Dear Mrs. Lyman:

On August 19, the writer inspected the new sewage disposal system at the school across the brook from your house. As you may know, it consists of a 1,000-gallon septic tank and a dry well some 10 feet deep. The latter is over 25 feet from the brook, and after consideration of the type of soil and size of the dry well it is felt that there is no potential danger of pollution of the brook.

As there is to be a concrete cover over the dry well with two feet of overburden, I am sure there will be no nuisance from odors.

I trust this information will allay your concern about the new system.

my land & into the cellar  
it will cause a lot of trouble  
for me and a possible case  
against the town, for I can't  
afford to have my water  
polluted. I hope you are all  
well & that the hot spell didn't  
wreak you too uncomfortable
