On March 10, 2016 a request for a recount of Article #1, Selectman – 3 Year Term on the town ballot, was presented by Donald J. Guarino to the Town Clerk/Tax Collector and was in compliance with RSA 669:31II (b).

On March 11, 2016 a request for a recount on Article III (By Petition) Bio-Solids on the town ballot was presented by Leonard C. Swanson to the Town Clerk/Tax Collector, and was in compliance with RSA 40:4-c I. Recount requirements.

The Town Clerk/Tax Collector, in accordance with RSA 669:31 I and RSA 40:4-c and 40:4-c II, set a date of Wednesday, March 16, 2016 at 6:00 p.m. for the Board of Recount to conduct said recounts.

The Board of Recount: Moderator, Mark Sisti; Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Debra Cornett; Selectmen: Michael Jean, Marshall Bishop and Rachel Frechette Hatch, pro tem appointed.

Ballot Inspectors present: Kathleen Brooks, Michelle Descoteaux, Kristyn Fischev, Michael Hatch, Diane Labelle, Julie Perkins, Andrea Schaffnit, and Leonard Schaffnit.

Requestor of each article, Donald Guarino and Leonard Swanson were each present for the recount.

Town Clerk, Debra Cornett, explained that the box containing the ballots for page two of two for the town ballot and box containing the school ballots would first be unsealed and the ballots removed for the ballot inspectors to inspect each ballot to ensure that town ballot one of two was not mixed in with those ballots. Uncast ballots were also inspected and viewed by the ballot inspectors, board of recount and the requestors. It was found that there was no pages one of two ballots mixed in with either of those boxes.

The remaining two boxes containing ballot one of two, cancelled ballots, write-ins, and absentee requests were opened and each ballot was inspected by the ballot inspectors to sort out any page two of two ballots, which were separated from the page one of two ballots. The ballot inspectors were then instructed to separate the page one of two ballots for the recount on selectman into one pile for Stephen McWhinnnie and one pile for Donald Guarino.

The inspectors were then instructed to count each of pile of those ballots in groups of ten, staggered. The Moderator then viewed each ballot pile and the Town Clerk counted and recorded each stack. The result of the hand recount on Article #1 for the three year Selectman position was: Stephen P. McWhinnie 514 votes, picking up one more vote in the recount. Donald J. Guarino's total count remained at 501.

Moderator Mark Sisti declared Stephen P. McWhinnie the winner to the three year position of Selectman. Town Clerk, Debra Cornett, gave Mr. McWhinnie his official Oath of Office immediately following the declaration. Congratulations to Stephen McWhinnie as one of our new Selectman!

The ballot inspectors re-sorted the entire one of two ballots for the next recount of Article #3, Bio-solids into two piles, one for yes votes, and the other for no votes. The Moderator made his determination on those ballots questionably marked. The same process of then stacking those two piles into counts of ten ballots, staggered was done. Moderator Sisti then viewed each ballot and Town Clerk, Debra Cornett, counted and recorded each stack. The result of the recount on Article #3 for Bio-solids was: Yes -504 and No -532. Article #3 failed.







RECOUNT OF TOWN MEETING BALLOT ARTICLE #2 MARCH 28, 2012 6:30 P.M.

On March 19, 2012 a request for a recount of Article #2 on the Town Ballot was presented to the Town Clerk/Tax Collector and was in compliance with RSA 40:4-c I. Recount requirements. The Town Clerk/Tax Collector per RSA 40:4-c set a date of Wednesday, March 28, 2012 at 6:30 p.m. for the Board of Recount to conduct said recount in accordance with RSA 40:4-c II.

Present for the recount of Town Ballot Article #2: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 known as (SB 2) to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Gilmanton on the second Tuesday of March (BY PETITION)".

The Board of Recount: Moderator, Mark Sisti; Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Debra Cornett; Selectmen: Rachel Frechette Hatch and Brett Currier.

Community members present: Judy Wilson and Cindy Houghton.

Moderator Sisti called recount to order at 6:35 p.m.

Town Clerk, Debra Cornett, opened the sealed ballots and removed the ballots from the box. The photocopied ballots that had been hand counted on election night and banded to keep them separate were removed first. The remaining regular ballots that were read by the Accuvote machine were removed next.

The regular ballots were first sorted by the Board of Recount into "yes", "no", "blank" and "over vote" piles by each member and then consolidated and placed into staggering groups of 10. The band was removed from the **photocopied ballots** and sorted in the same manner and these ballots were counted first with the following result: Yes - 46; No - 26; Blank - 5.

The regular ballots were counted next with the following result: Yes -474; No -303; Blank -36; Over voted -2.

The totals were as follows: Yes - 520; No - 329

Total "Yes": 520 + Total "No": 329 = 849. Calculation for the 3/5ths majority: Total number of votes cast: $849 \times .60 = 509.4$ (510 "yes" votes were needed for passage) Moderator Sisti declared that Article #2 passed by the required 3/5 majority.

The total number of voters of on Election Day was 892. The number of ballots cast: 520 + 329 = 849 + 41 blank ballots on Article #2 + 2 over voted ballots (yes and no were both filled in) = 892. The number of voters and ballots match.





The Optional Exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be as follows:

For a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, (\$20,000): for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, (\$30,000): for a person 80 years of age or older (\$40,000). To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least five years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or, if married a combined income of less than \$12,000; and own net assets not in excess of (\$50,000) excluding the value of the person's residence. Chapter 292 Session Laws 1949

An Act Relating to Beano

The following question shall be submitted to the voters in cities at the annual or biennial election and in towns at the annual meeting:

(1) Local Option:

"Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this city or town?"

In cities having an official ballot this question shall appear upon the official ballot. In towns where no official ballot is used, the vote on this question shall be by special ballot. If a majority of the qualified voters present and voting at any municipal election signifies the approval of the question hereinbefore stated, the selectmen of said town or the chief of police of said city may issue licenses for the conduct of games of beano under the provisions of said Chapter 171-A.

And a majority of the voters having signified their approval of the question, the Moderator declared that this town voted to license the game of beano.
