





FOURTH REGIMENT FLAGS.





INTRODUCTORY.

Having been appointed by the officers of the Regimental Association to compile and arrange for publication a roster of the Fourth Regiment, New Hampshire Volunteers, I submit the following work as the result of my labors. To ascertain the dead and locate the living of so large a number of men after over thirty years of separation, scattered not only throughout this country but in distant lands, would be a task impossible if a perfect roster was demanded, but to approach that standard as near as possible is all that I have attempted, and this could not be done were it not that the preparation of this work has been carried on for a long series of years. Great care has been taken to avoid errors. Some have been undoubtedly made. The few weeks given to prepare for the press leaves it not as complete as we could wish, but as it is, a more complete roster, accounting for so many of the original men and volunteer recruits, has not yet been published by any regiment that served in the late war. Several of the original men are unaccounted for, many of them are dead, but we have not been able to secure the re-

cord. Those marked "missing" are nearly all dead, their nearest friends not having heard from them for The fact that some are recorded as having been years. killed in battles or died in places where the regiment was not stationed, is accounted for by reason of the comrades having served by transfer or re-enlistment in other commands. But little can be learned of our recruits. Those who were volunteers, and citizens of our state or vicinity, we have been able to trace. They were good soldiers, a credit to the regiment and state; several of them joining us in our early history and serving through the war. But the long list of bounty jumpers who were sent to fill our depleted ranks, who deserted at the first opportunity, and nearly all serving under assumed names, of such we know but little. Our main effort has been to perfect the roster of the original members and the volunteer recruits who bore the burden and made the record that is accorded to the Fourth New Hampshire Regiment.

There have been added several portraits of wellknown members of the regiment. In the limited time had for collecting and securing cuts, not all of those we wanted could be secured. Those will be provided for in our history. Besides those who held the highest rank, it was thought best to have one from each company, who was one among the many best representatives of such company, and this rule was adopted: Each of the ten comrades selected must have been

connected with the regiment every day of its history, and by a long and creditable record secured wellearned positions of trust and honor. In '61 they carried a gun, and in '65 they wore a sword. The following were selected: Co. A, Capt. John II. Roberts; Co. B, 1st Lieut. Leonard A. Gay; Co. C, Capt. Eleazer L. Sarsons; Co. D, Adjt. Timothy W. Challis; Co. E, 1st Lieut. Charles M. Whiting; Co. F, 1st Lieut. Lorenzo D. Huntress; Co. G, 2d Lient Patrick Dowd; Co. H, Capt. Matthew Adams; Co. I, 1st Lieut. Henry A. Mann; Co. K, Capt. George W. Huckins.

During the past year there has been published by the Adjutant General of New Hampshire, a revised register of New Hampshire soldiers and sailors. It is a valuable work, filled with a vast amount of information of the living and dead, of those who represented the state in the war of 1861 - 65. The expense and limited edition published puts it within the reach of but few. To make more perfect and to correct many errors, this roster is published, making it possible for all the surviving members as well as interested friends to secure a copy to enable them to know the residence of the living and the long list of those who have passed to the camping grounds above. Many comrades, especially those at a distance, will here for the first time learn of the death of a tentmate and "chum" with whom they shared their blanket and rations, bringing to mind recollections of the long ago, when we touched elbows on the weary march, suffered together on the battlefields of the South, languished in hospitals, or endured the tortures of the prison pen.

If this volume is a source of any satisfaction to my comrades living, or is the means of drawing us a little closer together, although widely separated, I shall not regret the labors I have put forth, making possible its publication. I wish to express my sincere thanks to the officers of the Regimental Association who have so earnestly entered into this work, and also to the comrades who have assisted me in collecting the information concerning the living and dead. Whatever errors appear or emissions are made will be corrected in our history which is to follow this. The whereabouts of our unknown comrades will be ascertained for the perfection of this roster, as far as may be possible for the history. I invite the co-operation of all comrades and interested friends.

I am indebted to Mrs. Colomy, wife of Comrade W. H. W. Colomy of Co. F, for the poem on Fort Fisher: also to Rev. Chas. A. Cressy of Morris, Minn., a comrade of Co. E, who has sung to us so appropriately of our old "stand by" the Army Canteen.

COL. THOMAS J. WHIPPLE.

Thomas Jefferson Whipple was born in Wentworth, N. H., Jan. 30, 1816. His father, Dr. Thomas Whipple, was a well-known physician of northern New Hampshire, and served in the U. S. House of Representatives. Col. Whipple was educated at Bradford, Vt., and the Norwich Military University, read law with Hon. Josiah Quiney of Rnmney and Salmon Waires of Johnson, Vt., and was admitted to the bar in 1840, settled at Wentworth, afterwards removing to Meredith Bridge, now Laconia, where all his life was passed, excepting while in the service of his country.

He was commissioned First Lieutenant of the Ninth U.S. Infantry, April 9, 1847, and was soon made Adjutant. He was taken prisoner at Vera Cruz, Mexico, was afterwards exchanged and distinguished himself at the battle of Atlixeo. Adjutant Whipple resigned Feb. 23, 1848, afterwards served in the New Hampshire State Militia. When the Rebellion broke out he was practicing law at Luconia. He at once offered his service to Gov. Good vin, who appointed him Lieutenant Col. First Regiment New Hampshire Volunteers, April 29, 1861. He was

mustered out Aug. 9, and Aug. 20 was commissioned Col. Fourth Regiment New Hampshire Volunteers. He had the honor of commanding the regiment which was the first to land on South Carolina soil after the state had seceded.

Col. Whipple was a model soldier, strict in discipline, but kind and considerate to his men, who admired his military abilities, respected and loved him as their leader and deeply regretted his departure, caused by his resignation, March 18, 1862, at Jacksonville, Fla.

After the war he practiced law at Laconia, where he became one of the leading lawyers of northern New Hampshire.

Col. Whipple died of paralysis, at his home in Laconia, Dec. 21, 1889, aged 73 years, 10 months, and 21 days, universally lamented by his comrades and all that knew him.

FOURTH REGIMENT NEW HAMPSHIRE VOLUNTEERS.

This was the third three-years regiment raised under the first call for 300,000 men. It was organized in Manchester, being the first regiment to eamp in that city. Many of those who served in Co's D and K were enlisted for the Third Regiment, but more than enough had already been secured, and they were sent to Manchester as a nucleus around which very soon gathered those who became connected with this organization. Eighteen of the officers and about one hundred of the men had seen three months service in the First Regiment. The several companies were raised as follows: Co. A, Dover: Co. B, Nashua; Co. C. Manchester; Co. D. Laconia; Co. E. Manchester; Co. F. Great Falls; Co. G. Manchester; Co. H. Salem: Co. I, Derry and Manchester: Co. K. Manchester. All the companies had many men from the towns in different parts of the state. The Manchester Cornet band, Walter Dignam, leader, was secured as regimental

band. Early in September a full complement of menwere secured and a full set of officers were appointed. The first field, staff and non-commissioned staff officerswere as follows:

The organization being completed, arrangements were made for our muster into the United States service.

Then we took our place at Camp Sullivan, Doctor Eastman pronounced us sound. September eighteenth we joined Uncle Sam, And for three long years we were bound.

We were initiated into the duties of camp guard, company battalion drill, dress parade, and the preliminary duties of a soldier's life. Knapsacks were being filled beyond endurance by our relatives and friends. Revolvers and dirk knives were secured in large numbers, that afterwards proved useless. Bibles and Testaments were given to all, and a few were secured which some dared to call by that name that had but fifty-two leaves. Gov. Berry visited us, and in behalf of the state, presented a set of colors, and the state treasurer came and paid us the bounty then offered, which suggests these lines:

Our state's gratitude was put to the test, When we recall those years that are past. She gave cents to the first, who proved the best, And dollars for the worst, who went last.

We thank God the boys to the state were true ! Can the state make a claim quite as fair ? Is ten dollars for the first Boys in Blue, Three hundred to the last, equal share ?

The news from the front and the preparations being made for our departure made us realize that we were about to enter upon scenes that would test our courage and endurance. A very few went home and did not return to leave with us for the seat of war, but thirtynine commissioned officers and nine hundred and ninety-one men, a total of ten hundred thirty, were true and went to the front. We were obliged to go without guns as the supply was not equal to the demand and they were not issued to us until we arrived in Washington. We shall never forget that automn day when we marched down Elm street and boarded the cars for

the South, amid the cheers and waving of handkerchiefs of the crowds on the street, as well as the goodbys and well wishes of our loved ones.

September twenty-seventh, we went away To encounter hardship, danger and strife, The Boys in Blue against the Boys in Gray. Oh! how many were called to give up life!

Comrades, memory's treacherons sometimes, When we recall those years long ago, We'll never forget, 'tis fresh in our minds, When we bid home and loved ones adien.

A few days in Washington and Annapolis and we were aboard the Baltic to live for twenty days and encounter the terrible storm off Hatteras. The death, funeral and burial at sea of a comrade was a sad experience. We sighted land which proved to be our destination off Port Royal harbor, S. C., Nov. 7, and the battle was between our gunboats led by the Wabash, Admiral Dupont commanding, and the forts Beauregard and Walker. Before night had set in the forts are reduced. We landed on South Carolina soil; a few months, and we are on Warsaw island, Ga., then to Fernandina, Jacksonville and St. Augustine, Fla. From March to September the regiment is divided, Companys B, H, and K return to South Carolina for duty under Major Drew. From St. Augustine, Fla., in September we went to Beaufort, South Carolina. We fought the battle of Pocoligo, South Carolina, Oct. 22, '62, when we made the unsuccessful attempt to gain a foothold on the mainland.

FOURTH REGIMENT

After spending the winter in Beaufort and vicinity, we started in the spring of '63 for the siege of forts Wagner and Gregg on Morris island, tarrying for a little while on Folly island. From July 20, 1863, to Feb. 11. 1864, we were on Morris island, South Carolina. Hard actual service was the experience of the regiment. To call it an engagement, does not give any adequate idea of what was accomplished or endured; month after month, night and day under fire, sickness as the result of the exposure adds to the dreadful death rate,-no brief sketch can do justice to what was done through those weary days. At last the Island is taken and Christmas comes and we are encouraged to re-enlist for three years more, but few respond. We return to Beaufort, South Carolina. Col. Bell appeals to the men to enlist for the war and as a result before February closes 400 enlisted for three years more. A short trip to Jacksonville, Fla., and the re-enlisted veterans return to New Hampshire, after an absence of 21% years, for a thirty days furlough. At its close we are sent to Washington, then rendezvous at Gloucester Point, Va., and the Virginia campaign of 1864 commences.

Up the James river we land at Bermuda Hundred, where we come into close proximity with the enemy and so remain until the war is over. With reasonably full ranks we started for Drury's Bluff. For five days we meet the rebel forces and move forward towards Richmond. At Drury's Bluff, near Fort Darling, May 16, we attempt to resist the terrible assault

made upon our lines, and after terrible loss, we are obliged to retreat. The regiment sustains the greatest loss during their service, some companies losing more than half their men. Ever afterwards the regiment was small; comrades were scattered, many never to return. The severely wounded in hospitals, and many prisoners of war, met their death as a result of May With thinned ranks, after this severe loss, the 16. regiment crosses the James and on to Cold Harbor and the defenses of Petersburg, the battle of the Mine July 30, and Deep Bottom August 16, and but a remnant of the old Fourth regiment is left. September 18 the three years men's time expired, and they prepare to go home. Good and true soldiers, the re-enlisted men parted with them as brothers, and their departure was deeply felt, as only those who had been companions in arms for three long tedious years could appreciate. The battles, skirmishes, and siege of Petersburg had so reduced the regiment that at the charge on Fort Gilmore (New Market Heights) September 29, but forty men were fit for duty. As the campaign of 1864 was closing, the regiment was sent on the first expedition to Fort Fisher only to return without accomplishing anything. In January, 1865, they were a part of the second expedition, and on the fifteenth of January successfully stormed the fort and captured it. While seeking rest so much needed, the magazine exploded, and many were killed and wounded. At this battle the idol of the regiment, Col. Louis Bell, 9

was killed. His command had learned to love him by reason of his heroism displayed wherever leadership was needed and duty called. After this brilliant victory, the last pitched battle in which the regiment was engaged, the enemy was driven forward, battery Buchanan captured, and Wilmington, N. C., was taken, February 22, 1865. In March we received back our prisoners taken in Virginia, and learned of the death of many a brave boy who gave up his life, after dreadful suffering, in the prison pens of the South.

Here we also received over three hundred recruits. mostly substitutes. They were not needed, and were too late to be of any service. A few of them did their duty and returned home honorably; but taken as a whole they were a useless, burdensome crowd. What a good many of them did in return for the enormous bounties they received, the long list of deserters on the last pages of this volume will show, and accounts for the feeling that prompted the verses above. A few weeks service in the interior of North Carolina and we reached Raleigh; the war is over, and we patiently await muster out, which occurs August 23, and the next day we started for home in command of Lieutenant Colonel Parker. With feelings beyond expression, we reached Manchester August 27, 1865, and were royally welcomed and entertained, then on to Concord and we were dismissed to report September 2, when we were paid off, laid aside the coat of blue, and entered the ranks of civil life to enjoy the

peace that had and prosperity that was to come to our united country as the result of sacrifices made, and of which we bore a part.

The Fourth New Hampshire Regiment did not have as many men as some other regiments, nor is it claimed that they have a record superior or even equal to some. They are willing that history shall make the record, and abide its decision. We may safely say it served the state well for four long years, over four hundred of its members served twice upon its quota, it was never away from the front during its term of service, only for the thirty days furlough of its re-enlisted men; for over twelve months in front of Charlestown and Petersburg it endured the sieges of those places. To call it only one engagement is wrong; to measure it and try and compute the number of battles it was equal to would require an expert mathematician. The siege of Charlestown or Petersburg means far more than did Gettysburg to many commands who fly it upon their colors, in losses, sufferings, and hardship endured. Suffice it to say, that this regiment from September, 1861, to September, 1865, went cheerfully wherever duty called, and faithfully performed their part in bringing about the victory that finally came at Appomattox.

This brief summary of the regiment is all that space could be provided for in this volume. In our history we purpose to give a full and detailed report of all its doings, and all its members will be given every 20

opportunity to furnish such information as they have to make it complete and reliable.

COL. LOUIS BELL.

Louis Bell was the youngest of nine children, eight sons and one daughter, of the late Gov. Samuel Bell, and was born in Chester, N. H., March 8, 1837. It was a distinguished family, all now deceased. His only sister became the wife of Lt. Gov. Nesmith of Massachusetts. All of the sons were educated professional men, four doctors and four lawyers. His oldest brother, Samuel D. Bell, became chief justice of the state : James Bell, United states senator; Dr. Luther V. Bell, a surgeon in the army, and a long time superintendent of the McLean Asylum for the insane, Somerville, Mass.; Charles Bell, a lawyer of Cleveland, Ohio, who died of disease contracted in the army. Dr. John Bell, late of Manchester, also served in the war.

Col. Bell fitted for college at Derry, and Gilford, N. H., and finished his education at Brown University, Providence, R. I., at the age of eighteen, read law with Judge Cushing of Charlestown, N. H., and Judge Cross of Manchester, N. II., and was admitted to the bar when but twenty-one years of age, and commenced practice in Farmington, N. H., in 1859. He was appointed justice of the police court and soon after solicitor of Strafford county. When the war broke out in

April, 1861, he immediately offered his services and was commissioned captain of Company A, 1st Regiment New Hampshire Volunteers, serving his enlistment of three months, and was mustered out Aug. 9, 1861. At the organization of the Fourth Regiment, he was commissioned Lieut. Colonel and was connected with the regiment through all its long service, until he met his death at the last battle his command was engaged in.

In the winter of '61- 62, while the regiment was stationed at Hilton Head, S. C., he served as inspector general on the staff of Gen. W. T. Sherman. In May, 1862, when at St. Augustine, Fla., he was promoted to the colonelcy of the regiment, succeeding Col. Whipple. Col. Bell was wounded while leading his regiment at the battle of Pocotaligo, S. C., Oct. 22, 1862. During the campaign of 1864 in Virginia, Col. Bell was continuously in command of a brigade, where he distinguished himself as a brave soldier and efficient commanding officer, and if even handed justice had been done him, he would have been made a general in 1864 rather than after he was killed.

In the charge upon Fort Fisher, N. C., Jan. 15, 1865, he led his brigade in that terrible assault, and there on the ramparts of the outer works he received his fatal wound about 5 o'clock in the afternoon, being shot by a sharpshooter, the ball entering his shoulder and passing through his body, and before the sun had risen on the morning of the sixteenth, our Colonel was no more. Death had released him from his sufferings and added his name to our honored dead. No officer ever commanded men, who was more highly esteemed.

We admired him for his nobleness of purpose and uprightness of character. We loved him for his sympathetic nature and his interest in our welfare. We knew him amid scenes where it tested the noblest qualities of manhood and he was never found wanting. Always patient, lovable, sympathetic, he was an officer who lived near his men, was approachable, concerned for all the details of camp life, visiting the sick in hospitals, and saw that they had all the care and comforts that it was possible to obtain.

There was nothing about his appearance that would indicate a soldier, except his commanding physique, destined to win a soldier's crown. In place of a stern look there was a pleasant expression indicative of a heart full of love and gentleness. It was remarkable that one could command a brigade of soldiers and marshal them successfully in battle and always have that evenness of disposition. He displayed no exhibition of temper where sometimes it would seem unavoidable. He ruled the turbulent with a firm hand and where punishment was demanded to secure discipline, he blended mercy with justice. A great sacrifice was laid on the altar of our country in Col. Bell's death. His memory will be cherished by his comrades while life shall last, and his name honored together with that long list of heroes who gave their lives on the battlefield of this republic.

COL. JEREMIAH D. DREW.

Jeremiah D. Drew was born in Brookfield, N. H., July 29, 1821. He resided until 1849 in Brookfield, Newmarket, and Derry, N. H., and Lawrence, Mass., when he went to California, returning in 1851 to Lawrence. Col. Drew served seven years in the Massachusetts state militia, moving to Salem, N. H., in 1860, where he resided when the war commenced. Hastening to Concord, he enlisted April 17, 1861, and was appointed a recruiting officer and raised Company H, of the First New Hampshire Regiment, and was commissioned captain, serving until Aug. 9, 1861, when the regiment was mustered out. He then raised Company H of the Fourth Regiment and was commissioned major. Dec. 1, 1863, he was promoted to lieutenant colonel. After serving three years, he was honorably discharged, Sept. 17, 1864. Returning from the front he located at Lawrence, Mass., where he still resides. Col. Drew has an honorable record of over three years as a faithful officer whose position in the regiment he filled with credit to himself and his comrades in arms. Col. Drew's young son was a musician, and his brother 1st lieutenant in company H. Both are now dead. The Colonel is passing the evening of his days quietly, at his beautiful home at Lawrence, respected by his fellow citizens and honored by those who with him helped to make the history of the Fourth New Hampshire Regiment.

MAJOR CHARLES W. SAWYER.

Charles W. Sawyer was the son of the Hon. Thomas E. Sawyer, and was born in Dover, N. H., May 19, 1832. He was educated in the public schools of his native city and early in life was for a time editor of a temperance journal. At the outbreak of the war he resided in Boston, where he was employed as clerk in the postoffice. He had served on the school board and been a member of the General Court. April 30, 1861, he was offered the first lieutenancy of Co. B, First New Hampshire Regiment, which he accepted, serving till the regiment's time expired.

He was instrumental in raising Co. A, 4th New Hampshire, and was appointed captain, and was made the ranking captain of the regiment. Very often while in the department of the South, he was detailed as judge advocate of the military department and was offered a permanent position as such with rank of major, which he declined, preferring to follow the fortunes of his comrades of the Fourth Regiment. During the many months when we were without a chaplain, Captain Sawyer acted

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as such at the funerals of our deceased comrades, reading the Episcopal burial service, so that the dead might have a christian burial.

On the first of December, 1863, he was promoted to major of the regiment and performed the duties of the position until his fatal wound, which occurred May 16, 1864, at Drury's Bluff, Va., where he was wounded in the right shoulder. He was removed to the hospital at Fort Monroe, Va., afterwards to Concord, New Hampshire, where he died of his wounds, June 22, 1864, a brave soldier and beloved officer. As a mark of honor, General Butler named one of the forts on the James river Fort Sawyer, as a recognition of his faithful and devoted services in the field.

The original company consisted of 101 men, to which were added during the war 40 recruits, a total of 141 men. One other recruit was assigned to Co. A— John Harrington — but was detailed in the Second band. Being a member of the original band his name appears in the band roster. One of the original men did not leave the state, making the true strength of the company 140. Eight of the recruits who deserted will be found in the deserters' list. Sixty-seven of the company are known to be dead, seven of whom were recruits. Twenty-four of the company died in the war; three of them were recruits. The postoflice addresses of forty-four are known, nine of whom were recruits.

The original first three officers of the company are among the dead. This was one of the smallest companies of the regiment and therefore a smaller number is unaccounted for than in many of the other companies.

Capt. Sleeper and First Lieut. Richardson of the original first officers have passed away. Lieutenant Richardson served three years with the regiment, and afterwards was a captain in the Hancock Veteran Corps. Lieut. F. A. Kendall, after four years' service, served for a long time in the regular army, and is now a retired captain. Sergt. Sarsons was promoted to first lieutenant and captain. Sergt. Wheeler to second

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and first lieutenants and captain, but declined the last two. Sergt. Seaver was promoted to second lieutenant. Private Norman Burdick was promoted to second lieutenant. Private Wm. D. Stearns to sergeant-major and afterwards to second lieutenant. Privates Silas P. Hubbard and George D. Stiles were promoted to second lieutenants in U. S. C. Troops.

One of the recruits of this company, as will be seen in the list of deserters, served in both Union and Rebel armies, and was taken prisoner by both sides.

Lieut. Col. Gilman E. Sleeper was born in Kingston, N. H., in 1831. He enlisted April 27, 1861, in Company K, First Regiment New Hampshire Volunteers, and was commissioned captain April 30. He was mustered out with his regiment Aug. 9, 1861, and immediately recruited Company C of the Fourth Regiment. and was mustered in as captain, Sept. 18, 1861. At St. Augustine, Fla., May 16, 1862, he was promoted to lieutenant colonel. In the fall of 1862 his health gave way, which was the cause of his resignation, Nov. 27, 1863. Col. Sleeper returned to his home in Salem, N. H., where he died after a lingering illness of consumption, Oct. 22, 1864. He was an excellent officer, respected by all who were associated with him, who regretted his departure from the regiment and were pained to learn of his death at the early age of thirtythree years. Although a citizen when he died, he gave his life for his native land.

This company had 101 original men and 84 recruits, making 185 men on their rolls, the largest number of any company in the regiment. Two of the original men did not go out, so the true number was 183. Thirty-eight of this company died in the war, 11 of whom were recruits. Eight of the recruits of this company are on the deserter's list. Sixty-two are reported dead on this roster, 15 of whom were recruits. Forty of the men re-enlisted. At St. Augustine, Fla., June 13, 1862, by the upsetting of a boat in the harbor three of this company were drowned-Chas. C. Cofran, John Lanıy, and Luther L. Libby. Capts. Badger and Burleigh were unfortunate at Bermuda Hundred, Va., and they were dismissed from the service. A misunderstanding at the front between themselves and some other officer as to who was responsible for an order given to retreat from the skirmish line was the cause of this. It was afterward shown to the satisfaction of the war department that they were guiltless and the disability of dismission was removed. They were good officers, respected by those who knew them best. Capt. Badger was afterwards commissioned colonel of the regiment but there not being men enough he could not be mus-

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tered in. Since the war he has served in the regular army and is now a retired captain. Capt. Burleigh went out second lieutenant, was promoted to first lieutenant and captain of Company I. First Sergt. Timothy W. Challis was promoted to second and first lieutenant, and then made adjutant, which position he filled at our muster-out, when he was breveted major. Sergt. Jewett was promoted to second and first lieutenant. Sergt. Davis became second lieutenant, was commissioned first lieutenant but declined it. Sergt. Knowlton was promoted to first lieutenant and then made captain of Company H. Sergt. Prescott entered the service a corporal, was made sergeant and promoted to first lieutenant, serving through the entire history of the regiment. The first three officers of the company are now living. Lieut, Jennison is now a practicing physician at Greenville, Mich.

Frank W. Parker was born in Bedford, N. H., Oct. 9, 1837. He was mustered in as first lieutenant of Company E, Fourth Regiment New Hampshire Volunteers, Sept. 18, 1861, and was promoted to captain, Jan. 17, 1862. While temporarily in command of the regiment at Deep Bottom, Va., Aug. 16, 1864, he was severely wounded in the neck. Jan. 13, 1865, he was promoted to lieutenant colonel. At Little Washington, N. C., April 9, 1865, he was taken prisoner but was paroled in three weeks. During the rest of our service Col. Parker was in command of the regiment until our muster-out, Aug. 23, 1865. Col. Parker was the only officer who went out in 1861 with the regiment as an officer and continued to serve in it during its four years' service. Major Towle was connected with the regiment all the time but was for some time on detached service on Gen. Ames's staff. Col. Parker tanght school before the war and has ever since his return from the army except two years during which he completed his studies in Germany. He has for several years been superintendent of Cook County Normal school, Chicago, and has published several educational works and attained national prominence as a lecturer. He has an honorable war record, a credif to his command and the state.

The original company consisted of 101 men, to which were added during the war, 62 recruits, a total of 163. Fourteen of the recruits deserted. Sixty-three of the company are dead, of whom seven were recruits; 21 died in the war, of whom six were recruits. The postoffice addresses of 53 are known, 11 of whom were recruits.

As will be seen above, all but three of the original members are accounted for, and those three have been lost trace of in the last few years. All of the volunteer recruits are accounted for. The 44 unknown were all

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substitutes not belonging in this section of the country and absolutely nothing has been known of them since the war. Undoubtedly a large proportion of them are dead. This explanation will apply to the unknown recruits in each of the other nine companies.

Lieut. Parker was promoted to captain and commanded the company three years, being the only survivor of the first three officers. He was promoted to lieutenant colonel, and there being no colonel after Col. Bell was killed, he was ever after in command of the regiment. Second Lieut. Edgerly was promoted to first lieutenant and discharged after one and a half year's service. First Sergt. Frank B. Hutehinson was promoted to second lieutenant Oct. 26, 1862. At the battle of Drury's Bluff, Va., May 16, 1864, he was reported as among the missing.

> ** Not among the suffering wounded, Not among the peaceful dead, Not among the prisoners — missing — That was all the message said."

A very careful investigation has convinced his brother, the author of this volume, that he was without doubt instantly killed. The following is taken from the report of the adjutant general of New Hampshire for 1866. "Lieut. Frank B. Hutchinson was last seen tiring his revolver within a few feet of the enemy. He was a soldier that never showed fear, and never tlinched from his duty."

N. H. VOLUNTEERS.

Corporal Charles M. Whiting was promoted to sergeant, then to first sergeant, and afterwards to first lientenant of the company. He was severely wounded July 30, 1864. Corporal Edwin Whitford was also promoted to sergeant and first sergeant, then to first lieutenant of Company I, and soon after to captain of Company G. Corporal Volney Piper was promoted to quartermaster sergeant of the regiment. Herman Greager was given the position of chief bugler, and afterward served in the Second band. Co. E went into the battle of Drnry's Bluff with 42 men and lost in killed, wounded and prisoners, 28. Nine of the 28 were killed, or died in the hands of the enemy. Private Charles H. Smithford was promoted to sergeant major.

Company F was the smallest company of the regiment of original members, consisting at first of eightyfour rank and file and three officers, a total of eightyseven, when the other nine companies had the maxi-

mum number of three officers and ninety-eight men. Six others were enlisted and were mustered in the day we left the state, so these men are placed in this roster as original men, as they should be, and not as reeruits as they have always been placed, making the total strength of this company when the regiment started for the front of ninety-three. During the service seventynine recruits were received. The total to be accounted for, one hundred and seventy-two. One of the original men did not go out, and thirteen of the reernits appear in the deserters' list. Twenty-six of the company died in the war, and fourteen of them were recruits. Fortynine are now known to be dead, and seventeen of them were recruits. Fifty-two are living,-ten recruits and forty-two original. Forty of this company re-enlisted. According to the number of men available to reenlist, a larger per cent re-enlisted from this company than from any of the other companies of the regiment.

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moted to captain of Company A. Corporal Clarence L. Chapman was promoted to first lieutenant and captain and served until after the war. Stephen J. Wentworth went to war as a private soldier, was promoted to sergeant, then to second lieutenant of Company K, and was killed at Deep Bottom, Va., Aug. 15, 1864. Sergt. George A. Drew was commissioned second lieutenant Second South Carolina Colored Troops.

Lorenzo D. Huntress was promoted to sergeant and first lieutenant of Company I. His picture appears on page 112. An error makes his name read Leonard H., which should read Lorenzo D. Charles O. Rankin of Somersworth, N. H., appears on all the New Hampshire adjutant-generals' reports as having died in the war. He is still living, although reported dead for the last thirty-two years.

DESERTERS.

The following one hundred and nine men have been separated from their companies and classed by themselves as having deserted. All of them were reeruits, and nearly all were substitutes, alias bounty-jumpers. Some served a few months, many but a few days. They disgraced the regiment and the state that sent them to keep company with good soldiers. Care has been taken in preparing this list, and we were governed by the following rule. But few of the original men deserted and none of those until after they had rendered considerable service, many of them being wounded, and some serving a long time as prisoners of war. One comrade served all through the war and deserted ten days before our muster out. Such names, as well as the recruits who rendered similar service, have been omitted from this list. SUMMARY.

The Fourth Regiment was connected with the Department of the South and was stationed at various places in South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida until April, 1864, afterwards it saw service in Virginia and North Carolina in the following commands:

April 25 to June 19, 1864, in First Brigade, Third Division, Tenth Army Corps.

June 19 to Dec. 3, 1864, in Third Brigade, Second Division, Tenth Army Corps.

Dec. 3, 1864, to April 2, 1865, in Third Brigade, Second Division, Twenty-fourth Army Corps.

April 2 to July 13, 1865, in Third Brigade, Second Division, Tenth Army Corps.

July 13 to Aug. 23, 1865, in First Brigade, Second Division, Tenth Army Corps.

The adjutant general of New Hampshire credits the regiment with having 1,759 men during the four years' service. Three of these men served in other commands; one in the Fifth New Hampshire and two in the United States colored troops. Their names do not appear in this roster.

Officers and men who went with the regiment, 1,030. Number known to be dead, 506.

Eighty-nine different officers held commissions in the regiment. Only thirty-six of these are dead. More than half of the rank and tile are dead. The regiment had twenty-nine captains; but five are known to be dead.

Of the first ten captains who went out in 1861, only

three are dead. A commission as captain in this regiment would seem to tend to longevity.

The first death in the regiment was James B. Patterson of Company B, Oct. 31, 1861.

The last death was James FittsSimmons of Company K, who was killed by accident on the cars Aug. 25, 1865, when the regiment was en route for home.

In the remarks made at the end of each company roster, those as having $di \epsilon d$ in the war include the killed and died of disease.

The oldest survivor, Dr. Josiah C. Eastman.

The youngest survivor, James A. Farnham, the drummer boy of the first band.

It should have been stated in the remarks on Company C, that Lieut. Kendall was promoted to first lieutenant and captain. He served all through the war and was honorably discharged six days before our muster out. He has since served several years in the regular army and is now a retired captain.

Nearly twelve hundred of the regiment were residents of New Hampshire when they enlisted, about two hundred seventy-five of whom were residents of Manchester.

Average age going to war, 26; average now, 61. A few are less than 50; a large number less than 55; a few over 80. Over 200 reside in New Hampshire and 60 in Massachusetts. In more than two thirds of the states there are residing survivors of the regiment, and a few in several foreign countries. **PD** Commons

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
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
