The Butler Homesite is location on the Class VI portion of Mary Butler Lane in Gilmanton Corners. Mary Butler Eastman and her husband, Lt. Ebenezer Eastman, are buried in Copp Cemetery on Province Road. The site is under the care of the Cemetery Trustees.
