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ARRANGEMENT OF GENEALOGY.

THE following genealogical arrangement recommends itself for its simplicity and facility in tracing relationship. The name occurs twice, as child and parent. Turn to the page designated by the index. The figures at the *left* in the margin denote the page on which the *child* is recorded as a *parent*. The figure at the *right* of the *parent's* name denotes the page on which these names occur as children.

A few old style dates occur previous to 1750, and even later the Puritan year began with March twenty-fifth. Consequently all dates occurring in January, February, and March may be credited to either year. These dates are entered as received. Reference is made to the "Family Memorial," published in 1835, by Mr. Elisha Thayer, Dedham, Mass., for a continuation of family lines other than that of Abraham.

INTRODUCTION.

THE increasing desire of the present generations to know something of their ancestry, and to trace their genealogy back to those who first landed on the shores of New England, is the only *raison d'être* of this little work. If it should be found in any degree useful, the purpose will be answered. The object of the author has been to throw some light on a subject which necessarily very few care for.

“Nothing seems at first sight less interesting or less instructive than a genealogical table, a mere register of names and dates. But each of these names is the memorial of an individual human life, that had its joys and sorrows, its cares and burdens, its affections and hopes, its conflicts and achievements, its opportunities wasted or improved, and its hour of death. Each of the dates of ‘Births,’ ‘Marriages,’ ‘Deaths,’ oh! how significant! What a day was each one of these to some human family, or to some circle of loving human hearts!”

It is not improbable that the arrival of the Puritan fathers in this country will form as memorable an epoch in history, and descendants, in direct line, will take as much pleasure in tracing their ancestry to the New England colonists, as do some of the English people of to-day, in being able to trace their descent from the Normans.

Owing to the hardships and trials which the Puritans endured, the uncertainty of their remaining in this country, and the little time afforded them for recording facts, there are but few families who have a full and complete record of genealogical data. But some items of interest may be gleaned if suitable patience and research are employed in collecting them. Some of our earliest records and memorials are in a state of decay, some names and dates have already become obliterated, some portions lost and probably lost for-

ever. Every effort should therefore be made to preserve these records, and save them from the ruins of time.

The coat-of-arms was granted to the Thayer name in England, and recorded in the Lincolnfield heraldic office.

Burke's "Heraldry," and also Fairbairn's, give the coat-of-arms as follows:

"Co. Essex: Per pale erm. and gu. three talbot's heads erased, counterchanged; crest, a talbot's head erased, per fesse, erm. and gu."

In early times the name was spelled in various ways, Thaire, Thayer, Theyar, Thair, Theyer.

It will be noticed that Abraham Thayer,⁶ pp. 24 and 49, married Lydia Thayer,⁶ of the same name. Her ancestry is given in Part I, back to Ephraim,³ Shadrach,² and Thomas Thayer,¹ p. 17, and through the wife of Ephraim Thayer to John Alden, p. 13.

Part II, page 41, contains the ancestry of Abraham Thayer⁶ back to Richard Thayer.¹ Both Richard¹ and Thomas¹ came from the parish of Thornbury, Gloucestershire, England, about 1640. Col. Abraham,⁷ pp. 26 and 50, son of Abraham⁶ and Lydia (Thayer⁶) Thayer, is the one in whom our interest centers; and the ancestry of his brother Jonathan, pp. 24 and 49, and cousin Gen. Sylvanus Thayer, p. 46, is also given.

PART I.
HISTORICAL NOTES ON THE ANCESTRY OF
LYDIA THAYER.

MEMORIAL SKETCH.

"To live in hearts we leave behind us is not to die."

HON. JOHN ALDEN.

HON. JOHN ALDEN was one of the pilgrims of Leyden who came in the "May Flower" to Plymouth in 1620. This small band of one hundred and one pilgrims, not counting the sailors, had sailed from England long ago, and now from Holland, to seek gold, jewels, conquest, glory? "God forbid," would have been their reply; none of these things did they seek. No! They believed they knew what God was, and how He must be worshiped. They were not permitted so to worship him in England; would have been burned or hung or whipped if they did so worship Him, so they fled to Holland, and were there not molested. But the Dutch did not know how to keep the Sabbath. Their children were growing to be Dutchmen, and no longer Englishmen, and, moreover, a great hope and inward zeal of laying good foundation for the propagation and advancing the Gospel of the Kingdom of Christ in these remote parts, was strong in them. Therefore, they sailed out into the cruel, tempestuous ocean, taking with them wives, children, young and old, not certain what their destination.

Much that is false, and foolish, has been written about them, and mostly in poetry, but these were the main reasons for this strange pilgrimage.

John Alden was about twenty-two years of age when he arrived, and was one of those who signed the original civil compact, formed and solemnly adopted by the first adventurers at Cape Cod Harbor, on the 15th of November, 1620. "He was the stripling who first leapt upon the rock" (Presi-

dent Adams). It is a well-known fact, that of the first company, consisting of one hundred and one, about one-half died in six months after landing, in consequence of the hardships they were called to encounter. For a few years John Alden lived in Plymouth, and then settled in Duxbury, Mass., on a farm which is one of the best in the town, and is a little remarkable that it has remained in the possession of his descendants ever since. He built his house on a rise of land near Eagle Tree Pond, where the ruins of his well are still to be seen.

In Guillim's "Display of Heraldry" the following armorial passage is recorded: "He beareth gules, three crescents within a border, engrailed ermine, by the name of Alden." This coat was assigned Sept. 8, 1607, by William Cambden, clarencier to John Alden of the Middle Temple.

Through a long and useful life, John Alden was almost continually engaged in public employments. He is mentioned as one of the "true and lawful attornies of the Council established at Plymouth, in the County of Devon." He was one of the Court of Assistants in 1633, and successively for a number of years. From 1641 to 1649 inclusively, he was chosen to represent the town of Duxbury in the General Court of the Old Colony. In 1653, and for several succeeding years, he was one of the Council of War, appointed on account of danger apprehended from the Indians. In the year 1650 he was again elected one of the Assistants to the Governor, and every year after till 1686. He was assistant to all the Governors of the Old Colony except Carver. He was for thirty-six years, without interruption, elected to this office.

This venerable and aged Puritan was distinguished by his holy life and conversation. He was a meek, humble, sincere, pious, and faithful follower of the blessed Redeemer, and his end was peace and triumph. The object which in his youthful days he anxiously sought, was fully attained. He came to the "howling wilds of America" to enjoy the sweets of religion, pure and undefiled. Like the saints of old, he was willing to endure hardships with the people of God, while he might be instrumental in extending the kingdom of

Immanuel, and looking to a better and an eternal state of existence for the rewards of grace. In addition to his spiritual blessings, he was crowned with that competence which is "vital to content," with an uncommon length of days, and with a goodly number of children, all of whom delighted in the ordinances of God, and finally left that good name in the world which is better than precious ointment. He married Priscilla Mullins, daughter of Mr. William Mullins, whose answer in his suit for Capt. Miles Standish for her hand, "Prythe John, why do you not speak for yourself," led to "renewed visits, and it was not long before their nuptials were celebrated in ample form." What report he made Capt. Miles Standish after that memorable first interview with Priscilla, tradition does not unfold; but it is said the Captain never forgave him to the day of his death. He had eight children, four sons and four daughters, who lived to enter the marriage state. He died in Duxbury, Mass., in 1687, at the age of eighty-nine years, for many years a Magistrate of the Old Plymouth Colony. A few lines from an "Elegy" on his death, by Rev. John Cotton of Plymouth:

"The guise 'tis of a wanton generation,
 To wish the aged soon to quit their station,
 Though truth it be, the Lord our God doth frown
 When aged saints by death do tumble down.
 What tho' there be not such activity,
 Yet in their prayers there's such fervency
 As doth great mercy for a place obtain,
 And gracious presence of the Lord maintain.

"His mouth was full of blessings till his death,
 To ministers and Christians all; his breath
 Was very sweet by many a precious word
 He uttered from the spirit of his Lord;
 He lived in Christ, in Jesus now he sleeps,
 And his blest soul, the Lord in safety keeps."

Mr. Jonathan Thayer was fifteen years of age when the war of 1812 broke out, and was only deterred from joining the army by the exercise of rigid parental authority. He was too far advanced in years to take an active part in the war of the Rebellion, so that his claims as a warrior, if he were to advance any, must rest upon the fact of his work upon the construction of Fort Warren in Boston Harbor, and his membership in the Old Braintree Militia Co. On April 8, 1888, was celebrated the seventieth anniversary of their marriage—the longest married life on the records of Old Braintree, and this aged couple still live, enjoying the honor, love, and respect of the entire community.

He was a Free Mason of high degree, and is said to have been in character a very proud, high-spirited gentleman, especially in his younger days.

SYLVANUS THAYER, LL.D.,' was b. June 9, 1785; grad. Dartmouth College in 1807; grad. from U. S. Military Academy, and promoted to second lieutenant Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., 1808; served in the War of 1812 as Chief Engineer of the Northern Army; promoted to rank of Major by Brevet Feb. 20, 1815. He was sent by the U. S. Government to Europe in May, 1815, with William McRee of the Corps of Engineers, to examine the French fortifications and to study more thoroughly the science of war as practiced in the army of Napoleon. After a month's voyage they learned that the battle of Waterloo had been fought two days before landing, and in Paris, occupied immediately by the allied forces, they enjoyed the best opportunities for perfecting a military education, while witnessing daily the evolutions of the troops who had routed the legions of the modern Caesar.

On his return to this country, in 1817, he became Superintendent of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, which position he filled so efficiently that he has since been called the father of West Point. With the powerful aid and coöperation of Mr. Calhoun, then Secretary of War, and by his own skill and energy, he triumphed over countless obstacles and achieved the most entire success. He introduced into this Academy the Analytic Mathematics pursued with so much advantage in the French military schools, and made them to be considered what they truly are,—the ground-work of military education. It is said that much of the skill and success which have attended the departments of military and civil engineering, as applied to the defense of our frontiers and the survey of our coasts and harbors, the construction of our canals and railways, may be traced ultimately to the course of mathematical training pursued at West Point. It is worthy of special remark that no changes have been found necessary in the organization and government of the Academy at West Point since the period of Gen. Thayer's connection with it, but everything remains as he established it in 1817. While under his charge the institution numbered 1,631 pupils and 690 graduates. His health at last compelled him at his own solicitation to choose another sphere of service, and he had charge of construction of Forts Warren and Independence from 1833 to 1857, and other fortifications in Boston harbor. During this period he was sent a second time to Europe by the U. S. Government to examine the state of military science and the fortifications on the Continent. He visited France, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Prussia, Austria, Hungary, Greece, and Egypt.

Gen. Thayer was made Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel March 3, 1823; Brevet Colonel March 3, 1833; Lieutenant-Colonel, 1838. The degree of A.M. was conferred on him by his Alma Mater in 1810, and by Harvard College in 1811. The honorary degree of LL.D. was conferred on him by St. John's College, Md., 1839; Kenyon College, Ohio, 1846; by Dartmouth College, 1846; by Harvard College, 1851. He endowed the Thayer School of Engineering at Dartmouth College. His

donations in lifetime to this college are well known as about \$70,000. He also endowed the Thayer Public Library in Braintree. The Thayer Academy in Braintree was founded by him. His own house, in his later years, was on the land where now the Thayer Academy stands. The fund for these purposes is variously estimated at from \$150,000 to \$200,000. A ripe scholar himself, he brought to the discharge of his various functions rare personal qualities. Uniting decision with courtesy, authority with kindness, of integrity and unshrinking firmness, true to his country and himself, he was in no ordinary degree fitted for the station he so long and honorably filled.
