, Jan'y 7, 1825, and for some time after. In 1830 he was a resident of Canton, Mass., for in that year the town committee made a contract with him for the map of Canton which was published in 1831. The map was made from actual surveys and the contract-price was \$30. While a resident of Canton, he lived part of the time in the Bemis house and part of the time in the Bussey house. He was for some years in charge of the Bussey farm, which now, known as the Arnold Arboretum and under the management of Harvard University, is one of the most famous institutions of Boston. He moved to Palmer, Mass., about 1843, and there passed the remainder of his life.

Sally (Gilbert) Hodges was a capable, energetic, New England woman. She directed with ability her domestic affairs, and managed the household finances. She carefully reared her children, to whom she was a devoted mother, holding their interests paramount to all others. Hence it was that, when some articles were needed for her home, and ready cash was not immediately available, the silver hilt of Major Joseph's sword was sacrificed by her for the sake of her family, and by the process of barter, was transmuted into silver spoons. The blade is still owned by her grandchildren.

WILLIAMS Hodges attended school in his native town, but during his earliest years the school advantages were few. He often gave his children accounts of those primitive times, when the scholars assembled in a farm-house kitchen or a vacated shop, and when the reading books contained chiefly extracts from the orations of the old Romans, many of which extracts he knew by heart and could repeat word for word. He was of a studious nature and especially fond of history, and took every opportunity to improve his education. He taught school in Taunton, Rehoboth and Norton, and his teaching was long remembered as of the best in those days. He was always interested in the public affairs of his town, State and nation, was at one time selectman of Norton and for a number of years was assessor; but he did not care to hold public office, and devoted his time and thoughts mainly to his private affairs, spending his leisure hours, when possible, among his books. He attended the First Church in Norton until he was 70 years old, and then united with the Methodist Society in Barrowsville. His life was one of quiet usefulness, and the daily beauty of his character, his unswerving integrity and adherence to the right won for him the love and esteem of his neighbors. [Mrs. Mary A. Hodges Reed was born, and passed his boyhood, on the old Reed homestead in Taunton, which has been owned and occupied by the Reed family since 1680. In his early manhood he was a merchant in Boston. In 1830 he returned to Taunton and went into business with his brothers John and William. After some years the partnership was dissolved and he carried on the business alone until near the close of his life. He was modest and unassuming, upright in all the affairs of life, and highly valued and respected by all with whom he came in contact. He possessed poetical talent and was the author of a large number of poems, many of which are of superior merit. He represented his town in the legislature in 1834 and 1836. He and his wife were members of the Winslow Church (Trinitarian Congregational) for many years. [I. W. Wilcox.]

EDGAR HODGES<sup>7</sup> REED spent his earliest years in Taunton and Boston. In 1834 he began business for himself in his native town, and carried it on continuously until July 1, 1889, when he retired, having gained a reputation as an able and successful merchant. He

was an enthusiastic and painstaking antiquary, and as such was well known in nearly all parts of the United States. His historical and genealogical gleanings, often obtained by hard personal labor and research, were freely dispensed to any and all who applied for help and information. He gave valuable aid to the compiler of the second edition of the Hodges Record, and was a generous contributor to this present edition. He was a member of the Old Colony Historical Society, and one of its directors. He united with the Spring Street Church (afterwards the Winslow) Oct. 2, 1842, and was superintendent of its Sabbath school for many years. He was treasurer of the Society from 1847 to 1871, and was chosen Deacon, Feb. 6, 1862, in which office he continued until his death. He was an alderman for 1865 and 1866, thus being a member of Taunton's first city government. He was a Representative to the legislature in 1869, and failed of a re-election only through his well-known temperance principles. He was a kind and loving husband and father, a good citizen, and in all the relations of life endeavored to do his duty towards one and all. [I. W. Wilcox.]

REV. FREDERICK ALONZO REED was educated at Amherst College and the Theological Seminary at Bangor, Me. His first pastorate was at Cohasset, Mass., where he remained 19 years; his second was at East Taunton, where he spent 10 years. Failing health compelling him to abandon work for a time, he went to Europe, on his return residing in Concord, Mass. After about three years of rest he accepted a call from the church in Harvard, Mass., and was there three years when he received the higher call. He was an interesting and instructive preacher, a faithful pastor, unobtrusive and selfforgetful, charitable, friendly, and ever ready to lend a helping hand. He was greatly beloved in all the places where he ministered and in all his life was happy and his labor fruitful. He was an excellent writer, careful in preparation and felicitous in expression. He wrote The Twin Heroes, which was published by the Congregational Publishing Society, and also The Boy Lollard, the proofs of which he read just before his death. His historical sermon, preached at the re-dedication of the church in Harvard, was also published. The end came suddenly, through apoplexy, though severe injuries, arising from a fall three weeks before, had laid him aside from labor.

George Leonard Hodges, when only nine years old, went to work, receiving \$4 per month. This job lasted eight months, at the end of which time he had left, after paying all his expenses, the sum of 24 dollars. During this time he visited his parents every week, going home Sunday morning and returning at night, walking nine miles each way. At the age of eleven he left his father's house in New Salem and went to his uncle, Timothy Hodges, in Greenfield, N. Y., and staid with him two years. Then a visit from his brother Timothy gave rise to such an attack of homesickness, that the two boys started off and made the 150-mile journey home on foot, getting an occasional lift from kind-hearted teamsters. He has always made his own way in the world, and has kept up his life of energetic, pushing work until within the last few years, when attacks of rheumatic fever have interfered with his activity. "I have always found plenty of work to do," he writes, "and have had my share of the griefs and troubles, as well as of the sunshine, that falls to the lot of man in this world. I have buried all my boys, lost money and regained it, and yet am poor. But I have kept the name unsullied."

Sarah Hodges possessed the sterling qualities of head and heart which enabled her to perform well the duties of a farmer's wife and of a loving mother. Having domestic tastes and ability, a warm heart and a sunny disposition, she made her home pleasant and attractive to all her kin and to her neighbors. Her life was quiet

and uneventful, but none the less useful.

RICHARD CASWELL was a farmer, and throughout his life was noted for his honest and just dealings. About 1806 he moved with his father's family from Attleboro, Mass., to Winthrop, Me. He served in the War of 1812, and for this service received a land grant of 160 acres which he sold afterwards for \$125. After the War he went to Norton and was employed in the old weaving mill in the part of the town now called Barrowsville. The looms were run by hand. After his marriage he lived in Winthrop, Me., until 1837, when he sold his farm, and resided again in Norton. In 1840 he moved to Mercer, Me., and there passed the rest of his life. [Byron S. Caswell.

HENRY ALMON<sup>8</sup> BAKER entered the service of the United States in March, 1864, as private of Co. E, 15th Mass. Vols., afterwards consolidated with the 20th Mass. Vols. He went through the terrible campaign in the Wilderness. On Aug. 25, 1864, in a severe engagement at Ream's Station on the Weldon Railroad, his regiment was surrounded and all present, except ten men, were killed or captured. He was among the prisoners and was taken to Andersonville prison. Except for a brief note, written just after his capture, his family received no direct word from him. But a fellow-prisoner saw his body carried

out of the prison in the dead-cart early in 1865.

Almon Danforth<sup>6</sup> Hodges lived in Norton until 1816, when he became clerk in George Gilbert's grocery store in Providence, R. I. In 1818 he entered the service of J. D. & M. Williams in Boston. "My position [here] was a very pleasant one," he wrote, "plenty of hard work, but everything went on cheerfully. We labored in the store from 5 o'clock in the morning until about 10, and sometimes later, at night." For months, in order to better his education, he "got up early in the morning," before the store opened, and studied. In 1823 he formed the firm of Stimson & Hodges, and carried on the grocery business in Providence. This very happy and successful partnership lasted 22 years, during which time not one disagreement occurred between the partners. In 1845 he went into the wholesale grocery business in Boston. In 1850 he was elected President of the Washington Bank, Boston, and held this position until his death, the success of this bank under his management being unsurpassed by that of any other bank in Boston, as may be seen from its published history. His financial ability, strict integrity and pleasant manner led to his being chosen for many positions of trust. His sense of right and justice were so strong, that he managed all properties entrusted to his care entirely for the benefit of the owners; and thus his own fortune was never so large as it was generally supposed to be by those who knew his successful management, or as

it might have been, had he chosen to deviate from his strict principles. He was for years a director of the Weybosset and National banks of Providence; trustee, vice-president, and president of the Roxbury Institution for Savings; treasurer for 24 years of the Association of Banks for the Suppression of Counterfeiting; an organizer of the Boston Clearing House in 1856, and a manager from that date until his death. He was one of the delegates sent by the Boston banks in November, 1861, in connection with delegates from New York and Philadelphia banks, to confer with Salmon P. Chase, Secretary of the

Treasury, concerning the finances of the United States.

From his youth he was actively interested in military matters. He was one of the founders of the Boston City Guard in 1821. He was Adjutant, Lieut.-Col., and Colonel (for 5 years) of the 2nd R. I. Militia Reg't, resigning in 1833. When the Olney-Lane Riots broke out in Providence, although a Colonel, he took the position of orderly-sergeant of the volunteer patrol hastily formed the first night. At the climax of the Dorr War in 1842, he marched to the threatened armory as private in the ranks, was soon commissioned Captain and then Lieut.-Colonel and did active service. At the end of the war he organized the company well known later as the Providence Horse Guards, was its Captain, and became Colonel again in 1844, resigning when he moved to Boston. In 1847 he was unanimously elected Brigadier-General of the Boston Brigade of Mass. Militia, and in 1850, Colonel of the Suffolk Light Infantry Reg't, but declined both offices. His intense loyalty to the government brought him again to the front in 1861. Being too old to be accepted for field service, he was active in raising troops and funds, gave liberally of his time and money, and organized and commanded the Roxbury Horse Guards. Four of his sons, being all of his family who could pass the physical examination, were in the Union Army and Navy, and two died in the service. Five sabres and 26 warrants, commissions and discharges form part of the military heirlooms preserved by one of his sons.

In politics he was a Whig and then a Republican. Always interested in political matters and holding it his duty always to vote, he had no desire for office and declined the nominations frequently offered him, except on two occasions of strong excitement. After the Dorr War he was elected representative of Providence in the Rhode Island legislature and made chairman of several important committees; and during the early years of the Republican party, he

once accepted a nomination in a forlorn hope.

He was wisely liberal in charitable matters and very unostentatious. His sense of right and justice, honor and fairness, loyalty to country, and duty to one's neighbors, was unusually strong. He was fond of society, especially in his younger days, and having a fine personal appearance, a cheery nature, a fund of humor, and cordial and attractive manners, he was a general favorite. He was a good singer, belonged to several musical societies, and played first clarinet in the Old Providence Philharmonic Society. He had a good memory for faces, names and dates. In the latter part of his life he wrote

many articles of reminiscences, which were published in the papers. At the age of 19 he began a journal which he continued through life, the last entry being made within 12 hours of his death. He was a life member of the N. E. Historic Genealogical Society and its President in 1859. In 1853 he compiled and published at his own expense the second edition of the Genealogical Record of the Hodges Family in New England. He died in his own house of congestion of the lungs, caused by heart trouble, after an illness of about fifteen minutes.

CAPT. WILLIAM TOWNSEND HODGES graduated in 1850 at the English High School, Boston, and entered on a business career which was interrupted by lung trouble, on account of which he went on a sea-voyage and spent two winters in Texas and Louisiana. He was a handsome young fellow, of a frank nature, attractive, generous, daring and fond of adventure. During the Kansas troubles he spent a vacation in the region infested by the "border ruffians," in order "to see what they were like." He excelled in athletic exercises, being one of the best boxers and fencers in Boston, and one of the best swordsmen and riders in the Volunteer Army. When the war broke out he desired to enlist, but was prevented by the doctors on account of his weak lungs. After his brother's death he could not be restrained. He had served in the militia, and on Sept. 10, 1862, was commissioned First Lieutenant of Co. C, 41st Mass. Infantry, which later became the 3rd Mass. Cavalry. He served with his regiment in Louisiana, participating in all the fights, and was promoted Captain in 1863. He was one of the first to volunteer in the noted Forlorn Hope at the siege of Port Hudson. In Feb. 1864, he was transferred to the 4th Mass. Cavalry of which his intimate friend, Francis Washburn, was Colonel. He went to Virginia and there saw much active service. He had been offered a commission as Major, with the usual furlough, at the beginning of the movements connected with Lee's retreat from Richmond, but he refused to leave his company at such a time, and instead of going North for promotion, went with his troop to check Lee's retreat. He was one of the heroic band of 78 (11 officers and 67 men) who, at High Bridge, on April 6, 1865, dashed against Rosser's division of cavalry and a part of Fitz-Hugh Lee's cavalry, supported by Longstreet's corps; killed or disabled more than a hundred of their foes, among them a General, a Colonel, three Majors and many inferior officers; and, by sacrificing themselves, delayed the whole Confederate army, and hastened the end of the war. "These 78 Massachusetts horsemen. who had just finished a sharp half-hour's fight, charged an advancing brigade of Confederates, crushed and drove back the heavy rebel line, and captured an embarassing crowd of prisoners. Again confronted by masses of cavalry, they re-formed and charged furiously again. They crashed through three lines until, their formation entirely broken, they mingled with their foes in a fierce hand-to-hand fight. Less than a score emerged from the melee, and these few were led by Capt. Hodges in a last furious charge, in which he met his own death, as gallant and chivalrous an officer as ever drew sabre." [New England Mag. July, 1891.]

ADJUTANT GEORGE FOSTER HODGES graduated with honors at Harvard in 1855, when only 18 years old. After teaching for a short time, spending a year in Cuba (he spoke Spanish fluently), and studying in a law office in Boston, he entered the Harvard Law School and received the degree of LL. B. in 1860. His abilities and thorough work at once attracted attention. He was made Librarian of the Law School, and was employed by Prof. Theophilus Parsons in the making of his legal publications. He made the Index to Parson's Maritime Law, and had an important share in the composition of Parson's Notes and Bills. In 1860 he became convinced that war was inevitable between the North and the South, and in order to prepare himself for the duty which, he felt, he owed to his country, he joined the Boston Cadets. When the first call came for troops, he responded at once, enlisting as private in Co. K, 5th Mass. Vols., and starting for Washington with the regiment on April 21, 1861. His abilities soon raised him from the ranks and he was made First Lieutenant and Paymaster. He was at the first battle of Bull Run, July 21, 1861, and in the thickest of the fight, acting as Aide, and fighting coolly, steadily and persistently. On the retreat he preserved his coolness and bore off from the field his wounded Colonel who had been abandoned as fatally wounded. For his gallant conduct he was presented with a sword - a mark of honor received by but few Union officers on that day. When his term of service expired he immediately re-enlisted, and in August, 1861, went again to the front as First Lieutenant and Adjutant of the 18th Mass. Vols. Devoting himself with characteristic energy to his duties and never sparing himself, he contracted typhoid fever and died in the service. At his death his friends - classmates, members of the bar and comrades in the army - wrote and published many expressions of love and respect, and the strongest testimonials to his manliness, his unselfishness, his intense loyalty to friends and to country, and his pre-eminent abilities as student, lawyer and soldier. [See Harvard Memorial Biog., i, 351.]

FREDERICK STIMSON<sup>7</sup> Hodges, in 1858, went out to Davenport, Ia., as clerk in a banking house and afterwards did some farming in Iowa and New Mexico. He took up engineering as his principal business, was for some years locating-engineer for the Union Pacific R. R. during its construction, and held a similar position on the Northern Pacific, the Texas Pacific and the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fé railroads. During the war he served a short time as Lieutenant in a volunteer cavalry company raised in Iowa to repel a Confederate raid, holding his commission from the State; and in 1863 he joined the gunboat Daylight, and for about a year was in the Atlantic blockading squadron and frequently under fire. He has visited almost every State and Territory in the United States, has been in quite a number of the Canadian Provinces, and has made one trip through Europe.

Alfred Hodges, when young, moved with his parents to Williamsburgh, and there passed the remainder of his life. He early evinced a great love for study and had an unusually good education for those days. He enjoyed classical literature, and having a retentive memory, was always ready with apt quotations. A wellstored mind, good power of expression and refinement of manner, rendered him an entertaining and instructive talker. In his early life Williamsburgh consisted in great part of large farms, owned by the Boeriems, Berrys, Wyckoffs and other wealthy families, who lived in quaint Dutch houses along the beautiful river-banks, with no other mode of communication with New York City than row-boats. Alfred Hodges owned and managed what was called "the ferry," transporting passengers in the row-boats for several years, and then substituting larger boats propelled by horse-power, the introduction of which created quite a sensation in the settlement. During the War of 1812, he served in the artillery. He took a conspicuous part in the reception of Lafayette on the second visit of that illustrious man to this country. He was a man of influence and character, enjoying the confidence of his neighbors, who chose him for many positions of trust. For years he was Superintendent of the Poor, a position for which he was well qualified by his quick sympathy, great generosity and abounding love of his fellow-beings. The poor had in him a friend who never forgot or forsook them, and to help those in distress was always his work. He could not see a case of suffering without relieving it, and when the public funds were low, his own purse was opened and emptied. The record of his life was one long act of charity. [Alfred Hodges.]

OLIVE WHITE<sup>6</sup> (Hodges) Fisher was a woman of remarkable personal appearance, lovable social traits and noted domestic ability. She went with her husbandto their new home in Spencer, after living in more settled places, and there managed the household and reared her family. For quite a long time there were no roads and no bridges in the neighborhood, yet she was accustomed to make the trip to the village, often with a baby in her arms, guided through the forest by the blazed trees, and crossing the streams on floating logs. She was not deterred by the screams of the panthers nor by the howls of the wolves; wild animals were so common that she had no fear of them. Deer were as plentiful as sheep are now, and almost as tame. She often counted a dozen feeding in the clearing around the house. She was the first person who drove a horse and wagon from her house to the village. [Robert H. Fisher.]

THOMAS FISHER was a seaman in his younger days, and first mate of a vessel plying chiefly between New York and the West Indies, until Congress passed the Embargo Act of 1807 which detained all American vessels in port. This act, by stopping his business, compelled him to seek other employment. He went with his wife and child to Tioga County, where his father, in 1805, had bought 7,200 acres, paying the sum of \$2,250. Thomas settled in the southeast corner of this tract. Squatters had cleared about an acre of the land; the rest was an almost unbroken wilderness. Three miles to the south a few families were living in the village of Spencer. He had a farm of 375 acres, which he commenced to clear. The log-house, which he built at the time of his settlement on the farm, sufficed for the needs of the family until 1824, when a new

house was built, which is still in use. [Robert H. Fisher.]

ROBERT HEPBURN' FISHER lives on the farm where his parents settled, and in the house in which he was born. Here for over three-score years he has resided continuously, and as his brothers and sisters have decided to part with their shares of the paternal estate, he has bought up their interests until he owns the whole of the homestead.

Joseph Hodges came from Maine to Massachusetts, and after a short residence in the neighborhood of Attleboro, settled in Providence. SALLY BASSETT (GUILLOT) HODGES was a school teacher before her marriage. She was a very lady-like person, mild, gentle, kind and well-beloved. Her education was superior to that of most women of her day, and she had a gift of making verses which she was often called on to display at weddings and other social occasions. Left a widow with 4 small children at the age of 35, she proved herself able to bring up her family. She lived to the age of 84, and is remembered as a beautiful old lady. Her father served in the Revolution, being 4 months in Rhode Island in the autumn of 1779 under Capt. Joseph Franklin, and enlisting in 1780 or 1781 for 3 years in the Continental Army and receiving a pension for his services. Her grandfather likewise served for 3 years in the Continental Army. The family was of French descent, coming from Francois Guillot who settled in Norton, Mass., and whose descendants generally spell the name Guillo or Guillow. [Mrs. H. T. Atwood.]

EPHRAIM WILDE HODGES was a sailor. He served in the War of 1812, was at Fort Popham, on the Kennebec River, and was for 3 years in the frigate Brandywine, being under Commodore Decatur when, after peace had been made with England, he thrashed the Barbary pirates. After his service in the navy, Ephraim W. commanded a vessel in the coasting trade for a number of years. When he gave up the sea he engaged in teaming in Hallowell, and was for some time proprietor of the Central House of that place.

WILLIAM HUNT HODGES volunteered when the war broke out and joined Co. E, 3rd Maine Reg't. His command was in the first battle of Bull Run. He had a sunstroke, on account of the effects of which he was discharged for disability in September, 1861. In 1864 he again enlisted, in Co. A, 16th Maine, and saw active service. He was under Grant in the operations at Petersburg, Va., and was wounded in the battle of Hatchers Run. In May, 1865, he was discharged. He joined the 42nd U.S. Infantry, and remained with this regiment until June, 1867.

Daniel Hodges, during the War of 1812, a child of 6 to 8 years, his father being away in the service of his country, was wont to be sent into the cornfields, after harvest, to glean the scattered ears of corn for the family of 16 children. At the age of 10, he went to his brother Ezra's and remained with him a couple of years. He managed to save up some money and get some schooling between the ages of 15 and 18, studying under Master Locke of Hallowell, a noted teacher of the day. When about 22, he went to Boston and was in the employ of his brother-in-law, Curtis Guild. Then he returned to Hallowell, and engaged for a short time in the liverystable business with his brother Benjamin. He bought an interest in a stage-line and drove a stage between Hallowell and Belfast and between Belfast and Bangor, saving up his money and, before his marriage, buying a nice farm about a mile out of Hallowell with the intention of building on it at a later period. He continued in the stage business until 1834, then sold out his business and bought a liverystable in Bangor. After two years he went on a farm near Hallowell for a year, and then moved into Hallowell Village and kept a hotel. A few years later he experienced religion, and not being able to reconcile rum-selling with his religious principles, gave up the hotelbusiness at a considerable pecuniary loss. He bought a farm two miles from the village and was a farmer for eight years. Failing strength caused him to give up farming and sent him into trade—in Bath, Gardiner, and then Lewiston. But after a few years, disease of the heart developed to a degree which compelled him to retire from all active business. [Daniel F. Hodges.]

Walter Scott Hodges, at the age of 17, volunteered in the Union Army, and served 9 months with Co. A, 23rd Maine Infantry. He re-enlisted and served in the 31st and 32nd Maine regiments, being corporal of Co. D, in the 32nd. He was with the Army of the Potomac in the Wilderness, and in several battles. Not long after the bloody struggle at Spottsylvania Court House, in May 1864, in which he fought, he was taken prisoner, and suffered the horrors of Andersonville Prison for seven months. From his treatment there he never recovered. He was never able afterwards to stand erect and his memory was impaired; and he finally died from the effects

of this terrible imprisonment. [Daniel F. Hodges.]

Martha J. (Owen) Hodges, with her husband, united with the Society of Friends in 1837. In January, 1844, she was acknowledged as a minister, and thenceforward was active in charitable and religious work. She visited the almshouses and prisons and other places of poverty, wretchedness or crime, extending her labors of love beyond the limits of New England, into New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio, as also New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and elsewhere. In her short life she won the love and respect of her neighbors, and was considered to be one of the most highly gifted members of the Society of Friends. In 1849 she attended the Ohio Yearly Meeting, visited the cities of Burlington and Philadelphia, and was engaged for some time within the limits of the New York Yearly Meeting. George Tisdale Hodges, suffering from weak lungs, was kept at home the greater part of the time until he was 21 years old. Hon. William Allen<sup>7</sup> Hodges, when not quite 14 years of age, went to Boston, and there, and in Milton, Mass., Roxbury and other neighboring places, worked as a baker until 1858, when he went to California and spent 2 years, part of the time mining, and part of the time baking. Returning to the East in 1860, he worked at his trade in Roxbury until 1866, with the exception of 5 months spent at McGregor, Iowa, in 1862. He then purchased an interest in a bakery in Quincy, becoming sole proprietor within 2 years. His business became the largest and most profitable establishment of the kind in the vicinity. This business he still (1894) conducts. During his residence in Quincy he has taken active interest in political matters. As a rule his district has been strongly Republican while he is a Democrat; so that his frequent election to office must be taken as evidence of his ability and popularity. He was selectman of Quincy 1872-5, 1877-8, 1880-1, and 1885-7, eleven years —a term of service as selectman equaled by only one other inhabitant of Quincy. In 1874 he was elected representative in the State legislature. In 1876 he was alternate delegate to the Democratic National Convention at St. Louis which nominated Tilden as Presidential Candidate. In 1878 and 1883 he was sent to the State Senate. In 1893 he was elected mayor of Quincy and in 1894, when elections went generally against his party, he was re-elected chief magistrate of his city.

JONATHAN HODGES moved with his parents to Glenville in 1820 and lived there until about 1844. Later he resided for several years in Corinth, settling in 1853 in Wilton, where he passed the remainder of his life. He was a man of marked individuality and left his impress upon the community in which he lived. He was one of the pioneers of Methodism in that section, having joined the Methodist church in 1830, and for 46 years held the position of class-leader in this society.

JONATHAN<sup>8</sup> Hodges is a contractor and builder. After his marriage he went to Bismarck, Dakota, and while there was engaged in building the Capitol. Thence he moved to St. Paul, Minnesota, and formed a connection with the Bohn Manufacturing Company, in whose interest he went to Chicago and helped build the wonderful "White City" of the great Columbus Fair. He was engaged on the Horticultural Building and then had charge of the erection of the

Electrical Building: After the Fair he returned to St. Paul.

MRS. SOPHIA M. (ALLEN) HODGES was daughter of a civil engineer of reputation, residing in Preston, England, for whom John Tyndall, afterwards of world-wide fame, when a young man, carried the chain in making surveys. Her paternal grandfather, Robert Allen, was also a civil engineer. Her maternal grandfather, Samuel Smith, of a family prominent in Preston from the earliest times, was a wealthy cotton manufacturer of Preston, and for 30 years was connected with the municipal affairs of the borough, being councillor for St. George's Ward 17 years, alderman 13 years, borough magistrate 11 years and mayor of the city in 1864. He was a prominent member of the Weslevan Methodist church, and his maternal grandmother, the pious Martha Thompson, had the reputation of being the first convert to Methodism in Preston, through the preaching of John Wesley.

OLIVER MACEY HODGES lived in Scotia for several years after his marriage, and then settled on a farm in Glenville. In 1856 he went to Schenectady, where he kept the City Hotel. In 1859 he moved

LEONARD BACONT HODGES was a prominent man in the Northwestern States, where he was widely and honorably known. He left his home at the age of 13, determined to push his own way through the world, and succeeded in his attempt. He first went to New Haven, Conn., where he found employment in a bookstore. After holding several positions, at the age of 17 he studied civil engineering a short time at Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass., and then spent four years in New York State, surveying, farming and teaching. In 1845 he went to Rockford, Ill., and bought a farm, but did not long retain it. He next went to Wisconsin, whence, after engaging in various pursuits, he proceeded to Iowa and settled at Hardin. In 1851 he was appointed U. S. Deputy Surveyor and did much government work in the Northwest. In 1854 he moved into Minnesota, bought a farm, and founded the town of Oronoco. The Sioux outbreak in 1862 aroused his martial spirit and he raised a company for the Minnesota Mounted Rangers, but was rejected by the surgeons on account of defective eyesight. In 1870, stirred up by what he considered exorbitant railroad tariffs, he became a candidate for the State Senate on an anti-monopoly platform. He was an earnest and vigorous speaker, took the stump and defeated his opponent, although he was a pronounced Democrat and his district was strongly Republican. In 1872 he moved to St. Paul. His zeal for forestry now manifested itself, and from this date until his death, his efforts to impress the State and municipal authorities, and the people at large, with the importance of this subject, were unremitting and fruitful in results. He was practically the founder of the State Forestry Association, organized in 1876, and its Secretary from the beginning until his death. He prepared the original draft of the Timber Culture Act, giving free possession of a quarter-section of government land to any person cultivating thereon 10 acres of trees during 8 years. Among other schemes which he originated was the substitution for snow-fences along railroads of double or triple lines of trees, which answer the purpose equally well while they are beneficial in other ways. The St. Paul & Pacific Railroad adopted the system under his superintendency to some extent and until overwhelmed by financial difficulties. Later the Northern Pacific Railroad took the matter up and employed him during the last two years of his life as Superintendent of its tree plantation with good results. His contributions to the literature of arboriculture were many and valuable and his speeches on the subject were practical and convincing. He was a terse writer and a good speaker. His Manual of Tree Planting, published by the Minn. State Forestry Association, is one of the best works on the subject ever written. He had some hard knocks in the course of his career, but amid all the vicissitudes of life his indomitable courage never failed him, and his unflagging perseverance enabled him to overcome many of the obstacles in his path. He had a kind heart, and liberality was among his prominent traits. [St. Paul Pioneer Press, April 15, 1883.]

When he saw the approach of death, he quietly and calmly arranged his business affairs, gave directions with respect to his funeral services, then said he was ready to go, and died with perfect resignation and composure. CHARLES HODGES<sup>8</sup> LEE, inheriting his father's mechanical talent, became widely and favorably known as a millwright throughout the Mississippi valley. He lived for a number of years in Eau Clair, Wis., and was a resident of that place at the time of his death, but was attacked by his fatal sickness while engaged elsewhere in his trade. He was very popular and by his pleasant, kindly manner won

During the Civil War, while living in Wisconsin, he formed a military band of which his young children were members. This band was intended originally to aid in recruiting, by playing at parades and public meetings. It became so popular that it retained its organization until 1872, when Mr. Hodges removed to Kansas; and even then, being strongly urged thereto, the family continued to furnish music for ten or twelve years longer. He is now (1893) a farmer, having a farm of nearly 500 acres in the Neosho Valley and considerable stock, over all which he still retains the active management.

Samuel' Hodges, when 21 years old, strapped a pack on his back, and with two companions walked from Savoy, Mass., to Newbury, Ohio, where his father had purchased land, and began to make a home for himself there. Going out in the spring of 1817, he returned to Savoy on foot in the late fall or early winter, married, and in the spring of 1818 returned to his new home with his bride, this time making the trip with an ox-team. There the couple lived the life of the pioneer, seeing the wilderness built up with homes, schools,

and churches, and by precept and example aiding in the healthy development of the country.

NATHAN ORSON CALKINS, who married CAROLINE ELIZA8 CARPEN-TER, enlisted Aug. 11, 1862, as private in Co. D, 33rd Wisconsin Inf.; was promoted 2nd Lieut., June 27, 1864, and 1st Lieut., Feb. 28, 1865; mustered out with company Aug. 9, 1865, and reached his home in Wisconsin, Sept. 5, 1865. He served in the 15th, 16th and 17th Army Corps. He participated during 47 days in the siege of Vicksburg early in 1863, and was in the marching and fighting which ended in defeating the Confederate General Johnston at Jackson, Miss., driving him from the State and preventing the relief of Vicksburg. In March, 1864, he was in the Meridian, Miss., expedition under Sherman, and then in Bank's Red River Expedition. Returning to Memphis, he was in the 3-days' fight at Tupelo, Miss. Ordered to Arkansas, he took part in the pursuit of Gen. Price in his last raid into Missouri, and was in the fight at Warrensburg; was then sent to Nashville and took part in the campaign which caused the destruction of Hood's army. In the spring of 1865 he was at the siege of Mobile, where he did his last fighting. He had good health during this long service, was always with his command, took part in 22 engagements, and escaped without a wound. JOSHUA BURNETT HODGES moved to Ohio in 1818 and settled in Mentor, where he remained until 1827, when he returned to Massachusetts and engaged in business. In 1831 or 1832, in company with his uncle, Dr. Isaac Hodges, he organized the firm of Hodges, Sanford & Co., built the Slater Cotton Mill at Adams (now North Adams), Mass.; and ran the mill until 1836, when the firm sold out. He then returned to Ohio and settled in Concord on the farm which was the family home until his wife's death. Then he went to live with his daughter. He was an honest and successful business man, was hospitable and sociable, and always tried to look on the bright side of life. During his long life he was blessed with excellent health. Five days before his death he had a slight stroke of paralysis, and then failed rapidly to the end. [Mrs. Emerette Corvles.

WILLIAM TURPIN COWLES, who married Emerette8 Hodges, is a farmer and a dealer in real estate, owning and managing two farms, and building and selling houses. Erastus Hodges, at the age of 11 years, moved with his father to Newbury, Ohio, and lived on his father's farm until he was nearly 19 years old. He then served an apprenticeship in the wagou-making

trade in Chagrin, Geauga Co. (now Willoughby, Lake Co.), for a year. The next winter, in order to obtain clothes, he cut wood, receiving 18 cents a cord; but the pay was not in cash, which was scarce, but in whiskey, at 12½ cents per gallon, this being the medium of trade at that time. The whiskey was exchanged for the desired clothes. The next year he worked at his trade in Burton, where he became acquainted with his wife. The month following his marriage he settled on a farm which he had bought in Concord. In 1851 he moved with his family to Newbury, where he had purchased the farm of his father-in-law who, with his wife, spent his remaining days with Mr. Hodges. About 1872, Erastus Hodges and his wife, being in poor health, made their home with their son James Henry in South Newbury, where they both died. After his wife's death he became very infirm, being obliged to use crutches much of the time. On the morning of Oct. 18, 1884, he received two strokes of paralysis which proved fatal two days later. He was a scrupulously honest and conscientious man and well esteemed by his neighbors. He was town constable of Concord for 12 years, and held various township offices in Newbury, where he was appointed enrolling officer in 1861. STEPHEN PARKER HARDY, true descendant of a sturdy New England ancestry, is a man of strong convictions and earnest beliefs, but of a gentle kindliness which has kept him from aggression. A lack of bodily strength has been compensated for by keenness of intellect. He early showed a taste for reading and a desire for knowledge. Despite unfavorable circumstances, he gained an education superior to that of the average youth of his day, and for several years was a successful teacher. Later he became a farmer, but never lost his interest in educational questions. His religion is a practical reality, and his belief that of a Methodist of the old-fashioned type. He has always taken a deep interest in public affairs and political issues. Originally a Whig with strong anti-slavery proclivities, he afterwards became an ardent Republican, although his rigid temperance views have led him sometimes to vote with the Prohibition party. AMANDA<sup>7</sup> Hodges was teaching school in Edinboro, Penn. (where she was living with a married sister), when she met Valorous Gage Austin, who had bought a farm in that township. The acquaintance resulted in marriage, and the couple resided on the farm for a couple of years, and then moved to Gainesville where Mr. Austin managed the farm of his father-in-law for several years. The next move was to Mt. Morris, N. Y., where he engaged in the wholesale and retail boot and shoe business for a comparatively short period. His partner died and he sold out and returned to Edinboro, to manage his father's farm. Mrs. Austin's health began to fail, and the family went, by the Doctor's advice, to a warmer climate, selecting Alexandria County, Va., where, in 1852, Mr. Austin bought a farm. Part of the time he worked his farm and part of the time he engaged in building for other people. Among the residences built by him was the famous Montgomery Castle, the property of Postmaster-General Blair, which was destroyed during the war. He had on his farm a saw- and gristmill, and was prospering when the war broke out but, being a Union man, he was obliged to abandon his property and move into Washington. He was appointed foreman of the saw-mill in the U.S. Navy Yard, holding the position until after the close of the war. Mrs. Austin died soon after they were driven from their farm. Mr. Austin married for his second wife Cornelia Renner, moved to a farm in Fairfax Co., Va., in 1877, but moved back 8 years later to Washington, where he remained until his death.

Capt. Manyille Augustus<sup>8</sup> Austin enlisted Feb. 17, 1864, in the 50th Reg't, New York Vol. Engineer Corps, and was at once engaged in active service in the Army of the Potomac under Grant. A part of his duty was on the construction of fortifications before Petersburg during its siege; and among these was Fort Hell, so-called, which was built under a tremendous fire of shot and shell which caused a terrible number of casualties. He was promoted to be a non-commissioned officer and was discharged with his regiment at the end of the war. On his return to Washington he was employed in mercantile business for a short time, but in May, 1866, entered the

District Police Force as patrolman. In November, 1866, he was made acting sergeant, and in January, 1867 full sergeaut. In Nov., 1868, he became Lieutenant, and in this capacity was very efficient in breaking up the many gambling dens which had heretofore flourished in the precinct to which he was appointed. During the Guiteau trial he was in command of the detail at the Court, where an immense crowd strove daily for admittance. On July 16, 1886, he was promoted Captain and is now (1894) the executive officer of the Metropolitan Police Force and the second in command. For a short time he has acted as Major and Superintendent.

ALBERT' Hodges moved to Iowa in the spring of 1861 and settled on a farm, a mile from the town of Weldon, where he still (1894) lives. Here he and two of his children own 450 acres of choice land and raise stock-cattle, horses and large numbers of hogs; besides hay, oats and corn. Of this last crop, with which some 120 acres are planted, they have raised as much as 8,000 bushels in a year. In March, 1872, and again in January, 1894, fire destroyed the farm house and caused a loss which was, however, partly covered by insurance. With this exception, the career of the family seems to have been steadily prosperous.

Harvey Arnold, one of the earliest and largest manufacturers of Adams, was educated at Wesleyan Academy and began the study of medicine with Dr. Isaac Hodges, whose daughter he afterwards married. Ill health compelled him to relinquish his studies and in 1828, as one of the firm of Arnold, Blynn & Co., he began his career as manufacturer. The firm leased a mill, and, being successful, built the Eclipse Mill in 1832. In 1836 Harvey Arnold and his brother Oliver, having a large and increasing business, bought the adjoining Slater Mill, of Hodges, Sanford & Co. In the panic of 1837, on account of the failure of their agents, the firm went into liquidation. But they straightened out their affairs, formed a new firm, hired the Union Print Works in 1843 and thenceforth had a successful career. North Adams was set off from Adams in 1878, and has become more generally known than the parent town.

CAPT. HORACE ISAAC, HODGES entered Williams College in 1838, but on account of poor health was obliged to leave without graduating, and took a sea-voyage to South America. Soon after the death of his first wife, he moved to Northampton and entered the law office of Bates & Huntington, where he remained until 1844. He then practised law in Adams for 3 years, returning to Northampton in 1847 and there continuing the practice of his profession. In February, 1849, he started with a company of men from Northampton and vicinity for California. The party was delayed for weeks on the Isthmus, and he, becoming impatient, took a vessel from Panama to Callao, Peru, and there secured passage to San Francisco, arriving, notwithstanding this duplication of the distance, some weeks ahead of the rest of the party. He went to the gold mines, but his health broke down and he was compelled to return home in November of the same year. He resumed his profession, acquired a prosperous business, and became influential in the local politics of Hampshire County. He held the office of trial-justice, was Judge of the Court of Insolvency and served as county commissioner, discharging all his public duties with ability and credit. In his profession he displayed unusual talent in the preparation, management and general conduct of cases. His knowledge of men was keen, his energy unfailing, and his perseverance indomitable. In society he was noted for geniality, love of fun and strong personal attachments. He was a natural leader of men, and being imbued with feelings of intense loyalty to the Union, when the War broke out he naturally took an active part. On Nov. 26, 1862, he was appointed Captain and Assistant Quartermaster of Volunteers by the President, and assigned to the Department of North Carolina. He was stationed at Plymouth as Post-Quartermaster. In this position he gained a high reputation, being prompt, vigilant, energetic and full of resources. He was naturally daring, and when Plymouth was attacked by a Confederate ram in April, 1864, he volunteered to carry despatches to the Union gunboat *Miami*. He started out in a boat with only one soldier, but in some way the boat was capsized and he was drowned.

SYLVESTER EDMUND' Hodges, coming of age a few days after his father's death, arranged his business, and then enlisted, Dec. 21, 1863, in Co. E, 2nd Reg't Berdan's Sharpshooters. He began active service in the Battle of the Wilderness, was in the fight on the North Anna River, and took part in several other engagements. The sharpshooters were employed chiefly in the work of skirmishing, which

has a maximum of danger combined with a minimum of glory. He was taken very sick, sent to the hospital at Montpelier, Vt., and on recovery was transferred to Co. G, 4th Vermont, 6th Army Corps. He was at Petersburg, Va., when it was captured, and was in the fights on Lee's retreat. He was mustered out of service July 13, 1865. On his return home he lived two years in Bristol, and since then has resided in Lincoln. With the exception of keeping a store one year, he has devoted his time to farming.

Mrs. Lucetta M. (Brown) Hodges is a member of a family which has traced its pedigree back to 1376, through Abraham Browne, who was born in Hawkdon, England, in 1590, came to America and settled in Watertown, Mass., where he was admitted freeman in 1632, and where he held many honorable positions. The house he lived in was standing in 1867 and owned by his descendants. Mrs. Hodges's mother came from a family which lived in Charlestown, Mass., and gave name to a hill which the British troops once found

SILAS HENRY Honges graduated at Middlebury College in 1821, was admitted to the bar in 1825, and practised law in Rutland. He was an exceedingly able lawyer and was rising rapidly in the profession, when he felt it his duty to enter the ministry; and giving up a most promising law business, he employed himself in religious teaching for eight years—from 1833 to 1841—giving his time and labor for little or no remuneration. At the end of this period he resumed his legal practice. From 1845 to 1850 he was Auditor of the State of Vermont. In 1852 he was appointed Commissioner of Patents and went to Washington, but resigned in 1853. In 1861 he was appointed Examiner-in-Chief of the Patent Office and held the position until his death.

George Washington<sup>7</sup> Hodges left Clarendon in 1828, passed 2 years in Buenos Ayres, South America, and in 1831 engaged in business in New York City, which led him to make long stays in England and to travel extensively throughout Europe. At one time he was largely engaged in the iron trade in Vermont and in Pennsylvania. In 1852 he took up his residence in Staten Island. He had a bright mind, a love of books and a wonderful memory. He was a large-hearted, generous and charitable man, and most hospitable to friends and relatives while it was in his power to give to others.

Walters Hodges was for 20 years Inward Freight Manager of the National Steamship Co. in New York City. Leaving this position in 1886, he traveled extensively in Europe, Africa and Australia. He has from time to time contributed many articles to the newspapers. He is now (1894) engaged in work connected with the management of the University Settlement in New York City, which has the reputation of being the most successful charitable establishment of its

class in the country.

EDWARD FULLER HODGES graduated at Middlebury College in 1836, and was admitted to the Bar in 1839 in Rutland, where he followed his profession until 1845, and then moved to Boston. Gifted with natural ability and endowed with remarkable powers of concentration and capacity for work, he became one of the most prominent and successful members of the Suffolk County Bar. He was of counsel in many important patent cases, such as those of the Smith & Wesson revolver, the Goodyear rubber inventions, the sewing-machines and, later, he was engaged in the Sudbury River suits and the European and North American railway litigation. Although possessing a very strong constitution, his assiduous devotion to his professional duties so deranged his health that he was compelled at least twice to seek relief and restoration in foreign travel. These interruptions, were however, only temporary, and he returned to his practice with renewed vigor and continued success.

George Clarendon<sup>8</sup> Hodges was graduated at Harvard College in 1879, then studied law in the office of Evarts, Southmayd & Choate in New York City and at the Harvard Law School, and was admitted to the Bar in Boston in 1883. For a number of years he was in business for himself, having charge of certain properties, but in 1894 he entered the law firm of Godfrey Morse, Hill & Hodges. He has taken an active interest in political matters, was one of the committee whose work elected Colonel Lyman, in 1882, as an Independent to Congress, was one of the founders of the Massachusetts Reform Club, and, in 1884, as assistant secretary of the Committee of One Hundred in Boston, took part, on the stump and in the office, in the campaign which resulted in the election of Cleveland. Since 1884 he has been quietly working for independent action in politics and for good government, but his time has been occupied chiefly in the practice of his profession.

For several years he was clerk in his father's store, but the greater part of his life he spent on his farm. He was a remarkably handsome man, of large stature, fine proportions and good features. He was of a kindly, genial temperament, ever ready to help others, modest and retiring, yet cordial in manner and very popular with his neighbors who recognized and appreciated his business ability and probity. He was town elerk of Clarendon from 1852 to 1857 and representative in 1861 and 1862. The last years of his life he was a sufferer from disease, but bore himself pleasantly and patiently to the end.

Col. Henry Clay Hodges graduated at West Point, July 1, 1851, and was immediately assigned to the 4th Infantry, U. S. A., of which he was successively Brevet 2nd Lieut., 2nd Lieut., and 1st Lieut. He was with his regiment, until 1861, in Wisconsin, California, Oregon and Washington, being employed in the various details of frontier service. Among other duties, he was engaged on the Pacific Railroad Explorations in 1853 and 1854, and in scouting against the Snake Indians and on the Yakima Expedition in 1855. He was promoted Captain, May 17, 1861, and thereafter served in the Quartermaster Department of the army. He was stationed in

New York City until January, 1863, his principal duty being that of equipping and forwarding troops and supplies. While here his extraordinary ability and resources were proved by a remarkable test in the spring of 1862, when he was abruptly called on to provide transportation for Gen. McClellan's army at the beginning of the Peninsular Campaign against Richmond. The movement was decided upon suddenly and without previous warning. The account of the tremendous task, given in the Life of Abraham Lincoln by his Private Secretaries, is here copied, with no other change than the substitution (in the cause of truth and fairness) of the names of the men who really did the work, for the name of the very efficient head clerk who transmitted the orders, and who is mentioned by the authors in accordance with official etiquette and their feelings of friendship. "Capt. Rufus Ingalls and Capt. Henry C. Hodges were charged by the President and Mr. Stanton with the entire task of transporting the Army of the Potomac to its new base [Fortress Monroe] and the utmost diligence was enjoined upon them. Assistant Secretary of War, Tucker, was assigned as the medium of official communications. We shall see that they performed the prodigious task intrusted to them in a manner not excelled by any similar feat in the annals of the world. \* \* It is one of the many grievances mentioned by Gen. McClellan in his report, that this work was taken entirely out of his hands and committed to those of Capts. Ingalls and Hodges; he thus estops himself from claiming any credit for one of the most brilliant feats of logistics [moving of armies] ever recorded. On the 27th of February the orders were received: on the 17th of March the troops began their embarkation; on the 5th of April Mr. Tucker transmitted his final report, showing that there had been transported to Fortress Monroe from Washington, Perryville and Alexandria, 121,500 men, 14,592 animals, 1,150 wagons, 44 batteries, 74 ambulances, besides pontoon bridges, telegraph materials, and the enormous quantity of equipage, etc., required for an army of such magnitude. The only loss is 8 mules and 9 barges, which latter went ashore in a gale within a few miles of Fortress Monroe, the cargoes being saved.' He is certainly justified in closing his story with these words: 'I respectfully but confidently submit that, for economy and celerity of movement, this expedition is without a parallel on record.' The means by which this work was done were as follows: 113 steamers at an average price per day of \$215.10; 188 schooners at \$24.15; 88 barges at \$14.27." The whole of the details of getting together and fitting out this large fleet, drawing up the charter-parties, obtaining crews, providing fuel, water, food, forage and numberless other supplies for the army during the voyage, and of taking the vessels to Washington, was done by Capt. Hodges in less than 18 days. Capt. Ingalls then took charge and had the whole force transported to their destination in 18 days more. The final report of the accomplished task was officially rendered 37 days after orders were issued. It seems hardly credible that a President of the United States. who had himself served in the war, could be induced to jump an inferior officer over the heads of such men as these; but under political influence this thing was done, more than 20 years after the war, and one of these modest, fair-minded and brilliant soldiers, who performed a feat "without a parallel on record," was thus prevented from

attaining the military rank he more than merited.

On Jan'y 1, 1863, Capt. Hodges was appointed Quartermaster of the Centre Grand Division of the Army of the Potomac with the rank of Lieut.-Col. He was Chief Quartermaster of the Army of the Cumberland in the Tennesee Campaign (Aug. to Nov. 1863), and was engaged in the battle of Chickamauga, Sept. 19 and 20, 1863. In 1865 he established a depot of supplies at Morehead City, N. C., for Sherman's army on its march from Savannah to North Carolina. Later he was Chief Quartermaster at Mobile, Ala., and at New Orleans. He was brevetted Major and Lieut.-Colonel, U. S. A., March 13, 1865, "for faithful and meritorious services during the Rebellion;" Major, July 29, 1866; Lieut.-Col., May 29, 1876; and Colonel and Assistant Quartermaster General, Oct. 19, 1888. He goes on the Retired List, Jan'y 14, 1895. On June 6, 1890, he and his wife were seriously injured in a railroad accident on the Louisville & Nashville R. R., between Cincinnati and Nashville. His right leg was broken and he was severely bruised. His wife was so terribly cut and crushed about the head and shoulders that, for a time, she was not expected to live. [A. D. Hodges, Jr.]

Annie (Abernethy) Hodges was daughter of Gov. George Abernethy, who was a native of New York City and for many years a prominent merchant there. He was involved in the panic of 1837, but settled up his business honorably, parting with all his property in order to do so. In 1839 he went to Oregon with the Indian Mission of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He resided a short time in the Willamette Valley, near the site of the city of Salem, and then went to Oregon City where he entered into mercantile business and prospered greatly. He owned ships and established trade with the Sandwich Islands. He was the first Governor of Oregon, served one term in an admirable manner, and was re-elected; but before his second term had expired, Joseph Lane came to the Territory with a commission as Governor from the Federal authorities, and Gov. Abernethy turned over to him the direction of affairs. By his disinterested and well directed efforts, Gov. Abernethy contributed largely to the prosperity of Oregon, and after a useful and honorable life, died, sincerely lamented by his fellow citizens, in Portland in 1877.

JOHN MARSH WADHAMS is a farmer. He has held all the town offices in Goshen, and has served three terms as representative and one term as senator in the State Legislature.

FREDERICK ALLEN LUCAS enlisted as private in Co. C, 19th Conn. Infantry, Aug. 8, 1862, was promoted corporal in September and sergeant in April. He was promoted sergeant-major of the 2nd Conn. Heavy Artillery April 6, 1864, Lieutenant of Co. B, Feb. 16, 1865 and was commanding officer of his company until the muster-out, Aug. 18, 1865. He was in every battle in which his regiment took part: — Spottsylvania, Tolopotomy, Hanover Court House, Cold Harbor, Petersburg, Winchester, Fisher's Hill, Hatcher's Run, Sailor's Creek, Appomattox. He was badly wounded at Cedar Creek with a rifle ball through his left thigh, and at Hatcher's Run a piece of a shell struck him on the right hip. He has held all the offices in the gift of his townsmen, who elected him representative in 1869 and 1886, and he was also State senator in 1887–8. He is now (1892) a retired merchant, and the largest land-owner in Goshen.

EDWIN HODGES had a store in Torrington Hollow, Conn., and was also engaged there in the manufacture of brass hollow-ware, of clocks and of cotton cloths. Later he kept store in Wolcottville, Conn. In 1844 he moved to Wisconsin, driving thither a flock of sheep, and located in Elkhorn, which then was a place of about a hundred inhabitants. Here he lived until 1870. He was postmaster from 1849 to 1853 under the Whig adminstration, and for several terms he was elected chairman of the Board of Supervisors. From 1855 to 1858 he was secretary and treasurer of the Wisconsin Central Railroad, and his successor's receipt shows that, on leaving this position, the assets which he turned over amounted to \$1,474,002.40. He opened a general store in 1861 which he carried on with much success for a number of years; but the fall of prices after the war finally forced him into bankruptcy in 1870. He then moved to Neodesha, Kansas, where he kept a hotel for a short time. In 1872 he again turned pioneer and went to central Kansas, pre-empting land three miles from Wellington. Here he lived for a number of years, farming for most of the time. In 1881 he sold out and went to Winterset, Iowa, the residence of his son, where he spent the few remaining years of his life. He had been township trustee in Kansas and Master of the Grange in his locality. Before this, while in Elkhorn, he had been Noble Grand of the Lodge of Odd Fellows. He died in Winterset, of cardiac dropsy, after a distressing illness of 8 months. [George W. Hodges.]

GEORGE WILLIAM8 HODGES studied at Beloit, Wis., but before the time came for graduating, he volunteered in the service of the Union, enlisting in the 40th Wisconsin Infantry. He was mustered into the service May 11, 1864, was made corporal, and was discharged Sept. 21, 1864. After living in various places he settled in Hutchinson, Kansas, where he is engaged in the drug business. He has taken much interest in the family history, and has rendered valuable help

in the preparation of this book.

Levi<sup>7</sup> Hodges was a farmer, and lived on the homestead of his father. HENRY WILLARD' HODGES, corporal Co. E, 18th Mass. Vols, was mustered into the U.S. service Aug. 24, 1861, and was discharged Dec. 31, 1864. Until May, 1864, he served continuously with his company. In 1862 he was in the Peninsular Campaign, at the second battle of Bull Run, at Antietam and at Fredericksburg. In this last battle he was wounded by a shell, but although incapacitated for a time for active service, he refused to go into the hospital. In 1863 he was in the battles of Chancellorsville, Gettysburg (the last two days) and Rappahannock Station. In May, 1864, with his regiment he started into the Wilderness under Grant. In one of the first fights he was taken prisoner, and sent first to Danville and then to Andersonville prison. He remained in the last place 4 months, but the horrors of the prison were somewhat alleviated in his case by the fact that he was appointed acting sergeant for the distribution of rations, and for this service was allowed one extra ration, whereby he obtained daily two small meals (if these can be called meals), and thus avoided absolute starvation. When Kilpatrick appeared near Andersonville, he and other prisoners were sent to Florence prison, S. C., and after 31 months in this place, he was sent North, arriving in Boston Jan'y 1, 1865. After his return he resumed his trade of carriage-painter, at which he still (1892) works.

JOHN DAGGETT' HODGES was baptized Zephaniah, but changed his name when he left home to make his own way in the world. At an early age he went West, and became one of the leading pilots on the Mississippi River. He held the position of Pilot and of Captain on the Mississippi, Red and Yazoo rivers, was widely known throughout the Mississippi Valley, and was on terms of friendship with many of the leading men of that section. Among his friends was the afterwards-famous author Mark Twain (Samuel Clemens), who was a fellow pilot; also Gen. Frank P. Blair and B. Gratz Brown, both later candidates for the Vice-Presidency of the United States. Capt. Hodges, besides running his steamboats, also engaged in the grain business, shipping between St. Louis and New Orleans. He married twice, the first time in 1847, but his wife died very soon after marriage, and as it always pained him to refer to this grief, her name has been forgotten. He made his home in St. Louis until 1861 when, his sympathies being with the South, he moved to New Orleans. Here his well-known friendship with Gen. Blair led to his arrest by the Confederate authorities, but he was at once released through the efforts of his Southern friends, remaining under arrest only one hour. He piloted steamers on the river inside of the Confederate lines until commissioned, on April 23, 1862, Pilot of the Confederate gunboat Arkansas. On July 15, 1862, the gunboat was ordered from Haines Bluff to Vicksburg, and fought her way thither against heavy odds. While running past a Union battery, a cannon ball shattered the pilot house and wounded Capt. Hodges so severely that he died four days later. [Mrs. Ann Hodges.]

Mrs. Ann (Smith) Hodges was born in the house of her maternal great-grandfather Bach, a house built about 1720 in Shirley, which is a village a dozen miles from Stratford-on-Avon, and the residence of her maternal ancestors for many generations. Her paternal grandfather Smith owned a place adjoining the estate of Shakspeare. On the death of her husband, with a courage and ability worthy of her ancestors and of the family into which she had married, Mrs. Hodges undertook the care and maintenance of her little family, and supported her children through the times of peculiar trial at the South after the war, and until they could care for themselves.

George Inwood was one of the first pioneers of California. Born in England, he came to New York City when 21 years of age, and after a short stay there, went to New Orleans, and, later, to St. Louis. In 1846 he started with a party for California. When at the Platte River they received the news that war had broken out with Mexico, and this information hastened their steps-luckily, as it proved, for immediately after their crossing the Sierra Nevada and arrival in Sacramento, a terrible snowstorm occurred, and the party next behind them was caught in the mountains and perished. Inwood and his party were called on to volunteer under Col. John C. Fremont, and the greater part enlisted, he and others serving in a battalion of mounted riflemen. For his service he was afterwards granted a pension, but when discharged at the end of the war no payment for service was made. He went to San Francisco and bought a 50-vara lot on the S. W. corner of Powell & Union streets. In 1849 he left the city for the gold mines. He was successful in mining and before long returned to San Francisco with sufficient gold dust, as he thought, to build a good house on his lot and to maintain himself in affluence for the rest of his days. His expectations were not wholly realized, owing in great measure to his too great liberality in loaning to a religious society, of which he was an enthusiastic member, a large sum of money without strict legal security, on the verbal promise of the pastor and the society. The loan was not repaid.

WILLIAM HENRY<sup>8</sup> KENNEY enlisted Oct. 7, 1861, in Co. D, 30th Mass. Vols., re-enlisted Jan'y 2, 1864, and was discharged July 5, 1866, on expiration of term of service, having served 4 years and 9 months. His regiment was sent first to the Gulf Department, and here he was in the fights at Baton Rouge, Clinton Plains and Plains Store, Port Hudson (where he volunteered in the "Forlorn Hope") and Rocks Plantation. Later his command was ordered to Virginia, where he took part in the battles of the Opequan, Fishers Hill and

Cedar Creek. The campaign in Louisiana told severely on his health, as on that of so many of his regiment, which was the last Massachusetts volunteer organization to be discharged from the service.

Francis Gardner' Hodges, in 1863, began making bracelets in the corner of a barn on North Main Street, Mansfield. He worked at first on a very modest scale, and his machinery was driven by horse-power. He increased his business slowly but steadily for a couple of years; then, having seen some specimens of horn jewelry, he made samples from cattle horn, which he took to New York City and displayed, and was successful in interesting others in the subject. He formed the firm of Kingman & Hodges, and entered upon the manufacture of horn jewelry in Mansfield. The goods sold readily and the business quickly outgrew the capacity of the barn. The "Middle Factory" on the Rumford River was purchased, and the manufacture was continued successfully on a very large scale until about 1876, when the demand for this style of ornament ceased, and the business took the shape of manufacturing various styles of jewelry in which he is still (1894) engaged.

EMERSON' Hodges graduated at Dartmouth College in 1849, and read law in an office in Rochester, N. Y., until admitted to the Bar in 1852. He then went to Fond du Lac, Wis., and practised his profession for four years, during two of which he was Superintendent of Public Schools. On account of poor health, in the spring of 1856 he removed to Olmsted County, Minn., and engaged in farming, doing also such law business as his neighbors required of him. He was very active in politics when his health permitted. He was elected to the State Senate in 1857, and after serving his term of two years, was immediately re-elected. In 1864, being appointed to a clerkship in the office of the Second Auditor of the Treasury Department, he moved to Washington, D. C. He held his position for 22 years, and then engaged until his death in the practice of his profession, making a specialty of Patent law. He died at his home of acute pneumonia. [Vernon E. Hodges.]

In the same assault on Marie's Heights in which his brother was killed, he was wounded, a piece of a shell striking his leg. He was sent to the Carver hospital at Washington, and his wound proving troublesome for a long time, he was transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps, Sept. 12, 1863, and discharged March 4, 1864.

Jesse<sup>3</sup> Comstock volunteered at the first call for troops in April, 1861, and went to the front in Co. D, 1st R. I. Infantry. His regiment was in the reserve at the Battle of Bull Run, July 21, 1861. During the panic, the men of a New York regiment rushed wildly through the lines of the First Rhode Island, knocking over some rifles, one of which was discharged, the ball passing through Jesse Comstock's knee. He was taken to the hospital at Sedley church, and there fell into the enemy's hands. He did not receive the necessary attention and care, and died from lock-jaw 10 days later. Samuel Wales Hodges was born under the torrid sun of Africa in the Cape Verde Islands. The climate and conditions of his native place proved fatal to his brothers, who all died in infancy, and were very injurious to him. To save his life, when he was 2 years old, he was sent to Massachusetts in a sailing vessel, in charge of a colored nurse. Through her good care he arrived in New England in tolerable health, after a long voyage, during which he was fed principally on the milk of a goat which was taken on the vessel. He was brought to Stoughton, where he attended school during boyhood. Then he studied a year at the Academy in Wrentham, and after this began his business life in Boston in the store of Samuel Wales, with whom he remained 3 years. From there he went to North Bridgewater, as clerk for Tyler Cobb, and 2 years later went to Kendall's Mills, Me., where he married and engaged in business during 3 years. Returning to Stoughton he was employed in his uncle's store for 2 years and then bought his uncle's woolen-yarn business, forming the firm of Tuck & Hodges which ran the mill for 10 years and then

sold out. He next went to Boston and engaged in trade, principally in furnishing regalias to secret societies, with many of which he was prominently identified. He was especially interested in the Sons of Temperance, of which order he was Grand Scribe for many years; and he labored incessantly in the cause of temperance, becoming known for his good works throughout the country. He joined the Odd Fellows of Stoughton in early life, was a charter member of Mt. Hebron Encampment, and became a Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. He took nearly all the degrees of the Masonic Order, and was Secretary of Mt. Zion Royal Arch Chapter of Stoughton at the time of his death. He was also a member of the Golden Cross, and of the Stoughton Grenadiers. While living at Stoughton he was a member of the school committee and town auditor, and was regularly elected moderator of the annual town meetings year after year; and while a resident of Boston he served in the Common Council of that city in 1866 and 1867. He was a man of decided ability and marked characteristics. Generous, kind and patriotic, actively interested in those matters which he believed to be for the good of his fellow-men, setting aside in great measure his private interests for the benefit of many, his life was one of active usefulness, and his death was a loss to the community. James Arthur Hodges left home when very young and went to the West to earn his living. In August, 1862, he enlisted as private in Co. K, 21st Wisconsin Vols., and was soon promoted sergeant, and then first sergeant. He was in the battle of Perryville, Ky., and the fight at Jefferson, Tenn. (the day before the battle of Murfreesboro), in which fight he was taken prisoner. He was sent to Libby Prison, but after some months was released and returned to his command, and was in the battle of Chickamauga. His health became seriously impaired, and in March, 1865, he was transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps, and was mustered out at the end of his term of enlistment, July 2, 1865. Before the war he had gone into the commission business at Manitowoc, as a member of the firm of Johnston & Hodges. After his return, in a great measure on account of impaired health, he took a position as clerk on the Goodrich line of steamboats on Lake Michigan. His steamer caught fire and was burned near Waukegan. Nearly a hundred persons lost their lives, and only 3 escaped.

LEONARD MORTON HODGES lived in his native town until he was 21 years old. He then went to Canton, a year later to Boston, and, after his marriage, to Providence where his wife and child died. He next went to New York City, and obtained a position with the American Express Co., which became afterwards the U.S. Express Co., remaining in this employ until the Erie Railroad took control of the express business of its own lines. After his second marriage, he lived a short time in Jersey City, and then in Oswego, N. Y., but before long went to St. Louis, where he was engaged as conductor on the Ohio & Mississippi R. R. In 1857 he removed to Peoria, Ill., and resumed his trade of carpenter. Mary' Hodges, after attending the public schools of her own town, spent a year at the Friends' School in Providence, R. I., and then taught for several years. Having married, she carefully trained her boys, teaching them to live good lives, and making them total abstainers from stimulants and narcotics. In addition to performing well the duties of wife and mother, she has had strength and ability to do acts of kindness and usefulness outside of her own immediate family circle. She has furnished genealogical and other data of value to various works, and to her the compilers of this record are indebted for many facts and many deeds of kindness. She is a thorough-going Prohibitionist and has rendered efficient aid to the

cause in which she heartily believes. Up to within a few months she has been able to work and to travel, to attend the conventions of the Womens' Temperance Unions, and to actively help in various lines of good work. In the summer of 1894 she fell and fractured her hip-bone, but is recovering therefrom, aided by her will, energy

and spirit of unfailing cheerfulness.

Job Sherman served an apprenticeship of 4 years with Gen. Stephen Leach in the iron-foundries in Foxboro, Chelmsford and Walpole. His remuneration was \$100 each year and board, with an allowance, which he always refused to accept, of one half-pint of rum and molasses daily. After the apprenticeship was ended, he worked for a number of years in foundries, and then settled as farmer in Foxboro. Here he led a quiet, industrious and successful life. He was a strong advocate of total abstinence. He was elected, at different times, to the offices of selectman, assessor and school-committeeman, and held other positions of trust and responsibility.

ZEPHANIAH, Hodges was a printer by trade. He worked at this business for a number of years, and then entered the large tack factory of A. Field & Son. With his father he engaged in the manufacture of wooden knobs, having a factory adjoining the homestead on Walker street, Taunton. After wooden knobs of this kind became obsolete, the factory was used as a sawmill. In 1875 he was member of the Common Council of Taunton. GEORGE DE LA TOUR' HODGES volunteered and was mustered Nov. 9, 1861, into the U. S. service as private in Co. G, 29th Mass. Infantry, and was promoted corporal. The regiment had a very long record of battles in Virginia, Mississippi, Tennessee, and again in Virginia, and he experienced more than the usual number of casualties. During the fight, March 8, 1862, between the Merrimac and the Cumberland at Newport News, while working one of the large guns of the shore batteries, he received a severe shock, which caused serious trouble later. At the battle of Antietam, Sept. 17, 1862, he was struck by a spent ball and rendered unconscious for a time, but recovered and took part again in the fight. He was with his regiment in all its many battles until a few days after the fights at Jackson, Miss., July 11-16, 1863, when a severe sunstroke sent him to the hospital at Covington, Ky., and produced such serious results that he was transferred to the 27th Regiment of the Veteran Reserve Corps, and stationed at Lebanon, Ky., doing duty as train guard and other light services. While guarding a train, he was again wounded, being fired on from an ambuscade, and receiving five buckshot in his leg, some of which were never extracted. He was mustered out of the service Jan'y 1, 1865, and has since engaged in the jewelry and the straw business. But the injuries received in the service have since caused him much trouble, resulting in severe pains in the heart and partial loss of sight.

Rev. Joseph Hodges was a man of unusual modesty and simplicity of mind and clearness of intellect, endowed with deep convictions and great tenacity of purpose, genial and liberal in his treatment and judgment of others, but stern in the ideas of his own duty. His natural abilities, his friends believed, were sufficient to make him famous, but his strict sense of right and wrong never permitted him to seek popularity at the expense of justice, or by deviating a hair-line from truth and fairness. At an early age he decided to devote himself to the ministry, for which he prepared himself by a course of study at Waterville College (now Colby University), where he graduated in 1830, followed by a 3-years' course at the Newton Theological Seminary, where he graduated in 1833. Entering upon his life-work, he became pastor, successively, of the Baptist churches in Weston, Amherst, Coleraine, Three Rivers (Palmer), East Brookfield and Oxford, giving always his most conscientious efforts to his charges, and never sparing himself. six years of his life previous to his final illness were devoted to an agency of the American and Foreign Bible Society, in which position he worked so untiringly and devotedly, that he broke down a frame unusually strong and vigorous, and sowed the seeds of a painful disease. His last days were days of great physical suffering, borne with unmurmuring patience and tempered by his faith and belief in a life beyond the grave. [The Watchman.]

JOSEPH<sup>8</sup> Hodges enlisted, early in 1861, in a company raised in Cambridge, Mass., and called the Williams Light Guard, but as no Massachusetts regiment was then being recruited, the company offered its services to the State of New York, was accepted, left Cambridge in June, 1861, and was enrolled as Co. D, 5th Reg't of Sickles Brigade, afterwards known as the 74th N. Y. Infantry. He served with his regiment, which did hard fighting, and was called the "Bloody Fifth of Sickles Brigade." In a charge at the battle of Williamsburg he was terribly wounded, and died the same day, sending word to his father and mother that "he died doing his duty," and bidding them therefore not to grieve. \[ Gilbert Hodges. \]

ALFRED BAYLIES' Hodges was enrolled as private, Co. F, 4th Mass. NATHANIEL WILLARD Hodges, when only 12 years old, went to work in a large cotton-factory, and remained there until 1832 when he went with his parents to Western New York. When his parents moved again, in 1835, to Ohio, he went with them; but after a couple of years he went back to New York, stopping in Chautauqua County, where he married and lived a year after his marriage. He then settled in Franklin County, Ohio, and in 1843 took up his residence in Delaware County. In 1850 he crossed the Plains on a trip to California, returning after a stay of nearly two years. He owns 183 acres of land nicely situated on the right bank of the Scioto River in Radnor township, and is one of the most successful breeders of short-horn cattle in the county. Commencing as a poor boy, he has made his own way, and living a temperate and industrious life, has been very successful. Politically he has been identified with the Whig and the Republican parties, but of late years he has voted with the Prohibition party and has worked earnestly in the temperance cause. He and his wife are deeply interested in religious matters, and are both active members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

CLARISSA ALMEDA<sup>7</sup> Hodges came with her parents to Ohio in 1832, and in 1835 to Geauga County. EDMUND ANTHONY was a printer and publisher. During his residence in Taunton he published the Taunton Reporter, from 1828 to 1832, and the *Independent Gazette* (called, after a few years, the *Bristol County Democrat*), from 1832 to 1849. In 1849 he sold his paper and moved to New Bedford, and there founded a new paper, the Standard, which proved very successful, was issued in a daily and a weekly edition by him until his death, and still (1892) is continued by his children and grandchildren. Danforth Comstock Hodges, being of rather feeble health when a child, was sent at the age of 8 years to a school in Lanesboro, Mass., among the Berkshire hills, and remained there and at Northboro, Mass., for 4 years. He then came back to his city home, and graduated at the Providence High School in 1847. When the family moved to Roxbury, Mass., he began his business career in the neighboring city of Boston in the drug store of J. A. & W. Bird & Co. He afterwards entered the employ of Peirce & Bacon, commission merchants, whose business, being with the Southern States, came nearly to an end when the war broke out in 1861. He was later a member of the firm of George Blackburn & Co., cotton manufacturers, and is at present (1894) auditor and trustee of the Roxbury Institution for Savings. He has never possessed vigorous health, and was not accepted by the doctors when he desired to volunteer in 1861. He is a member of St. James Episcopal Church of Roxbury and Clerk of the parish.

Dr. Almon Danforth<sup>8</sup> Hodges graduated at Harvard College in 1889 and immediately entered the Harvard Medical School, receiving the degree of M. D. in 1893. He spent the greater part of two years in Europe, studying medicine in Berlin and Vienna, and in 1894 began

to practise his profession in Boston.

Almon Danforth Hodges Jr. graduated at Harvard in 1864, spent a year at the Lawrence Scientific School, and then studied 3 years at the Royal Mining Academy at Freiberg, Saxony. In 1869 he went to San Francisco, Cal., and for a couple of years was junior editor of the Mining and Scientific Press, being also recording secretary of the California Academy of Sciences, and a founder of the San Francisco Art Association. In 1871 he went to Nevada, and beginning as workman in a mill, rose step by step to the position of superintendent. This practical apprenticeship lasted about eight years, during which hs had experience in mining and treating ores of gold, silver, lead, copper, cobalt and nickel, and in manufacturing sulphuric acid, bluestone, copperas and borax. He invented a process of refining the very coppery bullion of the Comstock lode, which up to that time had baffled all the efforts of the refiners, and his process has been in successful operation ever since. In 1878 he was appointed millsuperintendent for the famous Cerro de Pasco silver mines of South America, built a very large and complete mill and took it to Peru. The war between Peru and Chile putting a stop to all mining operations, he returned to San Francisco in 1880, and opened an office as consulting mining engineer. For several years he was busy examining and opening mines in Utah, Nevada, California, Arizona, New Mexico and Mexico. When his wife died he withdrew from active business, although he has since had charge of two of the largest mining examinations ever made. The first, in 1886 and 1887, for a powerful New York syndicate, was the examination of the Cerro de Pasco Mining District in Peru, which occupied in all nearly two years, employed as many as 60 or 70 men at a time, and cost nearly \$100,000. The second was again in Peru, in 1888 and 1889, and included among other properties, the Nueva California gold placer, a claim covering 41 square miles, with banks miles in length and as much as 300 feet in height. He volunteered during the war and went out in 1862 as private in Co. G, 44th Mass. Inf., doing much detail service and being promoted acting corporal or sergeant on each detail. In 1864 he went out as 2nd Lieut. of Co. D, 42nd Mass. Inf.; was at one time Acting Battalion Quartermaster; at another, Commander of the Odd Fellows Military Prison in Alexandria, Va.; at a third, A. A. Adjt.-Gen. and Military Pass Officer, staff of Provost Marshal General, Defences South of the Potomac; and practically for the balance of the time in charge of foraging and skirmishing parties outside of the lines. He had his cap shot off his head on one occasion and was knocked over on another, but escaped with mere scratches.

Bertha Louisa (Bernard) Hodges was of medium height, wellproportioned, with a clear white complexion, eyes gray or blue in varying lights, long black eyelashes and eyebrows, and a wealth of iridescent light brown hair which fell in soft thick masses below the

knees. Possessed of a charming face in which, despite her happy nature, there was a tinge of sadness and a maturity far beyond her years, she was attractive to persons of all ages. She excelled in the domestic virtues, could cook anything and everything, was a beautiful needlewoman and had exquisite taste in dress. Her home interests were her chief consideration, and on her husband and child she bestowed unstinted love and care. Modest and retiring, as simple and pure-minded as a child, sweet and womanly in her ways, she had other qualities, disclosed only when occasion required, which appeared remarkable by contrast. She developed a power of insight such as is possessed by only a few. With one quick glance she saw every detail of external dress and apparently much of the internal nature. She had an unusual ability for aiding those who were in trouble, and women of twice her age were wont to come to her with their sorrows, going away comforted and helped. With infinite tact she brought peace and prosperity to more than one unhappy family, and reunited homes which had been sadly divided. Even the power of drink yielded under her influence. She did not lecture or chide, but divining some strong and healthy desire, in unseen ways she set this in successful opposition to the thirst for liquor. She acted always so quietly and modestly that members of her own household often did not know the good she was doing. Perhaps the burdens which she so willingly took upon her young shoulders were too great for her strength; for suddenly the mysterious disease, consumption, fastened upon her, and in a few months she passed away. She was of German ancestry. Her maternal grandfather, Dr. Johann Friedrich von Scheenemann, was a prominent physician of Hanover; and his father was a grim old Prussian General, who never forgave his grandchildren for the active part they took in the Revolution of 1848, although his family pride led him to ensure their escape to the United States.

Amory Glazier<sup>7</sup> Hodges was too young to fight for the Union, but he joined a drum corps and marched through the streets during the war, drumming up recruits. age business in the firm of Emery & Hodges. Andrew Bowne<sup>7</sup> Hodges engaged in mercantile pursuits until 1840, when he was chosen secretary of the Williamsburgh Fire Insurance Co., holding this office until elected on the Whig ticket to the position of Surrogate. In 1850 he was Sheriff of King's County, and in 1869 was a member of the New York legislature. In 1853 he organized, and became president of, the Fulton Fire Insurance Co. of New York City, and being well versed in matters relating to fires and fire insurance, and possessing excellent judgment, was a most efficient officer. For 8 successive years he was chosen Chief of the Fire Department of Williamsburgh, and when he resigned, declining further re-election, the members of the department presented him with a beautiful silver tea-service, in testimony of their affection and esteem. He was always interested and useful in local affairs and local politics, and when in the legislature introduced, among other bills the one which provided a paid fire department for Brooklyn. He was an active member of the Republican party, was earnest in urging the necessity of working out purity in politics at the primaries, and never allowed anything to interfere with what he considered his individual duty. He inherited his father's generosity and benevolence, and was constant in charitable deeds. During the famine in Ireland he was chairman of a committee which raised a large sum for the sufferers. All these things made him widely known and loved, and combined with his personal magnetism, handsome face and figure, and grace of manner, made him popular wherever he went. He was an Episcopalian, and for many years an officer of Christ Church, Brooklyn. During the last part of his life, he withdrew from public affairs, devoting his time principally to the care of his estate and to his duties as secretary of the King's County Savings Bank, which he had helped to found. From early manhood he strongly disapproved the general ostentation at funerals and the wearing of mourning garments, believing the fashion to have a very bad effect on the poor who often distress themselves by unnecessary funeral display. When he knew that his own death was near, he directed that the services at his burial should be simple and without lavish show of flowers, setting an example which has been much followed. THERON NORTON HUDSON, formerly a carpenter and builder and of later years an accountant, was Quartermaster's clerk at Chattanooga,

Tenn., in 1864, and census marshal in 1870. His grandfather, David Hudson of Goshen, Conn., bought quite an amount of "Fire Land Scrip," and in 1800 located in what is now Hudson, Ohio, known then as a portion of the Connecticut Reserve. He took his family, among them Milo Lee Hudson, a lad of 9 years, in an open boat up Lake Erie, and landed one night at dusk at the mouth of Cuyahoga River, where there was a single log house on the site of the now flourishing city of Cleveland. Here they camped. During the night there occurred a heavy fall of rain, the river overflowed its banks, and by morning the family were drenched and their beds were affoat. The family, with three or four others, moved into the wilderness, 25 miles from any other white settlement, and opened up their own roads. They depended in some measure upon their aboriginal friends for their supplies, and not unfrequently were obliged to carry their provisions long distances upon their backs. Shortly after their arrival, David Hudson's youngest daughter was born — the first white child born on the Reserve. She lived to be 93 years of age, and died in April, 1893, the last survivor of the early settlers of Northeastern Ohio. [Theron N. Hudson.]

Rev. George<sup>8</sup> Hodges was graduated at Hamilton College in 1877, and then studied theology at the Berkeley Divinity School in Middletown, Conn. Soon after graduation at the Divinity School, he was appointed assistant minister of Calvary Episcopal Church, Pittsburg, Penn., becoming rector of the church when the former rector was consecrated bishop. He passed 10 very busy years at Pittsburg, laboring constantly and successfully in his large and steadily growing parish, and gaining a wide reputation among the clergy and laity. In addition to his multifarious parish work, he published The Church Catechisms in Forty Lessons; The Creed, The Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments in Forty Lessons; Beside the Cross; and a number of separate sermons. During a number of years he furnished for a local paper a sermon every Sunday and a column of religious matter every Monday. His ability and success led to his election, in 1893 as Dean of the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, Mass., which prominent, important and arduous position he now (1894) holds.

GILBERT<sup>8</sup> Hodges, when 16 years old, went to sea before the mast, and lived a sailor's life for four years. In 1870, in mid-winter, he was shipwrecked in the Atlantic Ocean, being rescued from the wreck on his 20th birthday. In 1871 he entered his brother's office and studied civil engineering until 1874. Then he went into the wholesale paper and stationery business, holding a position with a large firm in Springfield, Mass., from 1874 to 1876, and with another similar house in Omaha, Neb., from 1876 to 1881. But his true vocation is evidently engineering, and giving up trade in 1881, he went into the service of the Union Pacific Railway, and was employed in making surveys and locations in Colorado, Wyoming and Kansas. From 1882 to 1887, he was connected with the Boston & Lowell R. R., in the engineering, bridge and building departments, as draughtsman, assistant engineer, and assistant master of bridges and buildings. Having served a thorough apprenticeship in the different branches of his profession, in 1887 he opened an office in Boston for general engineering, making a specialty of railroad engineering, and in this he has built up a large business. Among other works, he had charge of the construction of the arch to replace the noted Bussey Bridge on the Boston & Providence R. R. A large part of his time is devoted to electric railroads, in which line he has been so successful that he counts among his clients upwards of 40 different roads in various parts of the Atlantic States. #### CHAPTER V.

MILITARY SERVICE OF THE FAMILY IN THE COLONIAL WARS, THE REVOLUTION, AND THE CIVIL WAR.

THE following records of military service are incomplete, especially in the Colonial Wars, although many months have been spent in collecting them. Those of the Colonial Wars and the Revolution are derived, with a few exceptions, from the State Archives of Massachusetts, and the authority for each statement is appended [in brackets] in italics.

DEAN, CHARLES FREDERICK 8, No. 524, v.

1st Sergeant, Co. F, 7th Mass. Inf. Mustered June 15, 1861. the battles of Yorktown (April 5, 1862), Williamsburg (May 5, 1862), Fair Oaks (May 31, 1862), picket fight at Fair Oaks (June 25, 1862), Malvern Hill (July 1, 1862), Antietam (Sept. 17, 1862), Fredericksburg (Dec. 13 to 15, 1862), and Marye's Heights (May 3, 1863). Killed by a shell in the last action.

DEAN, DAVID HODGES 8, No. 524, vii.

Corporal, Co. F, 7th Mass. Inf. Mustered June 15, 1861. In the battles of Yorktown (April 5, 1862), Williamsburgh (May 5, 1862), Fair Oaks (May 31, 1862), picket fight at Fair Oaks (June 25, 1862), Malvern Hill (July 1, 1862), Antietam (Sept. 17, 1862), Fredericks-burg (Dec. 13 to 15, 1862), and Marye's Heights (May 3, 1863). Wounded in leg in the last action. Transferred to Veteran Reserve Corps Sept. 12, 1863. Discharged March 4, 1864.

Dean, Williams 8, No. 524, ii. Corporal, Co. K, 4th Mass. Inf. Mustered Sept. 15, 1862. Served in Louisiana. At the siege of Port Hudson and in the assault of June 14, 1863. Mustered out Aug. 28, 1863.

DERBY, ISAAC WALKER, No. 272, xi.

(May 14, 1863), siege of Vicksburg (May 18 to July 4, 1863), Red River Expedition (March and April, 1864), battle of Harrisburg, Miss. (July 13, 1864), and battle of Nashville (Dec. 15, 1864). Thence ordered to Mobile, Ala. Mustered out April 7, 1865.

Jones, David, No. 397.

Private, Co. F, 132nd N. Y. Inf. Enlisted Aug. 18, mustered Oct. 4, 1862. Promoted Commissary-Sergeant. Killed in the service, May 26, 1864, by torpedo explosion on Bachelor's Creek, near Newbern, N. C.

KENNEY, WILLIAM HENRY 8, No. 508, i.

Private, Co. D, 30th Mass. Inf. Mustered Oct. 7, 1861. Served in Louisiana. At battle of Baton Rouge (Aug. 5, 1862), Clinton Plains & Plains Store (May 21, 1863), and siege of Port Hudson (May 23 to July 8, 1863), being one of the volunteers in the Forlorn Hope. Also at battle of Donaldsonville (July 13, 1863). Discharged to re-enlist Jan. 1, 1864. Re-mustered Jan. 2, 1864. Served in Virginia. At battles of the Opequan (Sept. 19, 1864), Fisher's Hill (Sept. 21, 1864), and Cedar Creek (Oct. 19, 1864). Mustered out July 5, 1866.

KENT, HARRISON ADORNO, No. 179, v.

Private, Co. I, 18th Conn. Inf. Enlisted Aug. 6, 1862. Mustered Aug. 22, 1862. Taken prisoner at battle of Winchester, Va., June 15, 1863, and sent to Belle Isle Prison, but soon exchanged. Mustered out June 27, 1865.

1st Lieut., Co. K, 1st Vt. Inf. Mustered May 8, 1861. At battle of Big Bethel, Va., June 10, 1861. Mustered out Aug. 15, 1861. Colonel 7th Vt. Inf. Commissioned Dec. 5, 1861. Served in Louisiana. Mortally wounded at battle of Baton Rouge, Aug. 5, 1862, and died of wounds Aug. 7, 1862.

Private, Providence Marine Artillery, May to Aug. 1861. 2nd Lieut. Co. C, 3rd R. I. Heavy Artillery. Mustered Aug. 1861. At capture of Fort Pulaski, Ga., April 10, 1862, and siege of Fort Wagner, Charleston Harbor, June to Sept. 1863. Resigned Oct. 28, 1863.

SEAVER, JAMES EDWARD, No. 310, iv.

Private, Co. D, 7th Mass. Inf. Mustered June 15, 1861. Promoted Corporal, Sergeant, and 1st Sergeant. Commissioned 2nd Lieut. Nov. 22, 1862, and 1st Lieut. May 5, 1863, acting as regimental Quartermaster. Wounded May 3, 1863, in the assault on Marye's Heights, Fredericksburg, Va. Resigned on account of wound Nov. 1, 1863.

SMITH, HEMAN PAGE, No. 633.

Private, 1st Me. Heavy Artillery. Mustered July, 1863. Promoted 2nd Lieut. Served in 2nd Corps, Army of the Potomac. Was in 5 battles. Wounded before Petersburg, Va., July, 1864. Discharged Aug. 21, 1865.

Private, Co. H, 15th Indiana Inf. Mustered June 14, 1861; mustered out June 25, 1864.

Ass't Surgeon, 2nd Mass. Inf. Mustered June 1, 1862. Surgeon. same reg't, Nov. 7, 1862. Surgeon, 54th Mass. Inf. April 21, 1863. Ass't Surgeon, U. S. Vols., Nov. 1863; promoted Surgeon, Dec. 1863. In charge of military hospital at Gallipolis, Ohio, to end of the war. In charge of Military Hospital at Harper's Ferry, Va., to spring of 1866.

SWEET, LEWIS HODGES7, No. 306, i.

Private, Co. F, 4th Mass. Inf. Mustered Sept. 23, 1862. Promoted Sergeant. Served in Louisiana. Was in the 3 days' fight at Bisland, April 11 to 13, 1863; at Franklin, April 14, 1863; and at siege of Port Hudson. Mortally wounded in the assault on Port Hudson, June 14, 1863, and died of wounds the next day.

THOMAS, LUCIUS BYRON, No. 444.
Private, Co. F, 3rd Vt. Inf. Enlisted Aug. 9, 1862. Served in Army of the Potomac. At the battle of Fredericksburg, Va., Dec. 13, 1862. Soon after became very sick, and discharged for disability. March 10, 1863.

Tobie, Leroy Harmon, No. 626.

Private, Co. K, 10th Me. Inf. Mustered Oct. 4, 1861. Served with his reg't until it was mustered out in 1863. Private Co. G, 1st Me. Cav. Mustered Sept. 13, 1864. Wounded at battle of Dinwiddie Court House, Va., March 31, 1865. Discharged by reason of wound, July 27, 1865.

WESTON, LLOYD, No. 643.

Private, Co. F, 115th N. Y. Inf. Enlisted Aug. 1862. Captured at surrender of Harper's Ferry, Va., Sept. 15, 1862. Parolled; and later served with his reg't at Hilton Head, S. C., and in Florida. Captured at Olustee, Fla., Feb. 20, 1864, and sent to Andersonville Prison, where he died.
