Served Chapter as Treasurer, Vice-Regent and Regent. Revolutionary ancestors, Col. Thomas Tash, Dr. Edmund Chadwick, Rev. Josiah Stearns, John Stearns, Hezekiah Hayes, William Kingman, John Kingman.

Mrs. Lila B. Roberts was born in Kennebunk, Me. Graduated from Kennebunkport High School and later the family came to Dover to live. She became the wife of William H. R. chapter in 1917, National No. 131497 on the service record of Abednogo Leathers, a private at Portsmouth Harbor, in Nov. 1775.

#### MARY BUTLER CHAPTER Laconia, N. H.

Chapter Work under Six Regencies:

Mrs. Harry C. Sanborn 1928-1930

Contributed ten dollars toward platform chair for Constitution Hall, twenty-five dollars to Dover Neighborhood House, five dollars for dolls and toys for Tamassee School, five dollars to state library fund, box to Ellis Island. Conducted a silver tea for Laconia Hospital netting twenty dollars and sixty-five cents. Sponsored float on Armistice Day which won first prize, also put on an elaborate shawl pageant. Twenty-five Revolutionary soldiers' graves were marked.

Mrs. Edwin M. Heard 1930-1931

Contributed \$5. to Dover Neighborhood House, \$10.00, a box and picture of Old Man of Mountain to Tamassee School. Box was sent to Ellis Island. Located and marked tree in Sanbornton. Put on pageant "In an Antique Shop". Chapter was represented at Northern Divisional meeting, State Forestry Conference, State Conference and Continental Congress.

Mrs. Henry Spindle 1931-1933

Entertained the 30th annual conference of the state organization. A member of Mary Butler Chapter, Mrs. Gertrude Whitten Sanborn was elected State Regent. Contributed \$3. for indexing books in Washington, \$10.00 to Dover Neighborhood House, \$20.00 and a Christmas box to Tamassee. Purchased one dozen Bi-Centennial plates. Sent \$6.00 to Ellis Island, \$10.00 to High School for best essays on American History. Bought eleven markers for Revolutionary soldiers' graves and had three donated. Sent books to Coast Guard, \$25. toward debt on Constitution Hall, \$5. to Mr. Kearsarge Fund, \$5 to Student Loan Fund. Also gave medals to students attaining highest rank in history in senior class and in citizenship in eighth grade. Sponsored lecture at American Legion Hall.

Mrs. Louis Parent 1933-1935

Chapter was hostess to 32nd State Conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Placed bronze marker on bridge at Weirs, marking Endicott Rock, Aqueductan Village and Old Block House. Contributed to Student Loan Fund, Tamassee School, Constitution Hall debt, Berea College, Kenmore Association, Ellis Island. Sent books for Seaman's Friend Society. Copied inscriptions on graves in two towns. Gave to Orphans' Home, Children's Aid and Protective Society, Infantile paralysis and tuberculosis funds, Kearsarge Mt. project, prizes for historical essays in high school and eighth grade. Bought and gave to girl and boy scouts 250 flag codes.

Mrs. Greenwood H. Knight 1935-1937

Chapter contributed to approved schools, Good Citizenship Pilgrimage, (medal to girls), prizes to Junior and Senior High School students for excellence in history and good citizenship. Collected and presented old deeds to N. H. Historical Society. Contributed to Children's Aid and Protective Society, Ellis Island, purchased a case to hold Revolutionary treasures and placed same in Laconia Public Library.

Mrs. Cyrus R. Varney 1937-1939

Chapter contributed to Tamassee, Crossnore and Hillside Schools, Ellis Island, N. H. Tuberculosis Asso., Orphans' Home, Student Loan Fund, Children's Aid and Protective Society, Kenmore Association and Good Citizenship Pilgrimage. Distributed 100 French Manuals and 50 English Manuals of Citizenship. Was 100% in support of D. A. R. work. Gave \$5. to Senior Class of Laconia High School to aid in issuing their annual book, gave \$10. for best historical essays in eighth grade and senior classes. Contributed to Penny Pine Planting Project, also to State Library Fund. Located site of First Church to be built in what is now the town of Gilford. Began restoration around the site of cabin where Ebenezer and Mary Butler Eastman lived, and in cemetery where they and some of their children are buried. Celebrated the twentieth anniversary of chapter.

Mrs. Walter H. True 1939-1940

Chapter has contributed to the following: history prizes in High School \$10., also Kenmore, Student Loan Fund, N. H. Children's Aid

and Protective Society, Crossnore, Hillside and Tamassee Schools, Ellis Island, N. H. Tuberculosis Asso., Franklin Orphans' Home, Golden Rule Farm, National Defense, N. H. Room, Manuals for Citizenship, press relations, N. H. Crippled children, Penny Pine Planting Project, State Library Fund and per capita tax for Archives Room in Washington.
